That once a year treat doesn't seem so harmless anymore.

you put in your children's baskets last year? Take a look on the back of those treats to see exactly what that bunny is leaving behind. The usual culprits are as follows:

I'll begin with all the added sugar, which is high in fructose. Not only is it bad for teeth, but it does a nasty number on the liver, gut, heart, and brain.

Corn syrup is sweeter and cheaper than natural sugar and can wreak havoc on the liver. Fatty liver leads to obesity, as well as diabetes, stroke, and heart disease.

Dextrose is a cheap added sugar popular with manufacturers because of its affordability. Most of the time, it's made from genetically modified (GMO) corn. It can cause heart disease, stroke, diabetes, and even cancer.

Monoglycerides (just another fancy name for Trans Fats) cause diabetes, strokes, and heart attacks. There's no "safe" level of this ingredient.

City Council voted unanimously, March 26, to approve new regulations on driveway sealants in the city.

The new ordinance bans the use and sale of coal-tar-based sealants. It also requires residents to get a one-time permit from the city to apply sealants on their driveways.

City council will set a fee for the permit at a later meeting. The ordinance takes effect 20 days after publication.

"Local woman finds success in running" Clarkston resident Darlene Smith, shared her adventures in running and as a triathlon which started three years prior. She fulfilled a dream of running 26.2 mile Detroit Press Marathon, placing seventh in her age group and qualfying for the Boston Marathon.

"Derby time" Cub Scouts participated in the Pinewood Derby competition at Springfield Oaks Activity Center. Paul Mueller won best-looking car as he made his look like a tank.

50 years ago - 1968

"Independence may be paying for ambulance" Richard Rudluff, a partner of Fleet Ambulance Service, spoke to the Independence Township board about a possible agreement whereby the township would pay for service within the area.

"Two parcels in zoning" There was considerable discussion of the proposed Deer Lake development of the former Ford property at the Independence Township meeting before a resolution was passed to rezone two parcels from Agriculture to Residential 1 and Residential 2.

"Winners in photo contest" Charles W. Phipps, of Pine Knob Road, was one of the winners in the 1967 Mid-America Photo contest sponsored by Mid-America Travel Directors Council.

Library funding honors agreement with voters

During our City Council meeting on Nov. 27, 2017, comments were made by PSLZ Certified Public Accountant Rana Emmons regarding the library millage credits that seemed to create some confusion within the council ("Audit clean, library millage talk returns," Nov. 29, 2017)

To gain the history of the millage, we reached out to Julie Meredith, who is the director of the Clarkston Independence District Library and she was able to provide a very detailed summary showing the linkage to the current millage.

An excerpt of that history, which dates to 1954, is:

• 2012, the Independence Township Board and Clarkston City Council approve the District Library agreement, forming the Clarkston Independence District Library with a millage rate of 1.25 mills, to be placed before voters with a deadline of approval of August 10, 2014. The city passes a resolution to reduce its general fund by 0.691 if the library's new funding passes in order to prevent double-charging residents for

library service.

• 2015, Clarkston Independence District Library funding takes effect.

On Jan. 22, 2018, Council member Scott Reynolds, City Manager Jonathan Smith, Treasurer Greg

Cote, and Rana Emmons from PSLZ CPA firm held an informal discussion to review the matter.

A couple of important points.

The City of the Village of Clarkston's

fiscal year runs July of a given year to June of the following year.

Given this, the initial starting period of this millage would have impacted the village starting in July 2014.

Clarkston is applying a credit of 0.691 on a fiscal-year bases to the maximum allowable millage as defined by Oakland County. Given Clarkston's fiscal year periods, this 0.691 credit was half applied then in our fiscal years of 2014 and 2015 in the amount of a 0.3455 credit (0.3455+0.3455=0.691).

The city treasurer provided the following information showing these credits:

• 2013, maximum allowed millage, 13.1979; city levy, 13.1979 (zero difference, library credit not yet applied);

• 2014, maximum allowed millage, 13.1979; city levy, 12.8524 (0.3455 difference, credit half applied);

• 2015, maximum allowed millage, 13.0777; city levy, 12.5069 (0.5708 difference, credit not fully applied);

• 2016, maximum allowed millage, 12.9168; city levy, 12.1056 (0.8112 difference to make up for 2015. The years 2015 and 2016 used an average value of these two combined fiscal years to be compliant, 0.5708+0.8112/2=0.691);

• 2017, maximum allowed millage, 12.7876; city levy, 12.0966 (0.691 difference).

In fiscal years 2015 and 2016, the city used a two-fiscal-year average to apply the 0.691 millage credit. In fiscal year 2017, the 0.691 millage credit was fully applied.

The 0.691 credit is not cumulative year over year, though the dollar differences are.

In conclusion, we feel the City of the Village of Clarkston is honoring the agreement reached regarding funding of the district library and the comments made by PSLZ during the Nov. 27, 2017, City Council meeting were not exact in their representation.



Two years, two state trophies

It was the ending all teams dream of holding up the state championship trophy in victory. The Clarkston cagers dominated Michigan State University's Breslin Center to bring home a back-to-back MHSAA Class A Boys Basketball State Championship with a 81-38 win over Holland West Ottawa on Saturday.

"This one brought me to tears," said Dan Fife, long-time head coach for the Wolves. "Last night, I was up thinking about the kids and the pressure, this moment – what it could mean to our community and our kids. Clarkston is such a great community. If we would have lost this game, I would have felt like I let them down. It's such a special place. It's a great place to live. It's home."

The first championship was special to him because it was something he dreamed of when he played for Clarkston and during his first 35 years coaching. But the championship in his 36th year coaching was more special.

"Having to go through a year from when we left this building, everyone starting talking about back-to-back," Fife said. "I know how hard that is because it took us so long to get the first one and if these kids can live up to the challenge. I can't say enough about these kids. You know it's in their hearts, once it's in your heart, you can't take it out."

He added they worked with each other and encouraged each other – they played together as a team.

"Along with our coaches Eric Chambers

and Tim Wasilk, it's just a great group to be around," Fife said. "It's been a great team. It's been a tremendous honor for me."

Fife added the win was an outstanding performance for the players defensively and rebounding.

"The difference was we were able to come out from the start to get a lead and set how the game was going to be played," he added. "We did a great job on defense. We talked about it last night watching film with the kids and they played about as well as they can play."

"To be honest, playing in this atmosphere on this stage, I think it definitely helped being here this year. There were no nerves. Our team came in, we weren't bright-eyed, we weren't scared playing under the lights," said senior guard Foster Loyer, who scored 40 points on their opponents. "Being here helped and coming into the game with the mindset to attack, working on my shots, so I was happy to be shooting that way."

He added he couldn't ask for a better finish to his high school career.

"To be able to make two state championships with my teammates, I don't think we could ask for a better end," he smiled, sitting next to senior starters Taylor Currie, CJ Robinson, Chase Wasilk and Nick Wells.

Championship game, March 24: Clarkston 81, Holland West Ottawa 38

The Wolves quickly got their lead going with a 3-point shot from Loyer in the first 15 seconds, receiving cheers from the Jungle, Clarkston's student section.

Robinson was next with his field goal before West Ottawa's Xavier Wade shot two from the free throw line to put the Panthers on the scoreboard.

It was followed by another 3-pointer from Loyer as he became the No. 1 in career points for the Wolves with 4:24 remaining in the first quarter. Another 3-pointer from senior Chase Wasilk furthered the lead 12-4.


"We carried over our success from yesterday into today," Loyer said. "It got us rolling. As a team we executed our game plan. We came out and played the way we wanted to play."

Robinson hit one more field goal and Loyer scored on two more baskets before they closed the first stanza, 19-6.

The Panthers scored five points in the first minute of the next quarter, only to be matched by seven points from Loyer. They

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Loyer lauded as Mr. Basketball

Head coach Dan Fife never doubted Foster Loyer was Mr. Basketball.

"What he has done for this program, what he has done, going about business. They don't come around like him very often," Fife said.

Loyer, who was awarded the 38th Hal Schram Mr. Basketball trophy on March 19, finished his high school career with 2,323 total points, taking over Dan's son Dane Fife's previous 2,287 record.

"It's an honor just to be recognized with the group of guys who have previously won it," Loyer said. "It's an honor to see all my hard work paying off."

At the beginning of his freshman year, already a starter for Clarkston Boys Varsity Basketball, the award wasn't his top priority. But that soon changed.

"As the season progressed, it definitely came to my mind as the ultimate goal," Loyer said. "About halfway through my freshman year I realized if I kept working hard, and I kept progressing the way I was, I would have a chance of winning it. Around that time the guys I had played against, guys I have played with, were seniors and they started winning it – that's when it became an ultimate dream of mine."

Loyer received the most votes from members of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan, earning 3,691 points to win Mr. Basketball.

"From my parents, my family sacrificing the time they have. My dad putting in shots over the summer, over the weekend. It's huge for me," Loyer said. "The Clarkston program has done everything for me these past four years, from Coach Fife really trusting me and letting me run the show a little bit. Everyone who has been there for me these past four years, they have made me who I am today."

He added, without his teammates he wouldn't be where he is today.

"We had 10 seniors and they really accepted me as a freshman when I started the first game," Foster said. "It was huge, how much they helped me mature my freshman year. From there, each day I try to get better, them busting their butt to make me better every day in practice has made me perform the way I have in games."

After winning Mr. Basketball, his next ultimate goal was going three more games in the post season, which the Wolves did, and also winning the second state championship, also accomplished as Clarkston defeated Holland West Ottawa, 81-38.

"Then, from there, I have a lot of work to do this summer to get ready to play at MSU," Loyer said. "We are looking to repeat what they did in the Big Ten this year."

Loyer and the 10 seniors left a legacy on Clarkston with a 97-6 record, four OAA Red

League Championships, four district championships, three regional championships, two semifinal appearances, and two Class A Boys Basketball state championships.

Loyer left his mark on the Clarkston Basketball record with scoring 272 3-point field goals during his career, for first place.

Loyer put himself into the state history books as well. Adding 40 points to his total during the championship game over Holland West Ottawa, his 2,323 points puts him 11th in state history. He made 634 free throws to take first place, and his free throw percentage is 90 percent for 634 out of 704 attempts, for second place. He had 589 assists for sixth place and he made 272 three-pointers for seventh place.

"It's been surreal," he said. "It's not something I think about as we are playing. It just happens. My teammates put me in the position to do it. My coaches put me in the position to do it. All the credit goes to them."

His advice to aspiring athletes, especially the young athletes who watch Clarkston Basketball, is anything is possible.

"I think the biggest thing is never let someone tell you, you can't do something because you are too small, you are too short," Loyer said. "Whatever the limitation they want to set for you is, don't let them kill your dream because with hard work and the time you put in, you will get a lot out of it. I think anything is possible and you should always work towards your dreams."

Loyer will be at the Breslin Center again wearing his Spartan uniform when the men's basketball season kicks off.

Loyer is the son of John and Katie and older brother to Fletcher and Jersey.



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
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

scored nine more points for their highest quarter with 14 points as the Wolves scored a total of 30 to close the half, 49-20.

"Clarkston is really good," said Steve Windemuller, head coach for West Ottawa. "If that's any news to anybody you have been living under a rock or in a cave. They were obviously really good today. It's one of those things. You get to play them one time. I am not sure if us playing them 10 times would have made a difference. It wasn't quite the way we wanted to end it and the way we wanted to play. Congratulations to them. They are one heck of a team."

The Wolves didn't score again until three minutes into the second half, but continued to dominate as Loyer scored seven consecutive points followed by six points from Currie and a field goal from Robinson with four seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Loyer led with 40 points with six field goals and had seven assists and three rebounds.

"Foster is no slouch," Windemuller said. "He is a pretty darn good player. To see him in person is really special because he is a special player. What he did today looked like it was pretty effortless at times. I wish him the best at Michigan State."

Loyer also finished his career at Clarkston with 2,323 points to beat the previous record holder and his future assistant coach at MSU, Dane Fife.

"Well, I just want to take a second, I see him in the back there, I just want to say he can't guard me," Loyer laughed. "In all honesty it's great. I am excited to be here with my teammates and celebrating the state championship."

Robinson scored 18 points with four field goals, three assists, three rebounds and two steals. Currie had 13 points with ten rebounds and one field goal, scored with 5:48 remaining in the game.

"I saw Tristen (Mysen) coming in for me so I thought I need to let one fly," he smiled. "And it went in. I went wow."

"It was a good win for our kids," Fife said. A couple did a good job at rebounding and getting loose balls - that's always important to us. I am happy with the win. Anytime you get to this level and win is good."

"Throughout the year we have seen pretty much every defense could be thrown at us," Loyer said. "We work on each little thing. Honestly just to come with the mindset early in the game, we are going to attack and play hard. Tonight my teammates and myself came out and threw that first punch. We are going to make them adjust to us."

The Wolves jumped to the lead in the semifinal game against the Pilots with a 12-3 run with eight points from Loyer.

He went on to hit two more field goals in a span of a minute and another at the buzzer as the first quarter ended, 23-13.

"When he gets like that, we try to key in on getting him the ball, and he knocks it down for us," Robinson said. "Ultimately, it fares well for others. He does a good job of getting everyone in and supporting us."

Currie opened the second quarter with two points with DeLaSalle's Kole Gjonaj matching it with a 3-pointer.

Senior Hank Schemmel scored the next two points off Currie's rebound before Gjonaj scored two more.

Loyer led with 42 points, with four rebounds and three assists. He scored off seven field goals.

"I don't think in 31 years as a varsity coach anyone has remotely scored that many points," said Greg Esler, head coach for DeLaSalle. "The thing about Loyer is he is so good and so deceiving. He might not be the fastest but all the sudden he shoots a 25-footer, getting it to the rim. Everything we geared towards was stopping him."

Currie had 16 points with 12 rebounds. Robinson had nine points with three steals and five assists.

"Foster and CJ are as good as guards as there are in the state," Fife said. "It's very hard to guard both of them. These guys can handle the pressure and different defense lines. These two guys have seen a lot of what other people are doing. It worked out well. Looking at the score, it didn't seem in my mind it was that big of a differential."

Wells had four points with six rebounds

and three steals.

"Often Nick is matched up with a bigger wing," Loyer said. "For him to come out there and give us 100 percent every night, the rebounds he gets. Our whole team has gelled as a team. We know our roles and I think every guy on our team comes in each game, each practice and fulfills their role."

"Close to 180 teams start in Class A and we came down to Final Four," said Esler. "It certainly was one of our goals with nine seniors."

Quarterfinal round, March 20: Clarkston 52, Carman Ainsworth 31

"To get three of these, I don't know if our kids understand how tough this really is," Fife said, about winning the third quarterfinal playoff game in a decade. "To be honest with you, we have been playing with a bullseye on our back all year so everyone we play we have talked about if you get lax or let up then you will get beat. Carman Ainsworth is a good team."

He added defense was the strength during the win.

"Our offense was a little ugly, but we got it done," he said. "A lot of times when you struggle on offense, you don't guard. I thought we struggled on offense. Every basket was hard. We didn't get very many easy baskets."

The battle began with a close first quarter beginning with Cavalier Jamarreyon Houston scoring the first two points with Wells tying the score less than a minute later.

Currie added two points to the lead before Ja'Kavaien Lewis shot one point from the free throw line to narrow the gap.

The Wolves added 12 more points with with five more points from Robinson, three from Wells and two from Currie and Loyer to close the quarter, 16-7.

Clarkston's defense kept the Cavaliers to five points in the second quarter before closing the first half, 27-12.

Loyer led with 19 points and had ten rebounds and six assists.

"He was struggling on shooting, but he still had confidence to shoot," said Fife. "He is such a competitor, he believes in himself. So many kids would miss shots and quit trying. Not Foster."

Robinson had 12 points, five rebounds, three assists; Currie had nine points, 11 rebounds, three blocks; and Wells had seven points, four rebounds and two steals.

The Wolves graduate 11 seniors who had a 97-6 overall record the last four years and led the team to two state championships.

"It's pretty impressive to me, I have been coaching my heart out," Fife said. "These kids have been fun to work with. I always say in my mind, you have to be happy with who you can lose with. These kids, just the way they go about business when I'm not there. I don't have to be there. I don't have to tell them to get in the gym. These kids are extremely close and have a great relationship on and off the floor. I believe it's going to carry on. These kids played with a bullseye for four years and continue to play like they have. It's a tremendous success story about who they were as kids and how they went about business."

After almost 14 years without driving, David Watson is eager to get back behind the wheel.

"I want to get up and go, and enjoy the freedom to get up and go," said Watson, who has also been confined to a hospital bed, recovering from a traffic accident.

Clarkston High School graduates Dave Muhleck and Selena Guidry started a Gofundme online campaign last year to collect funds for an new wheelchair-accessible van for Watson, a fellow CHS grad.

His previous vehicle was too low for him to ride in comfortably and not equipped to allow him to sit up front.

With a successful end to the campaign, they gathered with friends and family at Revability of Clarkston, March 23, to celebrate.

"With online and offline donations, I am able to get a new van," Watson said. "Thank you to all who helped organize, shared posts and gave way beyond what I ever expected. You all have blessed me and my life and I am forever in your debt. God bless you all for your generosity and love that you have shown me."

"It's a blessing," said Pandora Keiser,

Watson's sister. "We're thrilled. You hear about all the bad stuff, but then you hear about this and know there are still a lot of good people out there."

He took delivery of a Dodge Grand Caravan converted by Revability for wheelchair access and control.

"It's fantastic," said Kevin Bellant, mobility general manager for Michigan Mobility Solutions ast Revability, who went to high school with Watson. "It's a great day. We couldn't be more happy."

Revability's contribution to the campaign is part of the Rev Group company's commitment to give back to the community, Bellant said.


"We want to thank everyone who made this possible - it's amazing," he said.

After some practice in the parking lot, Watson plans to use the minivan to travel around the state.

"I want to thank all the wonderful people who reached out for your support," he said. "It's really cool - wow!"

"It's wonderful - the lord provides," Kim said. "He has been blessed and he is blessing me. I've very grateful."

Watson, 56, suffered a broken neck from a diving accident about 38 years ago, at the age of 18. The accident left him a quadriplegic, paralyzed from the chest down.

In the years following, he was able to manage life using wheelchairs and vans with conversions to accommodate his mobility needs.

He now uses a power wheelchair and needs a side-entry, lowered floor minivan better suited to his chair, something he wouldn't have to hunch over in.

The fundraiser campaign was also in memory of Muhleck's father, Earl Muhleck, who passed away on Dec. 22.

The answer – they all remind us of new life and God's promises. That's what springtime is all about, and that's what Easter is all about too.

As a child it was common where I

hatchlings might be even more fun.

This was obviously in the days before we had much sensitivity about

You can only imagine the excitement for my sister and me when our mom brought home two little, cute, soft, fluffy ducklings one day before Easter.

Of course we didn't know anything about raising ducks and didn't live on a farm, but they were cute and, anyway, how hard could it be. We kept them in a cardboard box. They grew fast and we played with them.

One day with a couple of friends we decided to take the ducklings down to the creek behind our house so they could

Being ducks we figured that was a good thing.

Somehow in trying to get my duck to swim faster or better, one of the neighborhood kids drowned my duck. I was devastated and for years I couldn't forget the duck, nor could I forgive that kid or myself for letting it happen.

Years later I came across a wonderful story about a little boy visiting his grandparents on their farm.

He was practicing outside with a slingshot they gave him, but he couldn't hit anything, not even the side of the barn.



Wing & Shot: Service and hunting dogs, kennels, boarding

Meet Ryan Rucci.

The 27-year-old, Schaumburg, Ill. native was born with cerebral palsy and almost died at birth. He probably would need a wheelchair throughout his life, yet Rucci learned how to walk without even a cane. He learned how to ride a bicycle. He played baseball as a boy, even though cerebral palsy made it difficult for him to run, throw, catch and bat. The *Chicago Tribune* reported his story.


In 2015, Rucci who grew up in the shadow of Wrigley Field was hired by the Chicago Cubs as a fan ambassador. The job requires daily interaction with Cub fans and often works in the sections reserved for fans with disabilities.

However, Rucci needed some help with day to day activities. So he approached Fred Saber of Brandon Township based Wing & Shot to train an emotional support dog that Rucci just received from a shelter two weeks prior.

"When we discussed his needs I explained that this type of training takes months," said Saber. "Then when we discussed price I could tell in the conversation money was an issue. So with a couple of payments he was able to afford one month of training for his new buddy Wrigley."

After Rucci and Wrigley were home for a couple of days he called Saber with a few concerns.

"He said, 'boy I sure wish I could leave her longer. Fred, how do people afford this?' I went on to explain

that most of these special pups have a sponsor," said Saber.

Then on March 2, Saber along with Wrigley greeted Rucci at Bishop Airport in Flint. After about an hour of training in the airport, Rucci and Wrigley headed

back to Chicago.

"We all thought this would be a great positive story considering all of the negative attention therapy/ service dogs are receiving right now," said Saber. "People are curious and trying to understand what it is and why these pups are playing such a huge roll in our society today."

In 2016, Fred and Kelley, owners of Wing & Shot dog training purchased Maple Lane Kennels, 2939 Hummer Lake Road, Ortonville, a boarding, grooming and daycare facility, helping to expand the need for their customer's boarding and training demands.

"Each year we offer four seminars for those who want to learn more about training hunting dogs," he said. "We prepare dogs for hunting season or competition—stop by and visit our facility. Service therapy and emotional support dogs have been a huge part of our business in the last 10 years now filling the schools with them, mostly for special needs children. Next year our company will have a pup for a year trained for a therapy dog then donate to a special child in need."

Regiani Holistic Dental Center: A better means of diagnosis

Progress means working with the times and technology. In health care, that means not reacting to every claim on the internet, and yet not being so narrow minded as to not recognize new advances. For Dr. David Regiani, it means embracing science with technology in a way that benefits his clients, with innovative diagnostics for a more biologically-acceptable result.

Case in point: Last year he purchased a low-radiation Galileos Comfort 3-D Computerized Technology Cone Beam, or CBCT for short. This one machine replaces the standard panoramic and separate cephalometric x-rays with one exposure. Especially for children, it is much less radiation than the two diagnostic films combined, and with much greater detail.

"This one set of images can be turned and manipulated as if we are looking through the skull from top to bottom and side to side," said Dr. Regiani. "Any abnormality, from extra canals in the roots of a tooth, to strange growths, and literal holes in the jawbone itself can be seen. Unusual cases are sent to a radiologist for a more thorough interpretation."

His office previously relied only on digital panoramic and cephalometric images, which are flat two dimensional views. Now there is better information in 3D, which is quickly becoming the new standard in diagnosing orthodontics and endodontics, evaluating periodontal bone loss, implant assessment and airway disturbances.

Medical doctors have been using 3D imaging for years. Computed tomography, also

called CT or CAT scans, is a fancy type of xray. Both medical and dental CT quickly acquires a lot of individual x-rays at one time, and then the computer assembles them to allow us to see a 3D image that can be manipulated into cross-sections.

Of course, dental CTs use much less radiation, as their focus is limited from above the eyebrows to the upper neck area.

The clinical team members of the Regiani Holistic Dental Center are all radiation-certified through the State of Michigan, and all have gone through additional training in 3D cone-beam imaging. All have learned about and have taken the pledge to "Image Gently," which means to evaluate their clients and use the lowest dose of radiation necessary to achieve the proper and thorough image on the first take.

By limiting memorial stones and visitation to pathways only, the meadows flourish naturally and beautifully. However, the nearby Shepherd's Wall offers memorialization. Its location in the heart of The Preserve is perfect for contemplation, meditation and prayer.

Its natural rolling landscape includes a flowing spring fed creek, bordered by woods and a picturesque lake that provides a setting of peace and serenity. This is a benefit to the individual while helping to preserve our environment.



GreenAway recycles, donates unwanted items with eco-friendly concept

Ugh. The clutter in your basement or attic. The stuff you can't take with you when you move that invariably ends up on the side of the road, destined for the landfill.

And if you want to donate those items, there's loading up the car and making multiple trips to the donation and recycling centers.

GreenAway Removal in Orion Township started last fall with the idea that going green is what people prefer when disposing of their old and unwanted items.

The key concept of the business is making sure that most of the debris is recycled or reused responsibility. GreenAway recycles what it can and works with local organizations to place reusable items in the hands of people who need them.

"When people find out we try to recycle or donate everything, they're happy. Our ecofriendly concept is just that, and people love that concept," Giwa said.

"The donations come first. We take items and try to give them to a charity. That's our #1 preference. The donation receipt is given back to the family or business for their own tax deductions.

"We recycle responsibly, trying to make sure everything goes to the appropriate places. Our staff will even break down all items and electronics to recycle the parts, when we can. We try to minimize the amount we take to landfills," Giwa said.

GreenAway also is increasingly helping local businesses relocate, or hauling away the items a business can't take with them, like old desks, chairs and cabinets.

"What do they do with the stuff they leave behind? That's where we come in," Giwa said. "When people are downsizing we're assisting with moving their things to storage facilities. We've done some full moves, from house to house. Really, we're taking the whole spectrum of moving things from point A to point B."

Giwa says the best way for people to gauge GreenAway's professional, courteous performance is to contact him directly and to visit the GreenAway website and read the testi-



The newest procedure they have been offering is for the treatment of chronic vein insufficiency.


"We are now doing venous ablation for venous insufficiency and varicose vein treatment in the office," Loree said.

The most effective way a patient to be preventative and to maintain a healthy cardiovascular system, Dr. Loree said, is to "Maintain a healthy diet, staying active, being proactive, following up with your doctors and with regular, physical activity."

"Atrial fibrillation is probably the most common illness that I have been seeing in the last couple of months. We always see coronary disease and heart attacks, but Atrial Fib has probably been one of the things that's becoming more common in all of us because as we age, the prevalence increases."

"So, with the aging population, we're seeing a lot more of it," she said.
