for the Record

"He who laughs last laughs best" might be an appropriate heading for the lead story in this week's paper to the effect that there will be a special election in both the City of Northville and Novi township on June 21 to vote upon annexation of the so-called "Yerkes farm" to the city.

Such a heading, although perhaps appropriate, would be no cause for self congratulation by either municipality because it would have a flavor that bodes ill for the kind of neighborhood relations that should be a source of strength instead of division between the two communities. Unfortunately they seem to be gradually drifting apart as a result of understandable community pride which is reflected inevitably in the acts and policies of elected officials in both Novi and Northville.

The foregoing may be largely unintelligible to those readers who failed to read our lead story last week, which referred to "the slightly amused attitude of Novi officials as they sit back and wait for further developments south of the border." These remarks arose from an oversight by the Secretary of State's office in notifying Novi township that it must hold a special election on June 5 to vote on permitting annexation of the Yerkes property to the City of Northville. Novi township has been fighting a delaying action since last summer to stall a vote on annexation, while Northville officials have been just as anxious to have the election held. When Novi township refused to cooperate willingly, Northville got the legislature to amend the election law to authorize the secretary of state to call such an election upon petition by Northville.

Upon telephone advice from the secretary of state Northville advertised a notice of registration for special election in the paper last week. Novi township's legal adviser ruled that the township could not run a similar advertisement legally until it had received formal written notice from the secretary of state. The written notice didn't arrive in Novi until one day after the paper had gone to press, so the advertisement wasn't run and the election had to be postponed until June 21.

All of which would be relatively unimportant if it did not point up a conflict of interest between Novi township and the City of Northville that probably will crop up from time to time over the next few years. The area immediately adjoining Northville on the north is starting to grow rapidly with or without new subdivisions breaking ground this spring within a mile from the city's north boundary. Like the proposed Yerkes subdivision, whose promoters want Northville water and sewerage facilities, it is logical to expect a gradual move for annexation by other adjacent areas so they can have city services which Novi township cannot provide at present. That Northville should favor such annexations is quite understandable.

From Novi township's viewpoint, however, its future can be seriously impaired if Northville gradually nibbles away its land to the south by annexation and the City of Walled Lake starts to nibble along the northern side of the township. As township officials see it, their best chance of developing a community center in the township is to incorporate it as a city as soon as population builds up enough to take care of its own needs. However, and in the meantime they look with a jaundiced eye at any move to transfer portions of the township to either Northville or Walled Lake. In the final analysis, however, there isn't much they can do to prevent this gradual grabbing of their territory except to stall as long as they can and hope for rapid growth.

Regardless of how one may feel personally about such delaying tactics as occurred last week, they are understandable if you put yourself in the shoes of the other fellow's shoes. As one Northville observer remarked: "It's sort of like having the measles or mumps when you're growing up. There isn't much you can do about it except grin and bear it."

Allows Enough Time For Legal Notices

State Moves Swiftly To Set New Date After Novi Questions Legality of June 5

A special election WILL be held and the date will be June 21. This official word from the Michigan Secretary of State's office Monday was the latest and apparently final development in Northville's attempt to secure a special election for the purpose of annexing "Yerkes farm," site of a proposed 25-home subdivision.

In notifying Novi and Northville officials of the new June 21 election date, the state said that this new date allowed ample time for publishing the proper notices of registration and election on the dates prescribed by law.

Notices In Paper: With the official notice and the subsequently published Notice of Registration for both Novi and Northville (in this week's paper), Northville officials hoped the last block to Northville's attempt to annex the much disputed property had been removed.

The "on again-off again-on again" furor over election dates began on April 23 when Northville and Novi were notified of a special annexation election set for May 10. Unable to comply with the state election laws prescribing time limits for publication of election notices, Northville requested and received on April 24 a verbal notice of change in date. The election was set for June 5.

However, Novi was not officially notified of the change, according to township officials, until April 26, too late for publication in that week's paper. According to Novi's attorney, they therefore had an insufficient number of days to prepare for the election, 30 instead of the required 40 days.

Sufficient Time: Whereupon the state set a third date for the election, June 21, and informed both parties that they had sufficient time according to law to properly prepare for the election.

Commenting on Monday's letter from the secretary of state's office, Novi Township Clerk Hadley Baehner said that in his opinion the letter was quite blunt and possibly stressful.

"The fire engine is made to order," Reed said, "and delivery will take approximately 200 days."

"The fire chief should know what kind of equipment he likes," Reed said.

"...but that's an expensive piece of equipment," Canterbury said, "Don't you think that we should talk to other representatives?"

"The fire chief knows more about it than we do," Reed said.

"The probably does," Canterbury said, "but we're responsible for spending the money."

Councilman Stubbins agreed that the council should follow their regular procedure. "This may be a good deal," he said, "but on an item like this we should have bids."

Attorney Philip Ogilvie mentioned that the engine could be ordered immediately and additional bids waived if the council's decision was unanimous.

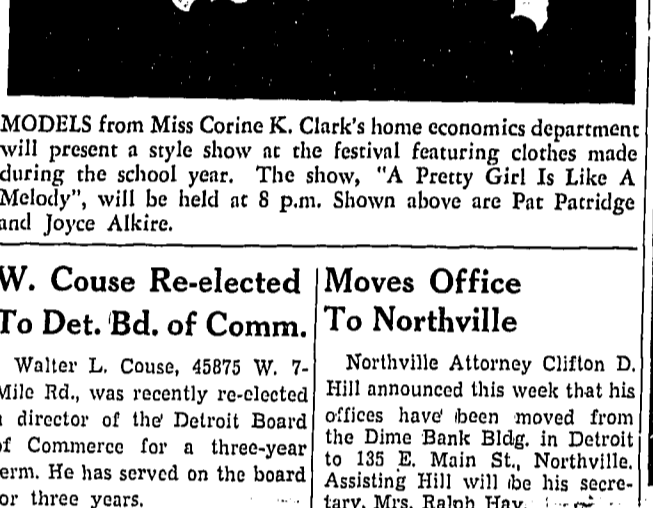

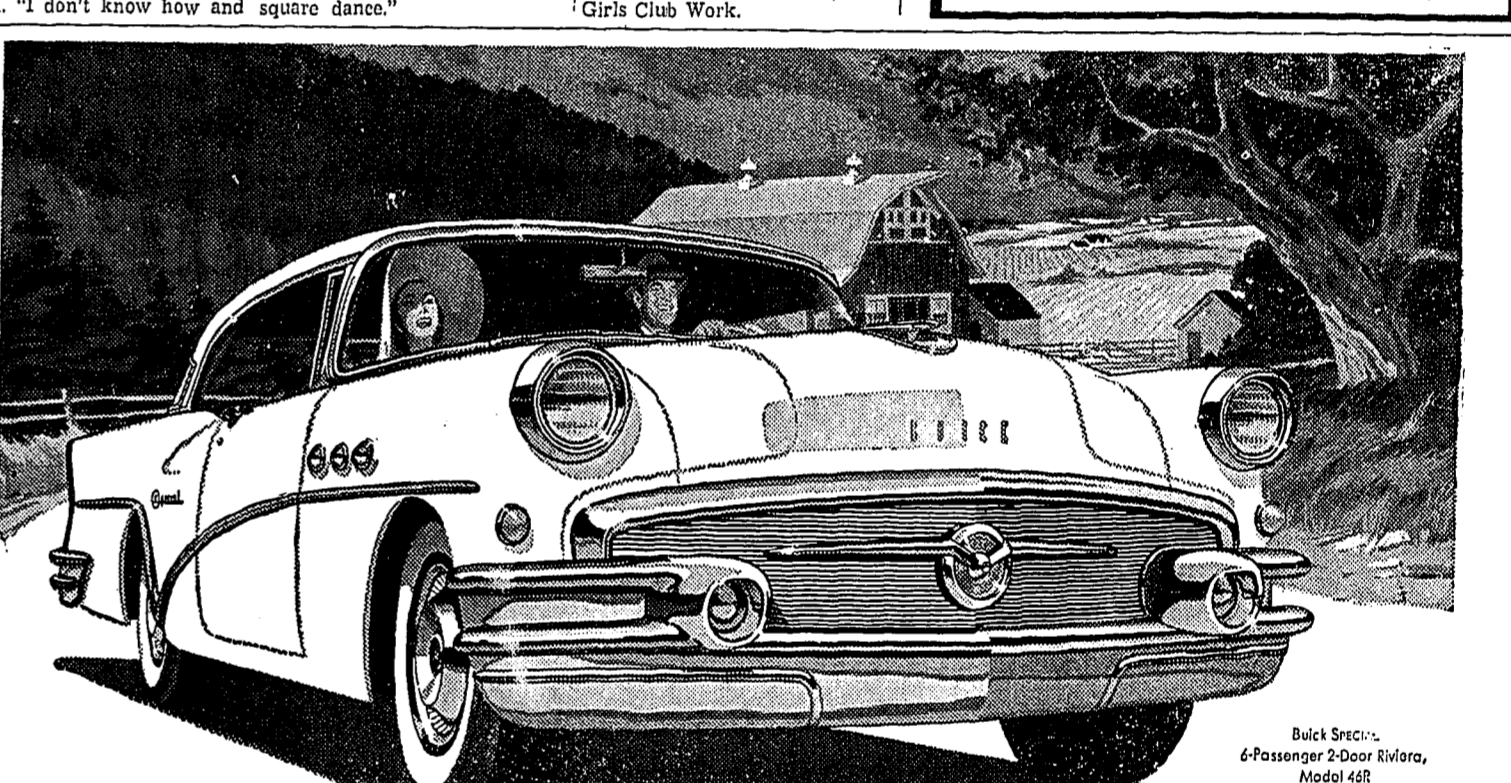
Nominations Open for Outstanding 4-H Alumni

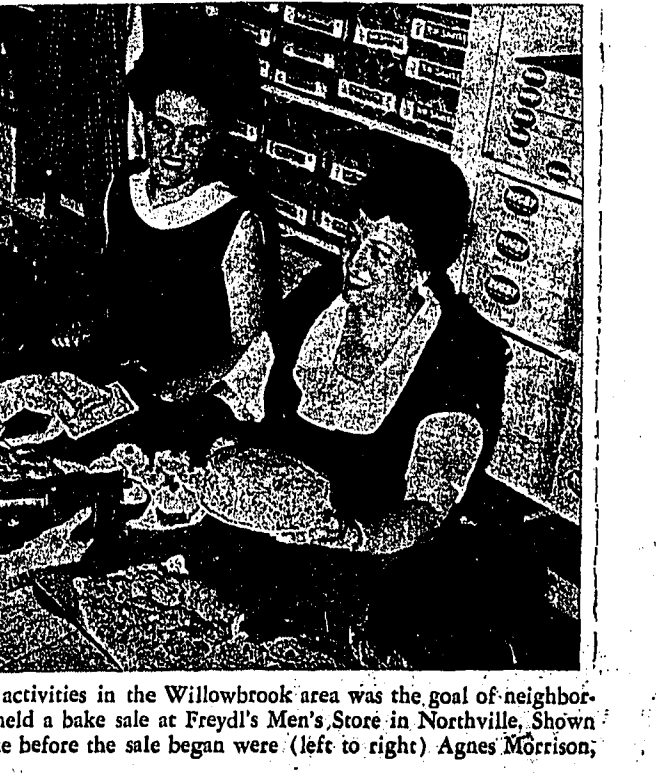
