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## Freight Trains Collide; 9 Cars, 2 Engines Derailed

Two locomotives and nine freight cars were derailed on the Chesapeake & Ohio tracks between Novi Rd. and Nine Mile Rd. early Friday morning when one freight train crashed into the rear of another.

The only injury reported was a dislocated knee suffered by Engineer George O'Leary of Saginaw.

The accident occurred shortly after six in the morning. A 61-car southbound train had been halted on the northern edge of Northville and was occupying the single track when the other southbound train rounded a curve and crashed into the stopped train.

Railroad officials did not make any explanation of the accident. Normally, when a train is stopped, a brakeman sets a warning signal a safe distance behind the stopped train.

The accident was reported to Police Chief Lee BeGoie at 6:10 by a fireman who had hitch-hiked up Novi Rd. to the township hall.

Wrecking crews were immediately called to the scene from Detroit and Bay City. Each crew was equipped with a crane and a derrick. The wreckage was removed by Saturday.

The first of the mishaps occurred at 7:35 p.m. when a southbound farm tractor driven by Charles Bodner of Detroit was overtaken and struck in the rear by a late model sedan operating on his way to a piece of land he farms on Novi Rd. near Nine Mile. The accident occurred near the Novi cemetery several blocks south of Grand River.

Eight minutes later, between Eight and Nine Mile roads, a northbound car driven by L. Roy Criles, 120 Rexton St., Novi, was struck by an oncoming car driven by Robert A. Smith, Jr., 120 N. Rogers, Northville. Smith applied his brakes as he passed the oncoming car but the driver of the latter car skidded out of control and into the path of the oncoming car.

As a result, all three cars ended up in the ditch.

No serious injuries resulted from either accident, although the confusion, coupled with the rain, produced a first rate traffic tie-up.

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## Board Stands Firm On Roads and Liquor Licenses

The application of Elmer Berstrom, Wisom, for a resort liquor license was turned down Monday night by a unanimous vote of the Novi Township board.

In turning down Berstrom's request and petition, the board stated that over long time business in the area had been seeking such a license for many years. They felt that it would be unfair to those businessmen to grant a license to Berstrom at this time in view of their past refusal to take similar action.

Trustee Frank Clark went on record in favor of allowing no more resort liquor licenses in the township.

**Approval Given PROVIDED . . .**  
The board also stood firm in regard to the recently passed ordinance requiring all new subdivisions to have black topped roads. A proposed subdivision on the Walled Lake Golf and Country club property which tentatively approval PROVIDED they comply with the new road ordinance. Such a compliance would be out of the question, the developers of the land stated. They said that possibly a small portion of the road facing an existing black topped road might be sold for subdividing in the near future.

White on the subject of black topping, the board members made a gesture of their strong belief in this type of paving. They unanimously have the parking area in front and on the south side of the township hall surfaced with black top. The board was awarded the black topping contract on a low bid of \$1,226.50, as these 20 acres are fully developed, additional portions of the Cruse estate will be opened for subdividing, he added.

The Blackwood Co. will not build the houses, Blackwood stated. An outside builder or builders will construct the homes. Cruse is reported to be keeping approximately 2 1/2 acres surrounding his present home.

Free Chest X-Rays For Visitors at State Fair

Again this year visitors to the Michigan State Fair, Sept. 2-11, will have an opportunity to get a free chest x-ray, general manager Donald L. Swanson, announced.

Within the ten day period last year, 1,546 persons had chest x-rays made at the fair. Health officials said that a chest x-ray is one of the most important tests that can be made at the State Fair by the Detroit, Dept. of Health, Dr. Joseph G. Mohler, Detroit Commissioner of Health, said that of this number 149 persons were referred to their physicians for some health reason brought to light by the chest x-ray.

In this group there were 58 inactive cases of tuberculosis, and nine active cases. Also 23 cases of heart condition and one case of lung cancer were found. Every person 15 years old and older is urged to have the x-ray examination. There is no charge to any visitor at the State Fair, regardless of residence.

The two Dept. of Health units will be located at the northeast corner of the picnic grove and the northwest corner of the Mall. A third unit, sponsored by the Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium, will be located at the southwest end of the Picnic Grove. All units give free x-rays.

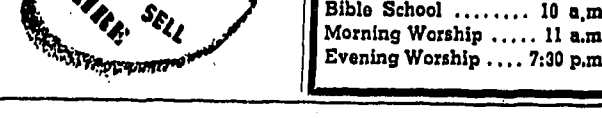

HUNTING NOTES From all reports at this writing there will be little or no change in Michigan's fall hunting seasons and regulations this year as compared to last year. The single and important exception of confining deer hunters to shooting of antlered deer only (Boy weather plays an all-important part in this. Frequent passage of weather "fronts" with accompanying high winds for the best season.

Deer Herd Slightly Larger Some 400,000 hunters who go for big game every fall will be interested to hear that the number of deer in Michigan is estimated to be a few more than last year. The Conservation Dept. shipments to dealers will start this week and continue through the first two weeks of September.

## FORD PLANT COMING TO NOVI TWP.

### Will Employ 5,000; Payroll \$30 Million

Plans for the construction of a multi-million dollar Lincoln division assembly plant and office building in the northwest part of Novi township were made public by Ford Motor Co. officials last Friday.

The plant will employ between 4,000 and 5,000 persons, who will be recruited largely from the surrounding area. Its annual payroll is expected to be between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000.

Whether by coincidence or design, plans for subdividing the Lewis D. Crouse farm at the northwest corner of 9 Mile and Novi roads were divulged at a township board meeting four days prior to the Ford announcement. Crouse is executive vice-president, car and truck division, of the Ford Motor Co. It is understood that he is reserving between 20 and 25 acres of the farm for personal use.

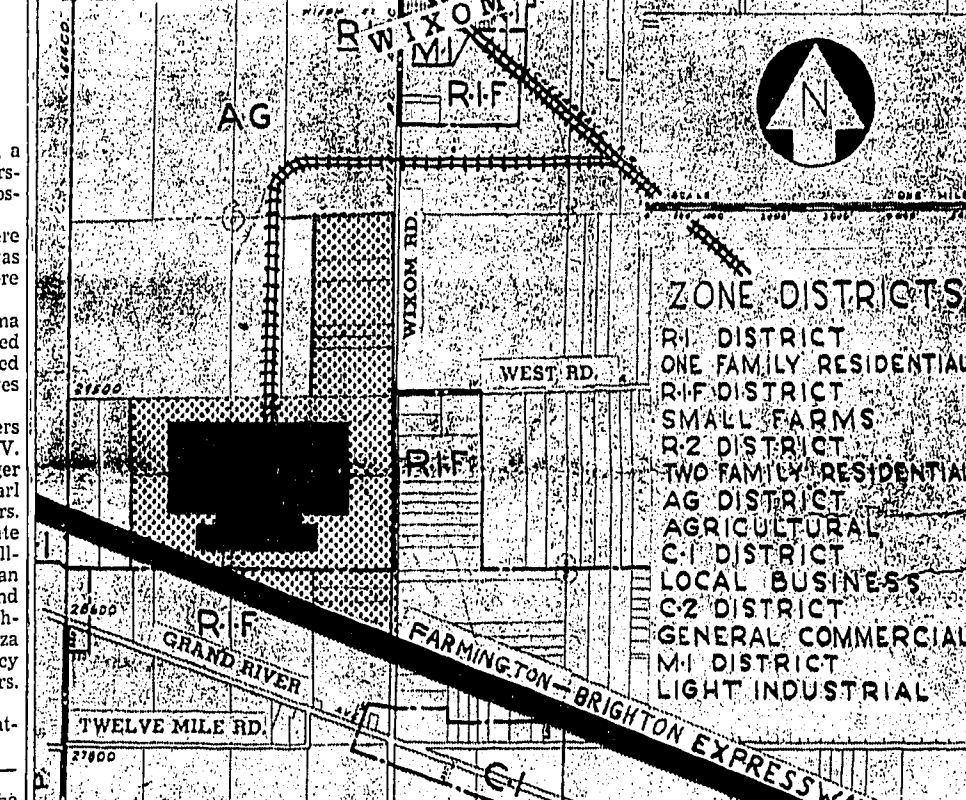
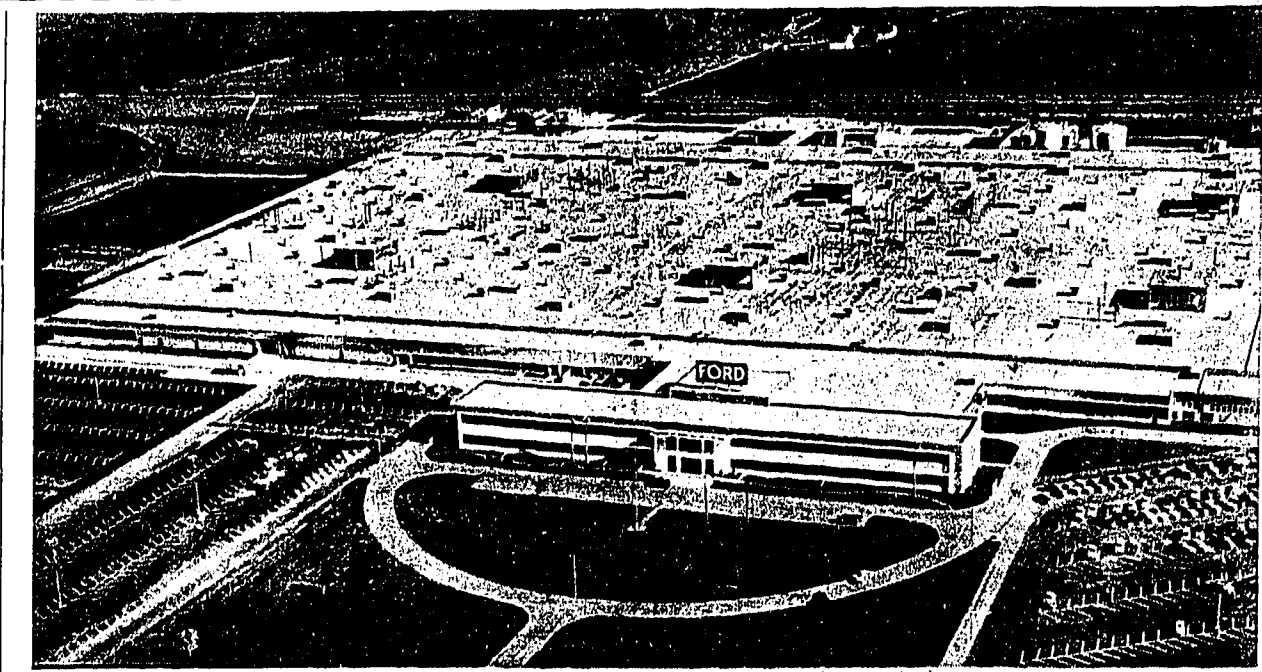
It is also known that options were given by Victor and Arthur Miller on their 300 acres of farm land adjacent to the Crouse property several months ago. These options expire Sept. 30. There is some speculation that part or all of the Crouse and Miller property may figure in a large housing development to spring at least in part from an influx of Lincoln executives and other personnel to the new Lincoln plant.

This is still a matter of rumor, however, although the construction of a large Lincoln plant is expected to swell population considerably.

Even before the Ford plans were made public last Friday, but coincident with rumors of important news in the offing, real estate men were actively trying to buy acreage near the proposed Crouse Farm Subdivision.

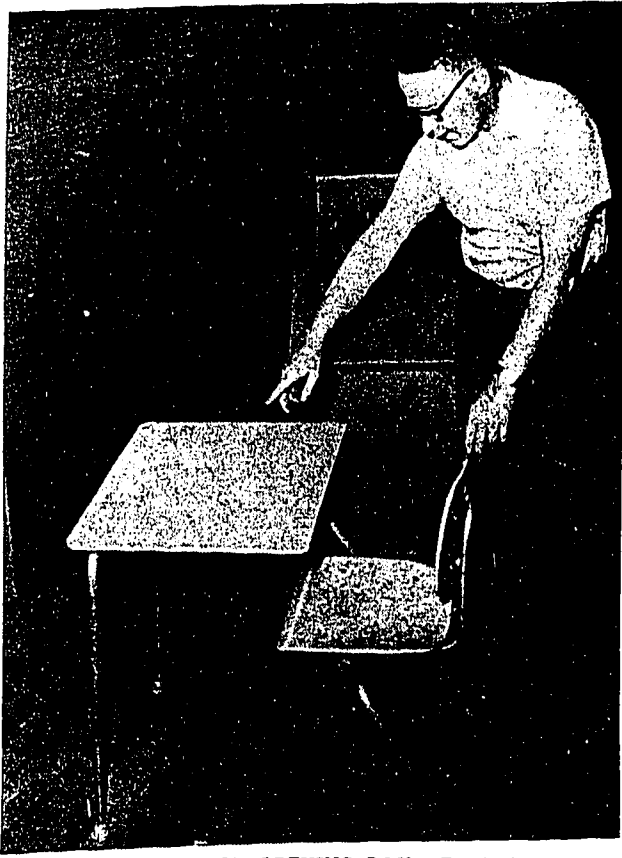

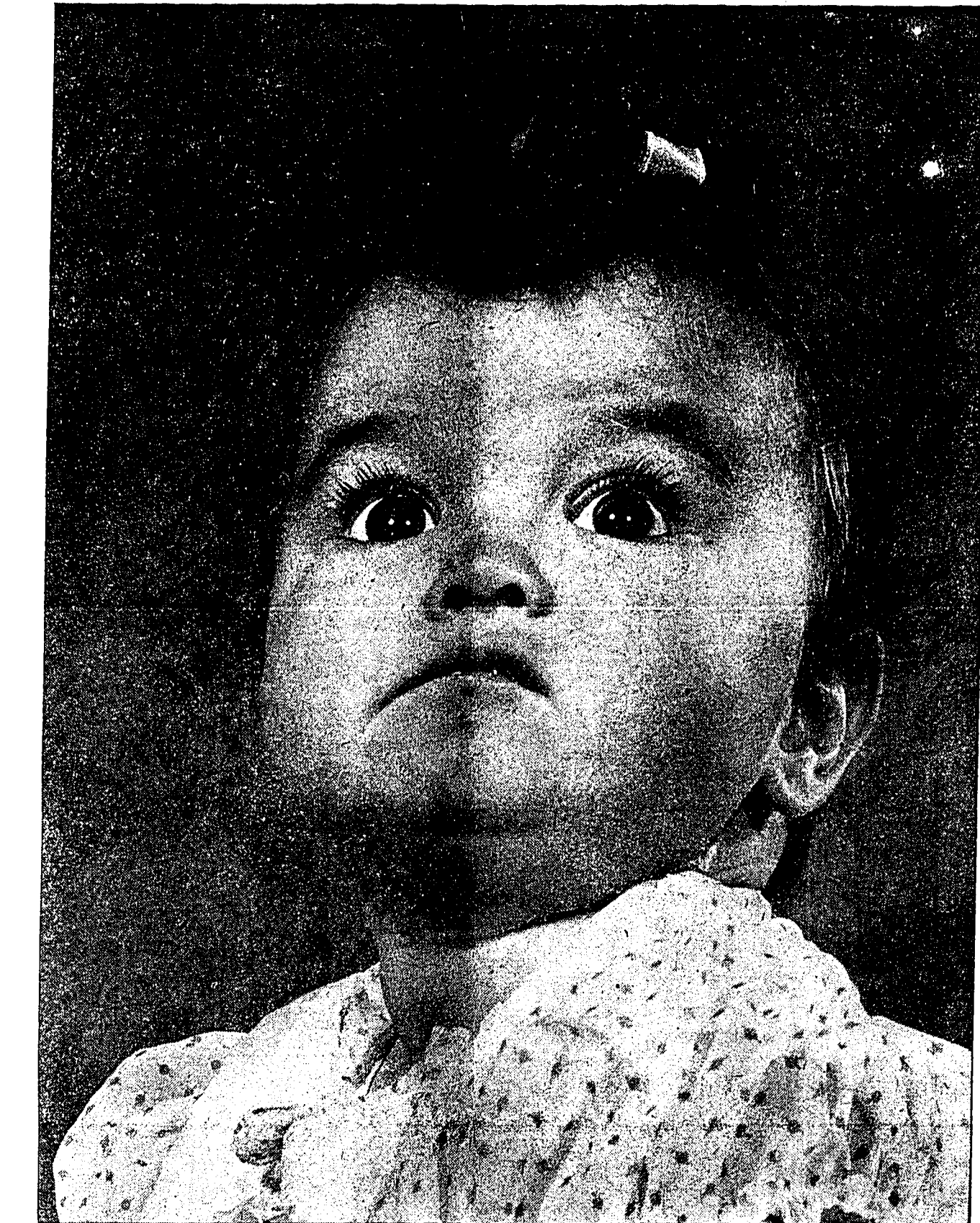
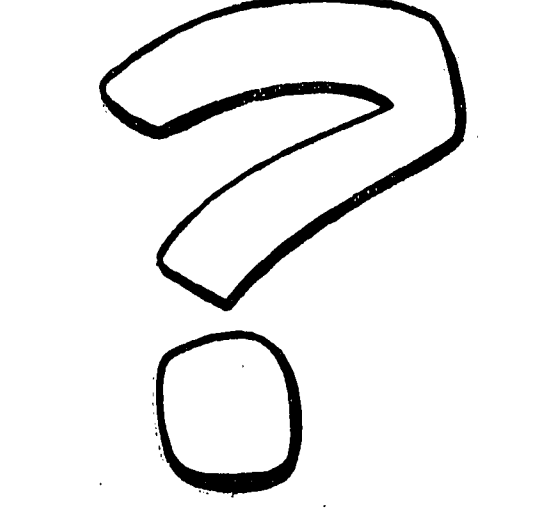
