A baseball team to win must be "strong down the middle". Are there any positions which are more important than others in football? Why not drop-kick your extra points. Aren't place kicks too hard

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





Novi Stayed Rural In Booming 1800's

history of Novi township, originally written as a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield high school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village.)

RURAL MARM PATTERN TO 1870 The growth of railroads east of the Mississippi and west of the Alleghanies after 1850 helped Michigan grow to a population of more than 1,000,000 by 1870. But much of the state's growth was in the north, where the lumber and mining industries were booming. Population

in Oakland county actually leveled off, and Novi even lost about 150 persons. The first railroad in Novi township, connecting Monroe and Flint in 1870, brought about the construction of a steam operated saw mill in 1877, but even with this, population remained unchanged.

Thus in Novi, unlike much of the midwest where commerce and population were booming, the growth pattern through 1870 evolved primarily around the needs of a small rural farm population. At first, the frontier farmers of Novi were attracted toward Farmington where in 1825, a blacksmith shop was es-

tablished. A saw mill followed in 1826, and in 1827 a grist mill was built on the Shiawassee Trail (10 Mile road). Then, as settlers moved farther west in the township, a road was built connecting Walled Lake to Northville, AL FARMINGTON: 6 SHIPLING where a grist mill was completed in 1828.

The first establishment in the township proper was a blacksmith's shop opened in 1829 at the crossroads of the Shiawassee Trail and the Northville road, a year later it expanded to include a saw

known as the Shiawassee Trail and the Grand River country. During the same year, two taverns were established on the northeast and southwest corners of Grand River and Novi road. In time the tavern on the southwest corner proved most successful both as a stopover for stage travelers and as the site of township meetings begin-For the next 40 years, Novi Corners, as this intersection

came to be known, was unchallenged as the central place for Novi township. The crossroads - only three-eights of a mile from the center of the township - developed two churches, a school, a post office, town hall, hotel, two general stores, a millivery, three blacksmiths, a wagon shop, and a cooperage.

The year 1870 was significant in that a station of the Flint and Pere Marquette Railroad was established not only

in Novi Corners, but also in Wixom. By 1877, Wixom establishments included the roalroad station, a warehouse, a foundry, a post office, a hotel, and merchant shops. Here then, was the second central place in Novi township - and like the first, it supplied the needs of a predom-


