Golfers Plug for Daylight Saving

A MOVE to ease Michigan's doctor shortage is in the mill at Wayne State University. The school's board of trustees is proposing an increase in medical student admission from 75 to 125 a year.

The plan, already approved by the board, hinges on state allocation of additional operating funds for Wayne's medical college.

The most economical way to turn out 30 more doctors a year, while other plans call for the establishment of costly new facilities, the Wayne proposal requires only the money necessary for instructors, according to Dean Gordon H. Scott.

Both medical and non-medical groups are supporting the plan. The Michigan State Medical Society has endorsed the proposed increase.

Among the first of the non-medical groups in the state to urge the increased assistance to Wayne State is the Michigan Farm Bureau.

Clark L. Brody, the Bureau's executive vice president, recently announced that its members have adopted a resolution in support of the plan.

ANOTHER TRY to put Michigan on Daylight Saving Time may be made at the next meeting of the State Legislature.

Strangely enough, the current proposal, it is said, have originated with a group of Detroit golfers who want an extra hour of daylight leisure in the evening.

Retailers there are now adding their support.

Biggest objectors: Mothers who must round up the kids for bed while it's still daylight and farm-

motorists to drive with care will be distributed by gasoline dealers who are members of the Michigan Retail Gasoline Dealers Association. Some 5,000 trucks belonging to members of the Michigan Trucking Association are joining actively in the campaign and will display signs reading, "Take the Pledge, Drive With Care."

The committee warns that the winter months bring dangerous driving conditions and is asking the cooperation of every motorist in cutting down the death toll.

THE STATE MAY need its own Navy to settle the latest controversy in its home waters. Under attack is a business venture now in Michigan, the "folet" or floating hotel.

At the request of Gerald M. Eddy, director of the Michigan Conservation Department, the attorney general's office is seeking an injunction against the "folet," the S.S. Western States, docked at Tawas City.

The question: Do floating hotels moored permanently in water or above state land violate the law?

State officials believe there is a violation. Submerged land under the Great Lakes is controlled by the Conservation Department according to an 1899 law. One of the requirements: Protect the public interest.

The request for an injunction to prevent the operation of the "folet" in the Western States is based on the assumption that the ship is not for navigation. If not, it may be permanently and unlawfully occupying submerged lands in violation of the public interest.

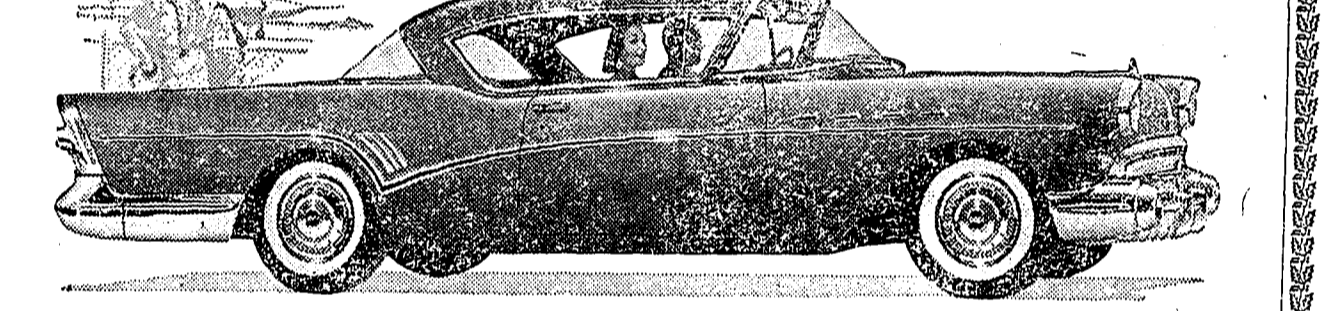

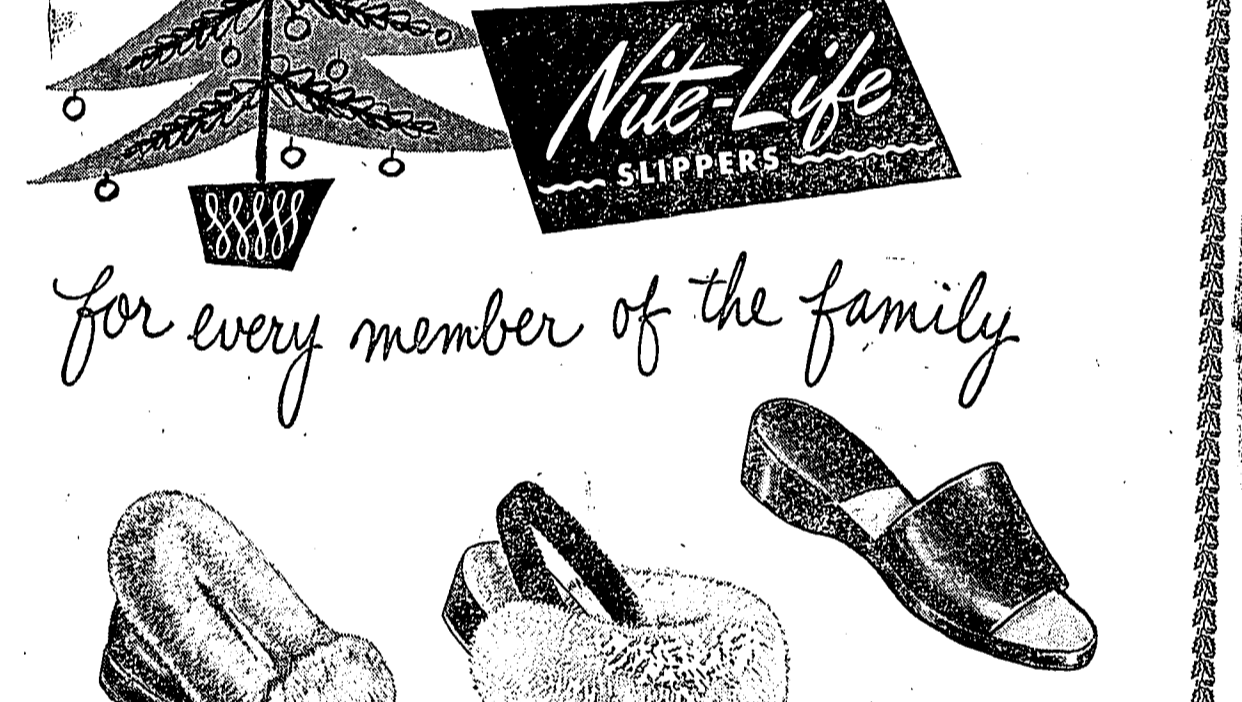

The treacherous corner of Grand River and Novi roads is under attack again — by a group of mothers who want the corner made safer for their children on the way to school.

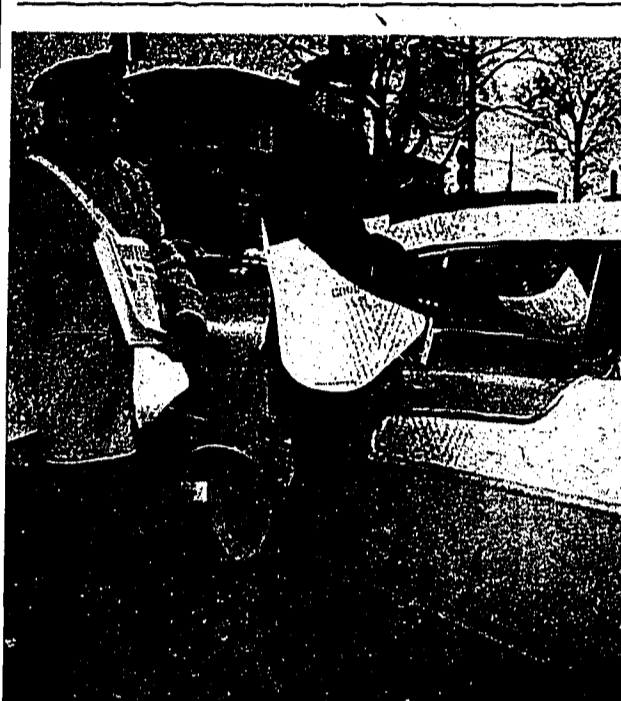

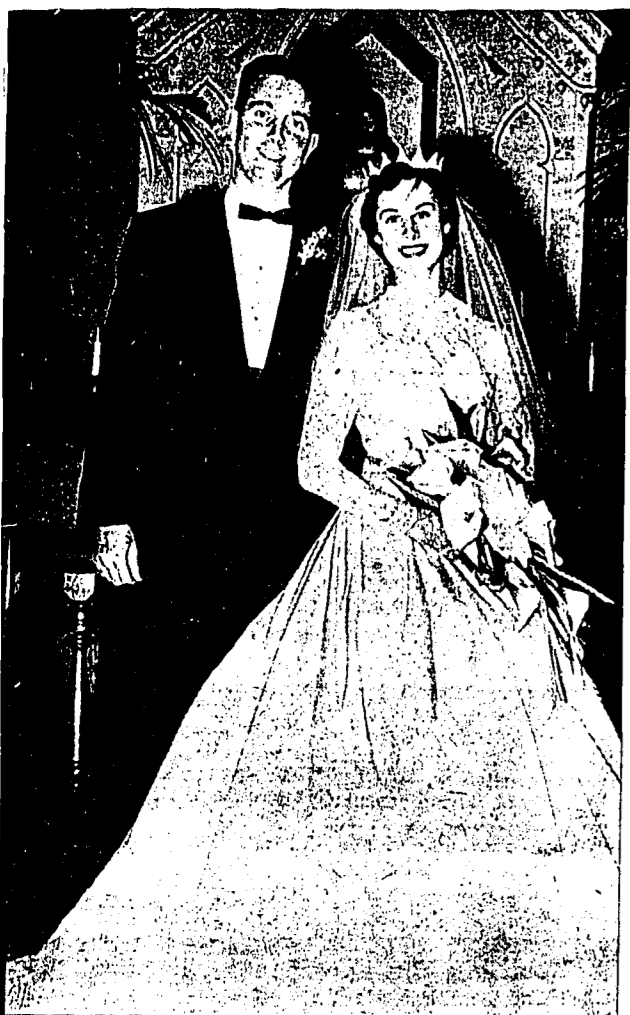

- FRUIT CAKE**
- 2 boxes apricots
  - 1 box currants
  - 1 box seedless raisins
  - 1 box white raisins
  - 2 large cans sliced pineapple (canned and drained)
  - 2 large bottles maraschino cherries (drained)
  - 2 pounds suet (broken into large pieces)
  - 1 large package dates (leave whole)
  - 2 pounds candied fruit
- Put all of the above in a large dishpan. Add four cups sifted flour. Mix well with hands.

- 1 1/2 cups quick oatmeal
  - 1 cup dates (finely cut)
  - 1 cup nuts
  - 1 bottle maraschino cherries (drain well)
  - 1 can crushed pineapple (drain well)
  - Drop in 1/2 teaspoon amounts on greased cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 15 minutes at 300 degrees.

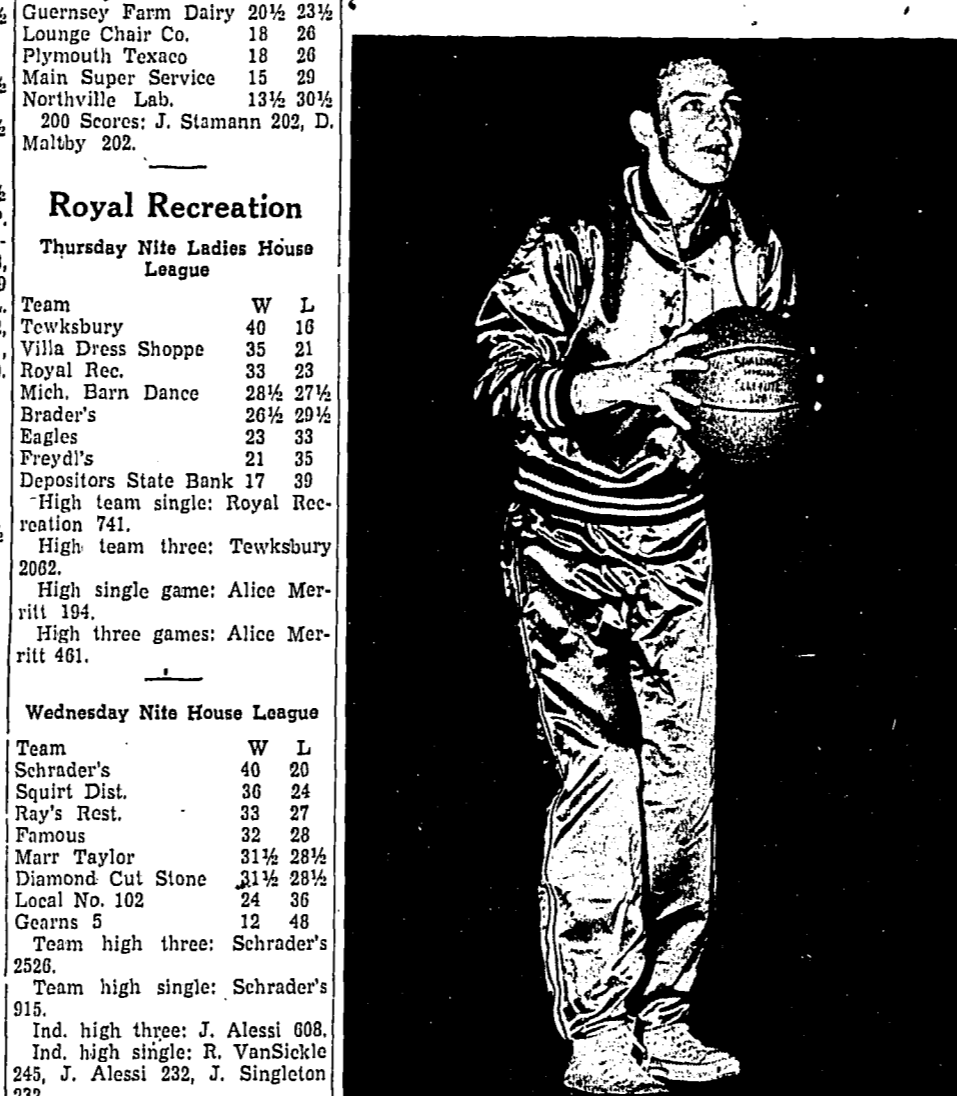

Mustangs and Brighton in 'Big Game' Friday

Northville Takes 2 Wins From Conference Foes

Northville and Brighton will put unbeaten league records on the line Friday night when they tangle in the Northville Community building for the Wayne-Gokland conference top spot. The two teams each have a 3-0 record in league play so far. Brighton has a perfect 5-0 season record, however, as against the Mustangs' 3-1 effort for the year.

Northville continued to share first place this week after two impressive victories over conference opponents.

The Mustangs downed Milford, 10-9, in a rugged contest Friday night after overwhelming West Bloomfield, 78-47, last Tuesday.

The Milford contest was a rough and tumble affair, played on the "crackbox" Milford court.

"I'm glad we have that game out of the way," said Coach Stan Johnston, "for whenever a team plays at Milford, they should figure on spotting Milford about 29 points."

Milford led once, 13-9 in the early moments of the second quarter but Northville quickly regained the lead and was never headed. Halftime score was 30-19 and at the three-quarter mark it stood at 39-33.

"Except for the one time they lead, Milford was never within six points of us," Johnston said. "Yet, it was the type of game in which the issue was never settled until the last few seconds."

Milford pressed hard on the small court, but the Mustangs played control ball for the final minutes and managed to protect their lead.

At times, play became somewhat rougher than ordinarily is seen on a basketball court. Yet only 14 fouls were called on Milford — not a high total for prep basketball.

"Milford made us look bad a few times with their style of play," Johnston said, "but we kept our wits about us and concentrated on staying ahead."

Center Bill Yahnne dumped in 17 points to lead the Mustangs, while forward Dick Biery scored 14 and guard Bud Bell led 12 for the winners.

Against the weak West Bloomfield squad, Northville put on one of the hottest shooting sprees ever to come from a Mustang basketball team. At the first quarter mark, the score was a phenomenal 30-10 — as the Mustangs hit on 60 percent of their shots from far out and had an overall average of 56 percent.

With replacements seeing as much action as the starting five, Northville ran up a 43-22 halftime margin and led 61-37 at the third quarter mark.

Four Mustang players entered the double-figure bracket on scoring. Bell led the way with 21. Yahnne posted 14, while guard Ben Burns and Biery each bucketed 12. Nine of the 10 Mustangs scored in the game.

## Students Hear of Little America Library Staff Tries Bookmark Art

Last week, junior and senior high school students attended an interesting assembly program about the "Little America" project in the Antarctic.

Curtis Lundy, pleasant young University of Michigan student who is studying for his doctorate in geology, showed several color slides and gave an explanation of the Antarctic "Little America". Mr. Lundy is in the U.S. Navy and was one of the men assigned by the government to go to the Antarctic last year to study weather conditions.

It is believed that something in the Antarctic area affects our weather, in the Northern Hemisphere, he said. To further his theory, he explained, the U.S. will send trained experts to build a settlement called "Little America Five" during the world geophysical year of 1957.

Along with this explanation of the Antarctic project, Mr. Lundy described various equipment which will be used, the Antarctic weather conditions, and some of the animal inhabitants of the South Polar region.
