Challenge of Schools

To residents of Northville and Novi who take their school matters very seriously it should be of more than passing interest that next week is American Education Week.

Seven days from November 11 to 17 have been set aside to salute our nation's schools, administrators, teachers, students and parents associated with them.

To observe the week, communities the nation over are planning open houses, special presentations, and with emphasis on particular aspects of education. A report elsewhere in this edition outlines the activities local groups have planned for the observance.

The manner in which school problems of our area has been met by administrators of both Northville and Novi indicates that they do not mean to be caught with "too little and too late" when it comes to providing proper educational facilities for our children.

This has not been true in other rapid growing communities. Half-days sessions and public buildings converted to school rooms are not unusual. Neither are they conducive to easy learning.

In Northville the zeal with which administrators, teachers and parent-groups have tackled local school problems would seem to leave little doubt that their future plans will receive enthusiastic approval. Soon residents will be given an opportunity to show their appreciation of this work and planning by granting permission—and funds—to build a new high school.

In Novi alert administrators have taken the initiative by proposing—and gaining—consolidation of a new school district. They point out that this will save the way to proper planning of adequate educational facilities for Novi's rapidly expanding populace.

In the light of these activities it would seem that during American Education Week we might pause long enough to say "well done." But less anyone of us should feel ourselves become complacent with the ever-growing need for more and better education, we'll add "keep up the good work."

Huge Vote in Novi Gives Nod to GOP

Record-shattering numbers of voters went to the polls in Novi township Tuesday and gave Republican candidates a victory in every contest on the ballot.

Some 87 per cent—2,177 of 2,507—of the township's registered voters cast their ballots. It was thought to be far and away the biggest turnout in township history.

Novi township picked winners in the national and Oakland county elections, but missed completely in state contests as Democratic candidates captured every office in Lansing.

President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon led the way for Republicans in Novi township with a 2-1 margin over the Democratic team of Stevenson and Kefauver. The vote was 1,384 to 753.

Other races were closer, but Republicans came through with almost a 2-3 margin in every contest. Governor George Romney and his running mate Alf Benson put up the best show for the Democrats, but was edged by Albert Cobo, 1,154 to 1,102.

Democrats had only one claim of triumph in the township precinct. 2 But returns from precinct 1 showed that they gave the township nod to Cobo.

In state-wide voting, Democrats swept every office from the governorship to the attorney general spot.

In Oakland county, by contrast, voters returned every Republican candidate to office. Only one Democrat on the entire ballot gained the favor of Oakland county voters—again Governor Williams.

In state and national legislative races, both Novi township and Oakland county favored Republican candidates. In the contest for U.S. representative from the 18th district, William Broomfield edged Paul Sutton, 1,884 to 1,071. For state senator from the 12th district, Harvey Lodge won over Frank Elms, 1,858 to 1,076. In the race for state representative from the 4th district, Theodore Hughes defeated S. James Clarkson, 959 to 25,523.

Novi township voters favored the constitutional amendment 986 to 10, to go along with the state-wide vote. In the election that Michigan legislators must be at least 21 and not have been convicted of subversion or

felony involving a breach of public trust.

United Fund Drive Nears Top

Expect to Reach \$4,000 As Campaign Ends Today

The Novi township United Fund campaign this week appeared certain to go over the top for the first time in its history. Scheduled to end officially today, the drive had already reached \$3,785 — or 94 per cent of its \$4,000 goal — earlier this week.

Township Chairman Wes Coon said he is confident that last-minute collections will boost the township fund well above the \$4,000 mark. He indicated that at least several hundred dollars are yet to be turned in by volunteers and organizations.

Thought the drive ends officially today, Coon said contributions will be accepted after at least two more months. Novi township Supervisor Frank Staman estimated this week it will take at least that long before a vote can be held on the incorporation move.

Staman said attorneys now are drafting the legal status of the incorporation effort and then must turn the matter over to the Oakland county board of supervisors, which would set an election date. Staman said the board of supervisors probably could not take the matter until January. Allowing 30 days for the advertising and registering for the election, Staman said, it would likely be at least February and possibly later before the vote could be held.

Meanwhile, the Oakland county townships drive also appeared headed for record-breaking returns. County Chairman Dwyer Stump said some 65 percent of its \$65,507 goal has been reached and that contributions will continue to come in during the next two weeks.

Novi township ranks third among county townships, he said. Oakland township has gone over the top with \$4,800 — or 108 per cent of its \$4,500 goal. And Commerce township has collected \$8,512 — or 103 percent of its \$8,217 goal.

The United Fund is a non-profit charity drive that distributes its funds among scores of charitable organizations on the local, county and state levels.

Similar Accidents Injure 2 Motorists

Two motorists were injured in Novi township Tuesday afternoon in similar but separate accidents within minutes of each other.

According to Police Chief Lee BeGole, both accidents occurred during the driving rain when motorists were unable to stop for trucks halted in the road in front of them.

Gerard Cook, 17, was cut badly on the forehead when he slid into the rear end of a truck on the northbound side of the road. The truck driver, Forest Neil, of Oak Park, had stopped to check for a flat tire.

Dorothy Spencer, 21, of Millford suffered a possible broken arm after being struck on Novi township Tuesday afternoon by a car driven by Earl Paraday of Walled Lake. BeGole said Paraday skidded around a halted truck and swerved into the opposite lane, striking Miss Spencer's car head-on.

Girl Scout Calendars Now on Sale

Novi Girl Scouts will join scouts from all over Southern Oakland county when their Girl Scout Calendar sale begins November 8 and continues throughout the month.

Profits from the sale will be used to maintain and develop council owned sites and to subsidize operating costs so that fees may be kept within the means of the majority of the girls.

A breakdown of camping activities in the South Oakland Girl Scout Council for 1956 shows that troop camping was enjoyed by over 1,000 scouts.

It is anticipated that camping facilities will be provided for over 1,000 more girls by 1960.

Drainage Problems Tackled

County OKs New Project On Garfield

The Novi township board meeting, which ordinarily would have been held last Monday night, will instead be held next Monday, November 12.

The meeting was postponed because of conflict with the general election Tuesday.

Plans are going ahead for construction of a new drain near Garfield and Ten Mile road area to relieve flooding of some 1,365 acres, the Oakland county drain commission said this week.

The decision to go ahead with the project came last week after a county board of determination met with residents of the area October 29 to discuss possible solutions to the problem.

According to county drain commissioner Robert Evans, construction of the new drain probably will begin next spring and take about a month to complete.

In the meantime, Evans said, the drain commission must get rights-of-way for the drain either voluntarily or through court condemnation.

The new drain will roughly follow the path of an old WPA drain north from Nine Mile and Garfield to a point just south of Ten Mile where it will tie into the existing Novi line drain.

The drain commission also plans to install a new culvert at Ten Mile road to handle the increased flow, Evans said.

Cost of the project has been estimated at \$10,000 and will be paid for by property owners in the 1,365-acre area. Assessment must be determined before construction of the project can begin.

POLISH STUFFED CABBAGE
1 head cabbage
1 pound ground meat (beef, pork or veal)
1 cup uncooked rice
1 onion (chopped)
1 egg
tomatoes or tomato paste
salt and pepper

Core the cabbage and parboil carefully removing a few leaves at a time.

Mix together the ground meat, rice, beaten egg, chopped onion, and salt and pepper to taste.

Put one or two tablespoons of mixture on each cabbage leaf and fold over.

Put rolls in baking dish or roaster. Cover with canned tomatoes or tomato paste (diluted with water to barely cover).

Bake at 350 degrees about 1 1/2 hours.

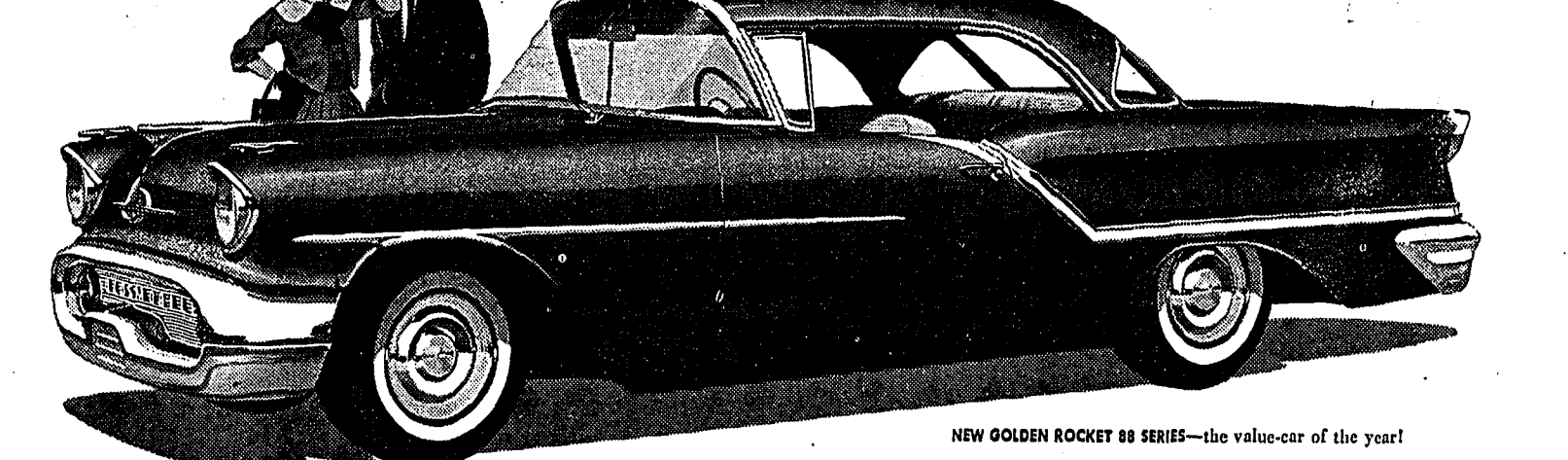

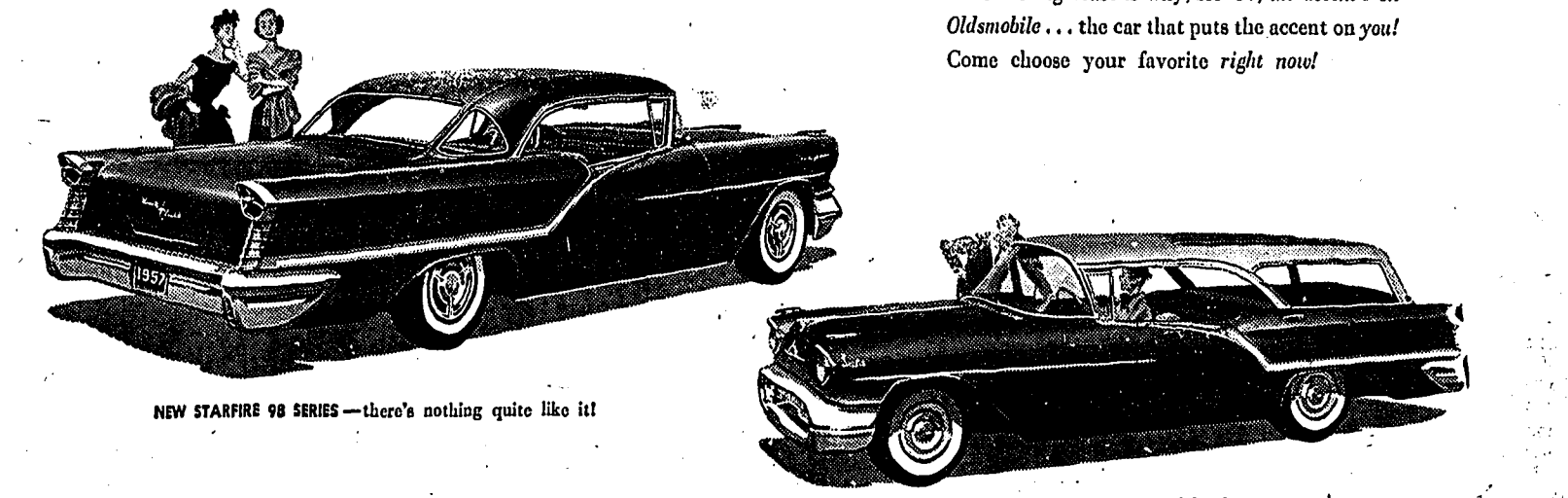
