City budget approved

City Manager Jonathan Smith prepared a proposal for the June 11 City Council meeting, specifying how \$18,000 for administration included in this year's budget would be spent.

It would include merit-based raises for employees; six more hours for the city manager, raising him from 30 to 36 hours per week; and making the department's unpaid intern into a paid, part-time employee. After discussion, city attorney Thomas Ryan recommended the city approve the budget plan as presented and determine specific appropriations later.

City Council accepted this recommendation, and voted unanimously, June 11, to approve the General Appropriations Act for its 2018-2019 budget. Earmarked projects in the \$984,531 budget include the \$18,000 for added administrative personnel; \$10,000 to complete the city Master Plan; \$20,000 for repair of the Village Hall building; \$75,000 for road paving;

\$15,000 for sidewalk repair and replacement; \$7,000 for health insurance for the city's fulltime DPW worker; and \$18,000 for engineering and planning work, crosswalk tape, and tree removal.

General property tax was set at 11.8792 mills for city operations, which equals the city's maximum allowable millage, 12.5702, minus a 0.691 library millage reduction.

The \$984,531 budget is up from the 2017-2018 budget of \$955,917.

The fund balance is set to decrease from \$278,990 as of June 30, 2018, to \$190,097 by June 30, 2019.

The fund balance was increased from 2017 to 2018 because of postponed capital-improvement projects, said Budget Committee member Chet Pardee at the June 11 City Council meeting.

"We had things in the budget we didn't get done – projects we budgeted for," Pardee said. "We couldn't get all the work done with the hours available (in city administration) to spend what was budgeted. We need more hours."

\$87M for school budget

Clarkston School Board voted unanimously, Monday night, to approve the 2018-2019 district budget, which totals \$87,304,144. This is up \$117,738 compared to last year's budget of \$84,819,041.

Revenue from property taxes, tuition, fees, rentals, grants, donations, and other local sources is budgeted at \$9,019,700, which is down \$11,000 compared to last year.

Total state revenue is budgeted at \$68,831,279, which is down \$267,085 compared to last year. Last year's revenue included an MSPERS one-time funding of \$1,054,300.

Clarkston Community Schools is projecting a loss of 150 students in the upcoming year, equaling a loss of about \$1,180,000 in state funding. However, state funding is expected to increase by \$240 per pupil, from \$7,631 to \$7,871 per student, for a total of \$1,800,000.

Revenue last year also included \$2,551,300 in one-time proceeds from the sale of buses, and one-time long-term bus debt issued, \$4,238,400, for a total of \$6,789,700.

Spending for basic programs at Clarkston schools and summer program is budgeted at \$43,966,216, which is down \$102,082 from last year. Spending for student services, which includes administration, human resources, technology, athletics, and other services, is budgeted at \$30,299,925, which is down \$3,614,872 from last year.

The estimated ending fund balance for the 2018-2019 school year is \$9,233,416, which is 10.5 percent of the budget. According to the school board, the district's rainy-day fund must be at least a 10 percent of its total budget.

The fund balance for the 2017-2018 school year was \$9,597,858.

Supporters call for coach reinstatement

Clarkston Boys JV-B Soccer Coach Herb Dula is working to get reinstated after being fired last season, with support from family and friends.

"I have seen many people come up to him. Kids so excited he had coached and excited to tell him what they are doing next, saying, 'Mr. Dula, I really hope they reinstate you back," said Christina Dula, Herb's wife, to the Clarkston Board of

Education, May 21. "Parents talk to me about when he used to do the Parks and Rec at the township, they still remember him and he's still their favorite coach."

"I feel Mr. Dula has been very unfairly treated in this situation because the situation did not deal with JV-B Soccer at all," said DeAnn Quilliams, mother of a Clarkston soccer player. "I'm just giving my support

to Mr. Dula. I really feel his job as JV-B coach should be reinstated."

School officials declined to comment, saying it is a private personnel matter.

Quilliams said her understanding was Coach Dula's termination resulted from a disagreement with the coach on the sidelines of a varsity game last fall.

She said Dula is an upstanding person who should be given a second chance. She said other parents she has spoken with saw him as a good role model and a good coach.


"When I heard he was fired, I was shocked," Quilliams said. "It sounded like it had not been really looked into a whole lot. I think you need to look into it before it's just a drastic, 'No, you're fired."

"(I'm) also in support of Mr. Dula," said David Gray, another parent at the meeting. "I feel Mr. Dula has been the one honest coach within the soccer program. He has been unfairly treated and I'm here to support him."

Dula's case is under consideration by the school board.





Deer Lake Beach needs facelift, officials say

After decades of erosion, families are finding less Deer Lake Beach to enjoy.

"For many years we have managed the Deer Lake Beach facility, and over the course of time, because of the way the wind blows and our increasingly hard winters, the beach has slowly deteriorated," said Parks and Rec Director Derek Smith at the June 12 Independence Township Board meeting. "Most of the sand material from the beach has traveled under the road to Middle Lake on what would be the south side of the road."

Smith worked with Hubbell, Roth & Clark Vice President Jamie Burton to figure out what measures are needed to restore the beach, stop the erosion, and determine costs.

"Per the DEQ, we are not allowed to add material to any inland water to grow the beach back to its original shape," Smith said. "But, what we can do is put in a series of restoration options that over time will help the lake, rebuild the beach naturally on its own."

Burton presented slides on the layout, critical areas to be restored, and proposed repairs to the beach off White Lake Road north of Dixie Highway, on the south end of the lake.

"Prevailing winds and prevailing currents, drive a lot of sand material up against this beach," he said. "It's in one of those spots on the lake that is just going to naturally get sand on the launch, and then it moves and kind of takes the beach away with it as well as the outlet."

Burton said he got an MDEQ permit for the area, which is valid for five years. Dredging of the launch began this year, but the problem builds up over time and partial work can be done as needed.

"Some of these might even be able to be done in house," said Burton. "There's some volunteer possible options as well."

The restoration project includes maintenance dredging to remove accumulated sediment of existing launch; construct infiltration trench with outlet to existing channel; construct a pilot groin, an erosion control device made of rocks or concrete, at existing channel; and shoreline stabilization and restoration.

"The estimated costs broken down per section is about \$120,000," he said. "We try to lay this all out if you did it all at once kind of perspective. There are pieces to this that you could do over time."

The Michigan Department of **Environmental Quality's Water Resources** Division protects and monitors Michigan's waters by establishing water quality standards, assessing the health of aquatic communities, issuing permits to regulate wastewater dischargers, and overseeing aquatic invasive species concerns and significant water withdrawals. It also processes permit applications and provides technical assistance to local soil erosion and sedimentation control programs as well as activities like dredging or filling water bodies; constructing or dismantling dams; constructing marinas, seawalls, or docks; building in a designated critical sand dune, wetland, or floodplain; and protecting underwater shipwreck resources.

Briefly

Stop on Holcomb

City Council is looking into installing a three-way stop and pedestrian crossing at Holcomb Road and Surrey Lane, to the west of downtown.

City council previously discussed a four- or three-way stop at Holcomb and W. Washington Street to help slow traffic heading north and south on Holcomb. However, the Road Commission for Oakland County controls the south half of the intersection and has opposed installing a stop sign there.

The Holcomb and Surrey intersection, just to the north of W. Washington Street, is within the city's traffic-control jurisdiction.

City attorney Thomas Ryan will consult with the Oakland County Sheriff's Office and prepare a traffic control order for the council to consider at a future meeting.





Historic-district hearing goes against city

An administrative law judge ruled in favor of a downtown developer against the city.

Administrative Law Judge Peter L. Plummer issued a Proposal for Decision recommendation, June 8, to overturn the city Historic District Commission's decisions against proposed development of 42 W. Washington Street.

"I find that the Clarkston HDC's decision denying petitioner's application for a Certificate of Appropriateness was contrary to the statutes, ordinances and required processes—and, therefore, arbitrary, capricious and an abuse of discretion," Plummer wrote in his opinion.

City Council can file an exception to the Proposal for Decision with the Michigan Administrative Hearing System within 21 days.

The HDC met on June 12 and vote 4-1 to recommend challenging the judge's opinion, said HDC member Cory Johnston.

"I voted against the action as I agree with the opinion," Johnston said. "That opinion agrees with my vote and statements made originally in August of 2017 when the demolition was denied."

The case stems from an HDC vote on Aug. 29, 2017, to deny the Certificate of Appropriateness requested by Lehman Investment Company, which owns the Clarkston Mills on W. Washington Street and includes downtown developers Ed Adler and Robert Roth.

Lehman applied for the certificate in order to demolish the house at 42 W. Washington, just to the west of the Mills building.

HDC said the demolition and resulting open space would "negatively affect the character of the historic district and in particular adjacent historic resources." Also, the owners did not submit a plan for redevelopment, so the commission "had no way to determine whether future proposed new construction on this lot would meet the standards."

The house is more than 50 years old and could be worth reconsidering as a historic resource "as recording an important place and time within the community," according to the HDC at the time.

The owners appealed the decision to the State Historic Preservation Office on Oct. 26, 2017, saying the HDC was inconsistent in its decisions – in 2004, the commission approved demolition of a home built in 1957 on Waldon Road. Also, the W. Washington house was built in 1953 and includes a residential structure and garage, both cinder-block construction, with "no redeeming historical structure or architectural features," they said.

Judge Plummer agreed with the property owners, and said HDC does not have the authority under statute to deny the certificate based on what may become a historic resource in the future, nor for the other reasons it stated.

"The evidence we presented demonstrate Mr. Adler has always taken care of his properties," said John D. Mulvihill, Adler's attorney. "He develops property for the good of the city."

The Proposal for Decision recommends HDC set aside its decision and issue the certificate of appropriateness, "granting permission to demolish the vacant residence and outbuildings owned by Lehman Investment Co."

The case represents one of several issues Lehman has with the city. The city also rejected a rezoning request for 42 W. Washington, and issued a work-stop-order on a tree-clearing project at M-15 and Waldon Road, Mulvihill said.

Adler and Lehman Investment Company applied for the rezoning from residential to commercial. City Council voted on May 22, 2017, to deny the rezoning request. Reasons included zoning ordinance standards were not satisfied, the Planning Commission recommended against it, Master Plan is against non-residential intrusions into residential areas, preserve property values, the plan was incompatible with adjacent residential areas, a petition against rezoning was signed by every adjacent property owner, the Mill Pond serves as a natural dividing line, and there was already sufficient commercially zoned property in the city.

EPA Begins Review of Springfield Township Dump Superfund Site

Davisburg, Michigan

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is conducting a five-year review of the Springfield Township Dump site located at 12955 Shindler Road, three miles south of Davisburg, Mich. The Superfund law requires regular checkups of sites that have been cleaned up -- with waste managed on-site -- to make sure the cleanup continues to protect people and the environment. This is the fourth five-year review of this site.

The cleanup began at the in 1990 and included the excavation and incineration of contaminated surface soil, vapor extraction of the volatile compounds contaminating subsurface soil, excavation and solidification of soil contaminated with metals and incinerator ash, and extraction and treatment of contaminated groundwater. A soil cover was placed over the treated area and grass was replanted.

Andrew Dimmer, a Clarkston Junior Optimist since fourth grade, serving as a state officer, will attend Oakland University in the fall.


Shaelyn Koleber, who co-chaired a blood drive, and leukemia and lymphoma program at Clarkston High School, is going to Michigan Tech.

As one of that despots of the "older" generation who has ruined Facebook for Millennials and younger folks, this past weekend I posted a couple of pictures of my very own father, Pops Rush. And, why not, it was after all a Father's Day weekend. I got to thinking, next month — July—will mark the 22nd anniversary of my father becoming nothing more than a memory to those

Smoking 97 packs of cigarettes a day since he was a kid, caught up to him. By the time he was 55, he was diagnosed with throat cancer. He lasted five years eating nothing but Ensure protein drinks and other adult beverages, and cutting down on the cigs to about 50 packs a day. He was "on" hospice from November until his body finally gave up nine months later. He was home, with Mom and his morphine for the pain. One of his last

who knew him.

lucid comments to me, the oldest of he and Mom's four kids, and his only son, namesake (though, not a junior) was this, "One of the worst things about this is I forgot my memory."

He lived just a couple months after his 60th birthday. On Sunday morning, Father's Day, after making a post on Facebook, I quickly turned off the social media site. I didn't want to dwell on seeing my father's smiling face and thinking about still missing him, all these years later, nor did I want my eyes to leak. And, of course, on and off throughout the day thoughts of Dad filled my head. At some point in the evening, trying to keep cool in front of a fan while the temps hoovered 95 degrees I thought of my dad's words, "One of the worst things about this is I forgot my memory."

Further, I thought, "Donald, you better write down some of your memories of Dad before you forget them, and then nobody, especially your sons will have a chance to know him."

That, I concluded, would be a shame.

Like many father-son relationships, I reckon my father's and mine was quite ordinary, pedestrian even. While scribbling out thoughts for this column on my yellow, college-ruled legal pad, I drew a circle. The circle, or cycle of this father-son relationship, from the son's perspective, starts and ends with love and admiration. In between the dynamics change from hero worship to not understanding the old man, to scorning him, to that defining moment of talking man-to-man (versus know-it-all young man to older, dominant man), to understanding, friendship, respect and then, ultimately missing him, while loving and admiring him.

Most folks who knew my dad, liked him. Not many however, really knew him. Hell, I didn't really know him until a few years before he punched out of this earthly life. When I learned the secret he shared with me, my heart both cried and filled with appreciation for the man, my father, who sat before me.

While spending a year in Korea in the mid-1950s affected Dad through the rest of his life, what really molded him, I think, was something from his childhood. Dad, was the consummate American male: athletic he played sports, football, baseball, basketball, hockey, handball, softball (both fast-pitch and slow); he believed in respect and working hard. He loved history, reading and John Wayne movies. He smiled and sang Irish songs. He loved his wife, kids and country (in that order). And, he smoked and he drank.

The man he wanted everyone to see, was the one I just described. But, what folks didn't know was the pain and shame he kept inside him. Once he shared with me, that shared-knowledge explained a lot.

I had done a story about child sexual abuse. It was a long, two-part series. One evening, Dad and I were at his favorite watering-hole, the Clarkston Eagles club. He wasn't sitting at "his" stool at the bar, which was unusual. He sat a table, in the dark. When I saw him, he waved me over. I sat down across from him. "About what you wrote," he always critiqued everything I wrote for the paper, so this conversation started like many, many others before. "It was a good article. It might help some people."

He paused a long pause and then looked at me. "And, it happened to me. I haven't told anybody this."

That was it. That's all he said. I didn't pry. I didn't cry. I just said, "Thank you."

Knowing the cycle of abuse (sometimes the abused become the abusers when they grow up), things started lining up in my mind. This explained why dad was uber competitive, macho, athletic — he needed to prove to himself who he was. This was why he super protective of his kids. This explained drinking and drinking and drinking. I think at that moment, though I didn't think it was possible, I loved him more than before. He fought his battles, and maybe he didn't win the war, neither did he lose.

Despite his faults, his wife loved him and his children loved him, even to this day with plenty of time to have ruminated on the subject. I think that is all he really wanted. Unfortunately, I am not sure he loved himself, though I sure hope he did — at least at the end.

While there are many conversations and movies in my head revolving around Dad (and I should write those down somewhere before I forget them, too) a couple of the best things he said to me, his only son were:

1. It's okay to cry.

2. The best things to have happened in my life was meeting and marrying your mother and the opportunity to be your guys' father.

3. I love you.





The campers also learned from current Wolves playing on the high school level and some who just graduated and are off to college in the fall.



varsity. I want to come back and work the camp.' They are building a relationship with the girls right now that they will coach some maybe play with when they are older."




