





Petitions, prepared beforehand were then circulated. Submission of the petitions Monday was the ulmination of the public move against the track.

Elaborate plans for the multimillion dollar race track and sports center have been made public by backers of the project and it is common knowledge that such a track would receive prime onsideration for the site.

But those who favor the rezoning, including township supervisor Frazer Staman, have pointed out that denial of the ezoning request would not only ill the race track, but prohibit all heavy industry on the site.

Staman has stated in the past hat Novi township soon will need major improvements in its services and facilities, and that revenue from heavy industry would be one steady and highly emunerative source.

But if heavy industry is bar d, Staman added, the township vill have to look elsewhere for funds or go without the needed acilities. On the other hand, opponents

of the rezoning and race track claim it would lower property values and be a bad influence in the township. They further nestion sincerety of the plans to build a sports center for use by he township as part of the race track set-up.




Varsity Debaters Win Second Round


