A REPORT FROM THE CAPITOL

DEMOCRATS ARE GANGLING UP on Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler again.

Gov. Williams and his Democratic state administration board are bearing down on the Republicans who will administer Michigan's new \$55,000,000 a year road-building fund in tax boosts.

So, days after the motorists started paying 3 1/2 cents a gallon more for gasoline, Williams and his official staff asked Ziegler why he hadn't built any new roads yet.

Ziegler said a quirk in the Federal-state financing plan and collection of the tax increase specified quarterly instead of monthly payments, causing a two-month delay.

Williams said he was "disappointed" at the lack of progress. He was joined in the sniping attack by other Democrats.

"I'm not God, or any kind of his relatives," snapped Ziegler.

The Governor stated he will brook no unnecessary delays in getting the roads built under a program which was one of the biggest political and legislative issues in the state.

To get a head start, Ziegler has moved up a number of priority projects from 1956 to 1955.

He said other problems would be in the scarcity of enough concrete for a massive roadbuilding program. Steel and manpower are in short supply.

"We're in better shape than any other state," Ziegler said. "We will be able to start some of the major projects within two months."

Williams stated he has been "informally notified" that there is plenty of cement for the work.

The first big battle the harassed Ziegler and the Democrats ended with Williams insisting the highway department work faster and Ziegler saying it was doing the best it could.

Forces on both sides were withdrawn, but Williams has called another meeting for June 24.

HUCKSTERS HAVE BEEN CHASED out of the capitol and state office buildings by Controller James W. Miller signed an order forbidding sales of candy, magazines, knit goods, newspapers or magazines in state offices.

He said the order was "just a matter of good business" to prevent confusion in the offices and state employees from being solicited on the job.

For the first few days, the order stopped deliveries of newspapers, a tradition in the late afternoon. Pressed for an explanation, Miller said:

"The order says sales, not deliveries."



Automatic Clothes Dryer Approved

Experiments by Wayne university with clothes drying methods show that homemakers work less when they use an automatic clothes dryer.

Employing a photographic technique of time exposures and light tracings, Prof. Everett Phelps, physics department chairman, and Mrs. Frances Sanderson, home economics department chairman, studied the movements of a typical homemaker as she hung washing on the line and as she transferred laundry from washer to electric dryer.

Fewer tracings of light when the laundry was shifted from washer to electric dryer provided visual proof that clothes dryers reduce the amount of effort required.

Prof. Phelps also evaluated the two methods in scientific terms by computing the number of foot-pounds of work expended in hanging clothes on an outdoor line compared to the foot-pounds required to remove the same number of articles from washer to dryer.

He found that in a typical situation, hanging the laundry of an average family exacted 43,000 foot-pounds of work from the homemaker, transferring the same laundry from washer to dryer required only 1,000 foot-pounds.

It was noted during the experiments that the most fatiguing part of hanging wash outdoors is climbing the basement stairs with a basket of damp clothes.

The second hardest operation for the homemaker is straightening up after hanging over to pick damp clothes out of the basket.

Water Dep't Nets 4/5ths of 1% Profit

The Northville Water Department operated last year at a profit of \$1,412 on its investment of \$171,239, equal to a return of 4/5ths of 1 percent.

These results are almost identical with those of the previous year, when the department turned in a profit of \$1,323 on an investment of \$169,818, or four-fifths of one percent.





Dear Sir: In the May 5 issue of your paper, an item was published in the column "For the Record" about the policy of the Aetna Life Insurance Company in handling overdue premium payments.
