State OK's Novi School Consolidation

Meeting To Be Held Friday, March 24

New Petitions To Be Circulated In Area Calling for Special Consolidation Vote

Consolidation of the four Novi school districts moved a step closer to reality this week. William Melnyk, superintendent of Novi District No. 8 received written notification that approval of the organization of a fourth class consolidated school district had been granted by Clair L. Taylor, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The proposed 4th class school district would presumably include the East Novi, Putnam and Durfee districts, in addition to Novi District No. 8. Having secured the approval of the state, the backers of consolidation are again preparing to circulate petitions which will require signatures of a majority of the voters in each area.

Following submission of these new petitions, a special election on the consolidation question will be called.

"The procedure to be followed is complex," Oakland County Supt. William Emerson announced, "I think it would be well if the petitioners, along with the boards of education affected, meet together for the purpose of discussing plans and procedures."

Emerson followed this with an announcement that such a meeting would be held Friday, Mar. 24, in the library of the Novi school at 6 p.m.

Three days for Tear Down

Novi Landmark Torn Down To Make Way For Used Car Lot

The old general store on the corner of Grand River and Novi Rd. was torn down this past week and in its place will be a used car lot.

A Novi landmark for many generations, the two story building was built almost 100 years ago and used as a general store until 1953.

Former Township Supervisor Frank Clark recalls the days when Josh McCrum ran the old general store in this building. H. H. Jones bought him out near the turn of the century. In 1912 Jones' son-in-law, Matt Mooren,

looked over the store and operated it for 41 years, until a year before his death in 1954. It was known as the M. J. Mooren General Store.

Mrs. Frazer Staman, Mooren's daughter, recalls that her father had the first gas station in the township before the first World War. Built on a little wooden platform, the pump operated by a hand on the side.

In the general store, "Matt" carried a wide variety of merchandise ranging from horse collars and drugs to groceries and hardware.

Fire Completely Destroys Second House In Willowbrook

For the second time in less than two months, fire swept through a partially built house in Willowbrook subdivision Friday evening and burned it to the ground.

Three Novi fire engines raced to the scene minutes after the alarm was given. Police Chief Lee BeCoe was one of the first to reach the fire. "I saw it was no use," he said, "the roof and walls had collapsed, but we had to put the flames out... they were endangering the adjoining houses."

Houses on both sides of the burning house were watered down.

The house, which was being built on E. LeBoat Dr., was partially constructed. The total loss was estimated by BeCoe as being about \$2,000.

Camron Lodge, Novi electrical inspector, stated that the cause of the fire has not yet been determined. Lodge has been conducting an investigation, but has not yet completed his report.

There were seven coke-burning salamanders in the house which were being used to take the frost out of the ground.

Following the first fire, a watchman was hired to protect unfinished houses during the 6 p.m.-6 a.m. hours and to watch the salamanders.

However, Lodge said that the watchman was not on E. LeBoat Dr. Friday evening when the fire started. "He left at 8 p.m.," Lodge said, "because he said that the fire was not yet under control."

The fire was first noticed by Officers Loeffler and Macchowski. They were in the patrol car a little north of 10-Mile Rd. They radioed the police department at 8:45 p.m. and the first engine was on the scene at 8:52 p.m.

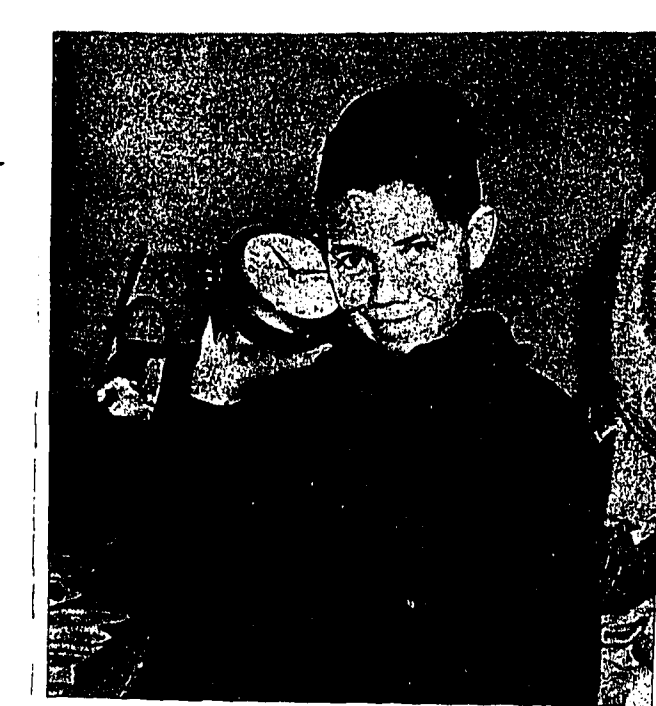

Home made bread is the light poetry of the kitchen - that fabulous air-borne delight that few housewives find time to bother with these days of "store bought" bread. But what is more mouth-watering than the fragrance of freshly baked bread or more delightful to gaze upon than its golden brown crust? Now get out your flour and yeast and try this delicious French bread recipe supplied this week by Mrs. Bernard J. Pankow, wife of the Rev. Pankow of St. Paul's Lutheran church. The Pankows have two sons, David 8 and James 5, who well know the taste pleasure of homemade bread.

FRENCH BREAD 1 pkg. quick-acting yeast 2 cups lukewarm water 1 large bowl (well sifted) 1 tablespoon sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons salt Dissolve yeast in one cup of lukewarm water. While yeast softens, sift flour, sugar and salt together in a large bowl, then stir in the dissolved yeast. Add just enough of the second cup of water to hold the dough together. Mix until you have a soft, rather sticky dough. Cover with a cloth, set bowl in a warm spot (not near direct heat) and let rise until double in size. This takes from 2 to 4 hours depending on the warmth of the kitchen. When dough is high and spongy punch it down with your fist and knead well. Divide dough in two parts and place each in a greased 6" round baking dish (glass casserole is perfect). Cover again with cloth and let rise until it reaches top of baking dish. Brush top of bread with melted butter (give it a little flavor to the crust) and bake for 1 hour in 375 degree oven.

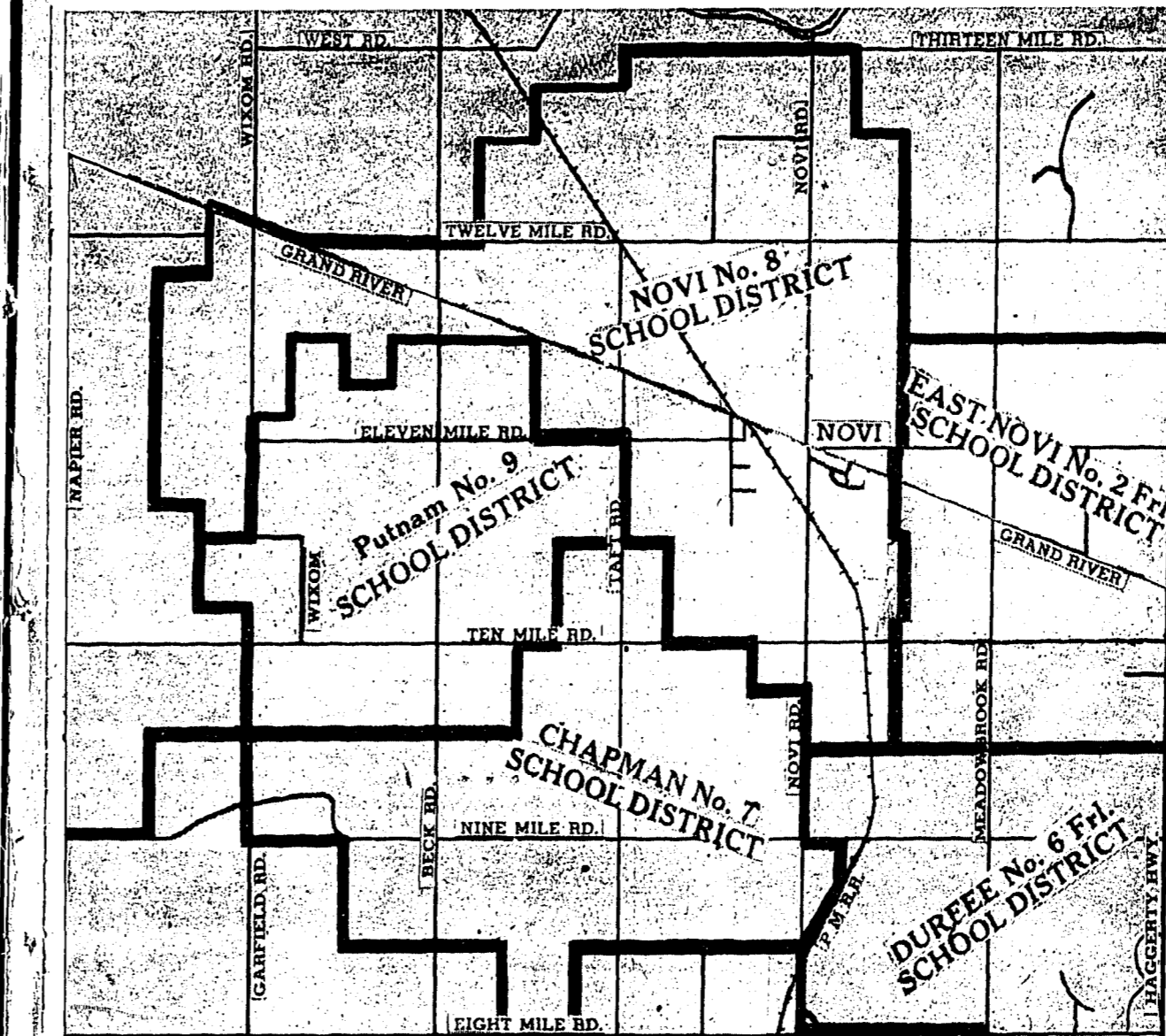

Consolidation Details Presented At Meeting

Bonds and Boundaries Discussed

Oakland County School Superintendent William Emerson explained legal provisions and steps involved in the consolidation of Novi school districts at a meeting of representatives of the four Novi districts Friday evening.

Numerous legal questions and procedure inquiries were discussed by school officials and area representatives during the two-hour session held in the Novi school's new library.

Despite the somewhat snowfall of the year and nearly impassable roads, approximately 40 people were on hand to discuss the problem.

Two of the most important questions raised were bonded indebtedness and district boundaries.

The bonded indebtedness question involved the new \$208,000 addition to Novi school in District No. 8. Approximately \$175,000 of the amount has not yet been paid off.

If the other three districts (East Novi, Putnam and Durfee) are to be consolidated with the 4 districts of Novi No. 8, they must also be prepared to assume their share of the outstanding indebtedness, Emerson pointed out. This point must be clearly brought out in the petitions for consolidation.

The question of boundaries for the new consolidated district was also discussed. There seems to be general agreement with the southern portion of Durfee district will ask to withdraw from the district and seek annexation to Northville.

Likewise, there seems to be general agreement regarding the line along which the district should be split. Some advocates making the split at 8-Mile Rd. to conform with township and county boundaries. Others advocate a line halfway between 8-Mile and 9-Mile roads.

Representatives of the Novi system are scheduled to meet with the Novi Board of Education Monday night to discuss the boundary situation.

The new petitions calling for a general election on the consolidation question must be signed by a number of qualified school electors equivalent to at least 50% of the number of registered general electors in the areas involved.

We hope to get this thing on the road as soon as possible," Novi No. 8 Supt. William Medlyn said. "The mechanics of working the consolidation out determine how soon we can circulate the petitions, but it will probably be late spring."
