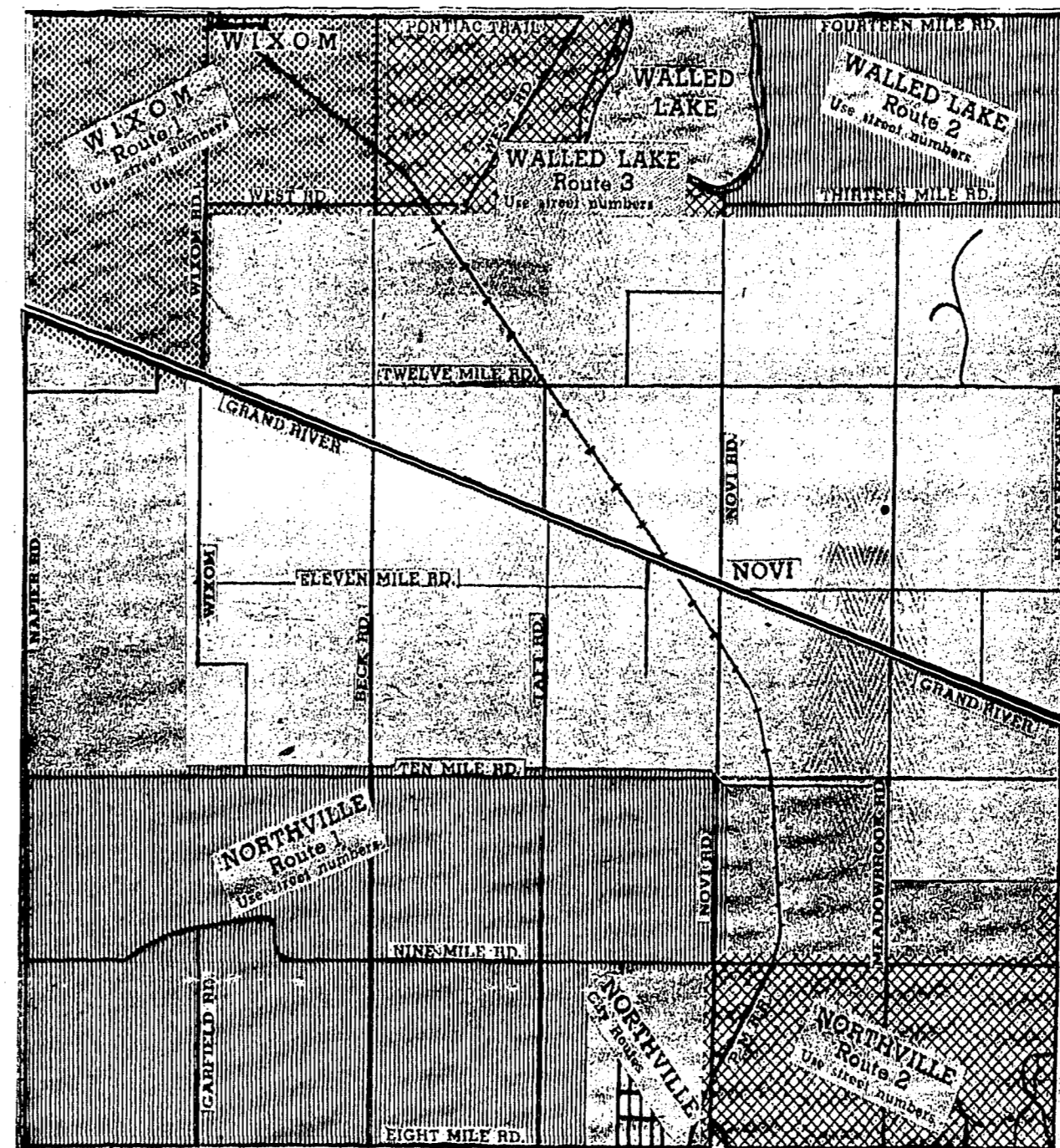

NOVI TO HAVE POSTAL ROUTE SATURDAY

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New Route to Cover Most of the Township

Larger Building for Post Office Needed — May Use Township Hall Temporarily

Novi will have its own rural mail delivery starting Saturday.

Novi Postmistress Marjorie Watson made this announcement Tuesday noon. There is speculation that most of the homes in the area bounded by 10-Mile Rd., Wixom Rd., 12-Mile Rd. and Haggerty Rd. will receive mail on the new route.

The announcement of the new route came as no surprise to township officials who, spearheaded by Supervisor Frazer Staman, have long requested such action by the post office department.

Temporarily, mail for the affected areas will continue to be sorted in the Northville Farmington and Walled Lake post offices. A Novi carrier will then pick it up and deliver it to the newly established rural route.

No announcement has been made as yet regarding the possibility of building a larger post office in Novi or putting an addition on the present building. Temporarily, officials say, there is a possibility that the township hall may be used during the Christmas rush.

People in the affected areas will continue to receive their mail bearing the old Farmington or Northville addresses. Mrs. Watson said, but they should notify their friends of the change in the near future. They should also remember to notify the publishers of magazines to which they subscribe.

Average TB Case Costs \$15,000; Taxpayers Pay Largest Amount

Dear Readers of The Northville Record: For many years you have supported the work of the Tuberculosis and Health Society by your generous contributions to the Christmas Seal Sale. You can take pride in the progress that has been made toward the defeat of tuberculosis in our community. Several other times, sprinle nutmeg or chopped nuts over the top.

Recently a man in this town packed his bags and said goodbye to his family. He couldn't say where he would be going.

What happens now? He can be fairly sure he'll get well although TB does take 10,000 American lives a year. His case was discovered early, during an industrial x-ray program and he'll get the best possible treatment in Herman Kiefer hospital.

How much will it cost to get him back on his feet? The average cost is about \$15,000, including medical care, compensation, pensions, relief payments, and loss of wages. Most of this cost is paid for by you as taxpayers.

What about his family? You can imagine that it won't take long to set up that nest egg. Will his wife have to go to work? What about these youngsters who need attention and care? Community agencies that you support will advise and help. But it will be difficult times for this family until the father comes home, and no one can promise when that will be.

And when he comes home, he will have to be trained for other work. This, too, costs money.

To put it bluntly, this family has switched from the asset to the liability column in this community. Tuberculosis is a preventable disease, an unnecessary disease, yet 400,000 Americans have it.

The money you give to the TB and Health Society is spent to prevent TB: to teach people how to build and keep good health, to help unknown cases of TB that may be spreading infection in this community, to help former TB patients keep well and back into the community asset column, and to find through scientific research ever better ways of preventing and treating TB.

When you buy Christmas Seals you are protecting the health of your own family. You are making

an investment in the future of your community. With your continued support we can wipe out tuberculosis in Wayne county.

Christmas Eggnog Pie
1 1/2 pt. plain gelatin
(1 envelope)
2 tbs. water
1/2 pt. coffee cream
1 cup sugar
1/2 pt. nutmeg
3 eggs, separated
2 tbs. rum
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 pt. whipping cream
Soak gelatin in cold water for five minutes, or until soft. Combine thin cream, sugar, beaten egg yolks and nutmeg in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until mixture coats the spoon. Remove from heat and add soaked gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Cool. Add rum and vanilla.

When cool enough to be syrupy, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and cream whipped until stiff—adding each separately. Put in regular or Graham cracker shell and place in refrigerator until firm enough to cut. Decorate with red or green candied cherries, for the holidays, or sprinkle nutmeg or nuts over the top.

Whereas it has been discovered that the legal requirement regarding publication of notices of hearing on said ordinance was not in accordance with the statute in such cases made and provided, and

Whereas by reason of the failure to conform with said statutory requirement the said ordinance has been challenged and is hereby declared null and void, and

Whereas the Commission for the City of Northville does believe that the ordinance to be invalid by reason of the failure to give proper notice as above specified, and

Whereas, a referendum petition has been filed with the City clerk's office and the same is hereby amended as follows: That the Commission be and it is hereby resolved that the Commission by re-opening of the hearing on said ordinance, hereby nullifies and cancels its action of November 7th, 1955, with regards to this invalid ordinance.

It is further resolved that in response to the petition filed protesting enactment of this ordinance, that the said ordinance is hereby repealed.

It is further resolved that the Building Inspector for the City of Northville be directed to revoke and cancel the building permit which he issued under this invalid ordinance.

Motion by Comm. Reed, seconded by Comm. Allen that the above resolution be adopted. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Comm. Allen, seconded by Comm. Peters, that an extension be granted to the A & A Asphalt Paving Co. to whom the contract was awarded for paving the streets which are already curbed, until July 1st, 1956, and that the terms of the contract remain the same as when contract was let and that bonds be re-issued when work is begun. Motion carried unanimously.

After discussing the matter of the Wayne Co. Health Department acting in the capacity of Health Commissioner for the City of Northville, due to the resignation of Dr. Chabot, with Dr. Cadwell, Director of Wayne Co. Health Dept. and Morton Hilbert, Chief of the Sanitation Dept., it was moved by Comm. Reed, seconded by Comm. Allen, that the Wayne Co. 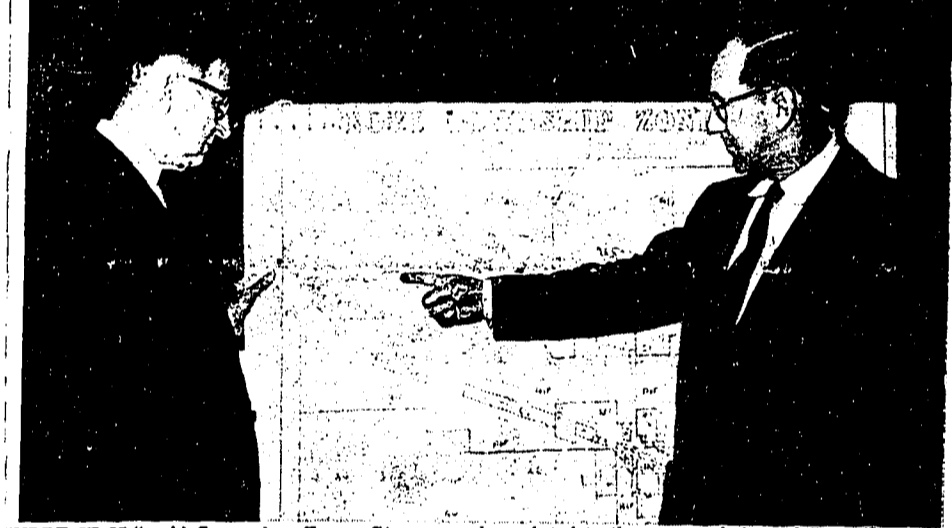

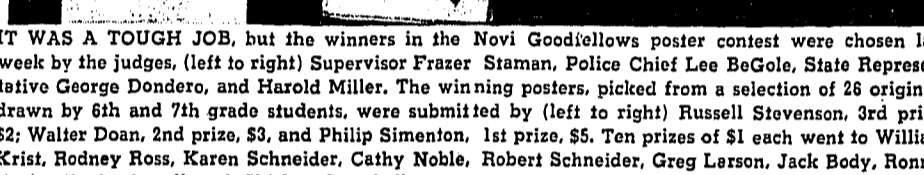
The WSCS of the Novi Methodist church presented a brass candelabra for the church altar Sunday morning.
