

When it looks like a wide enough split, the Democrats test their votes where they will do the most good.

The Coleman group lost on a fight to raise the salary of Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner, from \$12,500 to only \$16,500 a year. After a fight the figure was fixed at \$18,000.

Whether the accumulation of minor setbacks means new leadership in the future will have to wait until next year, but it appears that Coleman's group has lost important majority votes.

LABOR LEADERS were shocked when Republican party bellwethers denounced a Republican-sponsored "right-to-work" bill.

They arrived at a public hearing, 500 strong, with speakers well-versed in opposing the legislation which they feared would outlaw the closed shop.

The bill would have given a man the right to work without joining a labor union "or any other association." Everybody recognized that it was aimed at the unions.

August Scholle, president of the Michigan CIO council, said the bill was "anti-labor" and charged that Republicans were "living up to their policy of being against the working man."

Others were cheered by the

packed gallery when they made similar statements.

The payoff came when Senator Robert E. Faulkner, Republican chairman of the Senate labor committee, read a letter from State Chairman John Felken. Bellowing, he denounced the bill and said:

"The 'right to work' bill is not Republican party policy. The Republican is not now and never has been in opposition to the working man."





Open Letter To Ford

Valve Plant Workers

This newspaper last week printed a letter from J. T. Stone, president of the UAW-CIO Local 896, on the subject of automation in the local Ford valve plant. Mr. Stone had apparently given considerable thought to the matter in which automation may affect the individual members of his union. He expressed the fear that Ford will require fewer workers in the future and that this will hurt Northville merchants.

We have heard other individuals—not employed by Ford—express similar concern and the matter appears to be assuming some importance locally.

Let us examine this subject of automation (installation of labor-saving machinery) and what its effect has been in the past. Possibly this may give Stone his answer for the future which he fears.

Biggest Automation Feat

Those readers who are old enough to remember when Henry Ford installed the first moving assembly line, or who may have read of that momentous event, are familiar with the biggest single automation feat in the automobile industry. It was the moving assembly line which gave Ford a much higher efficiency than his competitors, and permitted him to be the first manufacturer to lower the price of his cars within reach of the man who made them.

Automation has been going on since Men first invented the wheel, which made it possible for him to carry loads on rough cart tracks instead of on his back. The sailor who learned how to propel his ship by capturing the wind in the sails was following the same principle of automation which some of us fear today.

Another example is the farmer who now uses a gang plow to turn several furrows at once. When the writer was a kid, farmers plowed one furrow at a time, walking slowly behind a team of horses day after day.

Ford's Automation Plans

A more pertinent example, and the one Mr. Stone uses in pointing out what he believes to be the danger in automation, is the current installation in the Ford valve plant here of machinery which will enable one man to produce 3,500 valves per day as compared with 3,500 which he produced in 1947 on the machinery Ford had then.

We have not checked the accuracy of Mr. Stone's figures but

we assume they are correct. Such a gain in efficiency is outstanding. If it could be equalled by Ford and other automobile manufacturers on other parts all down the line, it would enable the industry to lower the price of its cars so much that the all-time production record which seems likely in 1955 would look like a depression figure. Fifteen million passenger cars per year would be a distinct possibility, and a employment would be even higher than it is now.

Or—if we look at it from the standpoint of Ford and other automobile industry employees only—such a great improvement in efficiency would enable the companies to go much farther than Ford. Mr. Stone has this year on the guaranteed annual wage. Not only this—they could pay higher wages, and work as many as 60 hours a week years ago before labor-saving machinery was developed to increase their efficiency.

Even rest assured that now, they were not able to earn enough to purchase the cheapest cars.

UAW Shares Automation Benefits

Twenty years ago this argument might have been contested. That was before the UAW-CIO had become the powerful bargaining force that it is today. Now, Walter Reuther is so familiar with the economic situation of Ford and the other companies that he would be quick to ask for labor's share of the constant improvement in efficiency. In fact, the "annual improvement factor" which was put into G. M.'s contract five years ago upon Reuther's insistence, and later accepted by industry generally, has given annual increases in pay as the workers' share of the industry's improving efficiency.

If Ford is installing more efficient machinery at Northville, we may rest assured that one of the reasons this is being done is to enable the company to maintain the efficiency necessary to meet the UAW-CIO's demands for higher wages and greater fringe benefits.

However, the improvement in efficiency which we are now calling automation, has been going on for years. Fortunately for all of us, it will continue just as long as the system of free competitive enterprise survives in our country.

Ford's Northville Employment

Mr. Stone is correct, of course, with whether the Northville plant is a net loss.

C.D. Mobile Rescue Unit Displayed at Novi Township Hall

Novi Township Civil Defense Praised By Oakland Director

Novi Township civil defense workers drew high praise from Oakland County Civil Defense Director Lewis Jarrendt during a special civil defense meeting Thursday night at the township hall.

Jarrendt said he was "very pleased with the efficient civil defense organization functioning in Novi Township under the direction of Ernest Pitchford, John Flannery, Kenneth Bassett, and their co-workers." He was "particularly impressed by the enthusiasm of the volunteer civil defense workers present at the meeting."

On display at the meeting was the \$9,000 mobile emergency rescue unit owned by the Oakland County civil defense organization and operated by the county road commission. The unit, which is kept at the road commission garage in Pontiac, is available day and night in case of emergency or disaster in the county.

Thirty-two road commission employees have been fully trained in the operation of the unit, according to Jarrendt.

The mobile unit is equipped to handle all types of emergencies and is outfitted with first aid supplies, stretchers, 15 top jacks, acetylene torches, gas masks, food rations, demolition equipment, tools, a resuscitator, and a 2-way radio unit. The unit also has a high-low speed axle for travel and is equipped with a 2-way radio unit. The unit is operated by Bassett, chief of the auxiliary CD police force.

After examining the rescue unit, the civil defense workers and officials viewed movies on civil defense communications which were shown through the courtesy of Michigan Bell Telephone.

Pitchford is chairman of the local civil defense organization and is assisted by Bassett, chief of the auxiliary CD police force. Any township residents interested in performing civil defense work as a public service to their community are urged to contact Lucas accompanied Celia Sharpe and Nobby Butten when they sang two duets. The speaker for township hall, according to Director John Flannery.


