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



Board members wavered momentarily in their decision. Staman suggested having the question arbitrated in order to avoid a possible invalid election. But Trickey, Bachert, and several spectators argued

"I don't think we should take a chance on not calling ne election," Trickey said. "These petitioners have acted in good faith, and we should honor their petitions." "The petitions seem to be in order, and I don't see why

we should wait," Bachert said.

"The burden of proving the petitions valid does not lie with the board," said Herbert Koester, president of the Novi township Democratic club. "If someone claims the petitions aren't in order, let them prove it before you cancel the election."

"The board's own attorney said the petitions are alright," said another. "Is the board going to go by the petioners' wishes, or the wishes of one person?

Miller and Frank Clark. Both agreed that the election should be called without waiting for arbitration.

Discussion then turned to the election date. Trickey suggested it be called to coincide with the ownship primary on February 18 to save expenses, Bachert

Clark suggested a special election be called. But Bachert, getting a state election book from his office, pointed out that a special election cannot be called within 60 days of regularly scheduled election.

"So if we don't call it for February 18 (the primary) or April 1 (the township election), we can't schedule i until at least June 1," Bachert said.

Staman suggested the April 1 date in hopes that the state legislature would vote by then on a law limiting the Detroit area to three harness tracks and thus eliminating the possibility of a track in Novi.

"That would make all parties happy," Staman said "On one hand, no one would have to worry about a track, And on the other hand, there would be no objection to the rezoning of Dr. Holcomb's property for heavy industry as he has requested."

Bachert, however, read his resolution calling for the February 18 date. It was seconded and approved unanimously.

Birds Get Their Noses Counted Serving a growing community



Trekking through snow flurries along a secluded nature trail near Northville, the small group of warmly-bundled men and women paused and raised binoculars to their eyes. Perched on a distant branch, unmindful of the approaching humans, was a bird none of them had expected to see:

the rare Northern shrike. They studied the bird at length, making notes of the conditions under which they had seen it. Then letting their binoculars dangle loosely around their necks, they moved on-eyes continually looking in all directions for the sight of another bird.

Several hours earlier - about 7:30 on the morning of December 29 — they had met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hartley, 602 Randolph, to begin a day of participa-tion in the annual Christmas Bird Census sponsored by the National Audubon Society.

That Johnston's strategy has worked is shown not only

by the Mustangs' perfect record since then, but also by sta-tistics of Northville's first four conference games. (The following statistics, compiled Monday, do not include Tuesday night's game against Clarenceville.) Among other things, they show that Northville has had that lead. The Mustangs have never been behind in the first quarter and only once have they been behind at the

Furthermore, the figures show that of the 16 quarters played against the last four teams, Northville has been behind only at that same point - at the half against Brighton. The same figures show still another secret of the Mustangs' winning season: of those 16 quarters, Northville has been outpointed in only four of them. Two were the last two quarters against Holly, after Northville had built up a

half (38-40 against Brighton.)

(Perhaps the biggest key to success, of course, and certainly the factor that has allowed the strategy to work, has been the deadeye shooting of the Mustangs. At times, Northville has hit on nearly 60 percent of its shots in a quarter. The Mustangs' usual game average has been about 40 to 45 percent.)

In conference games, Nor; hville's cumulative statistics also show the same pattern of getting off to an early lead and then protecting it with steady play for the rest of the game. The Mustangs have outscored opponents 84-46 in the first quarter, then built up a slightly greater lead in follow-

Only when the non-conference Plymouth score is figured in does Northville stand on the debit side. That score puts the Mustangs at a 77-79 disadvantage for the cumulative fourth quarter. But Northville would just as soon forget
