

NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a public hearing will be held by the Zoning Board of the Township of Novi, Oakland County, at the Township Hall, 26850 Novi Road, Novi, Michigan, on the 14th day of September, A.D., 1955, at eight o'clock p.m., E.S.T., of said day for the purpose of considering the advisability of amending the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Novi in the following respects:

(a) Amending Section 10.02 of Article X of said ordinance, entitled M-1 Districts: Light Industrial Districts, to read as follows:

"10.02 BUILDING HEIGHT. No building hereafter erected or altered in any M-1 District shall exceed forty (40) feet or three (3) stories in height; provided, however, such height may be increased one (1) foot for each five (5) feet by which such building is set back in excess of one hundred (100) feet from the property lines."

(b) Adding to said ordinance a provision to the effect that the following lands situate in Town 1 North, Range 8 East, Novi Township, Oakland County, Michigan, may be devoted to the uses permitted by Section 10.01 of Article X of said ordinance:

The East one-half of the Southeast one-quarter of Section 6 and that portion of Section 7, aggregating 275 acres, more or less, lying North of the North line of the New Farmington-Brighton Expressway and East of a line parallel to and distant 1000 feet, more or less, from the West line of said Section 7.

(c) Directing that the aforesaid lands be rezoned from R-I-F District-Small Farm District and AG Distict-Agricultural District to M-1 District: Light Industrial District, and that the zoning map of Novi Township be amended accordingly.

The tentative text of the proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance and the map of the Zoning Ordinance may be examined at the office of the Township Clerk of Novi Township, in the Township Hall, 26850 Novi Road, Novi, Michigan, on any business day during the hours from nine o'clock a.m. to four o'clock p.m.

Most men and women, regardless of race, religion or economic circumstance, are destined to live and die without creating a discernable ripple on the surface of Life.

This is equally true of the miner who toils thousands of feet under the earth's surface, the highly paid corporation igan highways. lawyer or business executive whose name may appear often in the papers during the transient years before ill health or age dim his vigor, and the heads of state throughout the world who rule briefly and then are speedily forgotten.

Perhaps the same will be said of President Eisenhower when the history of the nineteenth century is read a hundred years hence. At this moment, however, his name appears likely to stand out above those of his contemporaries as having been the individual most responsible for off the highways. turning the thoughts of the world from a belief in the inevitability of war, and showing it that the road to Peace is one that holds infinitely greater promise for all mankind.

Not only have the President's policies rid the United States of the hurricane of confusion, suspicions, and excessive fears of the postwar years, as typified by McCar thyism at its worst; they have also contributed mightily in our dealings with Russia to dissipating any feeilng that this nation believes war offers a solution to the misunderstandings between the East and the West. The culminating evidence of the impact of the Eisenhower approach to international problems has been the atoms-for-peace, conference that has been under way at Geneva this month It is a direct result of President Eisenhower's suggestion at the earlier meeting of the Big Four heads of state that all nations get together and exchange information about a how atomic power might be used for peaceful purposes.

The Christian Science Monitor last week summarized the accomplishments of the assembly, as seen by its Geneva correspondent:

"High officials of the United Nations say they are convinced by experience at the atoms-for-peace conference here that most major nations have a clear understanding at last that humanity is entering a period when another major war would mean world suicide.

"This subject has never been raised at this conference. Nevertheless, men working behind the scenes for the past but assured him he would leave several months appear confident that a revolutionary change has taken place in men's thinking on both sides of the Iron Curtain.

"This is one evidence why this conference has been such a tremendous success, as already universally acclaimed by delegations and the press. There is wide recognition that the only future for the atom is one of peaceful uses. Soviet delegates here are believed to share this view as sincerely as those from the West. . . .

At home in the United States there has come in the past few months a welcome feeling of relief from tension and fear. Mothers no longer must worry that their boys will march to war. Youth may look ahead to the prospect of leading a normal life. Mature men and women again dare voice disagreement with political bureaucrats with out undue risk of being labeled a traitor or a Communist sympathizer.

There are still many things in the United States and the world which undoubtedly could be changed for the better, but there also are a great many things that are better today than they were when Eisenhower took office. For this all of us should be thankful.
