School survey

Clarkston Community School officials are looking for residents' opinions on buildings, traffic flow, safety, and other issues, so they're conducting an online survey.

"A strong and vibrant school system is important to community unity and success," said Deputy Superintendent Shawn Ryan.

A facilities evaluation of school property and facilities is underway, Ryan said.

"In this process, all buildings and sites are being evaluated, providing both a snapshot in time and a look forward to the district's current and anticipated needs," he said. "We have invested in our school district over the years and that is paying dividends through stable enrollment and expansion in educational offerings from pre-school to college and career prep."

It includes traffic flow, separation of pedestrians and vehicles, parking lot sizes and conditions, playground safety, drainage, pavement and concrete conditions and overall accessibility.

Facilities issues also include safety and security in and around the buildings, roofing, windows, doors, wall systems, mechanical systems, electrical systems, interior finishes, technology infrastructure, technology equipment, educational program requirements, and operational efficiencies.

The survey, provided at no cost to the district at www.surveymonkey.com/r/ClarkstonCS, takes 5-10 minutes. Results will be available in 3-4 months.

"The intent is to inform the community regarding this facilities assessment process and glean feedback from you regarding current facilities, operations and programming. Your input as a parent and/or community member is valued and important to this process," Ryan said.

City sets goals for the new year

Clarkston Planning Commission was the first city board to meet in 2016, and they took the opportunity to set some goals for the new year.

Goals include supporting the Master Plan; complete site plan reviews in a timely manner; complete training for all members; bring surface zoning ordinance enforcement issues to the attention of city administration; complete the Master Plan with more recent demographics; and schedule joint meetings with the city council and historic commission.

"Supporting the existing Master Plan is really important," said Commissioner Frank Schoebel at the Jan. 4 meeting. "Master plan enforcement of the zoning ordinance is something important we should follow up on."

Surface zoning enforcement includes parking, which was a major issue in 2015.

"We're not the enforcement arm, as we said during the parking issue," said Commission member Michael Sabol.

The commission achieved three of four goals in 2015, Sabol said.

Last year's goals were to support the Master Plan and Zoning Ordinance enforcement; complete site plan reviews in a timely manner; complete draft Zoning Ordinance and forward to City Council for review and approval; and complete training for all members.

The training wasn't completed because state programs had been put on hold, Sabol said.

"We're looking into that," he said. "We're batting .750. I consider the other item a walk we had no choice there."

The commission voted 4-0 to approve the goals, along with commissioners Elizabeth M. Rogers and Derek Werner. Commissioner Robert Bondy was absent. The planners' next meeting is Feb. 1 at 7 p.m.


Mayor Protem Eric Haven said one of his goals on City Council is more citizen involvement in Depot Park.

"As chairman of the Friends of Depot Park, a subcommittee of the City Council, I would like to see qualitative enhancements made in beautiful Depot Park in 2016 by coordinating the talents and resources of many who love our community," Haven said.

Council member Sharron Catallo said she is looking forward to planting new trees in Clarkston because of a grant the city received in 2015.

"As the chairperson of the Tree Committee, I am looking forward to the spring of 2016, to continue the tree plantings started last fall," Catallo said. "Replacing street trees lost to age and storm damage allows us to keep our tree-lined streets and an atmosphere that represents the well-being of

City Manager Carol Eberhardt said administration goals include completing an addition to City Hall, complete a parking study or studies and develop short and long range plans for parking improvements; develop

short and long term goals for the improvement of Depot Park and prioritize projects; increase citizen communication with the help of the communications committee leveraging the newly developed website; and completion of the south Depot Park bridge project.

Briefly

\$5,000 more for roads

Independence Township Board increased funding for neighborhood road improvements from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

The Neighborhood Repair Improvement Program was created to address residential roads in serious disrepair.

"Such road conditions have resulted in not only traffic and pedestrian safety concerns, but they also have a detrimental effect on the character, appearance, marketability and property values in these neighborhoods," said Director of Assessing Stacey Bassi at the Dec. 22 board meeting.

Under the program, residents can apply for partial funding to cover repaving and repairing existing neighborhood roads.

"The goal of the NRIP is to encourage and assist neighborhoods with improving public safety and revitalizing the appearance and character of their own neighborhoods," Bassi said.

Road improvements enhance marketability and overall value of the properties, she said.

It is an honor to have these brave and professional men and women serving our


community.



He was cited for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and advised to cease contact with the boy.

School policy for violence

Clarkston Board of Education approved revised school safety policies at their Dec. 14 meeting.

The policy will now include threat assessments at school, following guidelines created by the U.S Secret Service and U.S Department of Education.

Threats include crime and violence inside and outside the school system.

"We want to interact with and engage students to resolve conflict," said Superintendent Dr. Rod Rock.

The assessment will be based on evidence of behavior and communication in certain circumstances, such as when a student makes a threat to others or themselves.

If violent crime exceeds a state established threshold, the superintendent must convene a meeting with school building administrator, local law enforcement, parents, and others to create a corrective action plan.

They will gather information, perform an evaluation, and create an individual plan to


reduce threats and help students.

Each year, the superintendent must submit a report to the state, outlining the number of students expelled and why they were removed from the district.

State law requires officials to submit a report about violence, drug cases, and other crimes.

Other policy changes include entrance requirements, foreign and foreign-exchange students, graduation requirements, animals on district property, and immunization.

Students who do not meet state immunization requirements can be suspended from the district unless a waiver is submitted. Waivers can be granted for a valid medical reason, religious beliefs, or vaccinations not due. In December 2014, the Joint Commission on Administrative rules required those seeking non-medical waivers, which are provided at the Oakland County Health Department, to speak with a health educator at the Oakland County Health Department.


George Skene III earned the Leader of the Pack award for keeping the group together all year long, and Best Race Director for his work on multiple events and keeping social media going.
