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End of Summer Brings Rash of Youth Trouble to Novi Police

New York and Detroit aren't alone in their juvenile deinquency problems this summer. Last week, youth trouble broke out with a vengeance throughout Novi township, with cases ranging from simple

drag-racing to a vicious assault. Police chief Lee BeGole said the addition of night radio dispatcher Fred Garlick in recent weeks has helped police cover the township more thoroughly and more quickly.

"Even so." he added, "we can't be everywhere. I would urge all Novi residents to report incidents, to be ready to serve as witnesses, and to be careful when they go out at night." Among the cases which confronted police last week and this week:







the largest enrollment in local school history - will head back to classes at Novi school next

As of Tuesday, 562 had registered for the current school year, which begins Wednesday with a half-day session and continues Thursday with the first full day of classes.

The enrollment represents an increase of nearly 25 percent over last year's opening attendance of 457. But superintendent William Medlyn said the school is prepared for the huge increase and that it should

not result in unsolvable problems. Medlyn asked all parents this week to pay careful attention to the Novi school bus schedule (see page 7) and to the following schedule of registration and school opening

-Tuesday, September 3: all teachers report at 9 a.m. for full day of staff meetings.

-Wednesday, September 4: all students report at 9 a.m. for half day. Buses will make regular runs.

-Thursday, September 5: all students report for first full day of classes.
