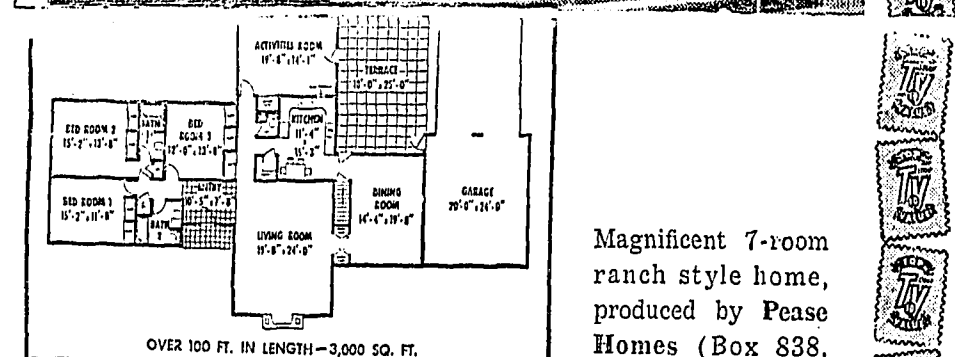
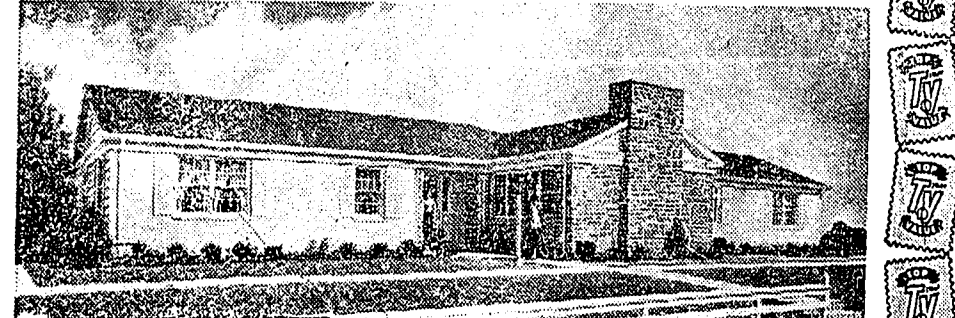

## 3 NEW DISTRICTS URGED

### Zoning Bd. Claims M-1 Inadequate

Proposed Districts Control Construction In Industrial Areas

In an effort to adequately control industrial construction in Novi township, the zoning board recommended creating 3 new industrial district classifications at their May 11 meeting.

The new districts, which were recommended with the unanimous approval of the board, replace the former all-inclusive M-1 industrial district.

M-1, the most restrictive of the new classifications, requires a 25-foot front yard and the building must be wholly enclosed in the building erected.

M-2 will be the district with the broadest restrictions and will require a 100-foot or more setback from the road depending on the height of the building constructed.

M-3 districts require a 50-foot front yard and permit multi-story storage areas surrounded by fences and green belts.

In addition to recommending the adoption of the new districts, the zoning board took action to two rezoning requests in the vicinity of the new Lincoln plant on Wixom Rd.

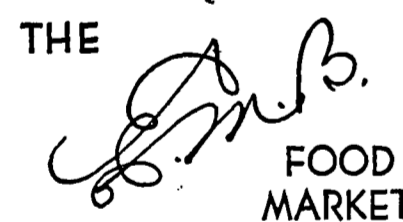

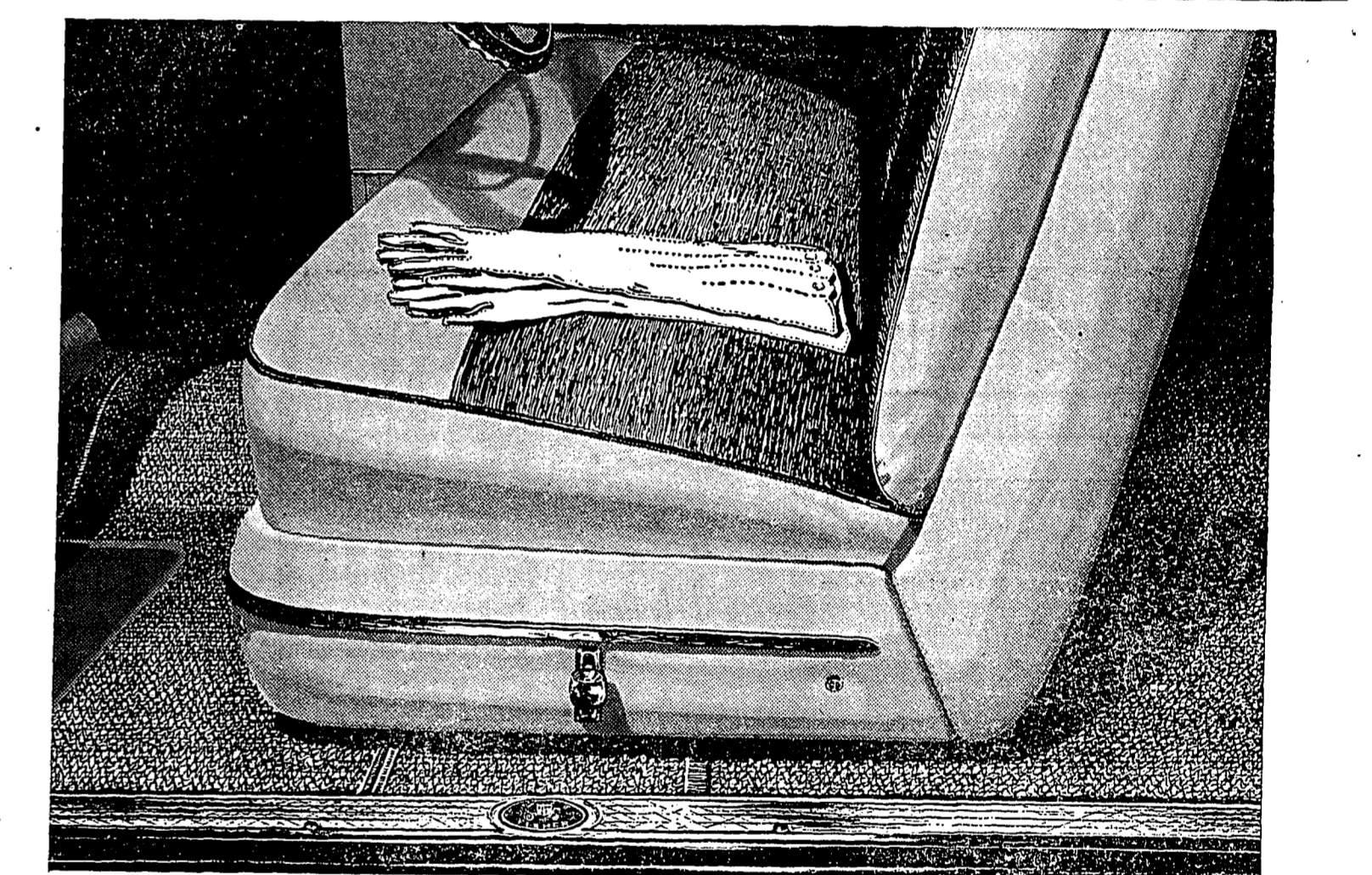

# Tornado Strikes Five Miles From Northville

At quarter to eight Saturday night, May 12, a whirling cone of black cloud roared from the northwest to strike the farm of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Gale of 54280 W. 8-Mile Rd. near Chubb Rd. Its fury tore apart a big, solid, all-metal quonset barn; hurled its corrugated walls over fields, into trees and on the lawn of a house across the street. The heavy steel rafters and braces were twisted bent on the ground.

In singling out the quonset barn, the tornado came left intact a large barn close to it on one side and a small shed on the other.

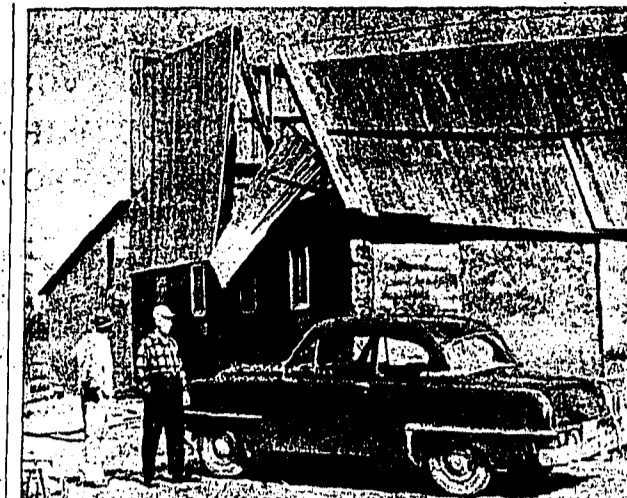
Stated Mrs. Gale: "We saw it coming and ran into the cellar." Others in the family said the tornado roared and fell as it sped toward the farm.

A little over an hour earlier, at 6:20 p.m., another tornado had already wreaked even greater damage in South Lyon, almost totally destroying the single block factory of Henry Bashian & Sons at 28003 Pontiac Trail where it snapped off and crumpled the five great evergreens, crumpled the barn roof and smashed and scattered the pieces in the field. A barn nearby was also leveled.

Farther south, on 11-Mile Rd., the tornado struck again, uproot-

### Will Make Progress Report To Bd. of Education May 23

Northville elementary school teachers completed their 16-week workshop Friday, May 11. They don't expect blue ribbons or merit badges for paying a tuition fee from their own salaries and spending over 40 hours in after-school classes; they don't expect anything, but you, as a taxpayer, should be interested in the facts of this unusual program.

Northville voters recently approved a millage increase for their schools which included a salary increase for the teachers. The increase brought the salaries up to the average wage scale in our area, but Northville elementary teachers are doing things that surpass the actions of the average teacher.

Richard Kay, principal of American school, has placed the workshop enrollment at practically 100%. Of the 34 elementary school personnel possible for enrollment, 29 have attended the meetings. The five who were not in attendance were interested, but because of previous commitments involving school activities and for other legitimate reasons they could not enroll.

"The important thing is that enrollment in these classes was not compulsory. The teachers then must have a genuine interest in improving their work and their schools. It would seem safe to assume that they're not just punching a time clock and they're not looking for praise."

They began their studies before their pay increase was decided upon. According to Richard Kay, the teachers were required to attend a one-day meeting to discuss school problems. It was at that meeting that the teachers recognized the need for further study and made plans to initiate a more integrated and supervised program.

In December of last year they decided to arrange the special study and a few months later began their 16-week course in cooperation with Wayne University. The fact that the course drew close to 100% attendance was extremely gratifying to the group as a whole. As one teacher put it, "It's a great feeling to know that the group is pulling together, wanting only the best for their schools."

The course, "Local School Curriculum Planning," has been supervised by Carroll Munshaw, deputy superintendent of Wayne county schools who has had a vast amount of experience in directing off-campus courses. The teachers divided them-

### Police Chief Tells How To Keep The Burglar Away

Mayor Claude N. Ely recently proclaimed the week of May 6 through 12 as Burglary Prevention Week in Northville.

Chief of Police Joseph Denton pointed out that burglary is the one crime that always merits the attention of the police department. Experienced burglars know when to invade a house. It's up to the homeowner to fool him by creating the impression someone is home, though the house may be empty.

Many people leave their homes for an evening, week end or vacation and fail to take the simple precautions dictated by good common sense. Chief Denton said these citizens wouldn't think of leaving the front door open or hanging up a sign reading "Burglars Welcome - Nobody Home Here", etc. they give all the indications necessary, such as newspapers piled at the front door, a totally dark house, or even worse, lights left burning 24 hours a day.

Preventive suggestions to follow according to Chief Denton are:

1. DO leave a lamp or two connected to an automatic timer or arrange with some friend to turn lights on and off regularly each evening. This makes the home "lived-in" and is your best protective measure.

2. DO cancel all deliveries including milk, newspapers, etc. Have the post office or a neighbor hold your mail until you return.

### NOTICE TO FOOD HANDLERS IN THE CITY OF NORTHVILLE

In view of the fact that the City of Northville has appointed the Wayne County Health Department as its Health Officer, it will be necessary, according to the regulations of this Department, for each person employed in food establishments in the City of Northville to have a food handler's card issued by the Wayne County Board of Health, the fee for which is \$2.00.

A food establishment is any place in which food or beverages are served or sold for consumption on premises or elsewhere; such as, restaurants, cafeterias, taverns, soda fountains, itinerant restaurants, bakeries and grocery stores.

Vendors of food or beverages also come under this regulation.

No person shall be employed or work in food handling establishments or as a vendor unless he has a 1956 food handler's card. The Wayne County Department of Health shall issue food handler's cards to applicants when a negative chest X-ray report has been approved and filed with them. Such X-rays will be made by the Wayne County Department of Health at no cost to the applicant.

Wayne County Department of Health is located on Henry Ruff Road, Eliois, Michigan.

The penalty for violation of these provisions is according to the statutes in such case made and provided; which is, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the County Jail not to exceed 90 days, or by both such imprisonment and fine, at the discretion of the Court.

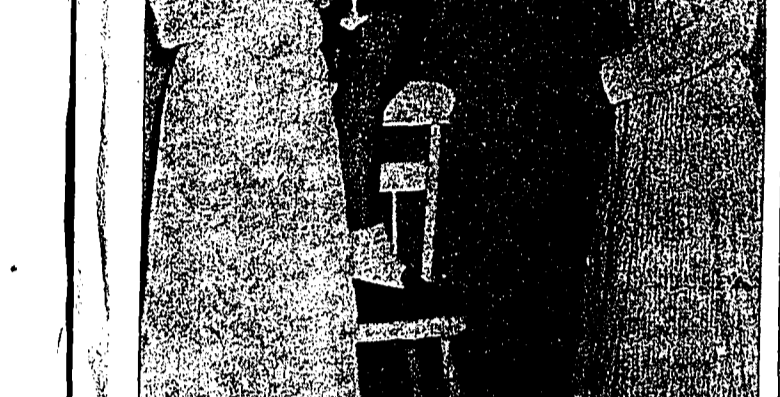

Firemen and Officials Attend Wixom Road Housewarming



KEEP THE HOME FIRES BURNING. At least that's what they were trying to do in Novi township last week when more than 40 firemen from Novi, Northville, Lyon township and Plymouth gathered at the Wixom Rd. site of the new Lincoln plant to practice fire-fighting techniques on a "real live house" scheduled for demolition. The above picture sequence was taken during the 2 1/2-hour "training session". The fire was started and extinguished three times during the session. Fog fire-fighting methods were used, employing special nozzles which break up the stream of water into a fine spray under 60 pounds pressure. The "fog" system, developed during the past decade, is considered one of the most effective ways to fight house fires, according to township fire-fighting officials. In the far left picture, firemen wait for the water to gain sufficient headway before extinguishing it (next picture) with their fog nozzles. Only the skeleton framework was left (third picture) by 8:30 and shortly afterwards even the framework gave way reducing the unoccupied house to a mass of rubble with only the brick chimney still standing.

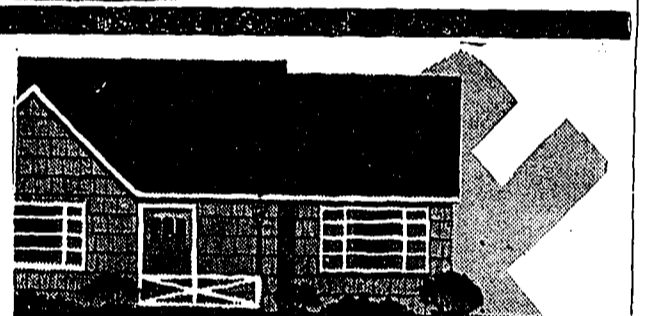
