Northville was a small farming community when "Doc" first came here and things are much easier now than when he made the rounds to visit sick farm animals in a buggy drawn by horses.

The first 40 years of his practice, "Doc" recalls, dealt mostly with large animals, horses, cows, hogs, etc. But with the use of farm machinery on a large scale, the amount of stock has been reduced and now his practice centers mainly on dogs, cats and other small animals.

"Should an 8.6 acre parcel belonging to D. M. Morris be shifted from the C.&O. railroad and Nine Mile Rd. be shifted from Durfee District to Northville School District?"

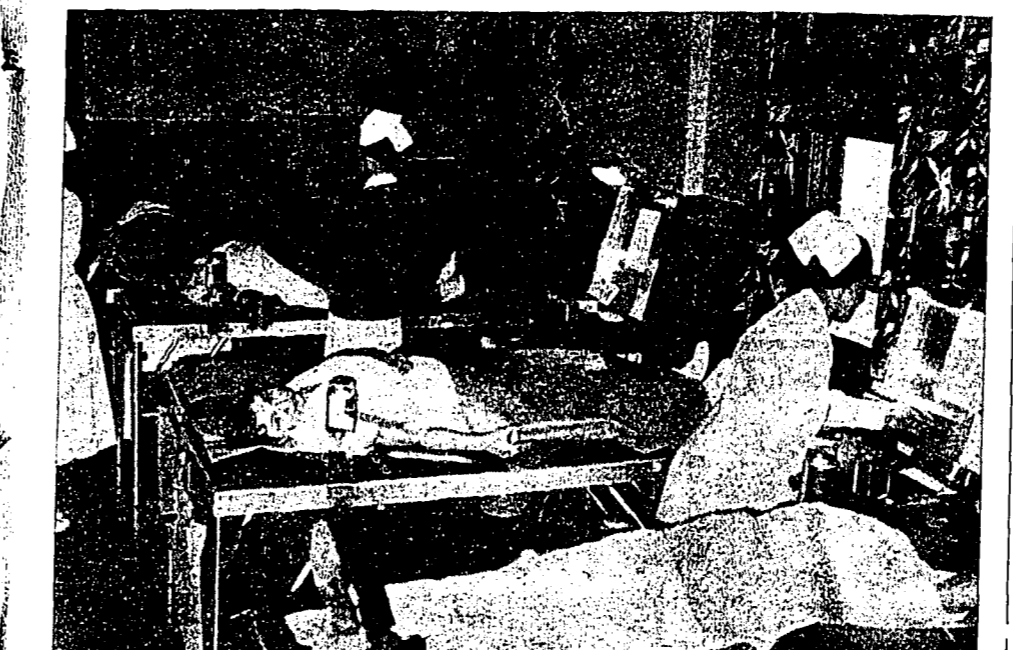

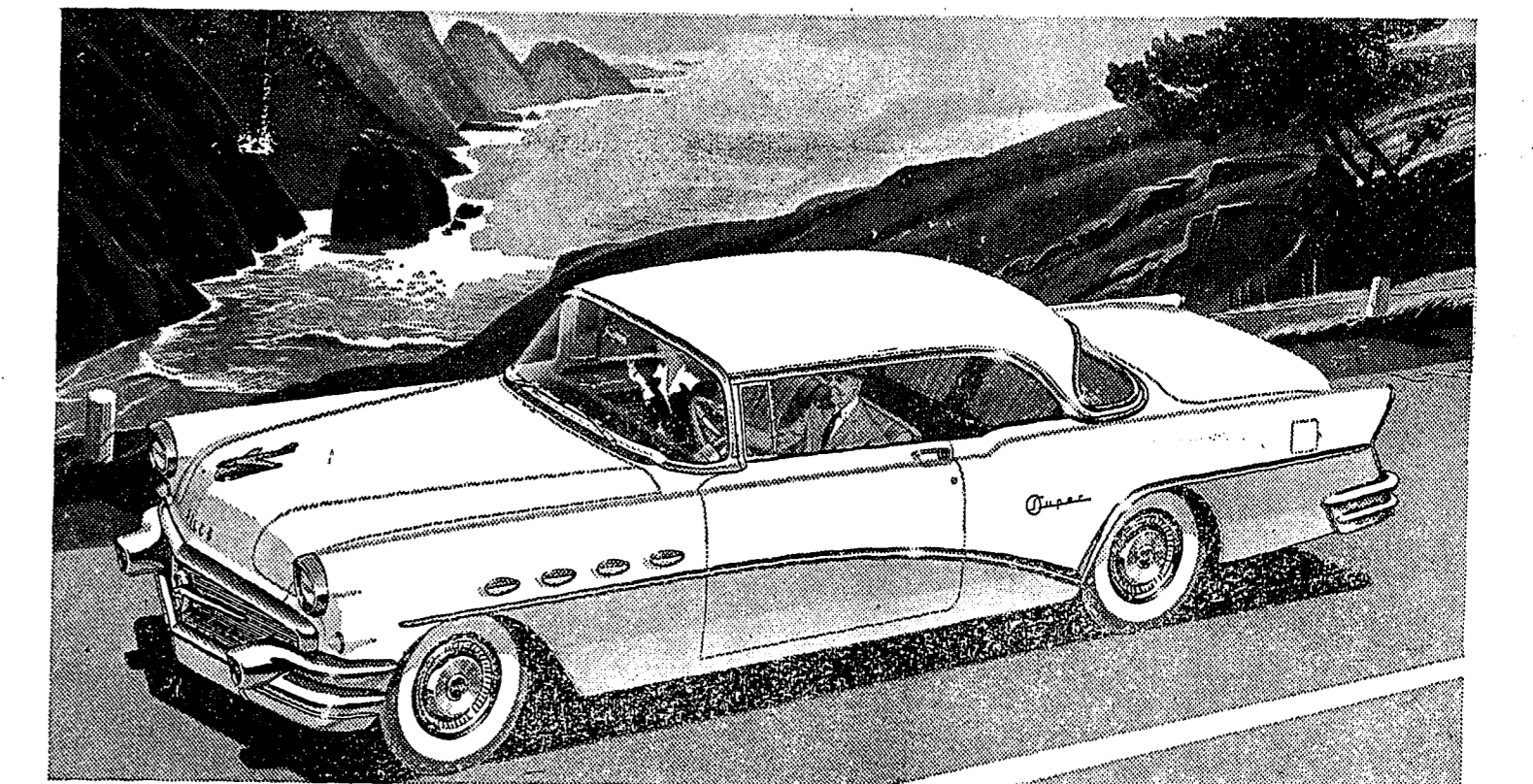

Regardless of how one may feel personally about such delaying tactics as occurred last week, they are understandable if you put yourself in the shoes of the Novi officials...

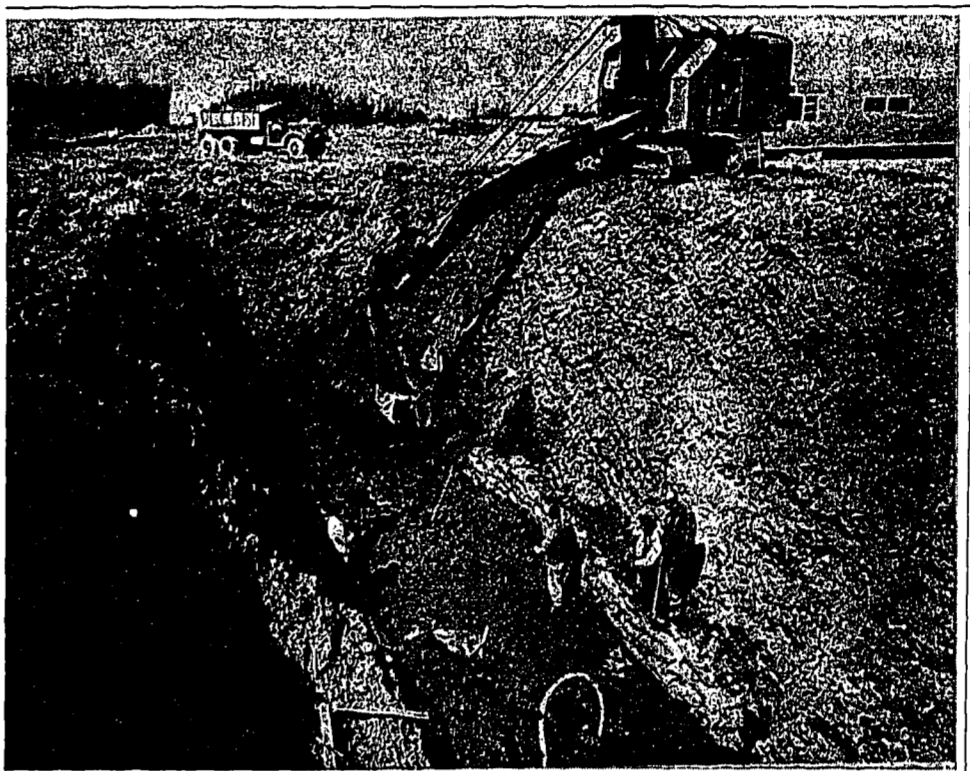

State Moves Swiftly To Set New Date After Novi Questions Legality of June 5. A special election WILL be held and the date will be June 21.

However, Novi was not officially notified of the change, according to township officials, until April 28, too late for publication in that week's paper.

"New We Know . . ." Supervisor Frazer Staman gave orders to have a proper Notice of Registration prepared by the Citizens'unity corporation counsel and duly published this week.
