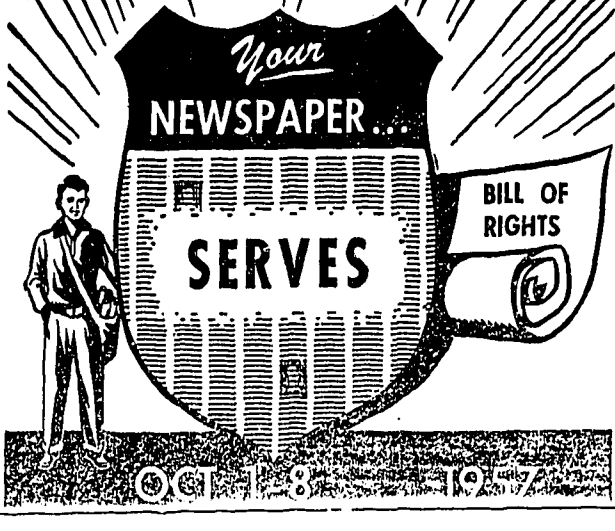

First Settlers Built Along Indian Trail

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles on the history of Novi township, originally written as a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield high school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village.

FRONTIER SETTLEMENT

When the first frontier farmers began to settle in the Novi region, moving out along Indian trails from Detroit, they must have been pleasantly surprised to find this rolling country, covered with mixed oak, maple and pine, and cold streams.

The intermediate space between the swamps and lakes—which is probably near one-half of the country—is with very few exceptions, a poor, barren, stony land on which scarcely any vegetation grows, except very small scrubby oak.

However, even in the face of this report, frontier farmers pushed seeking a new life, and new and cheap lands in the wilderness of the West.

The first settler in Novi township laid claim to a quarter-section of land at what is now the corner of 10 Mile and Haggerty roads. Ten Mile itself has once been a popular Shawnee Indian trail between Detroit and the Grand River country.

The first settler had pushed west through the swamps surrounding Detroit, moved on past the 10 or 12 families which had settled in Farmington the previous year, and with his family built a cabin in a clearing adjacent to what was an ancient Indian burial ground.

Thus, in 1824, farming came to Novi township. OPENING THE ERIE CANAL. During the next 25 years growth was rapid. The completion of the Erie Canal in October, 1825 caused an increasing volume of settlers to move across Lake Erie on sailing and new steam vessels, which had been operating on the lake only about seven years.

Michigan, up to this time, had largely been passed by because of its distance north of the main routes west, especially the Ohio River. Michigan's population in 1820 was just less than 9,000, compared to almost 600,000 in Ohio.

The opening of the Erie Canal, then, and the consequent road from the Mahawk Valley to Detroit, changed southern Michigan and Novi township from a frontier to a pioneer farm region.

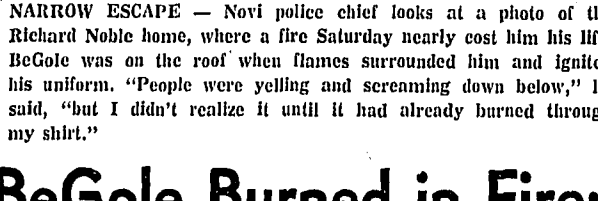


Vote on City Scheduled For Wixom

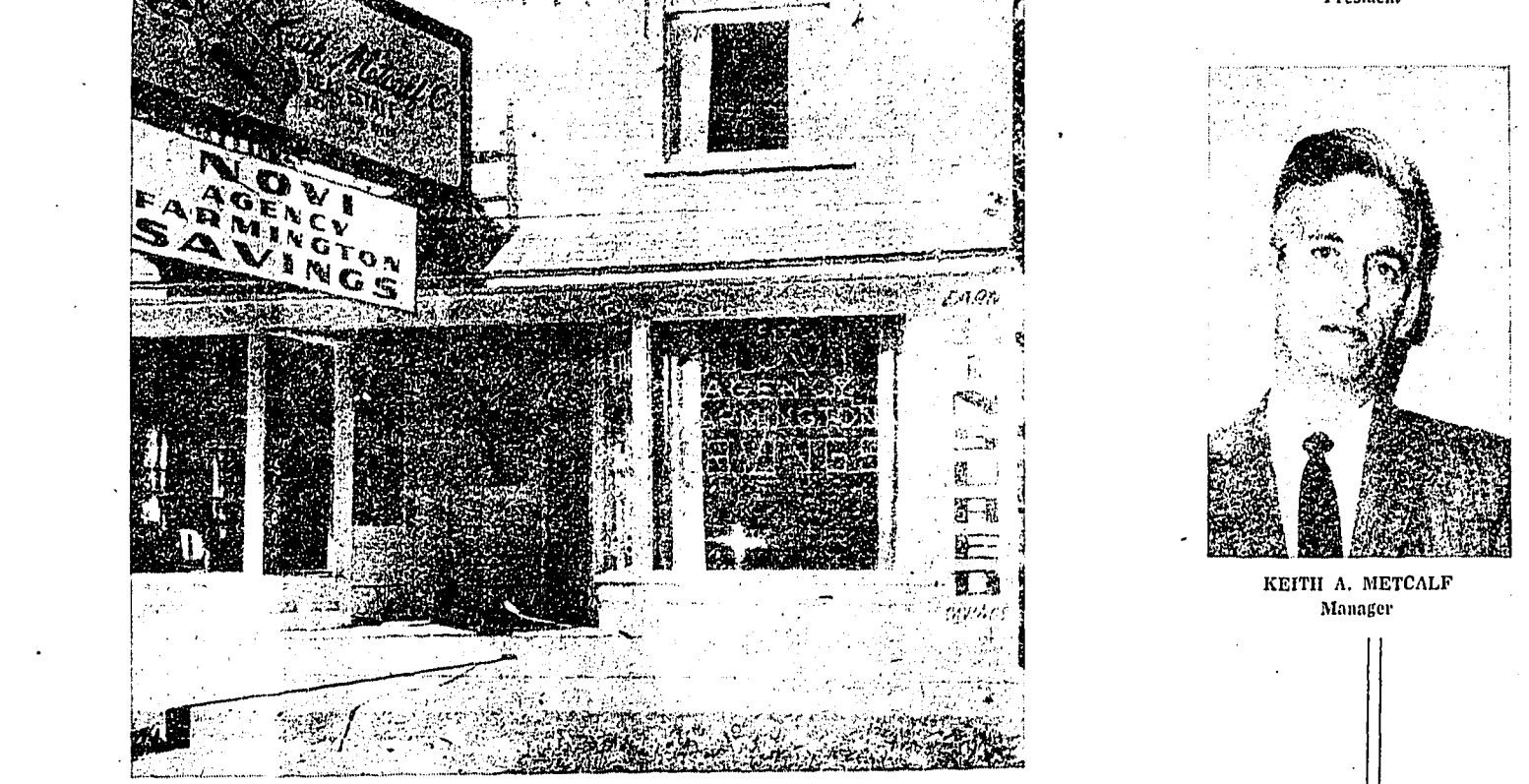

Sec. 5.07 Side Yard. Each lot shall have two side yards, the aggregate width to be not less than twenty (20) feet. The minimum side yard width shall be eight (8) feet. In new subdivisions the minimum distance between houses shall be twenty (20) feet. The foregoing amendment will be presented for adoption at the next regular council meeting, Monday, October 21, 1957 at the City Hall, City of Northville.

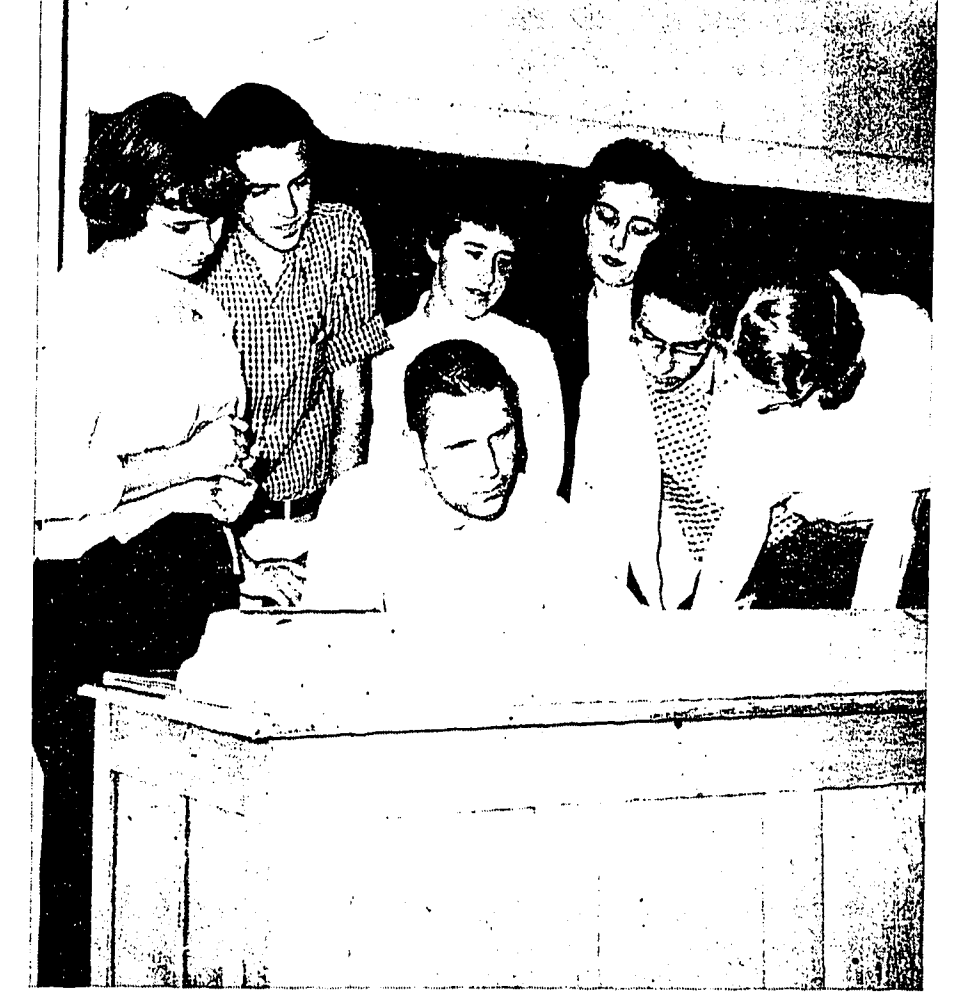

New Laws for Safety

HIGHWAY SAFETY EXPERTS are digging deeper reasons why people die in automobile accidents. They will present new ideas to the Michigan legislature in the latest of a series of bills that have changed the nature of motoring in Michigan in the past three years.

Highways are designed with the safety factor in the blueprint. They are designed with median strips, banked curves and fewer entry points.

Automobile manufacturers stress deep dish steering wheel and safety features.

Now, the experts are tackling the remaining factor—the driver.

Drunk driving has for years been a serious cause behind the wheel. But police records show now that while a driver often cannot be considered intoxicated under legal standards, his reactions after several drinks are slowed. He is a poorer driver.

The State Safety Commission is making a study of the problem of drinking drivers at the request of Secretary of State James M. Hars, Jr.

Hars' alarm at the potential hazard of the drinking driver was stirred by a one-man field study—in a tavern.

But when Democrats gathered in a caucus to discuss the matter, Hars was again asked for government action.

Babson Park, Mass.—Some day the Magic Circle instead of our great Central West will blossom like a rose. That is why it is called the "Magic Circle". This includes the six states of Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Oklahoma and Arkansas, which have a total area of about 400,000 square miles.

Why Called The Magic Circle? Because the area has the potential of being the breadbasket of the entire United States. It has good soil, much sunshine, and in some years, plenty of rain. Unfortunately, however, it has very dry periods for some years, and then a deluge which takes away good topsoil and does other harm.

Plans should immediately be made and negotiations started. We should not wait until we are in dire need of the food from the nation's breadbasket. Those who own land which will some day be irrigated by these Canadian waters should retain their land and perhaps buy more. A Federal authority will someday be organized to build the new river; the bonds of which should easily be paid off by "tolls" on the increased crops. Today we have a surplus of certain crops which we are storing; but this situation will soon change because of population growth and export demand.

Work of John W. Fowler, Jr., Homewood, Alabama, deserves the credit for this idea although it is only a portion of his grand plan. He believes that the United States Government completes its proposed national highways and toll roads for automobiles, it will immediately start on a similar program for water. Mr. Fowler believes that the water of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River should be carried to the Atlantic Ocean, here the water is not only wanted, but dangerous seas are created which affect ocean navigation and the climate of various regions.

Some day an artificial river will be constructed from these lakes across the Canadian line southerly to the very Center of the United States. This "center" will be near Greenwood County, of which Eureka, Kansas, is the hub. From Eureka, canals will radiate in different directions to provide water for all sections of the Magic Circle.

My Personal Investments
I am interested in the woodlands of New Hampshire; in Lakeland, Fla.; in Florida; and in land in Wellesley, Mass.; but the only pasture land which interests me is in the Magic Circle. I have bought such land because I believe that some day an artificial river will be constructed to utilize the surplus water by sending it southward.
