

County Nurse

Report from January 1 to August 1, 1926



AS has been said, it is the aim of the County Nurse to interest the public in Health, and this year has seen in part a realization of her efforts. Several of the smaller villages are asking for a nursing service and health teaching in their schools. Visits were made to thirty-eight rural schools, one thousand seventy-two children inspected and health talks given. Visits were made to the homes of many of these children for interviews with their parents regarding defects.

The Tuberculosis Association has this year held 13 clinics at which two hundred forty-three patients were given examinations. Thirty of these were found to be tuberculous and are now getting care either at home or in Sanitoriums. Thirty-one cases were found to be suspicious of tuberculosis and were referred for X-ray or to their physician for further study. One hundred seventy-nine visits were made to the tuberculous in their homes for instruction regarding their care and for the protection of others. One hundred and one visits were made to the suspicious cases; they are also given instruction and urged to secure a diagnosis as soon as possible.
