A REPORT FROM THE CAPITOL

A SUMMER-LONG SEARCH for a place to build a children's mental hospital is under way. The quest is a "halfway" answer by the legislature to the issue which stirred weeks of cloak-and-sword debate during the last session.

About 1,100 mentally deficient children who need care and treatment have not been admitted to Michigan's three institutions because of overcrowding, said Chas. F. Wagg, state mental health director. This is a pressing condition which concerns many lawmakers.

Dr. Harry C. August, of the mental health commission, said the proposed hospital should be in a prominent place in a residential area which draws most patients.

Commenting on the long waiting list, Dr. August said, "Some of our children are in a state of complete neglect because it has become only a gesture."

The commission is casting an eye on the Wayne County Home and Training School, which now has 750 patients, and an area in Grand Rapids. These seem to be the two most promising sites.

Dr. August said the new hospital should be large enough to accommodate 3,500.

Last winter, the mental health commission rounded up some legislative support—but not enough to take over a tuberculosis hospital as a mental health institution.

It was blocked by health officials who said that, despite the fact that some of the tuberculosis hospital beds are vacant, we're just rowing against the tide.

Hub of the trouble, retailers feel, is that they are tied up too tightly by gasoline companies. The large companies, in most instances, own the station and lease it to the "owner". Miller might be called "Mr. Turkey" in Michigan. In addition to his work with the state's Grand Rapids, he is a poultry professor at MSU.

Incidentally, he says that consumers will be paying more this year for their Thanksgiving turkey than in 1954. "There was an oversupply last year," he explains. "People who bought turkeys then for 37c or 39c per pound were paying less than last year's price."

Chapman Votes Annexation To Northville School System

Residents of Novi's Chapman school district voted by a wide margin Monday to annex their district to the Northville Public School district.

The vote, 58-18 in favor of annexation, came as a result of a special election held in the district June 8.

Another proposal on the ballot calling for the district to assume its proportionate share of the bonded indebtedness of \$377,500 of the Northville schools also passed, 54-18.

An increase in taxes against the property in the Chapman district of \$10 per \$1,000 from 1954 through 1964, and a boost of \$5.50 per \$1,000 from 1965 through 1975, carried, 54-18.

Robert Coolman, president of the Northville board of education, has called a special meeting of the board for tonight, Aug. 11, at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of formally accepting the Chapman district building, assets and records.

Good Turnout of Voters
Moderator William Templeton of the Chapman district commented that "in view of the fact that many electors are on vacation, the turnout at the election was highly satisfactory." Templeton estimates that there is a potential of about 110 voters in the district.

Northville Supt. of Schools Russell A. Amerman said that all that remains in the annexation process is "the mere formalities of acceptance of Chapman district properties."

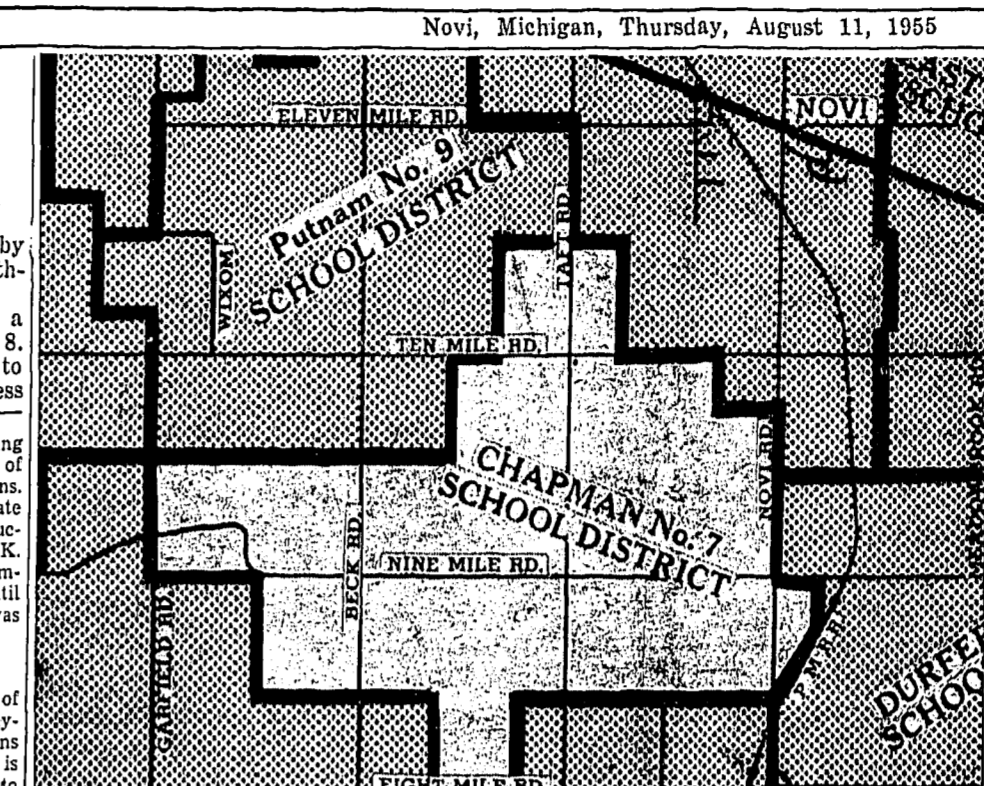

US-16 Bridge Contract Awarded

The first project in the \$11,000,000 Farmington to Brighton expressway, a bridge carrying 12 Mile and Beck roads over the new highway, was awarded last week to C. A. Hull Co., on a low bid of \$144,607.

Completion date for the bridge is set for June 15, 1956. Plans call for an expressway exit at this point.

It will be a 253-foot bridge of four spans. Both Beck and 12-Mile Rd. will cross the new road at this point two miles northeast of Farmington.

"We want to get started on this expressway as quickly as possible to relieve one of the serious areas of traffic congestion," Charles Ziegler, state highway commissioner, said.

The expressway, when completed, will start at 115-25 east of Brighton and extend 12 1/2 miles to connect with the present district highway on US-16 east of Farmington, near Middle Belt, replacing US-16 between the two points.

Wolves and wilderness are a part of Michigan to Mrs. Carolyn Roy, whose parents emigrated from Germany and were pioneer settlers in the Big Rapids area in 1868. The spry, 84-year-old woman remembers living on a farm on Jensens lake when she was eight years old. Wolves could be heard howling in the hills at night, and their next-door neighbors were Indians, living in tents. A team of oxen was the only means of transportation to the nearest town, and wild deer and turkeys adorned the land. The lakes were so full of fish on those days, she recalls, that one could practically dip them out by the tubful.

A REPORT FROM THE CAPITOL

NORTLAND RESORTS have the promise of a highway funneling thousands of cars into their driveways—the way or another. The tug-of-war between toll roads and free superhighways is the focal point of one of the bitterest disputes in years.

On one end of the rope is the Michigan Turnpike Authority and on the other end is Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler.

could finish the free road in three years. Higgins said the turnpike can be completed in 39 months after the bonds are sold. They will be retired from tolls.

There was a poignant moment when Congress killed President Eisenhower's highway aid plan, which would have given Michigan federal money for interstate highways at 90-10 ratio, federal to state matching.

"If we got that, we can finish the free highway in three years," Ziegler said.

When the bill was killed in Congress, Ziegler said state money would do the job in the same time. Higgins, mourning the death of the program in Congress on the surface, privately was jubilant.

"This will put all the more steam behind the turnpike program. We'll get started as soon as we can and build the toll road."

Serious questions have arisen from the situation. If there is to be a competing free road—with the same superhighway construction—will New York financiers go for the revenue bonds?

Will motorists prefer the free superhighway to the toll road, creating a boycott and a virtually impossible financing problem for the turnpike?

Ziegler denies he doubled the toll. He said he was assured by the engineers for the turnpike that a free route along the same general route "would have no effect."

There have been hints that the 1956 legislature, recognizing the tight spot occupied by Higgins, a former senator, could remove Ziegler from authority.

On the other hand, Ziegler may be running for re-election next year. Republicans would think twice before jeopardizing his chances against a Democrat.

Best bet here is that the turnpike authority, with Higgins at the helm, will be told to take it a little easy and maybe change the route of its free road a bit.

Norbert Schemansky, world heavyweight champion, will be an official. Clarence Johnson, national AAU weight lifting champion, will be master of ceremonies.

Likely contenders for the Mr. Metropolitan title will be Ken Patterson of Western Y.M.C.A., Mr. Michigan for 1955, Sam Adams of Northeastern Body Builders club, who is Jr. Mr. Michigan, and Nelson Ego, also of Body Builders club.

Seiple, Van Fletteren, Frank Matten and Frank Cunk of all Northeastern Y's Body Builders club and Al Kernek of Ann Arbor are known threats in the weight-lifting competition, all veterans of past contests at the beach, but unknown competition is expected from outside. This is the first year the event has been open to the entire state, being previously limited to the five metropolitan counties.

DeMatteis, Body Builders' club president, said he expected about 40 entries.

An unidentified attorney in Detroit asked whether the state was violating its own law against advertising of any kind on the license plates. Here answered:

"You've got me, but I'll find out."

Hare is still checking with Attorney General Thomas M. Kavanaugh. The law plainly states that there shall be no advertising of any kind on a license plate.

July Attendance Topped 500,000 At Kensington Park

All-time attendance records were broken at both Metropolitan Beach and Kensington Metropolitan Park during July, the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority said today.

The five-county park and parkway agency revealed that Kensington park topped the half-million mark, nearly one-third of the total attendance recorded at the 4,500 acre park near New Holland in the entire year of 1954.

Metropolitan Beach, on Lake St. Clair, topped an attendance of 312,000 for July, nearly one-third the total for all of 1954, and approximately twice the July total for last year.

At Kensington park, an eight-year-old girl, Nancy Gollenbeck, 15750 Glastonbury, holds the current record for heaviest panfish. She caught a nine-ounce crappie to win a fishing contest prize for July.

At month-end, the current record for heaviest panfish, panfish and smallmouth bass, panfish and pike were reported in spite of the heat.

With the enlargement of the beach area and completion of a new bathhouse and food bar, Maple Beach on Kent Lake is accommodating three times as many bathers as last year, with a total of some 80,000 for July.

Marina Beach, larger of the two Kent Lake beaches, totaled approximately 100,000 bathers for the month.

New, High Protein, Low Calorie Bread Offered By A & P

A new type protein bread that is tasteful and highly nutritive is being introduced in the Detroit metropolitan area, according to the A & P Food store.

The new bread contains 53 per cent more protein than the same weight of regular white bread, has fewer calories per slice (105 and 45) and is made without the addition of either sugar or shortening in the company states.

Proteins contained in most vegetable foods are deficient in one or more of the amino acids known to be essential to the nutrition of man. Wheat, for example, contains only half the required amount of lysine. Now, with the recent development of lysine the equivalent required for good nutrition can be added, and the situation no longer need exist, it adds.

The new bread is not intended as a substitute for white bread, according to A & P, but was developed in response to growing consumer demand for a high-protein bread that would be highly nutritive as well as lower in calories. It is especially recommended for those who need to add more protein to their regular diet.

Freight Trains Collide; 9 Cars, 2 Engines Derailed

Two locomotives and nine freight cars were derailed on the Chesapeake & Ohio tracks between Novi Rd. and Nine Mile Rd. early Friday morning when one freight train crashed into the rear of another.

The only injury reported was a dislocated knee suffered by Engineer George O'Leary of Saginaw.

The accident occurred shortly after six in the morning. A 61-car southbound train had been halted on the northern edge of Northville and was occupying the single track when the other southbound train rounded a curve and crashed into the stopped train.

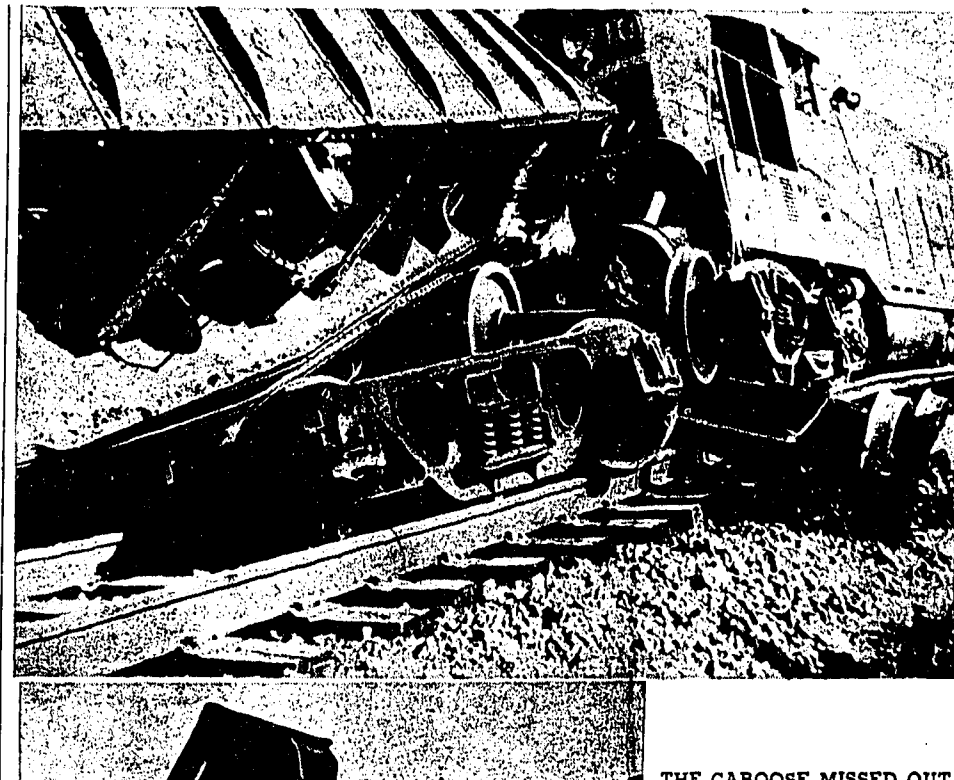
Railroad officials did not make any explanation of the accident. Normally, when a train is stopped, a brakeman sets a warning signal a safe distance behind the stopped train.

The accident was reported to Police Chief Lee BeGole at 6:10 by a fireman who had hitch-hiked up Novi Rd. to the township hall.

Wrecking crews were immediately called to the scene from Detroit and Bay City. Each crew was supported by a crane which posited ends with giant railroad cranes. Twins were again rolling by through the thousands witness of the salvage operations over a local television station. The derailed cars were first cleared off the tracks so the giant cranes could get in position. Then they were hoisted back on the tracks.

In the case of the locomotives, the tracks were built out to them and they were then hoisted onto the newly laid tracks.

The crowd of onlookers was so great at times that five members of the Novi police department, two sheriff's deputies were on hand to direct traffic.

The application of Elmer Bergstrom, Wisom, for a resort liquor license was turned down Monday night by a unanimous vote of the Novi Township board.

In turning down Bergstrom's request and petition, the board stated that after long time business in the area had been seeking such a license for many years. They felt that it would be unfair to those businessmen to grant a license to Bergstrom at this time in view of their past refusal to take similar action. Trustee Frank Clark went on record in favor of allowing no more resort liquor licenses in the township.

Charles Trickey, Jr. was appointed Novi Township treasurer Monday evening following the resignation of Mrs. Russell Woodworth, wife of the former township treasurer.

Mrs. Woodworth, in resigning from the post which she had held for less than two months, said that her physician had advised her that the strain and responsibilities of the post would be injurious to her health.

The township board had appointed Mrs. Woodworth to the treasurer's position in July to fill the vacancy caused by the sudden automobile death of her husband June 28.

Following Trickey's appointment by the township board to succeed Mrs. Woodworth, Supervisor Fraser Staman said that the board had no immediate plans for filling the position of trustee.

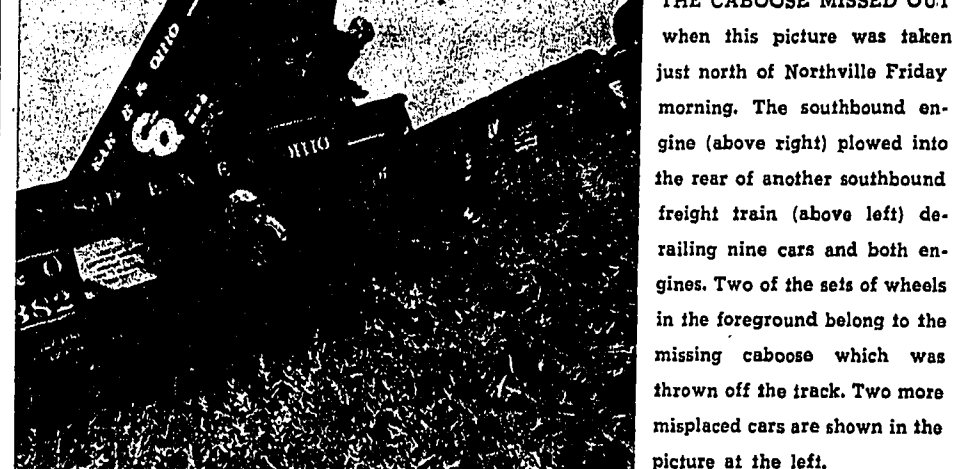
5 Cars Ditched In 3 Mile Stretch Within 8 Minutes

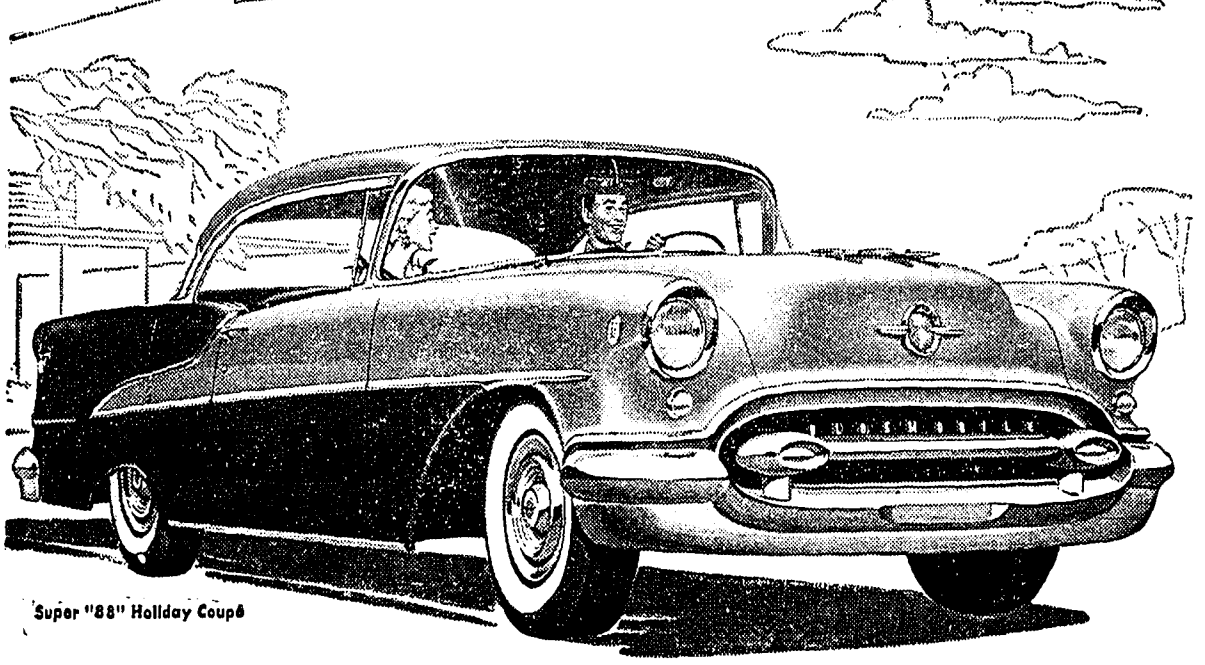
The field of 16 entries was narrowed down to six finalists and there were several minutes of debating among the judges before they announced their decision.
