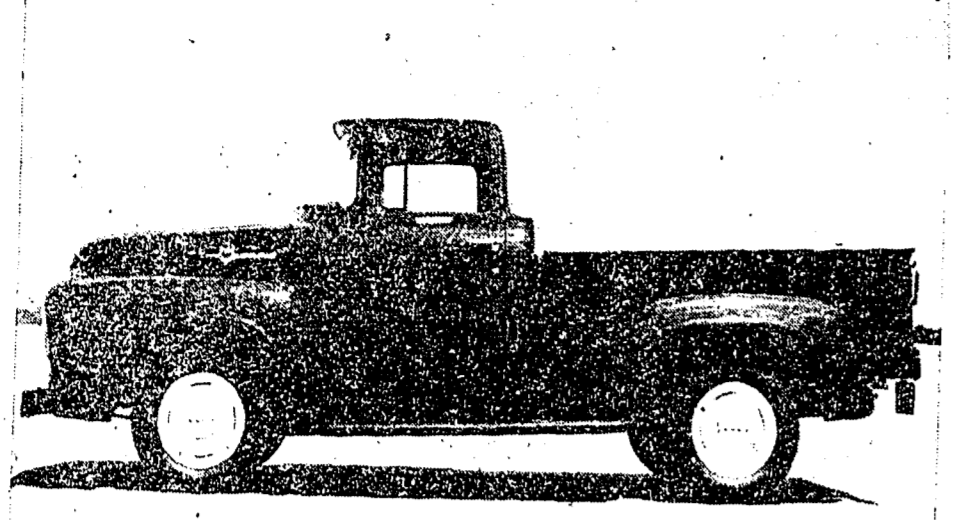

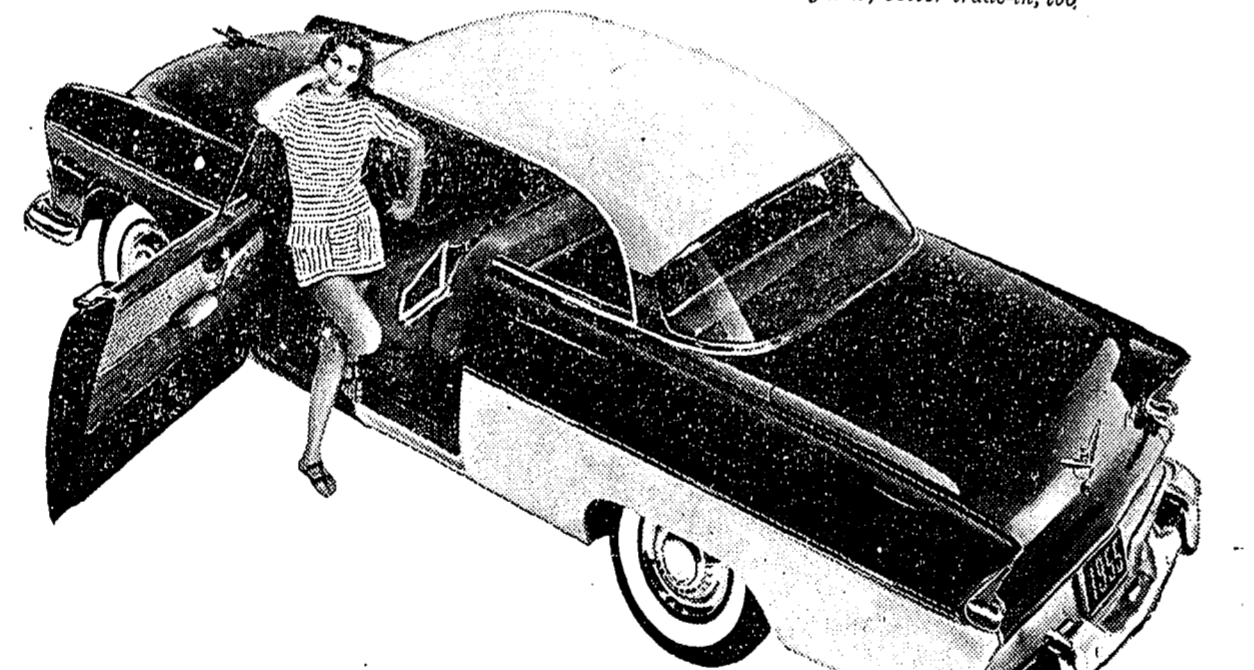

for the Record

Northville is to be congratulated on the civic mindedness of those city and township residents who are joining together as the Adult Education-Community Study Group to analyze and discuss present and future community problems.

The group is an outgrowth of the course in community development which was conducted here last winter through the cooperation of the Ford Foundation and the Community Adult Education Department of the University of Michigan. Without any official status, but with a membership of 25 men and women who were sufficiently interested in the various problems which confront the Northville community to devote many hours to their analysis and possible means of solving them, the project was among the most worthy carried on here last year.

Because there seems to be a need for continuing study to enlighten the citizenry at large, the group has been reactivated this month under the leadership of John S. Canterbury as president. Membership for the 1955-56 year is open to anyone in the area who is interested in community affairs and community problems. Meetings are to be held in the Community Building the first Tuesday of every month. Anyone who attends regularly and is willing to take part in the various study projects will be richly rewarded by a better understanding of the problems that confront the Northville community. Out of such a study can develop an informed public opinion that can go a long way toward intelligent solution of problems that will arise from year to year.

For many years we have been prone to squelch those who disagree with our opinion by quoting some familiar adage like "All's Fair in Love or War", "Honesty Is the Best Policy" or "A Fool and His Money Are Soon Parted". The number of such sayings is legion, and we've used most of them at one time or another to put an effective end to controversy that could be settled by words alone.

Until now we've never given much thought to whether such sayings were correct or not. We just assumed that whoever thought them up in the first place must have known what he was talking about.

Now, however, we are beginning to wonder if we may not have been wrong all these years. This disquieting fear comes as a result of the efforts of the Ford Motor Co. to acquire two farms for a right-of-way on which to build a side-track to the proposed Lincoln plant from its main line between Novi and Wilcox. It seems the owners of these two farms have held them so many years that they can't bear to part with them for sentimental reasons; there are reports that only a half million dollars for each farm will assuage the sorrow that will be caused by transferring title to the automobile company.

Here then, is a situation which casts grave doubt on the truth of the adage about there being no sentiment in business. And if this doubt be well founded, what about the other sayings that we have been so fond of quoting in the past? Are they, perhaps, also subject to questioning? Must we try in the future to win our arguments without benefit of plagiarizing the words of wisdom of some forgotten seer?

Like many another weighty problem, the answer lies in the future. Only time, and the final result of Ford's effort to buy the right-of-way will tell us how much sentiment is to be found in business.

Pvt. David Boyd Finishes Army Course

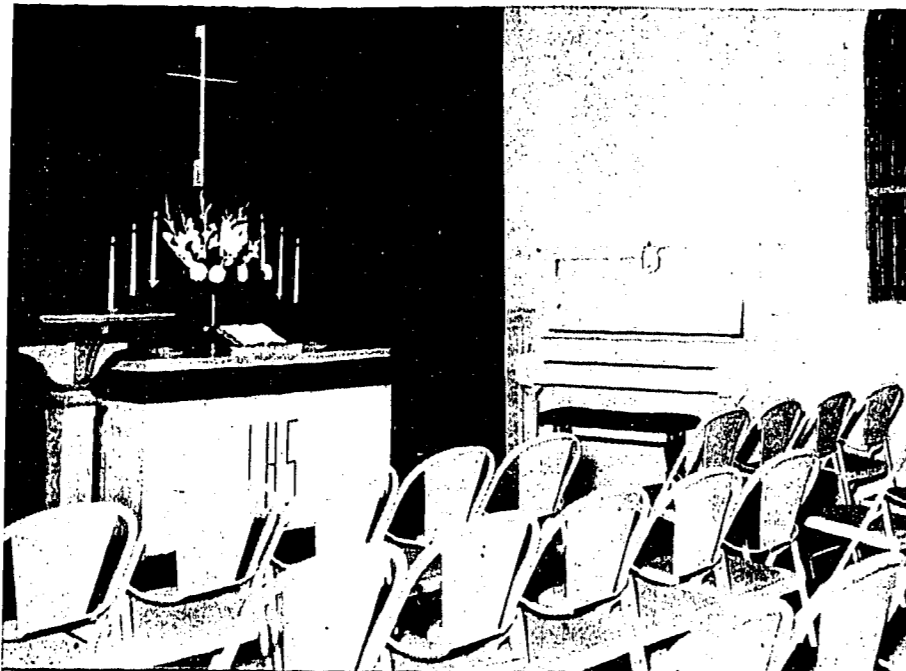

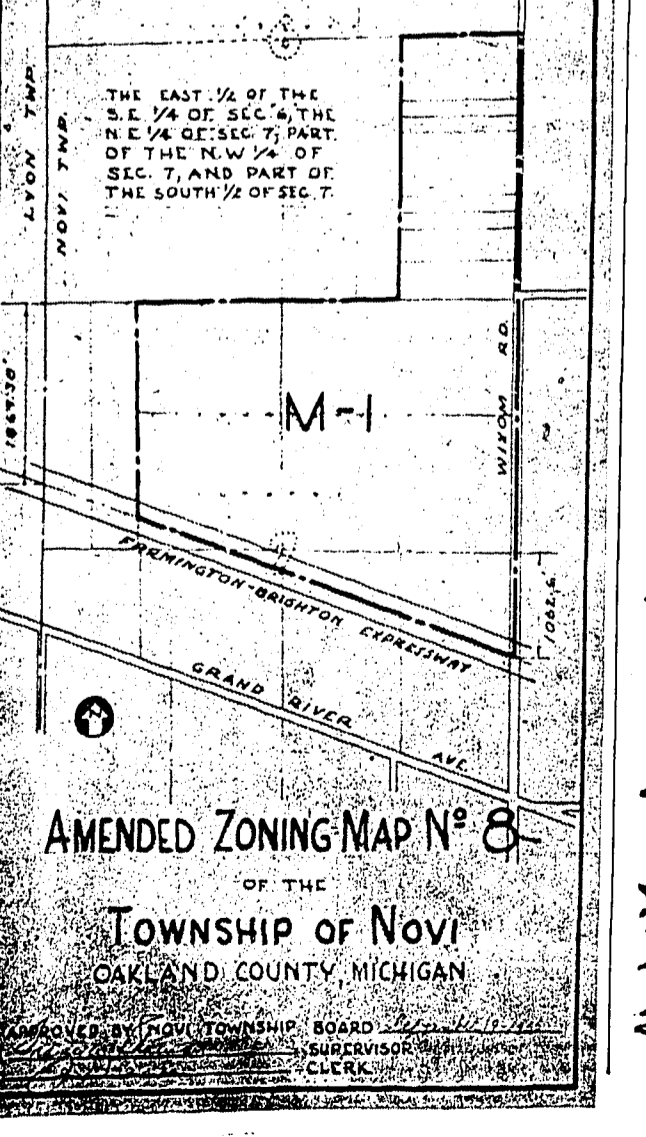

Police Program

Ely's recommendations for the police department were the unanimous approval of the full city commission. They were: 1. An immediate increase of \$400 per year for all members of the police force, to bring yearly salaries to \$4,725 for patrolmen, \$4,225 for Sgt. Gil Glasson and \$5,225 for Chief Joseph Denton.

Reasons for Opposition

Names of four private individuals for the committee were proposed by Commissioner Allen and Reed, the two-man committee appointed by Ely two weeks ago. A maximum allowance of \$75 per year per man for replacement of any part of the uniform.

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
