"Mr. Canterbury, a graduate of Ohio Northern University, was a teaching fellow in the graduate school of business administration at the University of North Carolina in 1938-39. Later he studied government management for two years a the University of Denver as a fellow of the Alfred P. Sloar Foundation, whose purpose was to train men to objectively appraise governmental activities from the outside.

"Following this training, he became a staff associate with J. L. Jacobs & Co. of Chicago, one of the foremost consulting firms in the country on matters of public administration and finance.
