They hadn't seen him in six months. A master sergeant in the U.S. Air Force, he returned that morning, Nov. 3, from a deployment to the United Arab Emirates.

"To see them there, it was awesome," Darrell said.
"It's good to see the community come together for this."

"The Clarkston Elementary family is very supportive. It's great," said Sarah Bublitz, his wife. "It's been a long six months."

Students, parents, and staff lined up waving flags with Darrell at one end when the children emerged from the school at the end of their day.

"Welcome home," said Principal Brian Adams to Darrell. "Thank you for everything. We appreciate everything you do."

Parents and staff at the school organized the homecoming welcome after receiving word of his arrival earlier in the week.

"We were thinking about an assembly for after school, to give him time to get home and settle in," said Jeanette Early, PTO president.

This was Darrell's fifth tour overseas, two-and-a-half years altogether. His deployment in the UAE was with the 127th Wing, out of Selfridge Michigan Air National Guard Base. He arrived home that morning at 7:30 a.m., after a 16-hour flight.

Sanjay Dutta of Clarkston was at the local post office last week when he noticed Steve Kennedy needed some assistance.

"I asked, can I help you," Dutta said.

They got to talking and he soon realized Kennedy, 91, is a World War II veteran like his father, who served with the British Army.

With Veterans Day coming up, Dutta figured he deserved more so he called his friend Pete Caruso, owner of Uncle Peter's Pasties in Independence Township.

By Thursday afternoon, Caruso had organized a luncheon for Kennedy and several other veterans at his Sashabaw Road eatery, Nov. 3, as well as for diners stopping in to eat.

"I thought when I shook his hand, It's amazing, his grip is like steel," said Matthew Rzepnicka, who had stopped in to eat. "He's so strong at 91 years old."

"I think this is incredible – it's like being welcomed home from World War II," Kennedy said.

Easterseals Michigan, Clarkston SCAMP, My Habitat Clarkston, and Clarkston Area Youth Assistance will each receive \$1,820.87.





Here we are with two months left of 2017 and I was in a group setting when someone asked quite a few questions.


One, did you fulfill the goals you set for yourself at the beginning of the year?



"Michalak named Young Woman of Year" Exhibiting all-around ability and poise, Clarkston High School senior Kim Michalek topped a field of 14 contestants to with the 1992-93 Junior Miss Young Woman of the Year contest.

City to consider more no-parking areas

The Clarkston city Parking Committee called on City Council to consider a list of recommendations at next week's meeting.

"Our backs are against the wall, we have to do something," said Council member Rick Detkowski at the Oct. 23 meeting. "This is a bandaid until spring, when hopefully we'll have the funds to address this."

Recommendations include no-parking posted on E. Church Street, no parking on S. Buffalo, and "no on-street parking" or "offstreet parking only" signs on E. Washington.

The changes are needed because the roads do not meet American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) standards for width, Detkowski said.

"We've had near misses - if we had actual accidents, we'd be in big trouble," he said.

A claim against the city could increase its ongoing rates, said City Manager Jonathan Smith.

Recommendations also include bagging the no-parking signs during holidays,

consult with city engineers HRC on how to make the streets compliant, ask the Signs and Streets Committee to consider signs to direct patrons to available parking, and review ordinances to prepare for future businesses coming into town.

"How do we use the lessons learned and create requirements for potential new businesses to address parking - explore updating the parking deferment ordinance," Detkowski said. "Do we update and make it viable for businesses and adhere to the law, or do we continue to ignore it?"

Installation of a parking kiosk at the Washington and Main parking lot should be complete by the middle of November, said Smith.

A dedicated bank account has been set up, which will allow credit card payments, parking spot numbering is complete, and a parking enforcement official has been hired.

The parking kiosk was purchased from Harvey Electronics and Radio at a total cost of \$9,775. All parking revenue from the lot, \$1 per hour for its 58 spaces, would be used to pay for the parking lot.





"They beat Rockford (33-28)."


"I am excited," added Cantu.


Lake Orion won the next close battle also with a 25-23 score.

Senior Jen Chupinsky had 32 digs. Nowicki had 15 kills and Johnson had 11 kills.


The Lady Wolves continued with a 3-0 victory over Brandon, 25-13, 25-19, 25-14 for the championship title.


Malinowski had 15 kills and three blocks against Brandon. Luchenbach had six kills and four blocks and Chupinsky had 24 digs and one ace.







Firefighters answer call for aid

Independence Township Fire Department recently helped out other Oakland County communities when they lost water pressure.

"There was a water main break in the West Bloomfield/Farmington Hills area (Oct. 23) that resulted in a number of communities in the area being either with very little water pressure or, in some communities, no water pressure. We responded based on a mutual aid request to provide a tanker truck to the areas," Independence Township Fire Chief Mitch Petterson said.

Personnel from the township's fire department went to a Novi fire station and spent the afternoon and stayed overnight covering the area, Petterson said. If a fire occurred, they were around to provide water.

It's common for groups within Oakland County to provide aid to each other. Petterson said they provide and receive it on a frequent basis, usually within surrounding communities such as Lake Orion, Waterford and Brandon Township.

"This one was just slightly out of the ordinary because it was a little bit further away. Novi is not part of our bordering neighbors. Because we have tankers we can

provide, they called us instead of calling one of their closer departments," he said.

The water pressure has improved, Petterson said, and the communities are confident they can provide enough water for fire suppression.

"It's relatively routine business for us to provide mutual aid," Petterson added. "We're always happy to help out and we know they're there for us if we need them."





Candle Factory closing at end of year

A charming brick building located in the center of downtown Davisburg has spent the better part of the year up for sale.

The Davisburg Candle Factory has been around since the 1970s and offers a unique shopping location for specialty candles, from holiday decorations to animal designs to your favorite Michigan sports team.

The shop's last day before closing is Dec 31, 2017. Phoebe Bojanzyk, who owns the shop with her two daughters, Melissa and Laurel, said there has been interested buyers, but nothing concrete yet.

"It's for sale and we're hoping someone will buy it and keep it as a candle factory because we hate to be the ones to end it," Bojanzyk said.

All the candles are made in-shop using original equipment from when the factory first opened. When entering the shop, the complex system can be seen behind the counter, with candle merchandise upstairs.

Bojanzyk also decorates the candles in best

the shop. She said they've made just about every design.

"We've had some weird requests over the years and we've done it," she added.

Bojanzyk's describes her daughter, Laurel, as a "candle nut."

"She came here and shopped and when she found out it was for sale, she just was relentless," Bojanzyk said of when they first purchased the store.

The family has owned the candle factory going on 18 years and Bojanzyk said they're ready to move on from the business.

"We're all just tired of it," she explained. "The weekends especially. We've lost a lot of family time over the years because of having to be here, so we've just had enough."

The Davisburg Candle Factory is located at 634 Broadway and is open through the end of the year.

"We're just hoping someone will buy it and keep it open, but we have no control over that," Bojanzyk said. "We hope for the



Hunt history with coin collecting

As a Kindergartener on the way to school in the 1940s, Chuck Sharp stopped by a gas station and asked the manager for some change for the penny peanut and gum machines.

Instead of using the changer on his belt, the man swept some coins from the till and put them in his hand.

"They were white, like silver. I was startled. 'Hey, you gave me dimes,'" Sharp told him.

They were pennies, but zinc coated, issued during World War II to save on copper.

"That got me interested in coins. Since then, I wanted to learn all I could about them," he said.

The longtime coin collector founded the Clarkston Area Coin Club for fellow numismatists interested in sharing their hobby. They meet the second Tuesday of the month from 6:30-9 p.m. at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, 5464 Waterford Road off Maybee Road in Independence Township

"We have a dozen regulars now, a couple young folks. That's the future," Sharp said. "We're a straight up educational organization, following the broad pattern of clubs formed in Huron Valley, Jackson, and Ann Arbor."

They focus on education, grading, identification, and authentication of any coin

or piece of currency.

"The history of it, why is it there, why not today, who's on it, what caused that? There are many aspects," he said.

They collect Indian and Buffalo pennies, two-cent pieces, three-cent pieces, a 20-cent piece, 2 ½ dollar gold piece, and countless other varieties.

"It's possible to collect them with diligence. You have to be innovative, check with relatives, friends, fellow collectors with duplicates," he said. "One fellow in the coin club goes to the bank and he gets rolls of change, and looks through them carefully."

Coins with mint errors including filled dates, from when a die stress crack forms and metal oozes in, are very interesting.

Some mint errors can be valuable, such as a 1922 Lincoln cent with no mint mark.

"One cent could be worth hundreds of dollars to a collector," he said. "When I was a kid I would cash my paycheck and get silver dollars. I still have one from 1952. It's worn out, but it's a memory."

Plans for the club, which started in October 2016, include a kids camp on the Federal Reserve in the summer. Speakers, such as experts on Civil War tokens, are also on tap.

"During the Depression, times of war, any economic hard times, they use tokens – all kinds of money are used," he said. "There's adventure and excitement of discovery, even in change. It teaches persistence."





and sewer payments. In the past, this task include opening up stacks and stacks of envelopes containing payments delivered by the postal service and then manually entering the payments into our system.

With an eye on the future, we implemented a few new methods for

receiving payments in the past 4 years including the following:

- Township is now an electronic vendor for most online payments you process from your bank
- We have established automatic billing and collection of water and sewer bills
- We implemented an automated lockbox at our bank where are processed payments electronically.

So what are the results of these efforts? In the table to the right you can see that over a 4 year period, we have increased the collection of funds via automated methods from 28% in 2013 to 63% in 2016 and we hope to get over 70% for 2017.

Fall lawn care for watershed protection

As we leave summer boating and swimming

behind, what can we be doing this fall to keep our rivers healthy and clean? We can be smart about fertilizing and raking leaves! Fall chores have an impact on the storm water runoff coming from our yards. Here are simple steps you can do to help keep our rivers, streams, and lakes healthy—

1. Do not dump your leaves into storm drains or ditches!

Decomposing leaves add excessive nutrients that cause

algae growth and take the oxygen out of the water that goes directly to our rivers. This harms fish and other aquatic animals and destroys their habitat.

2. Fertilizer should be applied in the fall for a healthy lawn in the spring. When applying fertilizer, keep a minimum 10 foot buffer from ditches, storm drains and streams. This prevents nitrogen and phosphorus from washing into our waterways.

3. Do not dump any materials down storm drain catch basins in streets or parking lots. All storm drains are connected directly to the St. Clair River and Lake St. Clair! Remember, only rain in the drain!

Independence Township educational video series garners 2 national awards



Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) just notified Independence Township that the intersection of Oak Hill and Sashabaw Roads will be converted to an All-Way Stop.

The stop sign installations and conversion of the existing signal flashers to all red will be completed by the first week in December. Travel speeds along Sashabaw Road combined with increasing vehicular traffic both east and

west on Oak Hill Road have contributed to a significant number of crashes over the past three years.

The All-Way Stop is an interim step to improve safety at this intersection as RCOC pursues a funding source to widen the intersection with dedicated left turn lanes and installation of a fully functioning traffic signal or construction of a modern roundabout. As always, please drive safely.



The Clarkston Chiefs dominated the National Youth Football League Superbowl at Clarkston High School on Saturday.



They advanced to the championship after winning the American Division with a 250 win over Avondale, Oct. 29.


The Chiefs JV Blue team also won their Superbowl game on Saturday with a 20-12 win over Avondale.





Accusations flew and questions fired throughout dinner and drinks until the decisive moment when the murderer was found out to be—Honest Abe Flores.

"I wanted to get the gold," Flores exclaimed after confessing, claiming Cherry Creek Saloon would go under without it.

"That's why Abe killed him, to

save the bar," explained Al Bartlett, who played Honest Abe, after the reveal to attendees of the Clarkston Area Chamber of Commerce's Murder Mystery Dinner, hosted by the chamber's Young Professionals Network.

"We hope everybody had a good time," Bartlett added. He was one of several Clarkston Village Players to act out character/suspects at the event. Several chamber members volunteered for acting parts as well.




All the students were grateful to the PTA and the community for raising the money as well.

"Coats for the Cold" Coat Drive celebrated their 30th year last week with a kick-off event at Clarkston's Genisys Credit Union.

Oakland County Sheriff Michael Bouchard began the coat drive and estimates they collect thousands of coats each year.

"When I started the program, I had seen people huddling by steam grates and they're cold," Bouchard said. "I felt compelled to do something and when I got home I hung my coat up and saw that I had a number of virtually brand-new coats, but lots of times, people give you a coat as a gift or you buy a different one, next thing you know that one that's in great shape just sits in the closest, and I thought probably a lot of people have that."

The coats are donated to several charities throughout the county and Bouchard said the only stipulation is the coats go to someone in need for free.

Coats can be dropped off at 65 locations throughout the county, including several Genisys locations.

"We're able to receive coats that will then be donated to people who are in need," Genisys Clarkston Branch Manager Jason Hermiz said. "It's very important to have that community involvement and be a place where we can help the community by making a difference and giving them needs that they may not be able to get on their own."

The event also included an appearance

by 98.7 AMP Radio station, another partner of the coat drive, located in Southfield.

"Being on the radio and trying to get people in, clean out their closet, that kind of thing, they might not even know that what they have can really make a difference in somebody else's life," Hermiz said.

Bouchard explained attendees of the kickoff event could enter to win Lady Gaga and Pistons tickets if they donated a coat during the event.

"People get a chance to have a fun night by doing a good thing, that's a win-win," he added.

They're also partnering with Oakland County Animal Shelter, Bouchard said. Donating a coat gets \$10 off an adoption fee, up to \$50 if you bring in five coats.

"If you're looking for giving a little love to an animal that needs to be adopted and also have the opportunity to give a coat to somebody that needs one in a winter season, that's a marriage made in Heaven," Bouchard said.

Throughout the month of November, Oakland County Sheriff's will pick up coats at the different drop-off locations.

"We'll have boxes here available for the Oakland County Sheriff's to make pick-ups. Hopefully we call them a lot and they come and pick up our full boxes," Hermiz said. "We're just very happy that we can help."




This scholarship is awarded on a competitive basis to students who demonstrate exemplary academic achievement, character, and a commitment to environmental stewardship.
