Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such a change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.



Mrs. Robert Haass of Farm Crest Farms discovered a January 23, 1931 edition of The Northville Record recently. She was impressed by a story of Waterford in the days of 1899. It boomed as an industrial center with the largest flour mill in the state, three cooper shops, a sawmill, a sash and blind factory and a farm implement plant. From the 1830's until its downfall at the turn of the century, Waterford outshone its neighboring communities, Plymouth and Northville. During the era of agitation against slavery it served as an "underground railway" station. Fire, which destroyed its mill for the second time, finally doomed the village pressed by growth of its neighbors.

An interesting sidelight in the addition is an editorial by Publisher Elton Eaton who defines the word "TAX". "T", he wrote, stands for "take", "A" for "away", and "X" for "the unknown quantity".


