Modern Farming

Babson Park, Mass.—Many farmers write to me complaining about the cost-price squeeze. They are discouraged because for them the bottom seems to have fallen out of the farm market. I sympathize with these people, but I suspect that many of them have come upon hard times because they are not farming as well as they know how. Also, many of them are not keeping abreast of new ideas and new crops.

Trend Is Toward More Mechanization
Tremendous changes have taken place in farming during my lifetime. When I was a boy, horses and mules furnished practically all the power on farms. Even as recently as 1910, there was almost no mechanization on farms. In that year the total farm population was 22,000,000. By 1950, this had dwindled to 25,000,000, a decline of 21.9 per cent. Most observers estimate the present farm population to be only 20,000,000. Thus farmers and their families now account for only 11.6 per cent of our total population compared with 34.9 per cent in 1910.

I predict that machines will continue to displace men on American farms. Hence, the smaller commercial farms will be hard put to survive. However, I do not believe farmers should be despairing of the future. A good living can still be made on the farm by those who open their eyes to trends. Obviously, the trend is toward new crops and greater mechanization, and there is no sense in bucking that trend.

Over-Production Is A Temporary Problem
Right now farmers are the victims of their own unusual ability to coax record yields-per-acre from their soil. Better seed, improved fertilization and irrigation, and more efficient spreading, cultivating and harvesting machinery have increased farm production during the past month. Farmers rose magnificently to the challenge to provide food and feed for our allies, and now they are temporarily in trouble.

Future of Agriculture
At present we are growing at least 5 per cent more farm products than we can sell. In an effort to keep our farm surpluses from becoming too burdensome, the government spends huge sums on price support programs, the soil bank, and foreign distribution schemes. All these measures have helped to some extent, but they are no means cure-alls. I am disturbed by the fact that too many farmers take undue advantage of this government help by deliberately over-

producing. However, I am firmly convinced that this over-production is a temporary problem.

Research Holds The Answer
Research has performed wonders for all other industries. I forecast that it will also perform wonders for agriculture. Chemistry, industry and agriculture, working together, gave us hybrid corn and varieties of the soybean which would grow in our country. This combination sponsored the research that produced a new dwarf variety of corn which yielded as much as 2,700 pounds per acre if the soil is properly irrigated and fertilized with nitrogen. Also, a new combine harvester-huller has been developed which will gather tall or short corn, thresh without waste, and produce a profitable future for cornbeans, with output reaching as high as 100,000 crop acres.

A stimulating flow of new research ideas has emerged from the recent annual Chemurgy Conference of the Council for Agricultural and Chemical Research. This organization and others like it are facing up to the real farm problem, which is not over-production but under-utilization and waste. Industrial Uses for Farm Products
We should be proud of the progress agriculture has made in our country. But there is still much to learn about soils, irrigation and weather. Crops such as cornbeans and sesame seed will become big business before long and I forecast that other big new cash crops are coming. But I want now to call special attention to the need for putting more farm products and residues to work in industry.

President Eisenhower is alert to this need. Some months ago, he appointed a Commission on Increased Industrial Use of Agricultural Products. Its report should be made public within the next month. I urge farmers to study it carefully and to follow it up with action. Over the long haul, I am bullish about farming in this country.

Williams, Legislature Battle Over Budget

THIS YEAR'S BATTLE over the budget may well benefit the people of the state. On the one hand is the governor with requests for increased appropriations. He is asking more than \$400 million. In his opinion this is the amount required to perform services desired by Michigan residents.

On the other hand is the legislature under Republican control. GOP leaders look at the budget differently. They try to figure how much money will be forthcoming from present state taxes and to allocate this money wisely among the various administrative departments.

Administrative agencies can be expected to believe that they must have more funds to provide services. It is human nature for each department head to want to do his best job. More money produces more services.

When an agency receives additional funds, it increases the prestige and power of its director and personnel.

Since each department prepares its own preliminary budget a common procedure is to limit spending. Legislators sincerely believe that many of the departmental requests contain unnecessary expenditures. It takes sharp eyes to pick out all the items that add costs but provide few benefits.

3. Taxes proposed by the government would fall directly on business groups, one of the chief supporters.

Agencies rarely return unneeded funds. The situation has a "snowballing" effect. With most agencies asking for more each year, expenditures grow with every new budget.

Only two groups can check the unnecessary expenditures. One is the office of the State Controller which prepares the governor's proposed budget from preliminary budget requests presented by the departments.

The other is the legislature. Since legislative duties include not only distributing funds to agencies, but also finding ways of raising the money, legislators quite normally consider extensive cuts in budget.

The 1957-58 budget points up the administrative-legislative contrasts more sharply because:

1. Requests cannot be filled without additional taxes. The GOP controlled legislature feels the Michigan tax burden should not be increased. The only alternative is to limit spending.



Plan New School near Willowbrook

Wixom to Vote On New Charter In July 15 Election

Voters of the newly incorporated village of Wixom will vote on the polls July 15 to decide upon the adoption of their newly created charter.

The document, completed last week, is nearly 60 pages long. It calls for a governing body of six councilmen and one president. The charter also incorporates the unique feature of providing for a village manager in form of government without amendment.

The five-man charter commission took nearly every day of the three-month period limited by law to draft the charter.

Wixom voted to become a village on February 3 by a vote of 253 to 168. The incorporation election decided both Novi and Commerce township and includes the new Lincoln Township plan. Voters in the Novi Township section of Wixom split their votes on the incorporation, 64 to 94.

The incorporation allows Wixom to tax the Lincoln plant and also presents the possibility that Novi Township could lose this tax source should Wixom ever become a city.

Will Start Building in Fall If Bond Issue Gets Okay

Novi school officials this week revealed plans to construct a new elementary school near Willowbrook Village next fall.

The new building will relieve a situation that threatens to overcrowd the present building by next spring.

Tentative plans call for 13 classrooms and a multi-purpose room, as well as a kitchen, teachers' lounge, special facilities room and administrative section.

Superintendent William Medlyn is working on a bond issue to raise funds for the bond issue probably will be placed before the voters in late June or early July. He did not estimate the amount that would be requested.

If the proposal passes, and if the state constitution for the bond issue is approved, construction would begin in the fall of 1958.

School board members were to meet last night to finish negotiations with the school site. Medlyn was reluctant to specify the site before the transaction was complete, but said the school will be built on 10 acres on 10 Mile road near Willowbrook.

Board attorney Paul Meredith has been authorized to take an option on the site.

The board will meet again next week to review cost estimates and preliminary plans for the building itself. Architect for the school is Charles Lane and Associates.

Medlyn said the present 17-room school would be likely to be overcrowded by next spring. The building, with a capacity of 600 and a present enrollment of 622, will have to handle an estimated 625 students by next spring.

Teachers will be granted down-line pay increases to effective next fall, making the Novi faculty one of the highest paid in the area.

The increases call for a \$100 increase in starting salary and a eight or annual increment.

Superintendent William Medlyn said the Novi pay scale is now "about average" when compared with Detroit, which has a 10 per cent increase in starting salary, but added that it is higher than either Northville or Waller Lake.

He noted that teacher supply and demand was one factor in granting the pay raises. In order to get and keep a fully-staffed faculty, the Novi school board felt salaries had to be increased, he said.

Specifically, the new scale gives teachers with no experience and a bachelor's degree \$4,200 a year, compared with \$4,200 last year. For each year of experience, such teachers get a \$225 increment as against \$200 last year.

Teachers with a master's degree and no experience start at \$4,500 compared with \$4,500 and receive an annual increment of \$250 as against \$200 last year.

Teachers also will receive 10 days sick leave a year, accumulated to 60 days.

Medlyn estimated that Novi school will need an additional six or seven teachers next fall, though some of these will be replacements for teachers leaving the system this summer.

The Novi board first set up a formal pay scale last year.

State Aid Picture Still Not Bright For Novi Schools

Money problems continued to hang over the heads of Novi school officials this week.

The school districts face an 80 percent cut in state school aid funds this quarter, with the prospect that the difference may have to be borrowed.

Superintendent William Medlyn said he will not make a move until the current state aid allotment is received—probably within the next few days.

Nevertheless, Medlyn anticipates that the expected \$23,000 check will be somewhere around \$4,000—a cut which reflects a state-wide squeeze on state aid funds as a result of a decline in sales tax receipts.

Medlyn said that if the check is as low as he now expects, the board will have to borrow money to pay teachers and meet other current obligations.

Meanwhile, Northville Parent-Teachers Association representatives journeyed to Lansing Tuesday to consult with the state board of education in an effort to find some answer to a similar problem. The Northville district is short some \$20,000 in state aid and another \$20,000 in delinquent taxes.

Story-teller Delights Kiddies At Mother-Daughter Dinner

Nearly 100 mothers, daughters and grandmothers attended the annual Mother-Daughter banquet of the Woman's Society of the Methodist church last Thursday evening.

The week, which includes May 12, is significantly and appropriately selected for this recognition in honor of the birth of Florence Nightingale. Although the life and contributions of Miss Nightingale tend to be glamorized in retrospect, her sincere and abiding interest in human well being remains the essence of the nursing profession today. Here again are a few facing an almost overwhelming task. Although there has been a constant increase in the number of professional nurses through the years, the ever greater increase in demands made upon the nursing profession continually bankrupt the supply.

Although the nurses at Northville number 46, a larger group than available to most state hospitals, this number is inadequate to provide the desired nursing care for 50 wards housing a total of 2200 patients. On the 18 wards that do have professional nurses, many activities have been initiated and are proving beneficial.

By working closely with doctors in implementing therapeutic attitudes, the professional nurses extend to many beneficial contacts which are thus provided help to establish the emotional climate essential to the recovery of the mentally ill.

Preparation for this kind of nursing participation is encouraged through in-service staff conferences, case presentation and supervision. Emphasis on group thinking, group participation and functioning is essential not only in the development of the nurse, but also promoting group activities with patients.

Many citizens recognize their responsibility in care for the mentally ill by working directly with the patients through volunteer groups, extending social experiences. Others recognize their responsibilities by supporting legislation designed to promote the welfare of the mentally ill. Still more are needed in both citizen groups if all patients are to be reached.





The youths returned, smashed the spotlight, broke several windows and then left.

DeGale said one youth was a "be-top" type, with long sideburns and overalls. The assailant's car was described as a 1953 or 1954 dark green Mercury with several primed-coated areas on its hood and roof.



... AND THE LIFE EVERLASTING

In Christ's resurrection from the dead centers our greatest hope: life and immortality. "Our Saviour Jesus Christ... hath abolished death, and hath brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel." (2 Timothy 1:10). Therefore, in our hearts the Easter festival is never past. We remember it every time we confess in the Apostles' Creed: "On the third day He rose again from the dead." Indeed, on the third day Christ gave us life immortal. Hence, we close the Creed by confessing our faith in the life everlasting. "I believe... in the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, AND THE LIFE EVERLASTING. Amen."

Someone very aptly commented that all the declarations of the Apostles' Creed would be meaningless without the great chord struck in the final sentence: "AND THE LIFE EVERLASTING." The Creed would be like a huge cathedral wrapped in gloom and darkness of night. But with the affirmation, "and the life everlasting," the Creed is like that same cathedral illuminated by the sun and showing all the harmony and beauty of the combined work of architect, sculptor and painter.





SPEAKING for the Record

Recent meetings in Northville and Novi, though entirely unrelated, bear a strong resemblance. They both arose as the result of misunderstanding and grievances that parties concerned figured could only be resolved by "laying their cards on the table."

The Northville meeting was fully reported in The Record last week. It concerned representatives of the city, Downs and Driving Club. Their relations were, we believe, greatly improved by the session. Councilmen were sympathetic to track with the city to see that future track expansion does not hinder surrounding property values.

In Novi the meeting has not been reported. It was an "off the record" affair called to clear the air and bring some harmony to the township board.

It's no secret to anyone even mildly interested in Novi township affairs that all is not serene on the board. Since the election a definite three to two split has existed on nearly every issue.

The controlling faction (Balon, Harrison and Bachert) maintains it was elected on a platform. Apparently they mean to stick to this as a mandate.

Meanwhile Supervisor Staman and Trustee Clark, veteran board members, stand opposed to many of the changes suggested. They point to the fact that they, too, were elected and have support for their views.

While Balon, Bachert and Harrison appear receptive to compromise, Staman cannot believe they are doing their own bargaining. Here, in perhaps lies the greatest stumbling block to harmony and progress in Novi.

The supervisor has openly charged that Charles Trickey, Jr., former treasurer, is pulling the strings behind the scenes. Trickey's part in the campaign, in which he backed a state against Staman, gives the supervisor ample reason to suspect the puppet act.

Nevertheless, Balon, Bachert and Harrison vehemently deny any connection with Trickey. They admit an adherence to the principles of their platform, which Trickey helped draft, but here his influence ends. He is a friend and nothing more, they contend.

Trickey takes the same position, but two suspect is gaining some pleasure from the torment he is causing Staman.

Michigan Mirror

Deeper Detroit River

START OF A \$10 MILLION project which has an economic impact on every person in Michigan and the entire area of the Great Lakes will be marked with a full day ceremony May 28 on the Detroit River.

Then work will begin on the Great Lakes Connecting Channel. This five-year project will deepen the waterways between the lakes so that modern ships can navigate.

Every inch deeper means 50 more tons that can pass through the lakes. Present channels are dredged to permit depths of 21 feet for light cargoes carried by upbound traffic and 25 feet for the heavier downbound channels.

What seems certain is that Michigan as a state is suffering in the existing conditions. Investors to locate new plants within its boundaries. It is not difficult to imagine a company which wants to locate a new site eliminating Michigan as a potential spot because "they say the tax rate is too high."

There seems a real need for a new spirit of working together in solving the tax problem and bringing the state as a good place for industry say representatives of the Michigan Economic Development Department. This office is charged with the job of securing new industry, and through it has no part in the tax fight, its efforts are hampered by the state.

It is difficult to know exactly what is the effect of the present proposed taxation program. In Michigan, as in other states, some industries leave some returns. There is much to indicate, and it is logical to conclude, that taxes is one of several important factors which determine where a new industry will be located.

A Bureau of Census report on manufacturing for the period 1947-1954, when Michigan had no corporate profits tax, shows that Michigan gained 219 manufacturing establishments. This is more than any other state except California, 370 more than Ohio.

The most recent figures available show that in 1954 Michigan industry spent \$70 million for new plants and equipment, more than was invested in Michigan for several years. And fighting is renewed during this legislative session.

Figures also show that Michigan's win has been mostly in smaller industries. Employment in auto industry has fluctuated during the past 10 years.

Roger Babson Diversify Trust Funds for Maximum Protection

Babson Park, Mass. — I believe in Trust Funds, for both children and grandchildren. The ideal method is to leave one half of your money in trust, and one half outright. In the case of children or grandchildren, you save an inheritance tax by leaving the money in trust for them and providing that your wife will have a life interest in the income.

Investing For Profit In previous weeks this column has shown how you can build \$10,000 up to \$1,000,000 in 25 years without borrowing any money or selling anything on margin.

What About Diversification? A trust officer will properly diversify your holdings as to security. This is also true of any money you put into Mutual Funds. Such Trust Funds, however, do not provide for diversification of management. My opinion this week is that you have several Trust Funds, each in a different bank so as to get diversification of management, at least as diversification of securities.

Trust officers are supposed to provide for common inflation. To do this they buy either convertible bonds or common stocks. Buying common stocks today, however, may be rather risky. This especially applies to the "Blue Chips", which trust officers like to buy in order to protect their own reputations.

Importance Of Youth I advise a selection of young college instructors, rather than older professors, because the older men are usually more interested in their own reputations and have more fear of making a mistake. The Trust agreements will, however, provide that the Trustees will not be held responsible for any losses. Experts See 'Boom Town' Growth in Wixom

Two experts in regional planning predicted this week that Wixom may overshadow all other communities in western Oakland county within the next 10 years, as they revealed plans for a continuing study of the new village's "nearly unique" situation.

Professor Frank Suggert of the resource development department at Michigan State university, and William F. Jewell, of the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission, had these other startling estimates about the Wixom-Novi-Northville Walled Lake area.

Wixom's population may reach 20,000 to 30,000 within the next 10 years. Wixom may be the center of a huge business-residential-industrial complex extending as far as 20 to 25 miles in each direction along the new Brighton-Farmington expressway.

Wixom may become another "River Rouge" — a key industrial area suddenly created out of rural farmland. Dr. Suggert and Jewell will soon begin work on a long-range two-part study of the Wixom situation which, as Dr. Suggert says, "is a golden opportunity to watch the transition of a community from a rural crossroads to a completely modern industrial complex."

Jewell said the Wixom situation is "almost unique" because farming communities seldom have a \$50,000,000 industrial plant dropped into their midst overnight.

Wixom may possibly be larger than any other surrounding community, he said, "but a lot will depend on how well they provide schools, use their huge tax base, and organize for the future."

Jewell said the planning commission will carry out their end by helping leaders in the Wixom-Novi-Walled Lake area plan for future use of their resources. Dr. Suggert and his MSU staff then will study the community as it develops to see what actually happens.

Jewell said he is now trying to set up a regional planning commission composed of representatives of Wixom, Novi, Walled Lake, Northville, Milford and other nearby communities as this one does should attempt to meet its problems even before they arise.

Jewell said, however, that growth of the area will not come unless the communities use their resources to the best advantage.

"This is part of our 1950 projection survey for the entire Detroit area," Jewell said. "Through it, we'll be able to learn what happens to an area when industry comes in and how we can best advise future communities to solve their problems."

"It's an excellent opportunity to study this," he added, "for we probably could never again find a community in its original state of fields and orchards such as Wixom now has."

In East Lansing, Dr. Suggert was equally enthusiastic about the study.

"Our study will not be grandiose," he said, "but it should be unique. I know of few other cases where researchers should have been able to investigate such a phenomenon. It's almost like watching history unfold before your eyes."

Dr. Suggert said he and his staff will attempt to plot out Wixom as it was two years ago, and then study and re-study the area every two years.

"We'll take aerial photographs from time to time, and in the meantime we'll map and survey the area, interview people, and study any changes in population growth, land use and development."

He said he already has contacted Lincoln officials to ask their cooperation, and soon will approach business and governmental leaders in the area.

Dr. Suggert said Wixom "conceivably could reach 20,000 to 30,000 people within 10 years and become the leading community in the area."

"Two factors which will help, he added, are the new expressway and the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad spur which may make it a key transportation center."

On the other hand, he said, Wixom could discourage development by a strict zoning code, high taxes and failure to provide needed service facilities.

Money Crisis Ends For School District

The Novi school system will weather the current financial squeeze that has gripped the school district in the red at the end of the current school year.

Superintendent William Medlyn said this week that teachers will be paid on time, and that other financial obligations will be met.

New Committee To Help Study School Problems

A Novi citizens' committee for schools will be formed tonight to look into problems connected with the proposed new elementary school in Novi.

A meeting has been called for 8 p.m. tonight (Thursday) in the Novi school library. Superintendent William Medlyn has contacted representatives of a number of Novi organizations, and has asked that any resident is welcome to attend the meeting and be added part of the committee.

In addition to studying current problems, the committee will have the responsibility of investigating and planning for future school needs in Novi township.

Medlyn said the school board was due to meet last night to wrap up final details in the purchase of a 10-acre site near Willowbrook village where the new school will be built.

Once the site is secured, the board will make plans for scheduling a bond issue election in June or July to provide building funds for the school. Estimated cost of the 13-room building has not yet been determined.

Money Crisis Ends For School District

Novi's state aid allotment still has not come through, he said, but the action caused still another serious breach among township board members.

Novi's situation was duplicated all over the state recently when it was announced that state aid checks for this quarter would probably be some 80 percent less than has been anticipated. For Novi, this meant the district would receive \$4,000 rather than the expected \$33,000.

Medlyn said the current stop-gap special tax measure is not a final answer to the problem of providing money for education.

"Basically," he said, "it all comes down to this: sooner or later, the residents in each district will have to realize that they must pay for what they get without banking on continued outside support. Either they will have to provide more local taxes for schools, or be satisfied with what the current taxes will provide."

Kindergarten Registration

Parents of children who will enter kindergartens at the Novi school next fall are reminded by superintendent William Medlyn that registration will continue through next Wednesday.

Registration will be held from 9 a.m. to 12 a.m. and from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. in the school auditorium. Each child must have his birth certificate at the time of registration, and must be five years of age or under December 1, 1957.

Medlyn said the board hopes construction can begin this fall and be completed in time for classes in the fall of 1958.
