



# Controversy Looms On School Plan

## Letters to the Editor

The following letter to the Northville Board of Education is self-explanatory. The writer, F. R. Sproule, is associated with Wyandotte Chemical Corp. and wrote an article titled "What Shall We Teach?" It appeared in the January 26 issue of this paper.

Dear Sirs: I want to second Mr. Schiefer's plea for a truly representative Citizens Advisory Committee on Education in Northville—see his Letter to the Editor, Northville Record, Feb. 9, 1956. Such Citizens Committees are doing excellent work elsewhere and they are recommended by prominent educators, laymen and organizations working for better schools.

I would suggest a committee of 15-20 representing the township geographically and by occupation-group, with men at least equal to women in number,

and including an outstanding teen-ager and teacher or school principal. Qualification would be an avowed interest in better schools and willingness to donate time and effort. The committee to elect its own chairman and make its own rules. Members to be appointed by a group of three—say, the PTA president; a city councilman or other person chosen by the Council, and a township board member or other person chosen by the board.

As members dropped out, replacements would be appointed by the same group of three. If at the end of two years there had been a turnover of less than one-third, the committee would decide by lot who should drop out, so that every six years there would be a complete turnover of members. However, any person could be reappointed after an absence of two years. As you can see, I am thinking of a permanent committee, with new blood, new ideas coming in as time goes on.

I have expressed to you before my admiration for your donation of time into the wee hours, and I know that Mr. Annonen gives devoted service far beyond what could be rightfully demanded of him. I think that you have been so busy and so close to the picture for so long that you would find it very helpful to get ideas from a group not even appointed by you or anyone connected with the schools, a group that would see the situation "as-else see it", unhampered by the press of immediate crises and concerns, and free to make bold suggestions because those suggestions would have no authority and would not entail responsibility unless adopted by the board.

I think the initiative in setting up such a Citizens Committee should properly be yours.

With dismay we read the minority-of-one report to the people of the Northville School District in the Northville Record, 2-9-56 issue by Mr. James Schiefer. We got the feeling that the majority of the members of the Citizens Advisory Committee ended their assigned task with the attitude of "Well, let's get it over and be done with it."

We don't doubt that the task of confronting the committee was a very difficult one involving the investment of much time and effort. However, we don't doubt that they did, unselfishly, devote much of their time and abilities in the discharge of their obligation to report their findings as directed. But it is also evident that, as a group, they were not fully cognizant of the very great responsibility they assumed in making the report.

Mr. Schiefer points out, in the third proposal he recommended for consideration by the Board of Education, the need for continuing curriculum study with the object of better educating our children the opportunity to equip themselves for living in an era of fast-moving, dynamic developments in the political, economic and social aspects of our society. Can we afford to do less than what Mr. Schiefer suggests?

It escapes us also how one could diagnose the first and second proposals submitted by Mr. Schiefer. It seems obvious that increasing the membership of the Citizens Advisory Committee, and by making it a permanent body whose purpose would be to act as liaison between the Board of Education and the public, is well versed; the public would be given greater space and encouragement for participation in the problem of giving our children the best possible of educational opportunities.

We are gravely concerned with the apparent lack of democratic procedure within the Citizen's Advisory Committee's deliberations. We gather from Mr. Schiefer's article that he and a few other members of this committee submitted the three proposals to the committee as a whole, in the belief that these three proposals would further the cause of good education in the Northville School District. The officers of the committee apparently did not see fit to honor the submitted proposals by allowing them to be voted upon by the members of the committee. This, gentlemen, is not acceptable democratic procedure.

As interested parents, we want to go on record recommending

the three proposals, submitted by Mr. Schiefer and supported by a few other members of the Citizens Advisory Committee, to the Board of Education of the Northville School District, with the hope that the members of the Board of Education will carefully study them and consider them important enough to adopt without qualifications.



"I Got The Point, Pastor" The Lenten season is a fine time to re-evaluate many things in our lives. It is also a special time to re-evaluate our personal relationship to the Church and what she stands for.

The matter, for example, of our attendance at Divine Worship in the church of our choice is one that could well warrant consideration. I am reminded of the advice given by Paul in his letter to the Hebrews 10:25, "Do not neglect the assembling of yourselves together". I believe this advice is as timely as tomorrow's news. A simple truth is illustrated regarding this matter by the experience of a Pastor who called on an evening upon one of his prominent members who had neglected the services of the church for some weeks.

Sitting by the fireplace, the pastor took the long and removed a red hot coal from the center of the fire and then he placed it upon the hearth. Soon the coal became gray and cold. 



"No kidding" "We're not kidding and neither are the creameries who say they will bargain with us," he added.


"What is our tie-up with labor?" he continued. "We have none. Unions are not a part of this association. They don't belong in one. . . we can get good advice from labor unions and we are willing to take it if it will help farmers."

**More Than Average**  
Barnes, an official spokesman for the MMPA, had told the group earlier that the average farmer in the Detroit area gets more for his milk than the average farmer in most other parts of the country.

If the 12,000 dairy farmers in the Detroit area create artificially high prices, he warned, the creameries will get an increasing amount of their supply from farmers outside of the normal Detroit area. There are 100,000 dairy farmers in the state, he added.

**Accept Will of Majority**  
"Our organization (the MMPA) feels that the real answer lies in compromise. . . accepting the will of the majority and moving forward. We feel that there is no question about the dairy farmer needing more money for his milk," Barnes continued.

## Three Men Killed In Gd. River Mishap

Driver Loses Control As Freezing Rain Turns Highway Into Glare of Ice

They were attempting, an oncoming truck and a desire to pass added up to sudden death for three Detroiters Friday morning. Killed instantly were Ray Vennard, 45, of Detroit, and his son, Robert, 18.

The driver of the car, Ralph Jones, was still alive when Novi police arrived at the scene, but he died as officer D'Arcy Young was taking his pulse.

The accident occurred on Grand River just west of Nalley Rd. early Friday morning soon after a freezing rain had turned every highway in the area into a glare of ice.

Witnesses say Jones' car was attempting to pass two other cars on Grand River. The truck, which was completely around by the force of the impact and landed in a nearby ditch.

Ray Vennard was thrown out of the car and his body was recovered 350 feet from the scene of the accident.

State police directed traffic while Novi officers cleared the scene of the accident. Police Chief Lee BeGole says it was one of the worst accidents he has ever seen. "You could hardly recognize that the wreckage had ever been a car," he added.

Although the truck suffered extensive front end damage, the driver was not hurt. He was not held by police.

## State To Let Last Two Projects On Expressway

Lansing — The State Highway Dept. will determine the low bidder Mar. 7 in Lansing on two road projects on the relocation of US-16 (the Brighton-Farmington expressway).

The road projects on the relocation of US-16 are:

- 4.4 miles of dual, 24-foot-wide concrete pavement from 10-Mile Rd. west to 12-Mile Rd. in Oakman.
- 1.2 miles of dual, 24-foot-wide concrete pavement from 10-Mile Rd. east to Grand River Ave. The completion date for this project is Sept. 30, 1957.




