The bird houses will be entries in the contest sponsored by the Garden Club. Prizes of money and ribbons will be awarded for the best houses.

The junior high entries are judged according to the Detroit News bird house specifications. Cub Scout entries are judged on merit alone.

The judges are Ed Mollema and Oneida Quinlan, teachers at the Northville High School. The subject and are quite well versed on bird house specifications.

The "guiding light" in this contest, according to members, is Bill Reimer, industrial artist and teacher, whose enthusiasm for this program has been very contagious and has resulted in approximately 50 entries from the junior high students.

Spring Is In The Air Birds Sighted In Town

If you believe that birds are any indication of the coming of spring then shout "hooray" dear reader, because spring is in the air.

During the past week many people have reported seeing robins and other birds in town. A few of the more unusual reports follow:

Red Crossbills
Residents of Northville and the surrounding area who are interested in bird migration were given a rare treat Sunday. A pair of red crossbills came to the feeding station of Mr. and Mrs. George Hill on W. 7-Mile Rd.

The crossbill is named for its peculiar bill which looks like a deformity. The top part of the bill is crossed over the lower bill at the tip. This enables the bird to insert its bill into the side of the pine cones, to get the seeds, he opens his bill and tears the cone scales at the base.

The chief diet of the crossbill consists of pine cone seeds, but they are wanderers and are rarely seen in this area.

Crocus In Bloom
Despite a driveway of solid ice last Thursday, Mar. 1, six crocuses were in full bloom in the Glenn Cummings' yard on 6-Mile Rd.

Red Winged Blackbirds
Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Masson, on 7-Mile Rd., sighted the first red winged blackbirds beyond their orchard last week. The meadow lark's song could be heard there a week ago.

Oriole Sighted
Mrs. Harry Duerson and Mrs. James Huff saw an oriole Monday morning on top of the big elm tree on Dunlap St. The bird's songing attracted Mrs. Duerson's attention and she identified it after observing it through her field glasses.

\$1,754 Goal Easter Seal Campaign To Start March 10

A goal of \$1,754 was announced today by Easter Seal Chairman Roy Stone, as he launched the 1956 mailing campaign for funds for crippled children to be raised during the annual Easter Seal drive which officially opens Saturday, Mar. 10, and continues through Apr. 10.

"Approximately 3250 appeal letters containing sheets of Easter Seals are being mailed to Northville residents," said Stone.

During the month-long drive centers will be placed in business establishments and a lively parade will be held in the shopping area of Northville Mar. 24 led by Mrs. Betty Willing as chairman.

Chairman Stone is being assisted in this annual appeal for crippled children funds by a committee of three Rotarians, J. F. Stokewell, Joe Revitzer and W. K. Belaso.

Northville is one of 22 communities in Western Wayne county which receives the services of the Wayne Out-County chapter, Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

A goal of \$40,000 is the aim of the Wayne Out-County chapter day at the Michigan State Fair Grounds from Mar. 17-25.

There will be 20 contest gardens built by professional landscapers in the "Elli Parade of Gardens". All will be practical gardens and speakers in each garden will provide music which will be played from a tape recording of the 20 musical numbers which have been selected. The public will judge these gardens as they did last year and the winner will receive a 1956 Dodge.

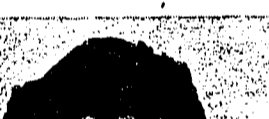

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Education of Northville Public Schools School District, Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, has called a special election to be held in said School District on Tuesday, March 20, 1956.

Section 532 of Chapter 8 of the Michigan School Code provides as follows:

"The inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides . . ."

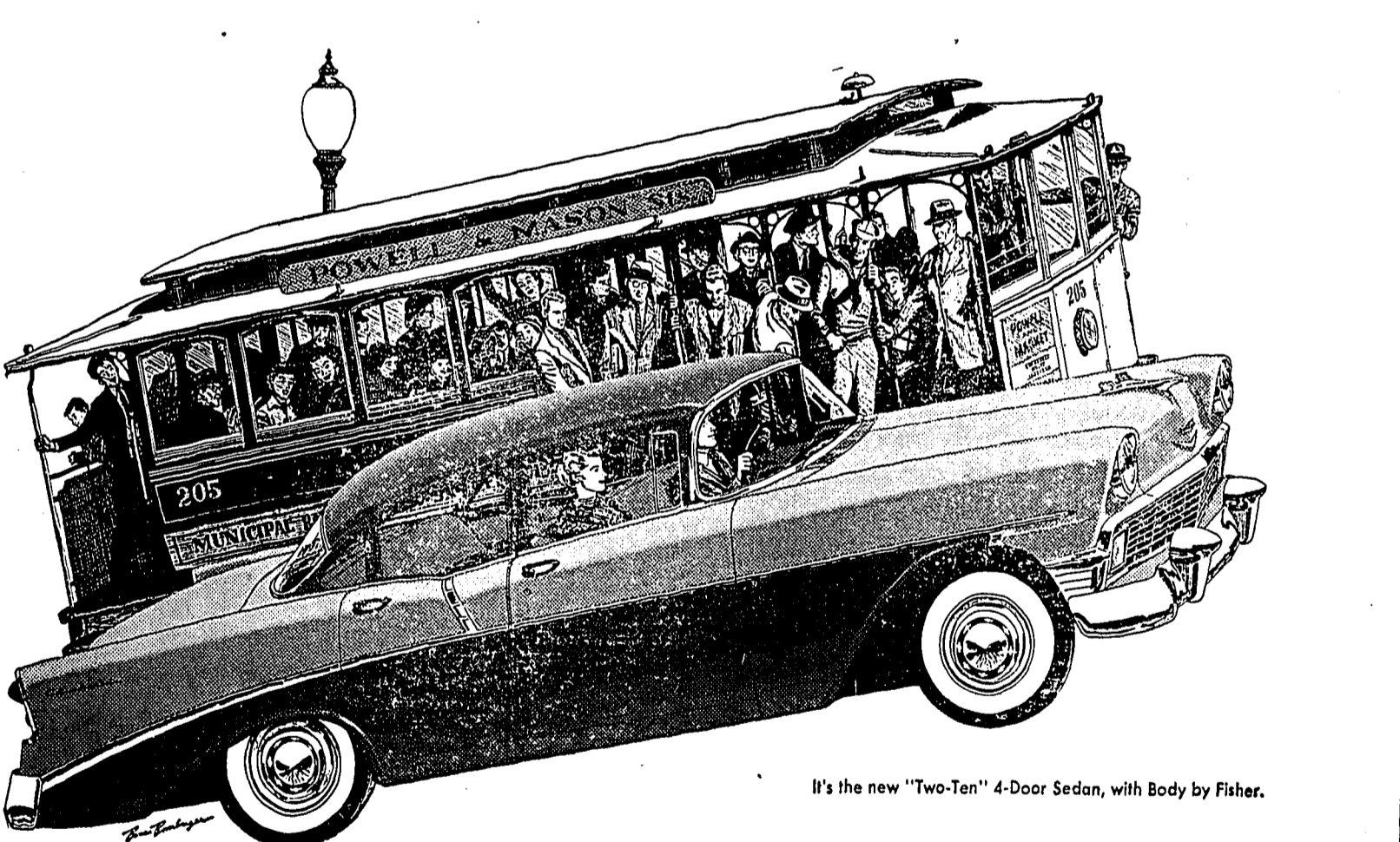
THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the appropriate Township Clerk or City Clerk in order to be eligible to vote at the Special Election called to be held on Tuesday, March 20, 1956, is Friday, March 9, 1956. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on the said Friday, March 9, 1956, are not eligible to vote at said Special School Election.

Under the provisions of the Michigan School Code, registrations will not be taken by school officials and only persons who have registered as general electors with the township clerk of the township in which they reside or the city clerk of the city in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with the township or city clerks must ascertain the days and hours on which the clerks' offices are open for registration.

THE FATHERHOOD OF GOD

The concept of the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God has been a common theme in the thinking of the social, political, and religious worlds. It is both a noble and dangerous thought. It is noble in that it puts no premium on race, class or nation, and puts tremendous responsibility on all of us for social action and justice. It is dangerous in that it cuts to shreds the Evangelical tenets of faith which assert that we become sons of God through personal belief in Jesus Christ. I almost shudder when I hear it spoken of so often with little thought of clarification on the part of the speaker or writer. There is little reason for confusion if one takes care to notice the distinction between the "Fatherhood of God" and the "Brotherhood of Man" as viewed in terms of the social solidarity of the race and the spiritual fraternity of those united by faith in Christ. This noble idea has been accepted by some and must be

PUBLICATION OF ORDINANCE No. 132

City of Northville

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE NECESSARY PROCEDURES FOR PURCHASE AND SALE OF CITY PROPERTY

The City of Northville Ordains:

SECTION 1. General Policy

- a. All purchases shall be evidenced by a purchase order signed by the Purchasing Officer.
- b. All sales of city property shall be evidenced by a written agreement or contract of sale.
- c. No sale or purchase shall be divided for the purpose of circumventing the dollar value limitations contained in this ordinance.

SECTION 2. Purchases: Limitations and Requirements

Respecting

- a. After award of a contract as hereinafter provided, the contract documents, together with the terms and conditions of the City and a labor and material bond running to the People of the State of Michigan and approved by the Board of Commissioners on or before the date of the award, shall be filed and ordered by the City Council.
- b. All purchases in excess of \$500.00 shall be authorized and ordered by the City Council.
- c. All of such purchases which do not exceed the sum of \$1,000.00 may be authorized and ordered by the City Council without the necessity of advertising for sealed competitive bids.
- d. Sealed bids shall be asked for in all transactions involving the expenditure of \$1,000.00 or more and the transaction evidenced by written contract submitted to and accepted by the Council; provided, however, that this requirement shall not extend to instances where the employment of professional services, and that they may be waived in instances where the Council, by unanimous consent, deems it to be clearly to the City's advantage to contract without competitive bidding.
- e. All open market purchases shall, wherever possible, be based on personal inspection of the goods to be purchased, which may be solicited by the Purchasing Officer via telephone or mail. The Purchasing Officer shall keep a record of all open market orders and the bids submitted in competition therefor, and such records shall also be open to public inspection.
- f. Purchases from public utilities with which the City has a franchise shall not be governed by this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Notices

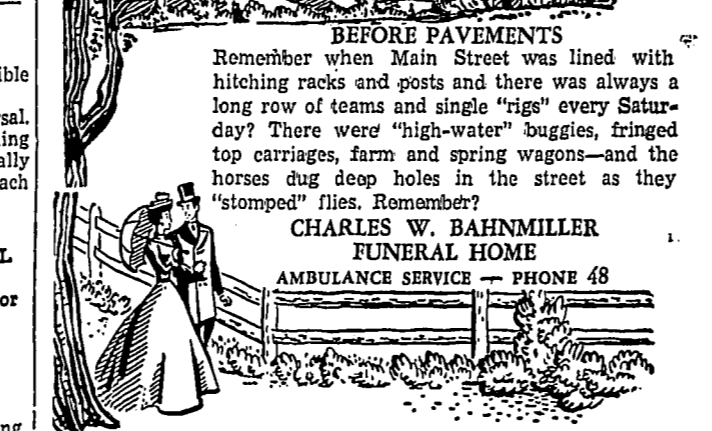
- a. Notices inviting sealed competitive bids shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the city or in appropriate trade publications at least four (4) calendar days prior to the final date for submitting bids.
- b. Such notice shall briefly designate the supplies, material or equipment desired, or the construction project to be undertaken, the amount of the bid bond (corporate surety cash, certified check or cashier's check) required, and the date, time and place of filing and opening of bids. The right shall be reserved to reject any or all bids, or parts thereof.
- c. The Purchasing Officer shall mail copies of the official notice to such qualified vendors or contractors as he may deem necessary to give actual notice to interested bidders and to obtain competitive bidding.

SECTION 4. Form of Bids

- a. Bids submitted in response to such notice shall be sealed and accompanied by the specified bid bond.
- b. Sealed bids shall be opened by the Council in public at the time and place specified in the official notice. After opening the bids the Council may review the same and act thereon, or may refer them to an appropriate city official or employee for tabulation and/or recommendation before being opened.
- c. Any competing bidder may examine the bids and the tabulation.

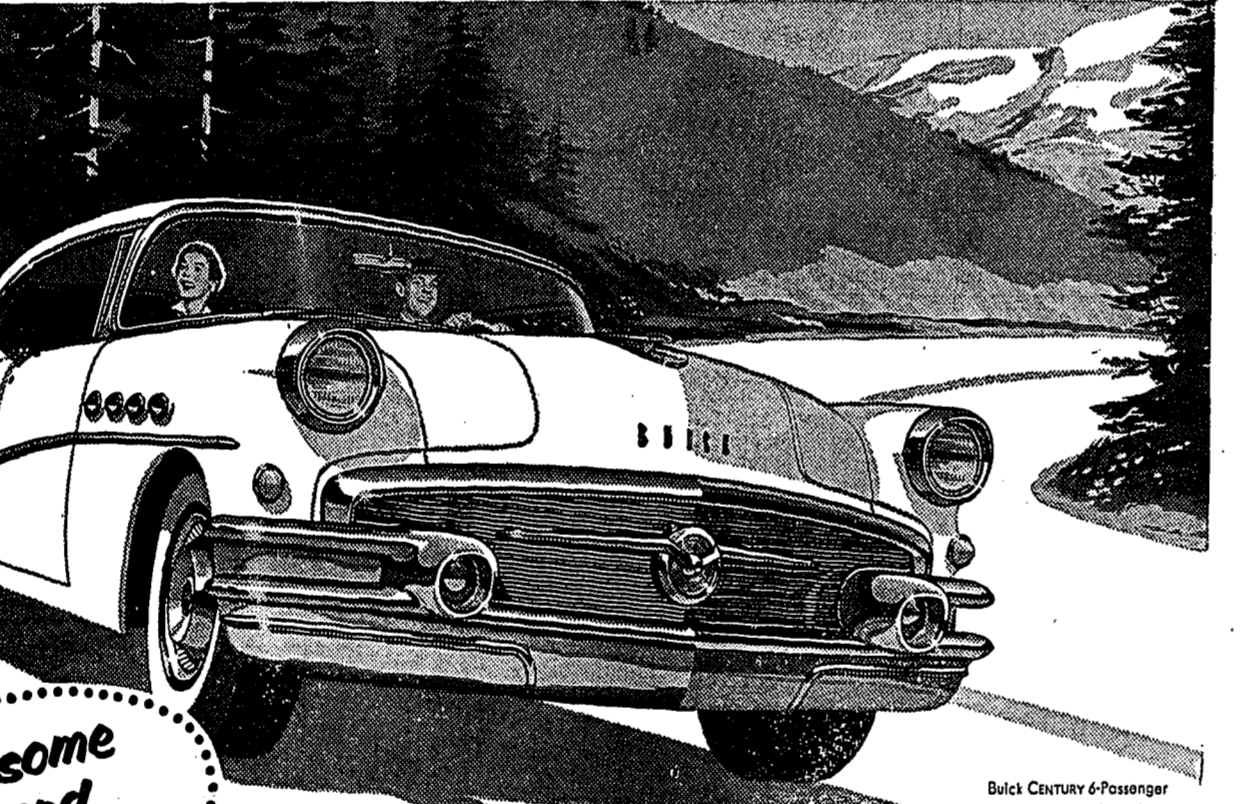

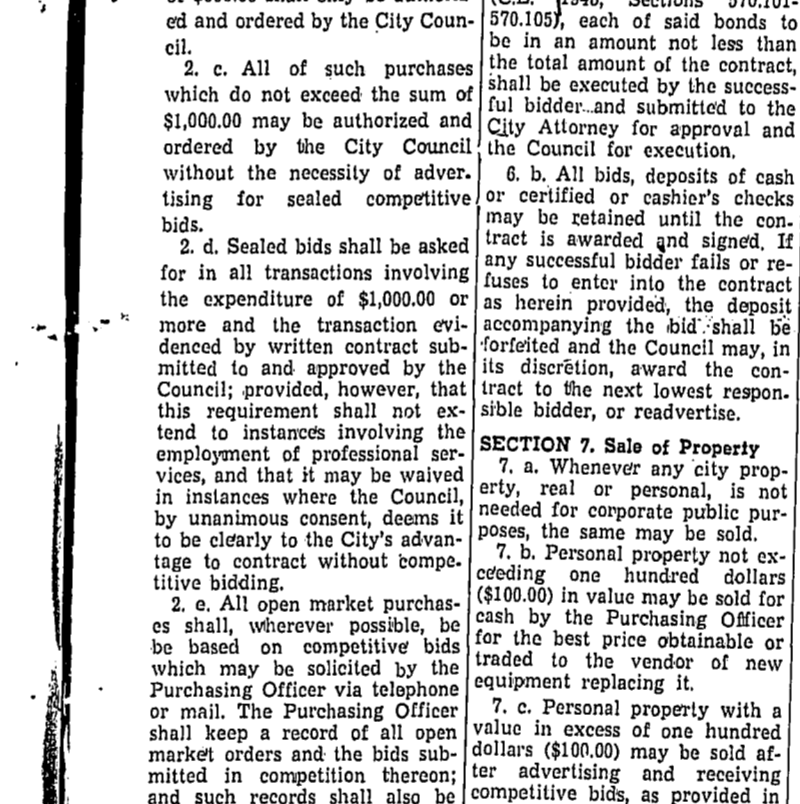

This is a noble concept and must be appreciated, yet there is a spiritual basis for Christian brotherhood. Many years ago I heard one of the outstanding preachers of the country express the idea of children of God like this—"the potential sons of God." In fairness to our Christian faith I should like to make several distinctions relating to our God our Father. Primarily, He is the God and Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Christ is uniquely His son, the "only begotten." Upon His first personal appearance He declares that He must be about His Father's business, and at the last commitment of His Spirit into the Father's hands, His filial consciousness was always preserved and unbroken.

Secondly, God is essentially "Our Father" in terms of the Lord's Prayer. Believers are sons of God through faith in Jesus and forms of worship. God is (Continued on Page 12)

at the bottom of the entire list in its minimum and maximum salaries.

Superintendent Armerman estimated that the increase will put Northville "approximately" in the PRESENT PAY RANGE of neighboring districts that are comparable without considering that in most instances these districts will be setting new and higher salary schedules for 1956-57.

The new pay schedule differs principally from the one suggested by the Teachers' Club in the amount of the annual increase. The teachers asked for a \$50 annual raise based on service whereas the scale agreed upon makes the increase \$200. This adds up to a \$400 increase maximum for eight year teachers.

The proposed committee is to consist of 10 members appointed by the P-TA, 10 by the board of education, some faculty representatives appointed by the Teachers' Club and two, and a couple high school students appointed by the Student Council. The committee would stay in existence 18 months and make quarterly reports to the board of education. Its functions will be entirely advisory in nature and its work will be financed by the board of education up to \$500.

Long Talk Precedes Agreement
The salary agreement between the board of education and the teachers' club was reached only after lengthy discussion between board members, administrative school personnel, teachers and the public. Board members Nelson Schrader and Earl Clark professed fear that if the voters are asked to approve a tax of 10 mills to cover operating costs they may turn down the bond issue that will be necessary to build a new high school. The district is being levying a special mill tax to cover operating expenses for the past five years. After the raise in pay had been unanimously agreed

For Teachers SCHOOL BOARD OK'S SALARY INCREASE

City To Buy 4 Voting Machines

A motion was made and passed at the city council meeting Monday evening to purchase four electronic voting machines. The machines, which are made by the Shoup Voting Machine Corp., will cost a total of \$6,692 and will be paid over a five year period. Councilmen Reed and Stuenkel were appointed by Mayor Ely to arrange for the purchase. The council said that the machines would not arrive in time to be available for the school election.

Councilmen Canterbury and Stuenkel were delegated to consider storage quarters for the machines.

5 Yrs. To Pay \$6,692 Total

A tentative millage rate was presented by the city assessor, E. M. Bogart, and was given support by the council.

The newly passed charter allows the city to use up to 20 mills; however, Bogart said that it would be advantageous to use the lowest possible rate.

The council and Bogart agreed on a tentative 19.5 mill rate which would bring the city's tax to \$5,289.85. A 20 mill rate would make the total \$5,449.87.

The assessor's valuation of the city property was \$2,629,000. Oldwood subdivision is \$255,000, and residential property tax totals are \$1,479,900.

The board of review will be in the city hall Mar. 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to listen to any appeals from the taxpayers. Last year 11 people made an appearance.

Architect Named For Proposed High School

The Northville Board of Education voted pay raises this week for local teachers ranging from 15% for those with eight years teaching experience to 25% for beginners without experience. It also:

Named Eberle M. Smith as architect for the proposed new high school;

Approved in principle the formation of a new curriculum study committee recommended by Superintendent R.H. Armerman;

Decided to ask voters to approve a levy of 10 mills for ten years to help defray school operating expenses.

Twp. Board Passes Trailer Park Ord.

The Northville township board passed an amendment to the existing zoning ordinances, creating a new district, R3 Mobile Home District, and establishing a new use within the commercial district.

The amendment will provide for the building of trailer parks, motels and motor courts in the commercial districts.

Prior to the board's approval the amendment was submitted to the township zoning board and its members voted in favor of the ordinance. Both gave their approval.

Police Calls Drop But Fines Are Up

Northville police calls continue to take a drop as the current February report by Chief Joseph Denton indicated, but the total fines collected are higher than the 1955 amount.

Northville police answered 72 calls during February this year as compared with 85 calls last year, but they collected \$814 this year as compared with \$595 last year.

"You Get What You Pay For" Says P-TA Millage Committee

Why is school tax levying necessary?

The P-TA publicity committee on millage answered that question in a release to the Record this week. The answer, according to them is:

"For the past five years, your school taxes have included a special six mill levy passed by the voters of the Northville School District in 1951. This special levy has expired. The Board of Education asks that this six mill levy be renewed and that an additional four mills be granted to meet the financial needs of a growing system.

"These teachers will be hard to replace because of the competition for good, qualified teachers necessary to continue the instructional program and services now in existence, to provide five new teachers to take care of increased enrollment, and to provide a more adequate salary schedule.

"The teachers of Northville operate under the lowest pay scale of any school system in this area. This situation is responsible for the loss of capable teachers. It is possible that capable teachers will leave our system unless an adequate salary scale is granted.

"These teachers will be hard to replace because of the competition for good, qualified teachers necessary to continue the instructional program and services now in existence, to provide five new teachers to take care of increased enrollment, and to provide a more adequate salary schedule.

Background of the new salary schedule was afforded by a study of comparative starting and maximum salaries for 42 cities and villages in the southeastern Michigan area. This study was given to the board of education by the professional problems committee of the Northville Teachers' Club, co-chairedman by LeGone Quay and Ron Schipper. It showed Northville (Continued on Page 10)

2,000 New Employees By '58

Burroughs Corporation will begin construction this spring on a new 204,000 square foot addition to its Plymouth division plant facilities. It was announced today by John S. Cotnam, president.

The new one-story building will increase the size of the Plymouth division plant to 840,000 square feet, or 19 acres of manufacturing area.

"The new plant is needed to provide manufacturing and assembly space for expanding product lines," Mr. Cotnam said. "It is scheduled for completion during the first quarter of 1957, and the present economic trends continue, it is expected that by 1958 an additional 2,000 employees will be required to man it."

There are 3,500 men and women presently employed at the Plymouth division.

This will be the third expansion of the corporation's Plymouth plant since 1950. In that year a one-story 150,000 square foot addition was built and another plant of the same size was added in 1952. The new building will be similar to these two plants.

The other Plymouth division plants consist of a five-story main building, power house and a 100,000 foot warehouse. Burroughs occupied its first plant in Plymouth in 1938 when the five-story main structure and power house, facing the Plymouth Rd. were completed. These two buildings were designed by Albert Kahn, the multiple

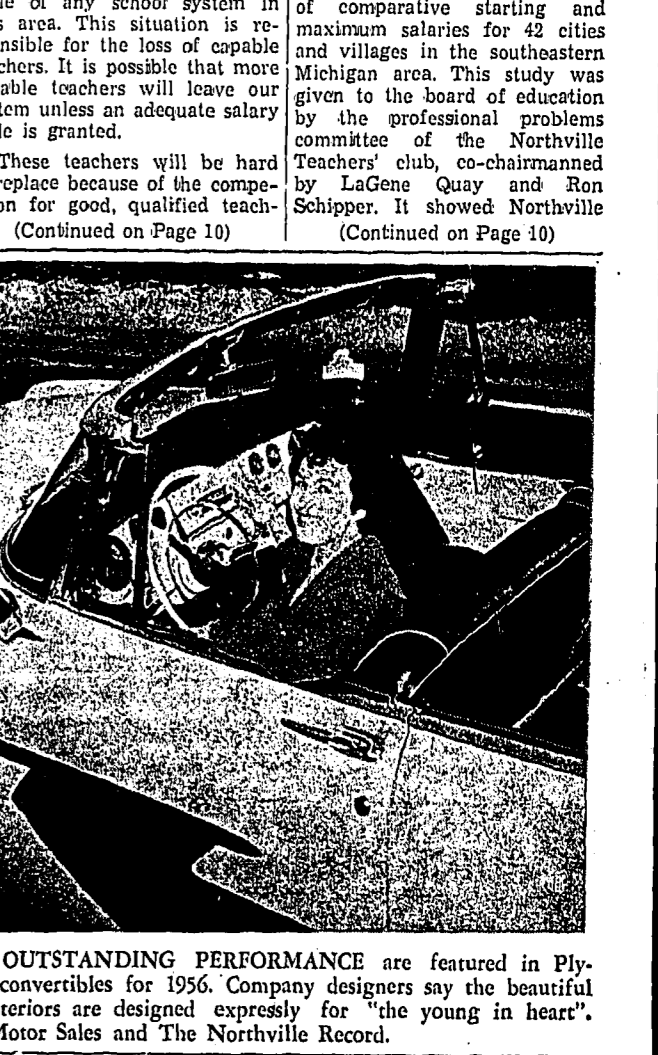

structure was patterned essentially after the Burroughs main plant in Detroit. The new buildings added in 1950 and 1952 are one-story plants to facilitate new concepts of manufacturing.

Before World War II and for some time afterwards the Plymouth division was devoted to the manufacture of a variety of the company's products including the cast registering machine, calculator, office chairs and supplies and defense products. During World War II the plant was changed almost exclusively to the manufacture of the famed Norden bomb sight.

In 1949 the plant took over production of the sensitive accounting machine, which it has been producing ever since.

Visiting Teacher Serves Community

Mrs. Moore Assists Parents, Children, School Personnel

140 V.T.'s in Mich.; School Systems Want To Hire More, But Demand Exceeds Supply

Many Northville residents are not aware of the many special services offered by the Northville school system. One in particular, the visiting teacher, is not often brought to the attention of the public due perhaps, to the intensity of her work, and the time element.

The visiting teacher for the Northville school system is Mrs. Alta F. Moore, from Wayne County Board of Education. She is one of 140 visiting teachers in Michigan and serves in the Melvindale, Dearborn Township, Main-kin Township, Livonia, Northville area schools.

The purpose of her work is manifold, but her main job is to help these children who are having difficulties in adjusting to school situations before the problem becomes of a serious nature, thus carrying on a preventive type of program and working with parents, teacher and child.

Not everyone has the opportunity to become acquainted with Mrs. Moore, but those who do have the pleasure of knowing a charming woman who possesses capabilities and drive far beyond those of the average woman. By her own words she admits that she enjoys her work, and her words are proven by her deeds.

Gives Time Freely
Mrs. Moore gives her time freely to PTA groups and parent study groups; she projects mental hygiene films at various gen-

and the Michigan Education Assn., serving on various committees locally and nationally. She is also a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, a national honorary society for women educators, and at the present time program chairman.

Everyone Works Together
The children are brought to the attention of Mrs. Moore, through the classroom teacher, through the

parent with brothers and sisters, cousins, and neighborhood children in terms of intellectual achievement and acquisition of skills and social graces to their great disadvantage.

Individual conferences with parents and teachers by the visiting teacher help them to understand why children behaved as they did and how the reaction of adults to this behavior either aggravated or alleviated the situation. Adults vary in the degree of strength which they have in handling children's problems. The more strength and acceptance they have, the easier it is for the visiting teacher to help them. This sometimes involves a long period of time and frequent interviews.

Need for V.T. Great
Because of the volume of cases, only a few could be handled on an intensive basis. It is second necessary to extend the visiting teacher service to greater numbers so that the simpler problems could be eliminated before they reached a crisis.

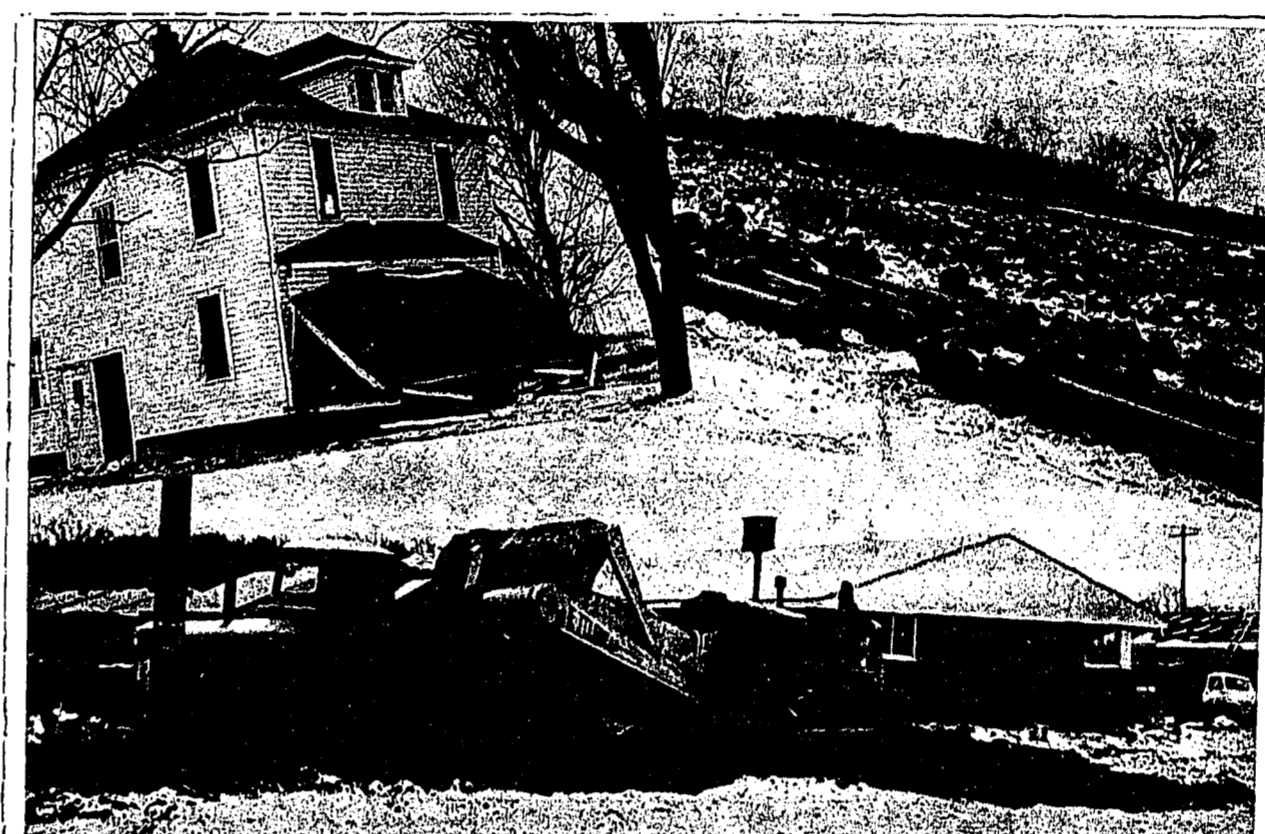
