



Co-operative Extension Work

URING the year 1926 the residents of Oakland County have had the services of the complete extension service through the co-operation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Michigan State College and the Oakland County Board of Supervisors.

The purpose of this service is to bring to the farmers, gardeners, house-wives and boys and girls the latest and best information regarding their particular field of work and any unusual problems and difficulties. By this means the scientific information obtained by the colleges is not kept for the resident student only, but is given to all who will avail themselves of the opportunity. In this way local people are considered as non-resident students of the college.

THE PERSONNEL

Mr. Geo. H. Kimball, Jr., is well known to the majority of the people of Oakland County. He has served in the capacity of Boys' and Girls' Club Agent for a number of years.

His duties consist of the organization of boys' and girls' clubs throughout the County to promote and develop the best in the way of education and recreation among the boys and girls.

As a rule the organization of boys and girls is based on definite project lines such as potato, live stock, canning, poultry, etc.

Mr. Kimball, as County Y. M. C. A. Secretary, spends part time in the capacity of County Club Leader and has much to do with the development of the youth of the county toward better citizenship.

Miss Muriel E. Dundas, Home Demonstration Agent. For the past two years, Miss Dundas has served the women's interest of the county, coming to Oakland from Allegan where she served in a similar capacity.

Under her leadership forty-eight groups of women have been receiving the instruction of the Clothing specialists of Michigan State College. Many projects of a minor nature such as music appreciation have been given during the course of study.

Harold M. Vaughn, County Agricultural Agent. Mr. Vaughn came from Manistee County in February to take up his work in Oakland County. His services are to the farmer and gardener as those of Mr. Kimball and Miss Dundas are to the boys and girls and women.

The majority of farm groups have received the work with considerable favor. The development has been principally along the lines of fruit and vegetable growing, dairying, poultry and potatoes. The work is carried on largely by field meeting, demonstration institutes, exhibits, individual farm calls and organized farm groups.

The Farmers' Clubs, Granges and Farm Bureau are giving splendid co-operation in this work of developing the quality of agricultural production and marketing in the county.

THE AGRICULTURAL SITUATION IN OAKLAND COUNTY

The rapid development of wealth and industry in Oakland County has exerted a great pressure upon the farmers of the county. Many farmers and others have seen in this movement the ending of agriculture as an enterprise of merit in Oakland County. These are firm in their belief and have much evidence to support their views.

Many farmers have been unable to adjust themselves to the changed conditions and have sold their farms or are allowing them to stand idle while awaiting sale.

On the other hand we find men in all portions of the county who are developing a program fitted to new conditions and are capitalizing the ready market and the decreased area in production.

It must be admitted that either view of the situation is perfectly permissible. Since many are expecting to continue in the agricultural profession, they are looking to Extension forces to help them meet the change of conditions.

* After observing the situation in other highly industrialized areas we believe that there is a very profitable future for agriculture in this county and that agriculture must meet the changing conditions and establish itself on a highly efficient plane.
