





# oung Auto Industry Meant Little to Novi

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles on the bistory of Novi township, originally written as a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield high school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village.) \* \* \*

THE RISE OF THE AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY Between 1870 and 1910, Michigan continued its growth, but Oakland county and Novi township population remain

ed about the same. Michigan's growth at this time is, of course, reflected mainly in the development of the automobile industry ir Detroit. During this early stage, the development of the automobile had little direct effect on the rural farm population of Oakland county or Novi, other than as it related to crop and livestock production.

During the next period from 1910 to 1930, the automohile industry expanded from its core in Detroit proper. For example, the Ford Motor company moved from its first site on Mack avenue in Detroit to Highland Park (1908) and shortly after to the Rouge plant in Dearborn. Supplier plants and related business enterprises also increased in the larger area in response to greater automotive production.

The first paved road joining Detroit and Pontiac was completed in 1916. Grand River and the other main arterial roads were similarly improved by the 1920's. Each improvement eventually reflected industrial expansion and population growth

In Oakland county, the population grew from about 49,000 in 1910 to over 211,000 in 1930. The general pattern of growth, however, was north toward Pontiac, and the population increase in western Novi township was only about 300 The township developed two other central places during this era.

First, the area surrounding Walled Lake became a summer recreational area for the Detroit and Pontiac areas. Summr cottages were built and the Dodge State Park now the Novi township park - was established on the lake. Although the park and many of the cottages were in Novi, ousiness centered in Walled Lake, a village at the junction of he Lake road and a road to Pontiac (now Michigan 218). Walled Lake village had been continually occupied since 1829 when an Indian trading post was established there,

The only gain to Novi proper was the addition of a dance pavilion which expanded to include an amusement park in 1929. Its location has remained at the intersection of Novi road and the Lake road.

The second center formed was Northville village, an area of about 40 acres, which adjoined the village of Northville. By 1930 then, Novi township had four central places -Novi Corners, Wixom, Walled Lake and Northville,





# World War Brought Industry Out to Novi

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth in a series of articles on the bistory of Novi township, originally written as a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield high school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village.) The time span from 1930 to 1950 brought Michigan's population to over six million and Oakland county's to almost 400,000. And finally, 100 years after the height of agricultural settlement in 1850, Novi township increased its population from 1,571 in 1930 to 4,086 in 1950.

The 1930's - although population continued to grow in the state, county and township - actually was a contracted period by comparison with the 1920's when industrial production was high. The most important growth, of course, resulted from increased productivity in the Detroit region during and after World War II. Industrial growth not only intensified in Oakland county north of the Detroit core, but also expanded westerly.

Novi's growth during this period was slow because of its westerly position, but it meant the beginning of the end for extensive rural agriculture in the township. The number of farms decreased, and the number of full time farmers today is estimated at only 10 to 15.

Small industrial plants, on the other hand, increased from five in the '30's to 12 in the '40's, usually producing small parts for primary industrial firms.

The war years brought military production and consequent higher production, likely with cost-plus contracts. The post-war period has returned cost competitiveness, but all plants have survived, though some with a reduced labor force.

All again produce small parts and machine tools. The war years created a housing shortage throughout the Detroit metropolitan region, and consequently increased the number of Novi residences, especially in Walled Lake area where many summer cottages of the 1920's were converted into year around dwellings.
