the latest chapter in the history of racing in Northville. voting unanimously to re-zone the St. Lawrence propert for erection of stables for 300 horses, the City Commissi ignored entirely the unanimous recommendation of the City Planning Board. The latter had sought to prevent the stabling of horses here the year 'round and to hold use of the property for racing purposes to a period starting 15 days prior to the racing meet and ending 15 days thereafter. It serves only in an "advisory" capacity, however, and its members must be wondering at this time how much its advice is worth. Nevertheless, the City Commission cannot be blamed for deciding as it did because not a single city resident appeared to support the Planning Commission's stand. The two or three city voices that were raised in protest at the meeting argued against the extension of racing itself, and it was a foregone conclusion that they would carry little weight because members of the City Commission believe that Northville residents want racing

We confess to some skepticism concerning the City Commission's plan to compel Northville Downs by ordinance to maintain a high standard of sanitation on the new property. In theory it sounds fine but we have heard the mayor and various members of the city commission complain too often in the past about unsatisfactory sanitary conditions at the present barns—and then do nothing to
