## GROUND BROKEN FOR LINCOLN PLANT

### Additional Details of New Plant Are Disclosed

Staman Welcomes Ford Motor Company; Lincoln Representatives To Novi Township

It's official now. They've started work. Details of a multi-million dollar "modern, efficient plant, to meet a growing demand for Lincoln automobiles," were disclosed in Novi Dec. 2 during ground-breaking ceremonies for the new national headquarters and plant of the Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Company.

Gathered in a 25x40 foot tent, put up to shelter guests from the wind and cold of a typical snowy winter day, were executives from the Ford, Mercury and Lincoln divisions of Ford Motor Company.

Novi Township officials, railroad officials, members of the press and school children invited to the ceremony.

Speakers Introduced

John Mayhew, director of the Lincoln public relations department, welcomed the guests and introduced the speakers. The first speaker to face the group of spectators, motor plant, camera and the barrage of flashbulbs, was Fraser Staman, Novi Township supervisor.

"Regardless of the weather," Staman said, "I'm extremely happy to be here. I would like to welcome the Ford Motor Co. to Novi Township and wish them continued success in their new venture. I am confident that the Lincoln headquarters here will be a definite asset to our community."

"Good Neighbors"

Following Staman's talk, Ben D. Mills, Ford vice-president and Lincoln general manager, was introduced. Mills said the new plant would employ the latest mass production techniques for the manufacture of "the finest car in its field." Mills also said that actual construction of the new plant would begin "shortly after the first of the year," with completion expected within 18 months.

He said the need for such new and expanded facilities was "clearly evident" in the rising demand for the Lincoln automobile. Mills pointed out that during the Lincoln headquarters here will

### Heated Debates Mark Monday's Township Meeting

Tempers Flare As Residents Take Floor In Monday Night's Twp. Board Meeting

Voices were raised and tempers flared Monday night when spectators decided to take an active part in the bi-monthly township board meeting at the Novi Township Hall.

Attendance, which had been declining for the past several meetings, took a sharp turn upward with approximately 30 township residents crowding the board room.

While not identifying themselves with any group or cause, a large number of the spectators were from the southern Walled Lake area, which came in for considerable zoning and building requirement discussion during the evening.

Letter Starts Fireworks

A letter to township board members from Ernest C. Pichford of 1837 E. Walled Lake Dr. started off the "fireworks." Pichford's letter stated that he had been refused a building permit on a piece of property located in 1913, a 30-foot wide lot in the Chapman subdivision near Pichford's present home.

The Oakland County board of health officer had refused Pichford a permit for construction of a sewage system because the 30-foot wide lot was too small to conform with state health requirements.

Township Risk?

However, the health officer had told Pichford that the township board could approve the system if it was willing to assume the risk in case of complaints or an epidemic caused by an improper sewage system.

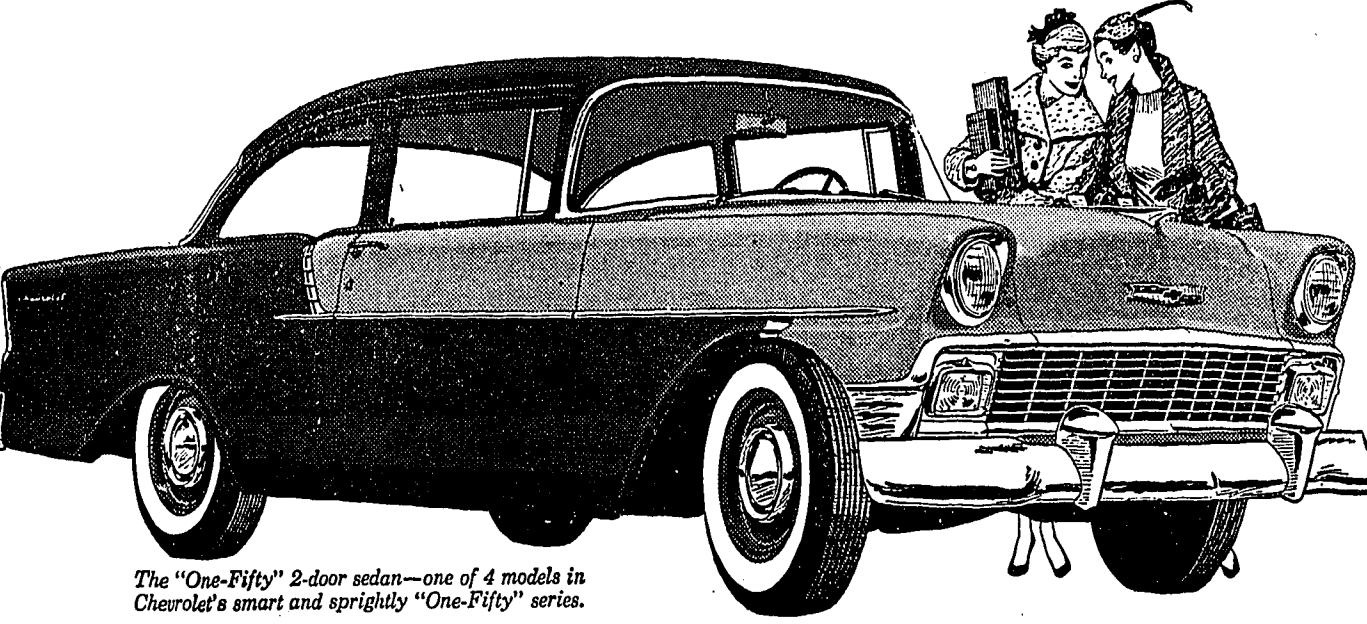

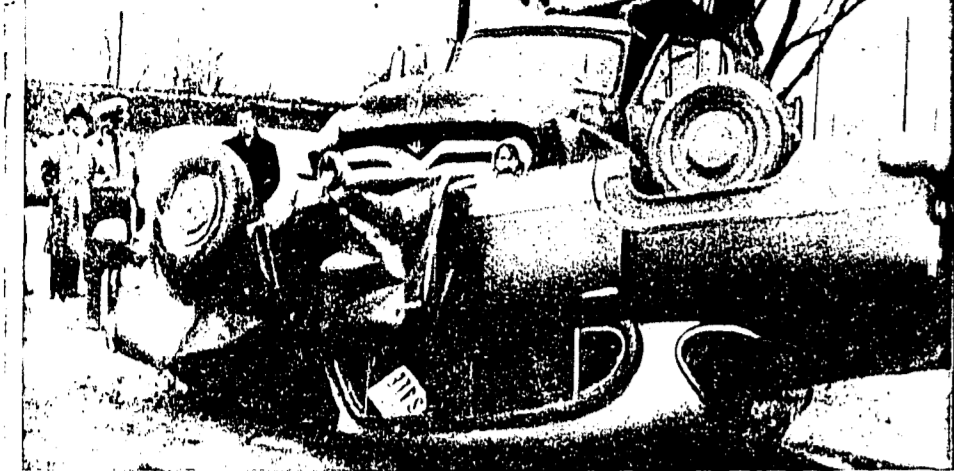

Bureau of the Budget, and in 1948 was named chairman of a joint committee set up by the Cleveland Citizens' League and the Mayor of Cleveland to improve financial administration of the city. He was also director of management for the Navy Finance Center in Cleveland, and later, director of the organization and management division of the Economic Cooperation Administration. For the past two years, Mr. Canterbury has been connected with the Ford Division of the Ford Motor Company, at Plymouth and Middlebelt roads."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE ENACTED UNDER ACT 184, PUBLIC ACTS OF 1943 OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN, AS AMENDED, TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF ZONING DISTRICTS LYING WHOLLY WITHIN THE UNINCORPORATED PARTS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, WITHIN WHICH ZONING DISTRICTS THE USE OF LAND, NATURAL RESOURCES, AND

STRUCTURES, INCLUDING TENTS AND TRAILER COACHES, THE HEIGHT, THE AREA, THE SIZE, AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS HEREAFTER ERECTED, THE LIGHT AND VENTILATION OF SUCH BUILDINGS, AND THE OPEN SPACES, AND THE DENSITY OF POPULATION SHALL BE REGULATED; TO PROVIDE FURTHER FOR A METHOD OF ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF ITS PROVISIONS; AND TO PRESCRIBE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS; TO PROVIDE FOR A BOARD OF

APPEALS AND ITS POWERS AND DUTIES.

THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by the addition of two (2) new paragraphs to Section 3.08 of Article III to read as follows:

"All lots must be served by a municipal sewer system or an approved disposal system capable of disposing of the effluent, acceptable to the requirements of the Wayne County Health Department.

In areas where the soil conditions are found to be inadequate to support septic tank facilities and special means of disposal must be provided for in order to safeguard the health of the community, and the lot areas as prescribed in this Ordinance are insufficient to furnish this safeguard, no building permit shall be issued for a building unless the lot area is sufficient in size to support the disposal system as shall meet the approval of the Wayne County Health Department.

PART II. That the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by the deletion of paragraphs (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and (h) of Section 7.01 and the changing of paragraph (i) to become paragraph (j) and paragraph (j) to become paragraph (k) of Section 7.01 of Article VII.

PART III. That the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by amending paragraph (i) of Section 11.01 Article X to read as follows:

Section 11.01 (i)  
1. Single family terrace dwellings of not more than eight (8) housing units each, when so erected at the same time.

2. Board and rooming houses or tourist homes, as defined in Article VII.

3. Private clubs, fraternities and lodges, except those of the chief activity of which is a

Be A Good Citizen - Vote Next Tuesday

The fact that only seven out of approximately 1,500 qualified Northville electors attended the meeting Nov. 28 of the Charter Commission to explain the proposed new city charter prompts use of the above heading for this editorial. The slim turnout was a timely demonstration of the apathy with which voters everywhere approach public business. Nevertheless, it is a good charter that comes up for approval next Tuesday. It deserved more than the "don't care" attitude evidenced by the public, and it is to be hoped that it will be adopted by a wide margin.

It is not the policy of the paper under normal circumstances to take sides in local elections because the city is small enough so most candidates for public office are usually fairly well known. The situation is somewhat different this year, however, because all five members of the present village commission are running for election to four positions on the new city council - plus John S. Canterbury, who has lived here but briefly (6 years) to be widely known, but who is recognized by those who have worked with him on village projects as capable and possessing a broad background in government activities outside of Northville.

There can be no argument that Mike Allen, Jack Stuenholl, Alton Peters, Earl Reed and Ed Welch, all members of the expiring village commission, have not given unstintingly of their time and effort to the village's business to the best of their individual ability. Each is deserving of credit to the extent that he has contributed to the city's welfare.

There are, however, some respects in which the present village commission as a whole has failed to deal with matters that should concern it. One of these is long-range planning with respect to paving, sewers, and other public improvements, which have been dealt with on a year-to-year basis until the last few weeks, when a citizens' advisory committee was set up.

Another is the establishment of the city's water department on a sound financial basis so that some day the city will not awake with a rude jolt to find that it has established no financial reserve to cover large outlays for replacements.

A third is to deal realistically with inequities in the assessment of city property that in effect favor some taxpayers at the expense of others. No one knows how extensive such abuses may be, but informed sources feel that a study and appraisal by an independent outside firm might reveal many "interesting" situations.

A fourth is the enactment of a new and modern building code for the city, to protect against sub-standard housing and other construction projects, and legalize the use of modern structural materials and designs.

Each of these things has been talked about informally by the present village commission but somehow they have been postponed until a more opportune time. Another criticism that can be leveled with considerable justice at the present commission is its lack of attention to such little details as strict observance of the village's ordinances.

Specifically, we refer to its "tacit acquiescence" in the rezoning of the St. Lawrence property, which was zoned residential, for tent stables of Northville Downs, and its inability to cope with the health and fire hazard condition which state officials charge existed there. We also refer to its "tacit acquiescence" to construction of barns on the St. Lawrence property in November before the recent change in zoning became effective.

We admit to being old fashioned enough to believe that laws and ordinances that are enacted should be lived up to by everyone, and we have the feeling that it should be a function of the city council to insist that this be done. If this objective is desirable, and if Northville electors are interested in a fresh approach to getting at some of the important matters mentioned above, they should turn to the Canterbury advertisement on Page 3, which was paid for by his friends, and to the reprint of an article at the end of this column, which the Northville Record carried in its issue of April 2, 1953. Commission Finds Rezoning Illegal

The Northville Village Commission on the occasion of its last official meeting Monday evening announced publicly that its recent rezoning of the St. Lawrence property for truck use was null and void, because it violated the city charter, and therefore was probably illegal.

Simultaneously, it revoked its rezoning action of Nov. 7, thus reverting the property to its original residential status.

Court Action Against City  
The commission's action came as a result of being named co-defendant with Northville Downs and Donald G. St. Lawrence in an injunctive legal action initiated in Wayne county circuit court on Nov. 28 by Charles G. Mummary, Irving J. and Dorothy M. Shoobridge, John and Frieda Haller, and F. D. Sobor. The plaintiff's bill of complaint alleged:

1. That on Oct. 25, 1955 the Planning Commission recommended to the Northville City Commission that the St. Lawrence property be rezoned for truck use.

2. That the Northville City Commission on Nov. 7, 1955, of which there was no notice and publication as required by law, passed an ordinance rezoning the property to "T-1 (truck)" without any of the limitations recommended by the Planning Commission, together with its instructions to City Attorney Philip Ogilvie not to uphold the validity of the rezoning will nullify further court action.

3. That the City Commission's rezoning action was invalid because there was not 15 days notice of the time and place of public hearing on the proposed amendment to said zoning ordinance published in an official paper or paper of general circulation.

4. That the amendment rezoning the property was arbitrary.

## ALLEN MONUMENT BUSINESS SECOND LARGEST IN MICHIGAN

Think of diamonds, travel and art, and what comes into your mind? You probably don't think of the monument business, but the fact is that these things are as much an integral part of the business as granite and sandblasting.

The monument dealer travels to select granite and marble; uses diamonds to cut the stone, and employs his artistic talents in sketching drawings for the marker.

The monument business incorporates a variety of skills and offers an escape from boredom since no two jobs or names are ever identical. Commenting on this fact, A. Malcolm (Mike) Allen, local monument dealer, said that a monument is very much like a tailored dress; it is made to fit the individual.

Allen is the second largest monument dealer in the state of Michigan and travels to several states during the year to order granite and marble.

Most of the granite that Allen buys comes from quarries in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Georgia and Barre, Ver. Tennessee and North Carolina are the marble centers. Blocks of the stone ranging in size from 100 pounds to 20 tons are shipped to Allen who has the stone cut to size in his factory.

Many of the monuments are displayed in the front and rear of the business buildings. "I don't have a storage problem," Allen said, "nobody walks away with my merchandise and the weather doesn't affect them."

**Largest Monument—20 Tons**  
The largest monument at Allen was ever commissioned to finish was a 20-ton solid unit displayed in the front and rear of the business buildings. "I don't have a storage problem," Allen said, "nobody walks away with my merchandise and the weather doesn't affect them."

**Another unusual monument**  
A five foot by four foot stone upon which will be the picture of Jesus Blessing Little Children. As far as Allen knows, this will be the first time for this religious drawing to appear on a monument.

**Diamond Saw Cuts Granite**  
Granite is cut with a diamond saw. The saw has no teeth, but there are 50 diamonds per inch in the wheel. As the saw cuts through the stone, water continually sprays to wash away the dust and cool the diamonds. A size to be used on the stone. The drawing is then transferred to a rubber stencil which covers the stone. The portions of the stencil which the finished "carving" is made.

**Free Hand**  
After the stone's surface is smoothed it is then prepared for the lettering and drawings.

**Free Hand**  
The days of the long-bearded stone carver with a hammer and chisel are past, Allen says. Most of the present day inscriptions and artwork are done by sandblasting or with pneumatic chisels.

**Free Hand**  
A free-hand sketch is made at the drawing board in the exact size to be used on the stone. The drawing is then transferred to a rubber stencil which covers the stone. The portions of the stencil which the finished "carving" is made.

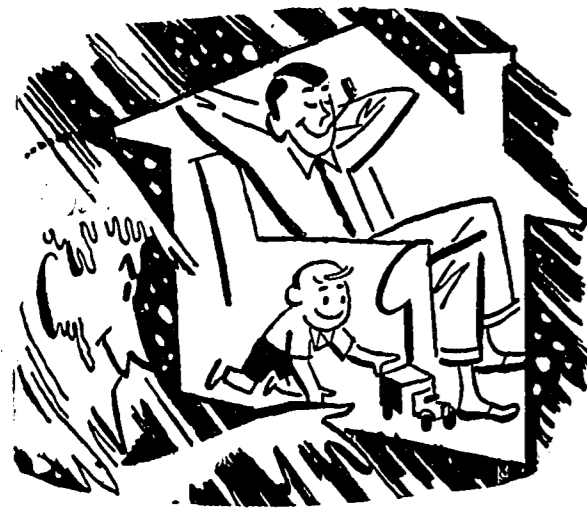

**Christmas Star is Still a Mystery**

The mystery of the Christmas star brings popular interest in astronomy to a peak in December, says University of Michigan associate professor Hazel M. Losh. As it's a mystery why astronomers haven't solved yet.  
"The narrative about the star is too incomplete, the date of the appearance of the star too uncertain, the early calendar too unreliable to lead us to any definite conclusion," she says. One explanation advanced is that the "star" reported to have guided the shepherds may have been a conjunction of bright planets.  
The Sun will reach its southernmost point this month, the winter solstice, as it is called. The Sun will then swing in its shortest day and longest night, about nine and 15 hours, respectively, Professor Losh points out.  
At this time of the year the earth is closer to the Sun than during our summer which tends to make winter a little milder and the southern summer a little hotter.  
In spite of the fact that we are closer to the Sun than we are in the summer the Sun's rays now hit us obliquely which lessens their force, the astronomy professor explains.  
Venus, after its long appearance during the summer and early fall as an evening planet is now the "morning star." And Mars will be the bright orange object in the southwestern sky.  
During December evenings some of the most beautiful and colorful stars in all the heavens light up the eastern horizon. Professor Losh says, citing Orion, the giant huntsman, as an example. He moves across the southern sky during the course of the night.

covering the areas of the stone to be engraved are carved away with a sharp knife.  
The stone is then wheeled into a special etched sand-blasting room where fine particles of carborundum are pneumatically blown over the exposed surface. Part of the stone at a pressure of 110 pounds per square inch.  
The terrific pressure of these particles striking the stone literally cuts away the surface of the stone to the required depth. Parts of the stone covered by the sand-blasting operation. It takes about three hours to blast a stone three feet long.  
Allen's factory includes a suction device which eliminates the possibility of workers becoming ill from breathing dust.

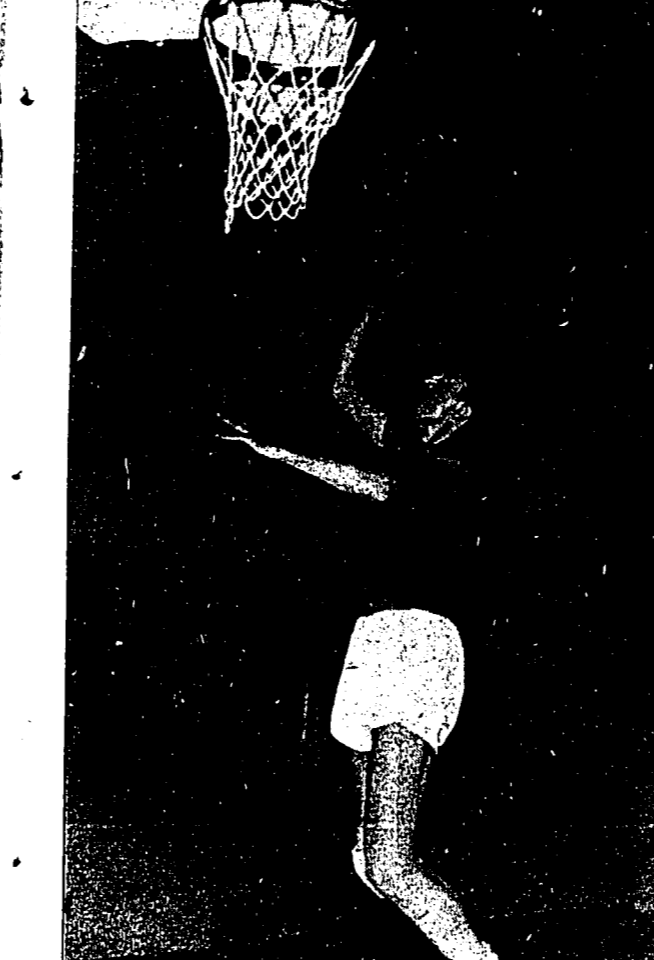

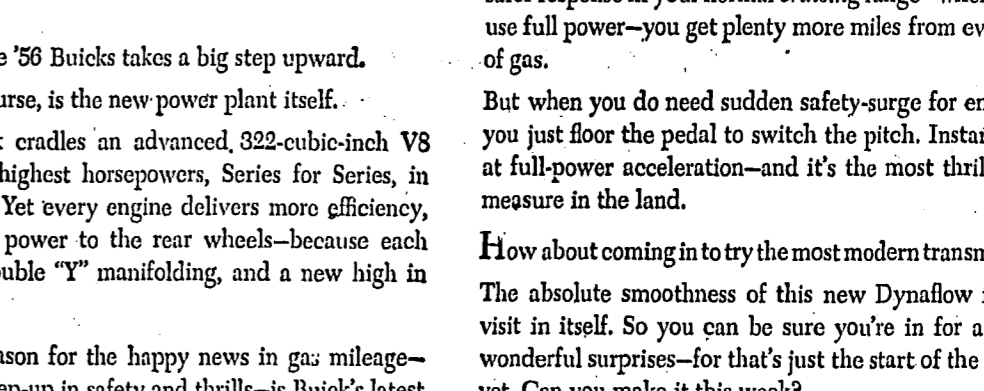

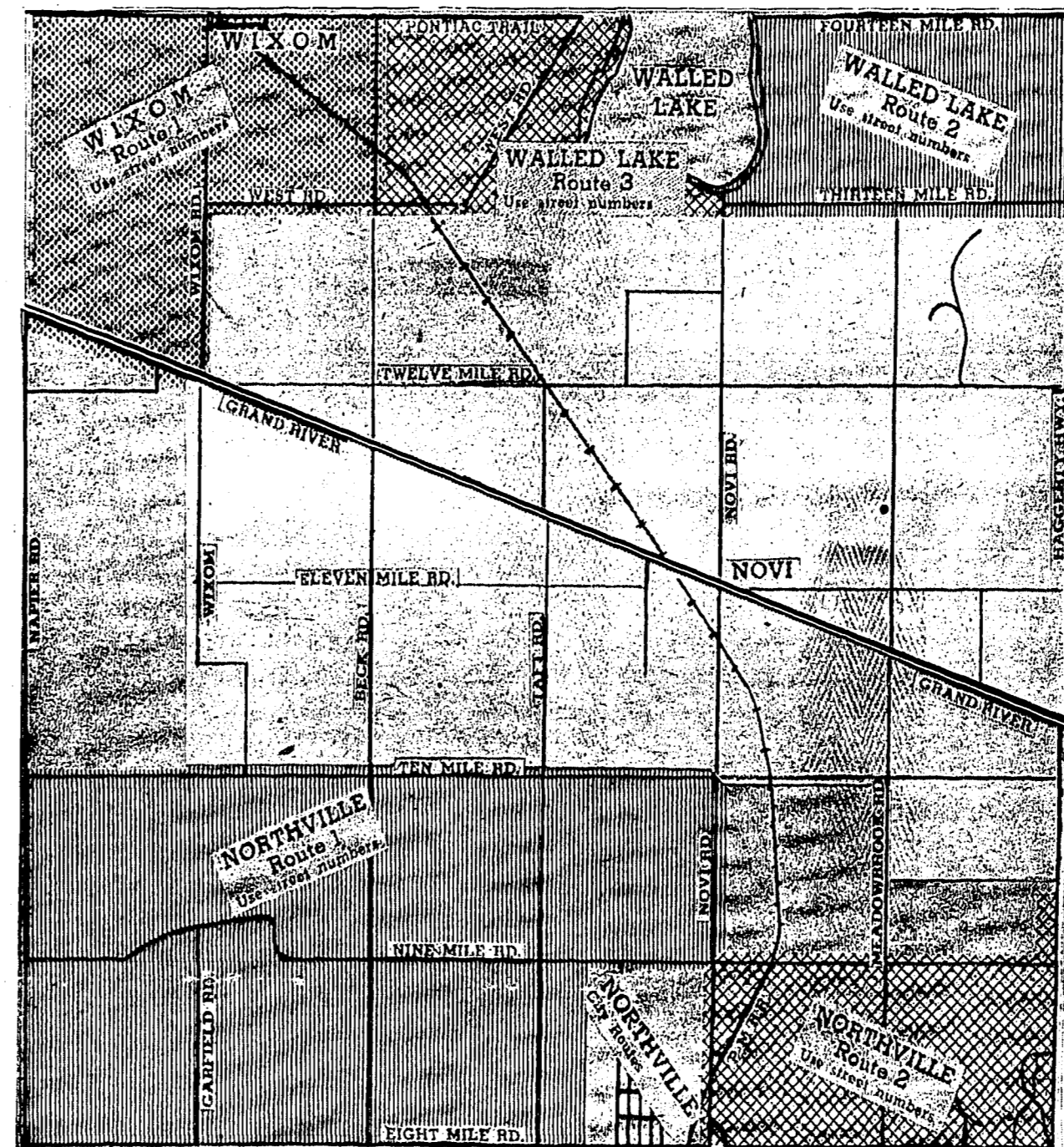

Novi will have its own rural mail delivery starting Saturday.

Novi Postmistress Marjorie Watson made this announcement Tuesday noon. There is speculation that most of the homes in the area bounded by 10-Mile Rd., Wixom Rd., 12-Mile Rd. and Haggerty Rd. will receive mail on the new route.

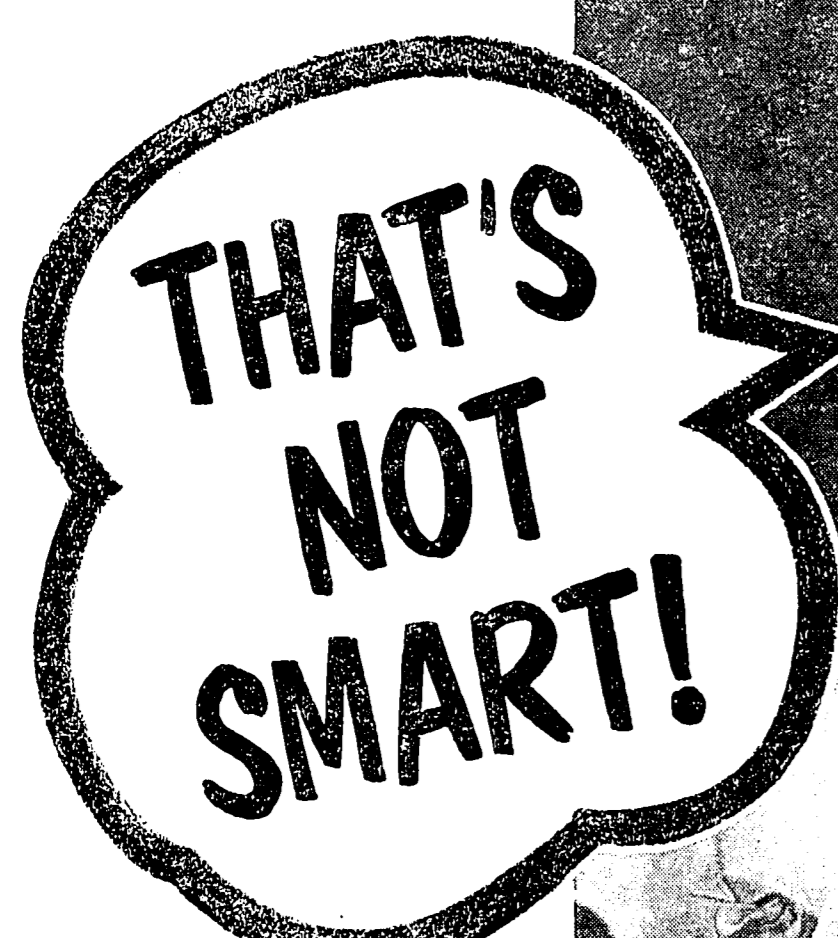
The announcement of the new route came as no surprise to township officials who, spearheaded by Supervisor Frazer Staman, have long requested such action by the post office department.

Temporarily, mail for the affected areas will continue to be sorted in the Northville Farmington and Walled Lake post offices. A Novi carrier will then pick it up and deliver it to the newly established rural route.

No announcement has been made as yet regarding the possibility of building a larger post office in Novi or putting an addition on the present building. Temporarily, officials say, there is a possibility that the township hall may be used during the Christmas rush.

### Boys Club Sells Christmas Trees

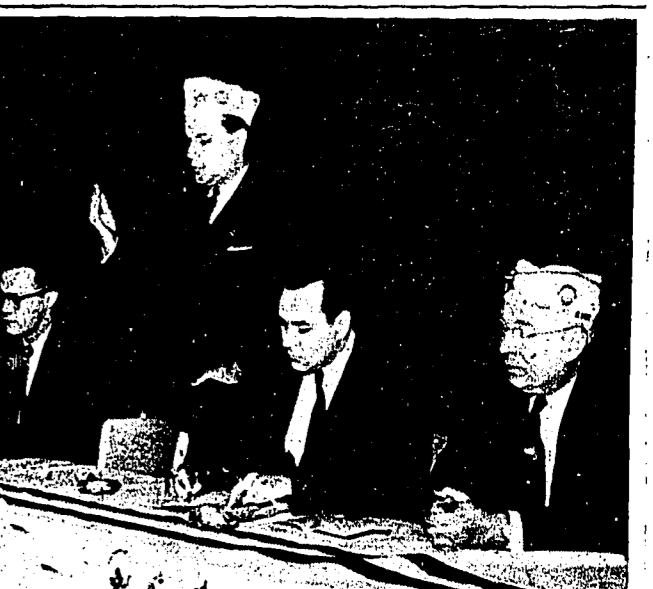
The Willowbrook Boys club will be selling Christmas trees at the Willowbrook Community Bldg. Prices of the trees are between \$2 and \$5.
