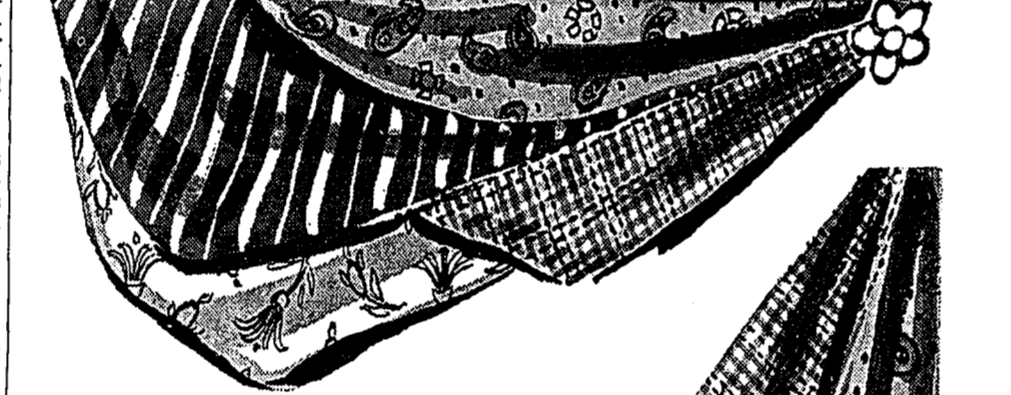

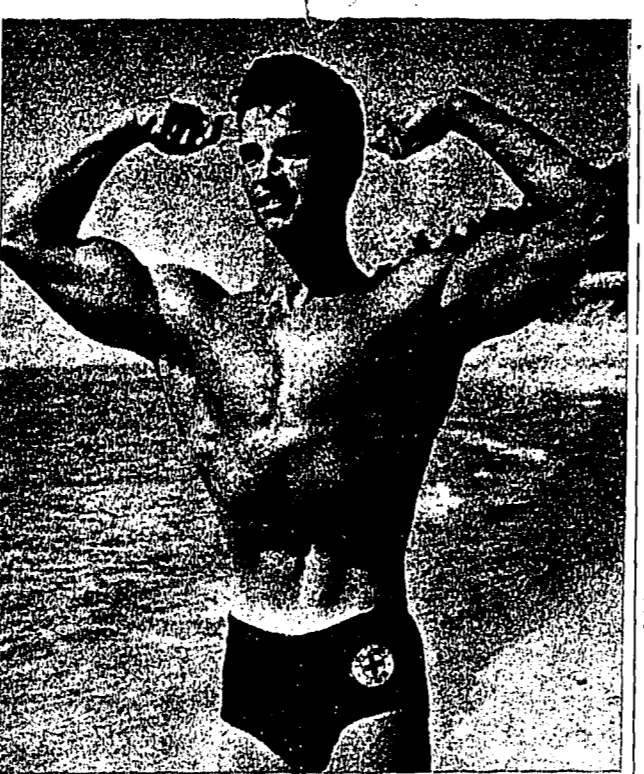

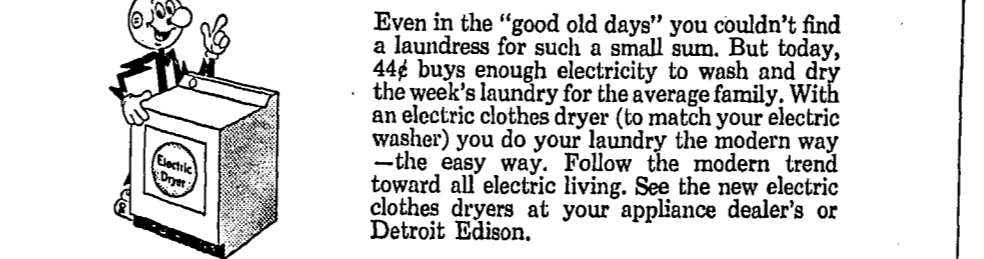

Letter To The Editor

"Need Long Range Curriculum Study"

To the Editor Northville Record As a former member of the new Citizens' Advisory Committee of the Northville School Board I would like to answer the article by Mr. F. R. Spruille in the Jan. 28 issue of the Record entitled "What Shall We Teach?" My answer is in the form of my own minority opinion to the Board of Education which I request be published in the Record, along with this letter.

My purpose is to enlarge upon Mr. Spruille's comments. In my opinion he did not go far enough in discussing the importance of the relative responsibilities of the school authorities and the parents and citizens of Northville in establishing the curriculum for our schools. Also the important things he did say were somewhat obscured by unrelated though interesting opinions on sundry educational problems.

Pershaps this letter, together with my minority opinion appended, will arouse sufficient interest in the Parents' and Citizens' Association to bring about public discussion of the basic issues involved in determining what we shall teach in the Northville Schools. Together with Mr. Spruille and the National Education Association whom he quoted, I believe very strongly that "the people have not only the right but also the responsibility to decide what shall be taught, the school authorities to say how it shall be taught."

As a parent with three children in Northville Grade schools and a fourth to enter next year, and as a former high school teacher (some 15 years ago) with a more than passing interest in educational problems, I have a vital personal interest in the character of the Northville High School. I believe there are hundreds of other parents in Northville who feel likewise and who want to fulfill their responsibility.

What can we parents do? I suggest one course of immediate action. Read my minority opinion addressed to the Board of Education which follows, discuss it with others, and write to the Board of Education Northville School District, Northville, Mich.

If you agree with my opinions on the need for public participation in curriculum decisions, a few lines seconding my proposals

recommendations to the Board of Education. 1. That the Advisory Committee be enlarged to include representative of the citizens and parents of Northville.

2. That the Advisory Committee continue to function, after submission of the report for which it was established, to provide continuing advice and counsel to the Board of Education as representatives of the Public Opinion of Northville.

3. That a long range curriculum study be undertaken under the auspices of the Citizens' Advisory Committee, utilizing an organized program for conducting such a study known as "The Parent-Citizen Plan."

The public cannot contribute anything constructive to such a study!!! 2. Curriculum is a matter which should be relegated to the professionals, the school authorities. 3. It would take too long. We've got to build a school.

Mr. Spruille in quoting the National Education Association answered the first two of these most adequately. Unfortunately some few of the members of the Advisory Committee have very definite opinions on education for the few—for these children who will be able intellectually to take advantage of their educational opportunities.

Prizes Educators Incidentally, I do not mean to infer here that our Northville School authorities are not to be trusted to plan an adequate curriculum for our schools. I personally believe that all Northville parents should be thankful for the extraordinarily capable teachers and administrators with whom we are blessed.

In answer to the third request for rejecting the "long range" curriculum study, I personally proposed on 2 separate occasions that the committee submit an "interim" report, along the lines of the final report just submitted—enough detail on curriculum, population, finance, building and site to enable the Board to come to a decision, hire an architect, choose a site and begin detailed plans—then continue committee work on the long range curriculum study. This study would proceed during the planning and early construction stages since it is probable that many changes could be made in curriculum without affecting the basic arrangement and number of classrooms and other facilities.

Also, I am a firm believer that late planning is better than no planning at all, particularly when revisions can be made even in the curriculum of our present high school without major rearrangements of the existing-inadequate facilities.

Finally, if further justification for my case is needed, both professional representatives of the PTA, Mothers Club, Rotary club, Exchange club, Optimist club, veterans' organizations, and others) to designate representatives who will reflect the opinion of their membership, plus other members representative of the various residential areas of the school district, this group might

of the Board of Education for consideration. I have appreciated the opportunity given me by the Board to participate in this study group. I do feel, however, that I have failed the Board and the citizens of Northville, since I was unable to convince sufficient other committee members of the importance of these issues. I can only hope that this minority opinion will generate further thinking on the part of the Board and the parents of Northville which will result in a more desirable school system for our children. This is my sole aim.

I note in the minutes of the Jan. 6 Board of Education meeting reported in last week's Record, that Mr. Amerman was authorized to appoint a group of teachers and lay citizens to share the work of planning for a new high school. This is fine. However, there was nothing in the minutes to indicate that an extensive curriculum study is to be undertaken by this group or that their work will be guided by adequate representation of the will of Northville citizens and parents.

Incidentally, I do not mean to infer here that our Northville School authorities are not to be trusted to plan an adequate curriculum for our schools. I personally believe that all Northville parents should be thankful for the extraordinarily capable teachers and administrators with whom we are blessed.

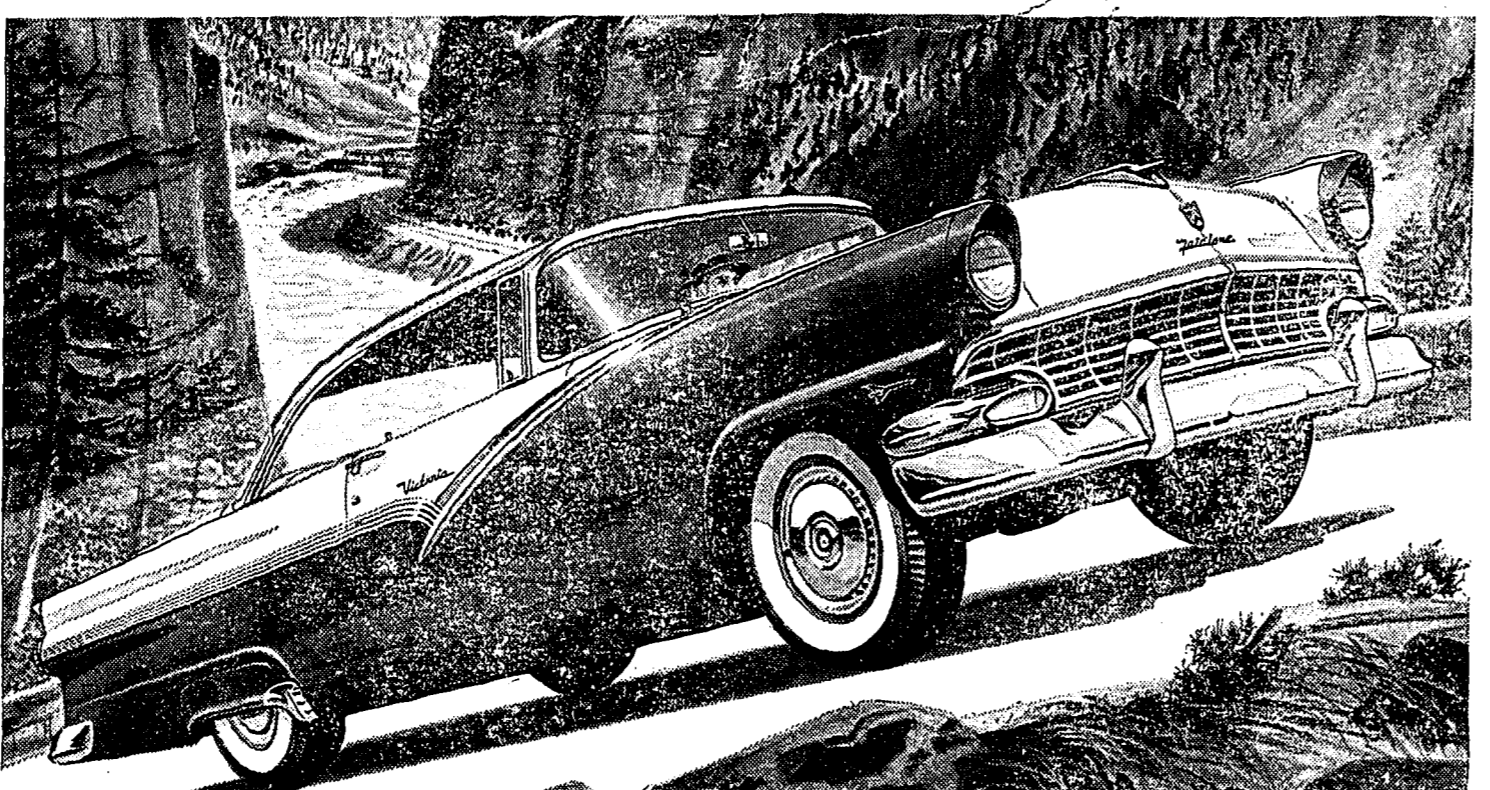

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All-League Band Concert Here Monday

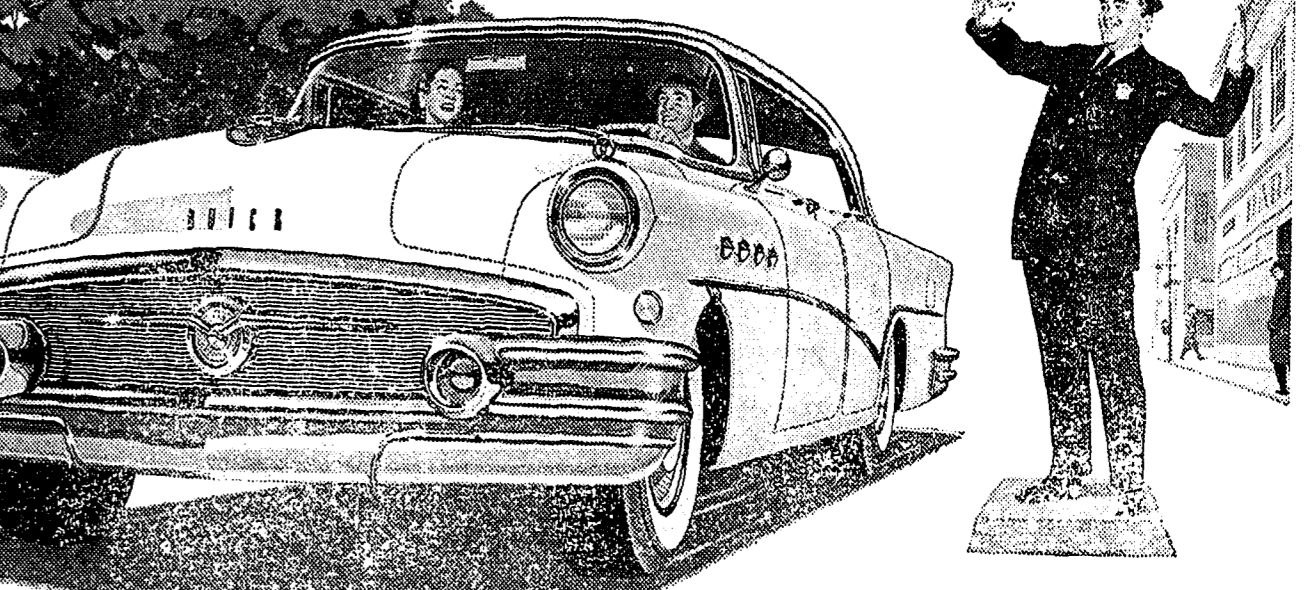

Phone Co. Official Sees Dials In Near Future

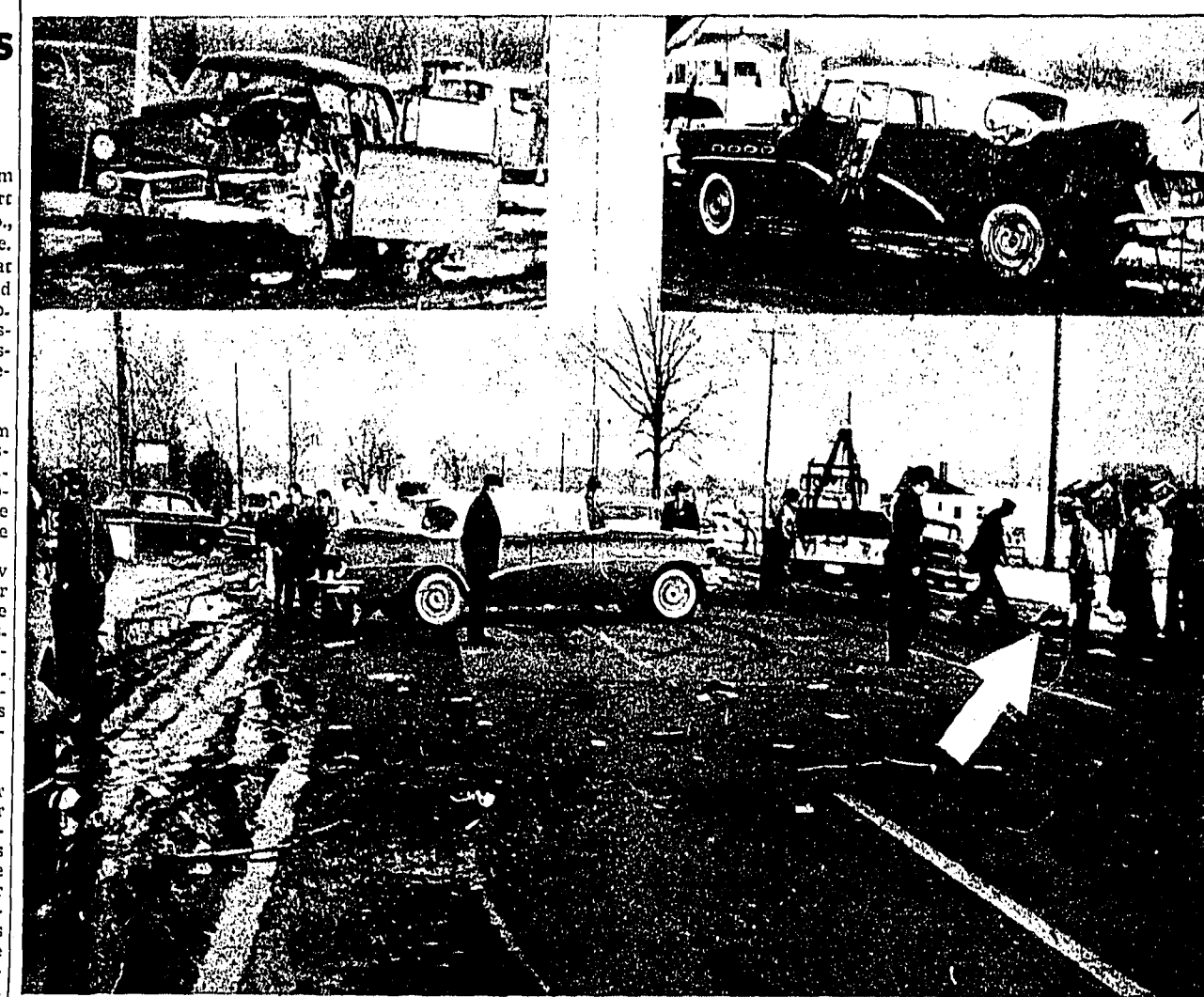

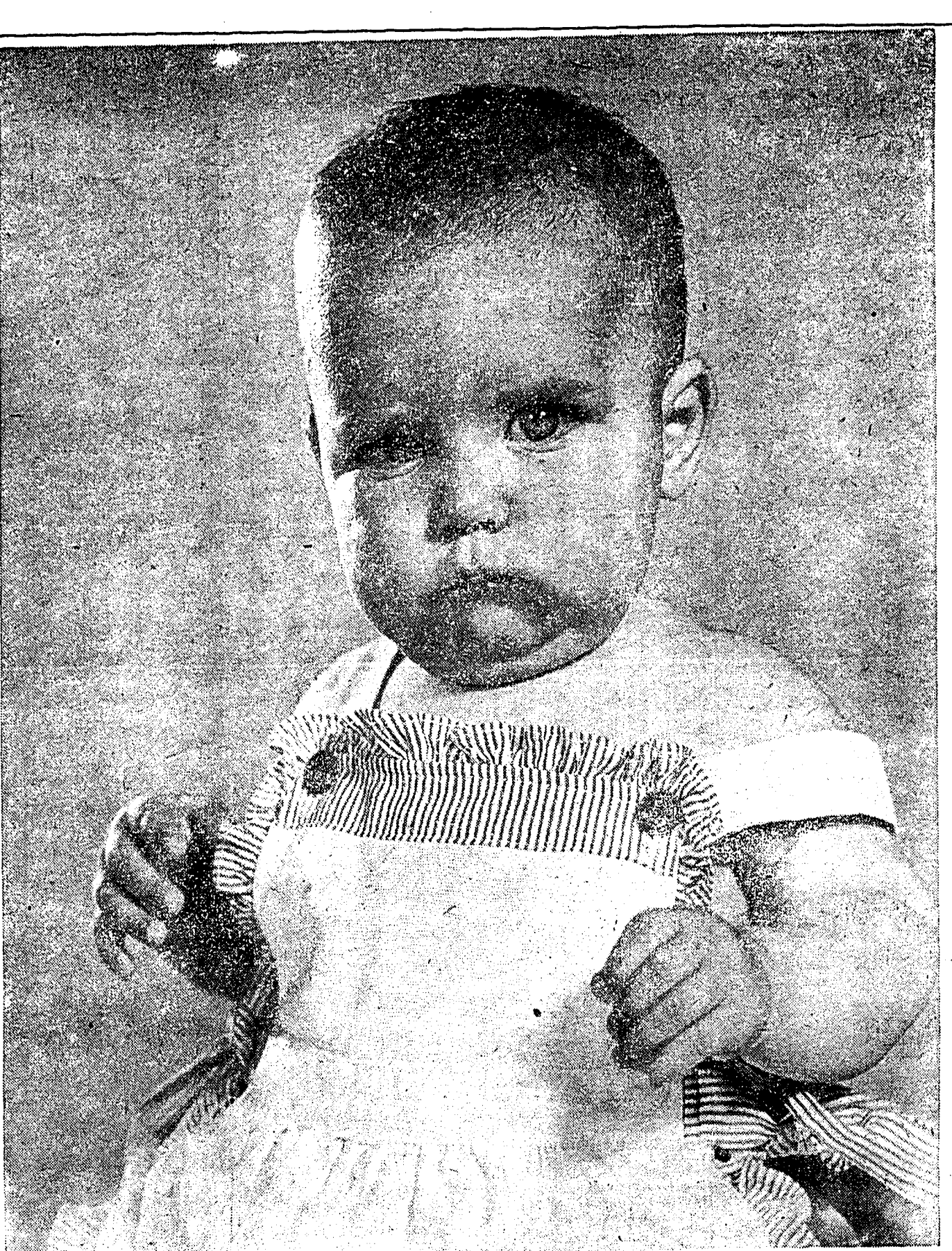
