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Michigan Mirror Industry Likes it Here

MICHIGAN'S INDUSTRIAL climate which has been kicked around often and hard between Democrats and Republicans when discussing the state tax structure, finally felt the warming glow of favorable light. The state of Oklahoma, which is carrying on an active campaign to interest new industry to locate there, wrote three letters to plants all over the country. Dan C. Weeks, director of the Michigan Department of Economic Development, recently heard from an Oklahoma official that Michigan industrialists show "outstanding loyalty to their state."

The Carrington Agency supplied Northville schools. The project has started to make school children aware of fire hazards in the home and point them out to parents.

They have long been sympathetic, but until now nothing has been done. Sid Frid, member of the Oakland county board of supervisors, has also kept the matter constantly before county officials. It bears added importance to the city at this time because of the pending annexation election. Warren Products officials have indicated they'll fight the election if the tax inequities remain.

Young Auto Industry Meant Little to Novi

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles on the history of Novi township, originally written at a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield high school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village.)

THE RISE OF THE AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Between 1870 and 1910, Michigan continued its growth, but Oakland county and Novi township population remained about the same. Michigan's growth at this time is, of course, reflected mainly in the development of the automobile industry in Detroit. During this early stage, the development of the automobile had little direct effect on the rural farm population of Oakland county or Novi, other than as it related to crop and livestock production.

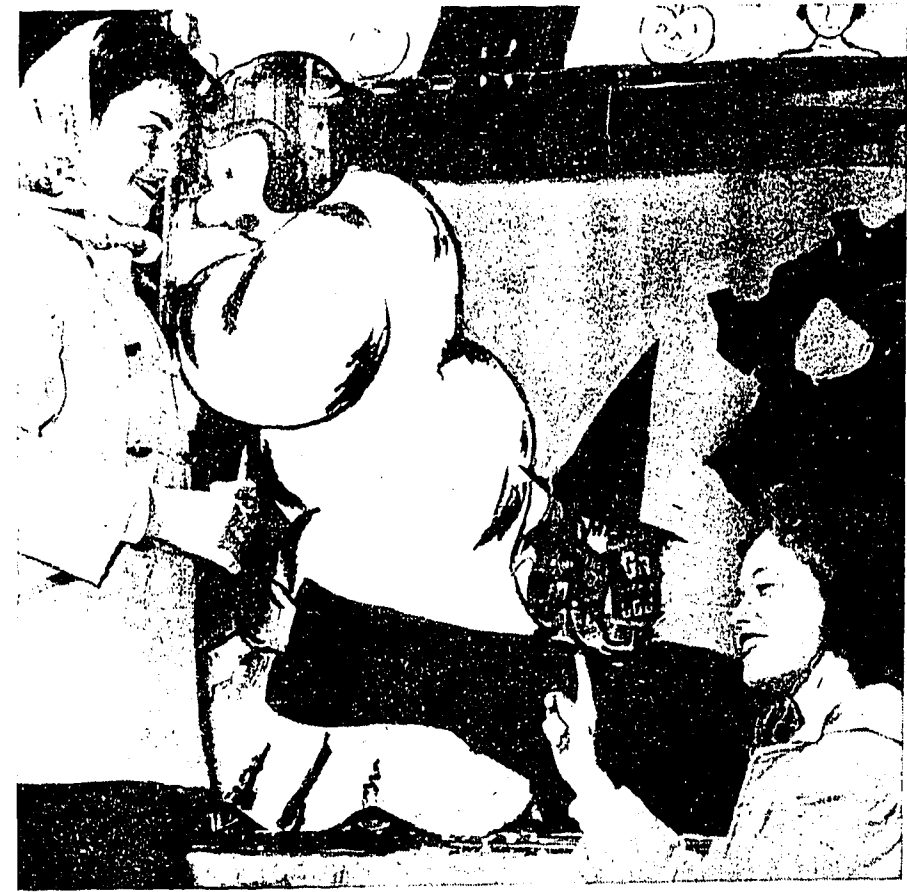

4 Crucial Plays Save Mustangs

Last-Minute Rally Fails For Milford

If it hadn't been for four decisive plays Friday night, the Northville Mustangs this week might have been licking their wounds from sitting on top of the Wayne-Oakland league with an unbeaten record. The four plays — had they gone another way — could have left Northville on the losing end of a 21-14 score against Milford.

As it was, the Mustangs hung on at the last minute to pull a 20-14 win out of the fire and get past the first major stumbling block in the path to the league title.

The four plays that gave Northville the win:

—In the second quarter, Northville halfback Dick Bieri brought down a goal-bound Milford ball-carrier after he had taken a pass and scumpled 20 yards.

—In the third quarter, Bieri intercepted a pass and went 73 yards for a touchdown with the best display of downfield blocking yet shown by the Mustangs.

—In the same period, quarterback Pete Gross hit Bieri and end Bill Yahnke with two successive passes for a total of 54 yards to move the Mustangs to the Milford 16-yard line, where they scored two plays later.

If statistics alone counted, Milford should have won in a walk. The Redskins led Northville in first downs (14-4), rushing (150-33), passing (44-0) and total offense (209-149) and held Northville to 60 total yards in the entire second half.

In addition, they stopped Northville's speedster Cole, allowing Bieri only 23 yards from scrimmage, and letting halfback Bob Starnes pick up a meager 5 yards.

Fullback Spike Walker, with 59 yards in 13 plays, and Gross, completing 4 of 9 passes, alone denied the Redskins armor.

Only Milford's inability to jell an attack for the first three quarters saved Northville. Despite drives of 20, 33, 48 and 43 yards, the Redskins entered the fourth quarter, behind 20-14.

Then, with quarterback Pat Kelley hitting on 5 of 8 passes and back John Zaeman and end Bill Yahnke eating up yardage, Milford made a shambles of the Mustangs, both defensively and offensively. BLESSED ARE THE PURE OF HEART
Children are rarely guilty of religious and racial prejudices. It is true that we sometimes see reflected in children the tensions, anxieties and prejudices of their elders. But fundamentally, it is always the adult who is guilty. Prejudice regards the spiritual growth of the individual as well as of his country.
The sermon on the Mount, especially the sixth benediction, should be a practical study and application for one who wishes to dispel his prejudices. "Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God." The richest goal that any of us can reach is the possession of God, but it is conditioned on the fact that we must be pure of heart and become as little children.
This benediction refers primarily to be pure and decent in thought, word and deed, but it also teaches us a habit of mind which concerns itself with the whole of life in the light of God's law. Purity of heart signifies more than morality and modesty. It consists of seeking God's glory and our neighbor's welfare. Purity of heart knows no duplicity of intention, prejudice of mind, nor hurtful action.
We are called "Blessed" by Christ if we are pure of heart, but greater still is the reward for this purity of intention and that is "to see God." "Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God."

State Factory Pay Tops

INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYEES' pay is higher in Michigan than anywhere else in the nation, according to a bureau of labor report referred to by Michigan Manufacturers Association.

Industries of this state are listed as having an average of \$94.98 per week in 1956. Nevada ranks second with \$82.84. Montana third with \$81.36.

Workers in the east drew less. New Jersey workers had an average weekly wage of \$70.20; in Pennsylvania it was \$59.20; in New York, \$73.90.

Hourly wages paid in Michigan have reached a new high in the state. In Northville, the rate was \$2.23, while in Michigan the rate was \$2.23.

The governor's relentless drive for higher taxes upon industry plus the union's steady pressure for higher wages and shorter hours, says an MMA newsletter, are responsible for "the chilly business climate so discussed in Michigan".

In other instances MMA has pointed out that wage and tax costs, higher than competitors in other states, put Michigan manufacturers at a disadvantage when they place their products on the market.

NATURAL GAS to heat homes of Michigan and to power its industry remains a major road block to development and the fast-growing empire which markets it.

It had come to Michigan 20 years ago through the Pontiac Eastern Pipeline to Detroit. Now two more pipelines bring natural gas to the state's eastern and western coasts.

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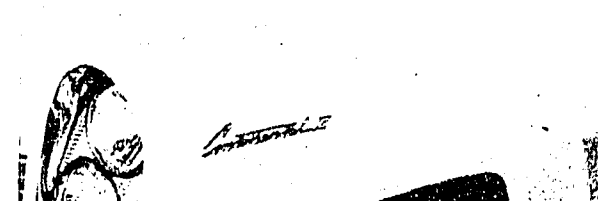
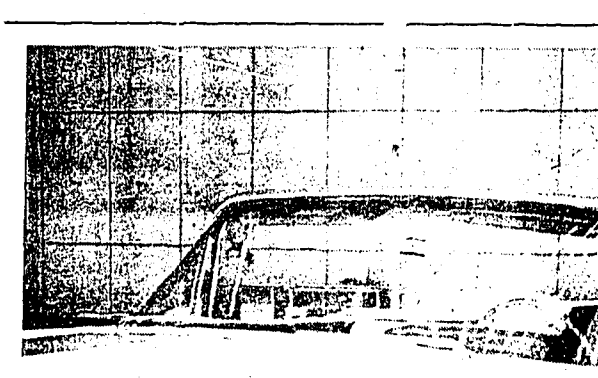
