About 150 Novi township residents sat in a very warm Community building last Thursday evening and listened to an authority on incorporation talk about his specialty. The meeting was called after a committee of five men, appointed by the Board of Commerce, studied the idea of incorporation and unanimously suggested it for Novi.

These men - Walter Tuck, Dirk Groenenberg, Keith Metcalf, Russell Button and Dicron Tafralian - obviously spent many hours of research and study before presenting heir recommendation. Their work cannot possibly bear them any reward except from the satisfaction that is gained from serving the community.

We suspect there will be some opposition to incorporation and to motives behind it. Opposition is fine. Incorporation is a big step for Novi and should be studied carefully. But we believe that the pros and cons of incorporation should be kept on a constructive level and that politics and personalities should be set aside.

While the vast majority of the citizens attending the meeting voted in favor of proceeding with incorporation steps, it was obvious from their questions that they want to know all the answers before the matter comes up for a vote. This questioning should be continued, and the final answer must come from what the voter believes is best for his com-

Frank Clark: A Quarter Century of Helping Novi



It flew over the Novi township hall, heart of the government into which Frank D. Clark, at 79, had poured his energies for more than a quarter of a century. It flew at a time when Novi was at last beginning to realize the future that Frank Clark had envisioned ever since

he came to Novi from the wheat fields of the west. This week, as the first shock of Frank Clark's passing ebbed somewhat, five of his closest friends and associates looked into the past and commented on the qualities which, in their minds and the minds of many, made him one of the most eminent and respected political figures of his time. "You could disagree with his philosophy," said Judge Clark J. Adams of the Oakland county circuit court, "but you could never quarrel with his sincerity of purpose. He was the finest type of public servant."

"When Frank Clark died," said Novi supervisor Frazer Staman, "Novi lost not only a friend but a remarkable leader. If anyone was, Frank was the brains of the township govern-"He was a grand man," said Mrs. James Lapham, 24350

Haggerty, a close friend for many years. "They don't come any better, and seldom as good." "Everything he did was for the good of Novi," said Mrs. R. H. Johnson, 316 South Wing, a long-time friend and travelling companion with him and his wife, "He was a foster father to me," said Carl J. Watts of Plymouth. "And there were many other people he helped

Throughout their recollections, certain words and phrases occurred over and over again: "kindly", "a true gentleman", "he had his own convictions, but was broad-minded", "upright", "sincere", "the type of man you love." And above all, one thought was expressed each time:

when they hardly knew which way to turn."

Frank Clark had only one interest as far as Novi was con-

"He was a strong leader, but not a demagogue," said Staman. "He was in government for more than 25 years, and thoroughly knew the problems facing Novi and the solutions

that would work out the best." Staman also gives Frank Clark credit for introducing him to the inroads of Oakland county politics and government after turning the supervisor's gavel over to him at the end of his own 18 years in that office.

"It is no easy job to learn the ins and outs of township and county government," he said. "Without Frank's help. would have been like entering a lion cage. But everyone in Pontiac was Frank's friend, and Novi is all the better for it." Staman noted that Frank Clark remained keen of mind until the end.

"His last letter was written to friends in Pontiac," said Staman. "He said: 'I'll soon be back in my old haunts at the county building, and when I am, I'll drop in to see you.' "And at board meetings," he added, "he could always be counted on as a voice of experience . . . a person who could rely on years of dealing with governmental problems and who could warn against pitfalls that might lie beneath the

Judge Adams noted that Frank Clark was "the type of man a person could not help admiring and loving." "He was an able administrator," he said, "but more than that, he was dedicated to Novi. And in all of his dealings, whether he agreed with you or not, he was a gentleman." Judge Adams, who knew him for many years both as a friend and as a legal associate, pointed to Frank Clark's unsung advice and assistance - particularly to needy young people — as an indication of his personality.

"He was kindly and honest and worked for the good of all," he said. "Like many others, I thought a great deal of praised him for his devotion to Novi "I don't live in Novi, and I didn't always agree with

him on politics," she said, "but I know whatever he did, it was always for the benefit of Novi." Mrs. Johnson recalled that he liked to take trips with his wife, herself, and her husband. "He was a good family man too," she said. "He didn't

have any children, but he treated his wife - and his 'foster' children — as good as any man ever did." Mrs. Lapham recalled many evenings when she and her husband played cards with the Clarks.

"He was always a story-teller," she said. "He would tell about his days on a wheat ranch out west, and about traveling down the old plank road to Detroit to carry his produce to market. He liked sports, but a farmer didn't have much time to himself in those days."

Watts, who lived with the Clarks for four years after his own parents died, looked on Frank Clark as a father. "He helped me whenever I needed it - which was

often," he said. "And his advice was always good, I don't know what would have happened without him.' "And I wasn't alone," he said, "He helped out many other young people. Maybe it was because he didn't have any children of his own. But in any case, he was a better father

Frank Clark's five friends had much more to say about him. But essentially, it came down to one fact: whether a foster father, a farmer, a governmental leader, or a pinochle friend, Frank Clark was admired by those who knew him. Shortly before he died, he wrote:

If those memories were as vivid as those of his friends, Frank Clark must have died contented.
