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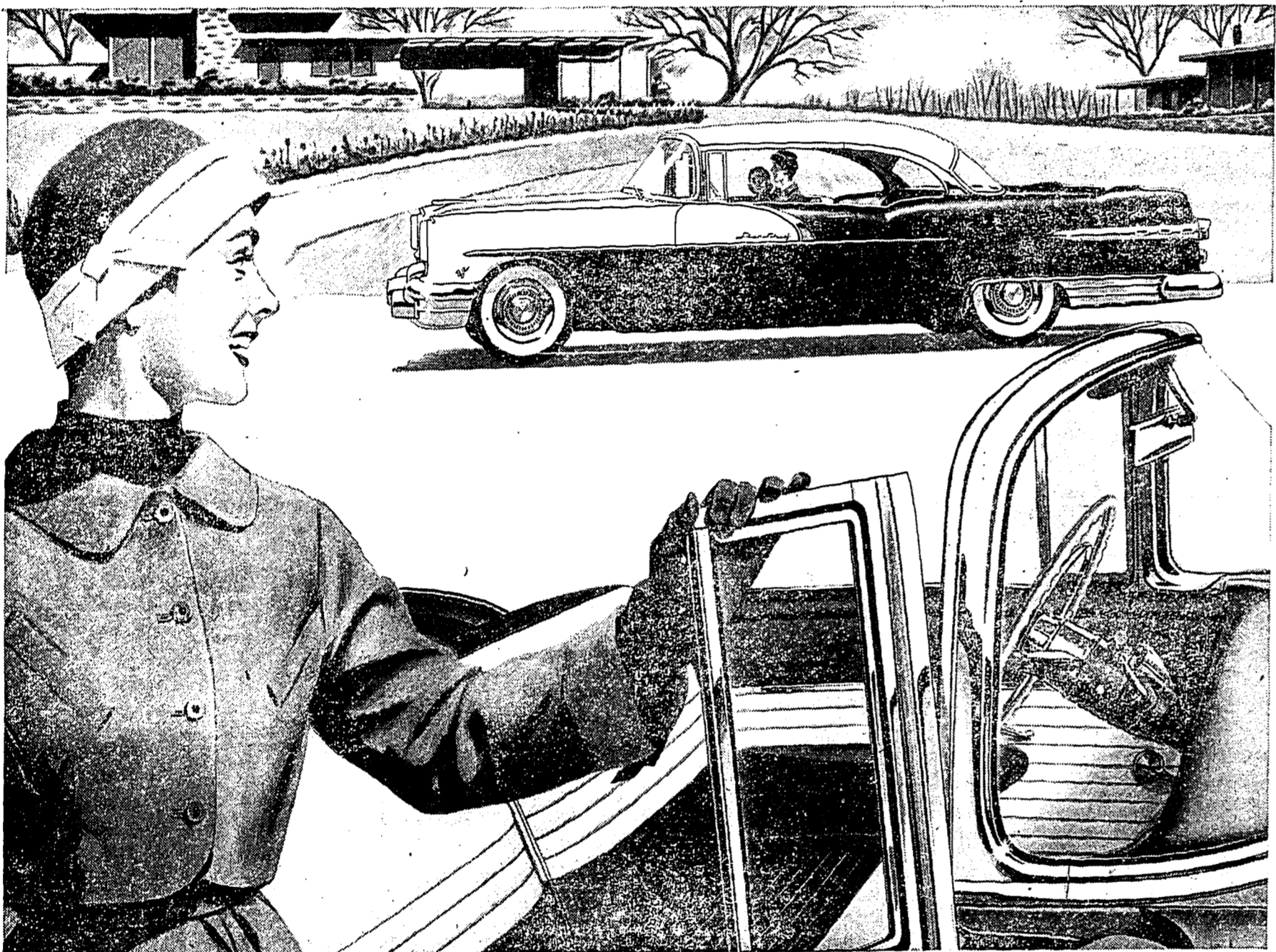

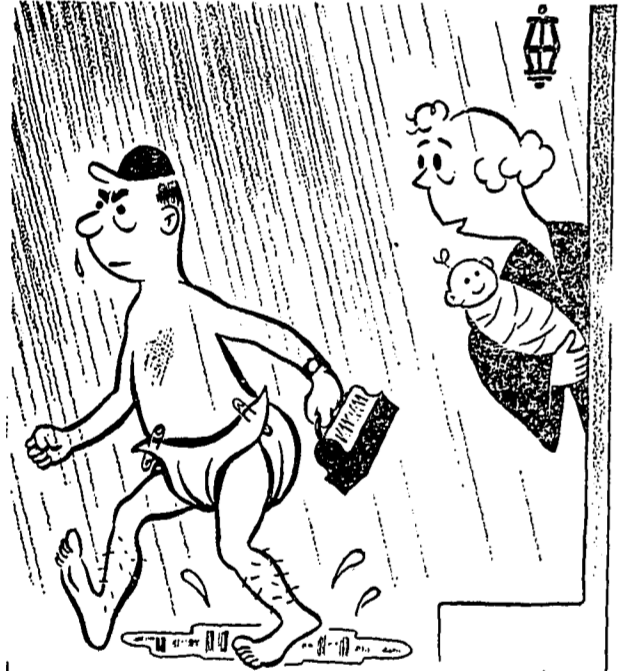

Novi Township Holds Annual Meeting Succumbs Monday After Long Illness

Proposed Budget of \$82,500 Approved

Treasurer's Report Receives Approval, Board Seeks Additional 1/2 Mill Tax Levy

A proposed budget of \$82,500 for the fiscal year 1956-57 was unanimously approved by Novi residents at the annual township meeting Monday afternoon.

In addition to the budget, they approved the treasurer's report listing expenses and income for the past year. An additional 1/2 mill tax levy was proposed, bringing the total township tax to 1 mill.

Proposed Budget Included in the proposed budget were the following items: Salaries (administrative) \$14,400 Salaries (public safety) \$2,200 General Expense 24,500 Street Lighting 2,000 Cemetery Fund 600 Welfare 600 Road Maintenance 6,000 Election expense 1,500 New Voting Machines (2) 5,000

Just An Estimate "This budget is just an estimate," Supervisor Frazer Staman emphasized. "Some items listed will undoubtedly be high, others low."

The township will be split into two precincts with 11-Mile Rd. the dividing line. The residents living north of 11-Mile will vote at the Community Elder center, those south of 11-Mile will vote at Township Hall.

A number of questions were put to the board by the spectators. "What do the expenses for the department of public safety include?" Mrs. Virginia Nobie asked.

The salaries of the police and fire personnel and commissions for the hauling, electrical and building inspectors are included in this category, Staman replied. Also brought out was the fact that the township park on the southwest shore of Walled Lake is now self-supporting. A new restaurant and additional playground equipment have been added in the last few years.

An explanation of the \$30,000 increase in the 1956-57 budget was requested and Staman outlined the basis on which the money is being raised.

The sales tax is distributed to townships on the basis of population in the 1950 census. It goes into the general fund and is used for miscellaneous township expenses, he said.

The questions of township roads was also brought up by a spectator. Staman said the township is allotted \$10,400 annually for all township roads, including county roads and state highways.

Need Additional Money "It's not an awful lot of money," he said, "and each year we need additional money. We took at the general fund and used for county roads and state highways."

Monday Night Board Meeting Moves Swiftly

A fast working township board took care of the business on hand, answered several spectator inquiries, and voted to adjourn in slightly less than 56 minutes Monday night.

Such routine matters as police calls, building permits, fire hose and finances were handled by the board in record time.

The meeting went so fast, in fact, that Treasurer Charles Trickey, Jr. had already made a motion to adjourn before speaker Leo Harwood realized what was happening and jumped to his feet saying "Hold everything! Hold everything!" Police Chief Lee Be Gole reported.

Used Car Lot Harwood's request proved simple enough. He said he was planning to erect a small concrete block office on his vacant lot east of the service station. The lot will be black-topped, flood-lighted and used for selling used cars. The building will be used as an office, he said.

Supervisor Frazer Staman told Harwood that the township board had no jurisdiction over the problem and that a building permit for the structure could be secured without difficulty.

Harwood, visibly surprised by the board's stand, sat down.

Asphalt Plant? Walled Lake Publisher John Flannery then raised a question about the proposed asphalt plant southwest of Novi Rd. and Grand River.

Flannery told the board he understood the property had been sold and that a cement batching plant was now considering use of the property.

Staman told Flannery that he did not know what the property in question was going to be used for, but he, too, understood that the asphalt plant idea had been abandoned.

No Permit Yet Flannery then asked if Ford Motor Co. had received a building permit for their new Lincoln plant. Flannery went on to say there were rumors that Ford wouldn't have to pay taxes on their factory or land.

"No permit has been issued yet...," Staman replied, "because the cost has not yet been figured out. We will give them the permit officially as soon as we have had a chance to figure the plans." Will Pay Taxes Regarding the "tax-free" question, Staman said, "...there have been no concessions made... none were asked. Their land is now taxed but we won't be able to tax the plant until it is completed."

"We are very lucky to have a plant of this size and nature located here," he added, "because many areas make a practice of granting tax and land concessions to secure industry. In that light, your rumor doesn't sound so wild."

Not In The Book "About 10 local fellows are in this," Harwood said, "and they want an airport for their own planes. We had a meeting and we find nothing in your (going) book covering an airport."

Flannery then raised another question. He asked the board who to see or what to do to build a private airport in the township.

"The railroad station is almost the same as it was when it was built in 1850. At that time eight mail or passenger trains stopped in Novi daily."

The church was torn down and another built. Stalls were built for horses. In 1913 fire destroyed the church, but it was rebuilt in 1914. The stalls were torn down in 1923.

The first church was built in 1846, the Baptist church. In 1875 the present school was built in 1928. Annex one was added in 1921 and annex two was added last year.

It is not known exactly where the first store was located, but one Novi resident had an old tin type picture of it which the children used to make their reproductions in miniature. The building was done with cardboard and construction paper.

The project originally included only a history of Novi schools, but the students became so interested that they continued until the exhibit now also includes the first store, church and railroad.

Many people have visited the classroom and some of the "old timers" gave the students additional information to add to their collection.

Reports were given by the following students: Carol Moxey introduced and early education in Novi; Donna Mae Lien, the first school; James Hagle, the second school; Philip R. Simenon, the present school; Catherine Nobie, the first store; James Hagle, the first church; and Gregory Larson, the first railroad.

According to Mrs. Selow the children spent three weeks on the project; interviewing, writing and building. They are now working to put the information in book form, with sketches. A copy will be presented to the school library.

Some interesting facts taken from the reports include: When Novi was first settled there were no schools. Mothers taught their children at home.

The first school was built in District 8. The children were taught reading, writing and arithmetic. The children did not pass from one grade to another, but from one reader to another.

The second school was built in 1864. Everyone wrote on slates.

REPORTS, WRITIN' and 'RITHMETIC were taught in the old Novi grade school, according to a study project recently completed by Mrs. Rowena Selow's sixth graders. Now remodeled and used as the Novi Convalescent Home, the old school was directly across and about a hundred feet south of the present school. Sixth grader Richard Ransay is shown above with the model of the old school which was built in 1864. Punishment in those days, the study reports, was "a darn good lickin'."



Earl Banks died Monday afternoon. Banks, who had served as township clerk for a record of 36 consecutive years, died April 2 in the large frame house at 39700 11-Mile Rd. where he was born 75 years ago.

Banks had been bedridden for several months. Until his recent illness, he had only missed attending two meetings of the township board in his 35 years.

Black Cherry Dessert Cake  
3 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 cup flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
2 tablespoons water  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1/4 teaspoon almond extract  
1 1/2 cups pitted Bing cherries  
1/3 cup chopped California walnut meats

Beat eggs until light; gradually add sugar; beat until lemon-colored. Add sifted dry ingredients. Add water and extracts; mix well. Pour into 2 waxed-paper-lined 8-inch round layer cake pans. Drop cherries over batter. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes. Serve slightly warm with sweetened whipped cream between layers and over top.

### Women Invited To County Agent To Discuss Lawn Care

"Wayne County lawn soil needs no liming," says P. R. Bielsheimer, Wayne County agricultural agent. Only when soil tests show the pH of the soil to be 6.5 or less is the use of lime recommended.

These and other facts about the care of home grounds will be discussed by Mr. Bielsheimer for members of Wayne County Home Economics Extension groups and their friends at the Northville Community Center, Wednesday, April 10 at 8 p.m. in Redford. Women who are interested in knowing more about the activities being carried on in the local home demonstration groups are invited to attend this open meeting.

Mr. Bielsheimer will discuss methods of establishing new lawns and give recommendations on caring for an established lawn. He will discuss weed and insect control. There will also be a discussion on making garden soils more productive.

### The Mysteries of Death

I have never preached a sermon on the subject of Death. I have never heard of a book written upon that subject, though there may be. I have on file two articles which have been taken from secular magazines in the past five years. The one entitled "How does it feel to die?" by Kate Holliday in the Coronet Magazine. Generally, people do not like to think about death nor do they care to discuss it. Perhaps the majority will not have the heart even to finish this article. There may be a few brave souls who find themselves of an inquiring mind as I do this morning and will spend a few moments considering this unpleasant subject. After all, my friends, we should be interested in God's word declares that it is "appointed unto man once to die" and the only hope of escaping that appointment is the possibility that Jesus Christ will return while we are still living upon earth.

### What Is Death?

Death is the separation of the soul and spirit from the body. In Eccl. 12:7 "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was; and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." The Bible speaks of someone who will die a second time. After the resurrection of the body, those who have refused the mercies of God through Jesus Christ will die again. This is a separation between the sin-

### How Does It Feel To Die?

Since one cannot speak from personal experience we must rely upon the experiences and information written by others. Several years ago, I read of a young man who wanted to make an experiment. He mixed a portion of poison for a slow but painless death. Then lying down with a pad beside him proceeded to write his thoughts and experience. Unfortunately he could not take very far into the valley of the shadow, he lost consciousness and was gone. Those who have remained conscious to the last moments have often spoken of being able to see the Lord Jesus. Others have called out the names of loved ones which have preceded them. Some have expressed the hearing of pleasant music. It is natural to fear going through an experience that is new to us. The fear of pain and misery give people most of their concern. Myron Primm, M.D., attending physician, Cedars Hospital, Los Angeles, says, "Few people know they are going to die. No matter whether the end comes through cancer, pneumonia, tuberculosis or any other cause, the patient usually goes into shock as death approaches. He becomes more and more mentally withdrawn, slipping through various stages until the end."

### Very Few People Believe That Death is a Gateway

Very few people believe that death is a gateway to a new existence. Even among the uneducated and the uncivilized the heathen have a belief in existence in some form

### human being must stand in the judgment to give an account of his earthly life.

(Romans 14:10-12) He speaks of two places which are eternal, namely Heaven and Hell. The Most Important Question Then -

### Is not "When am I going to die?" nor "How am I going to die?" but "Am I ready to die?"

Briefly, the Gospel of the saving grace of the Lord Jesus Christ prepares one to die. It is through personal faith in Christ that we receive the forgiveness of sins, the imputation of a perfect righteousness and as a gift from God he is assured of eternal life in Heaven. Therefore death for the Christian is an entrance into a new life of eternal joy.

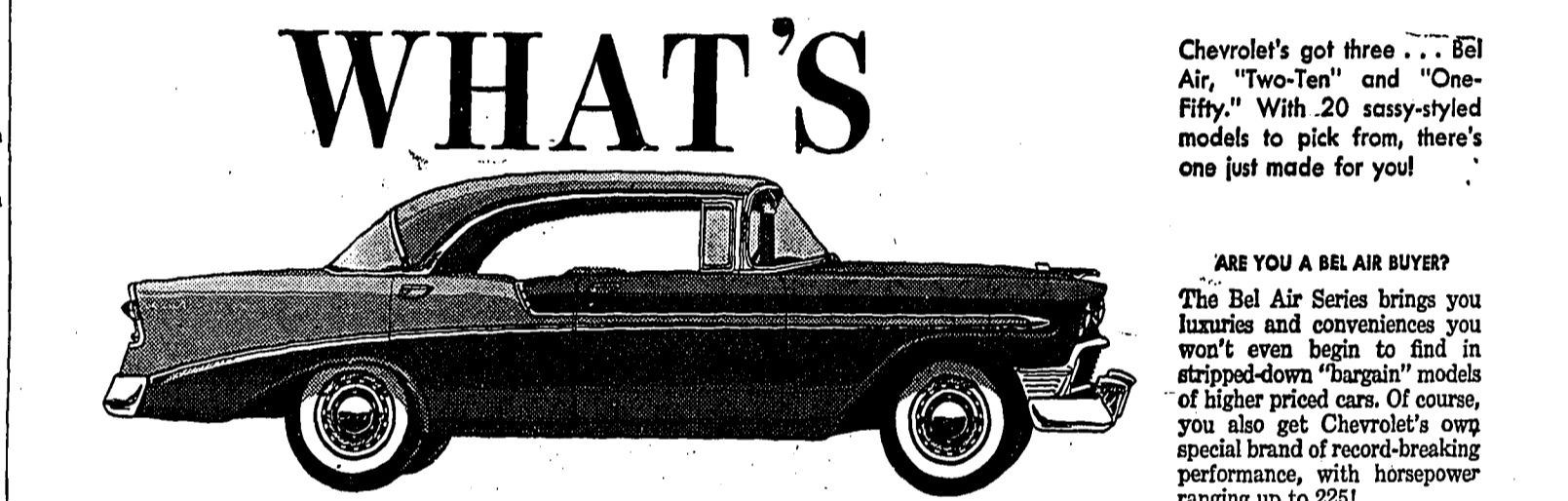

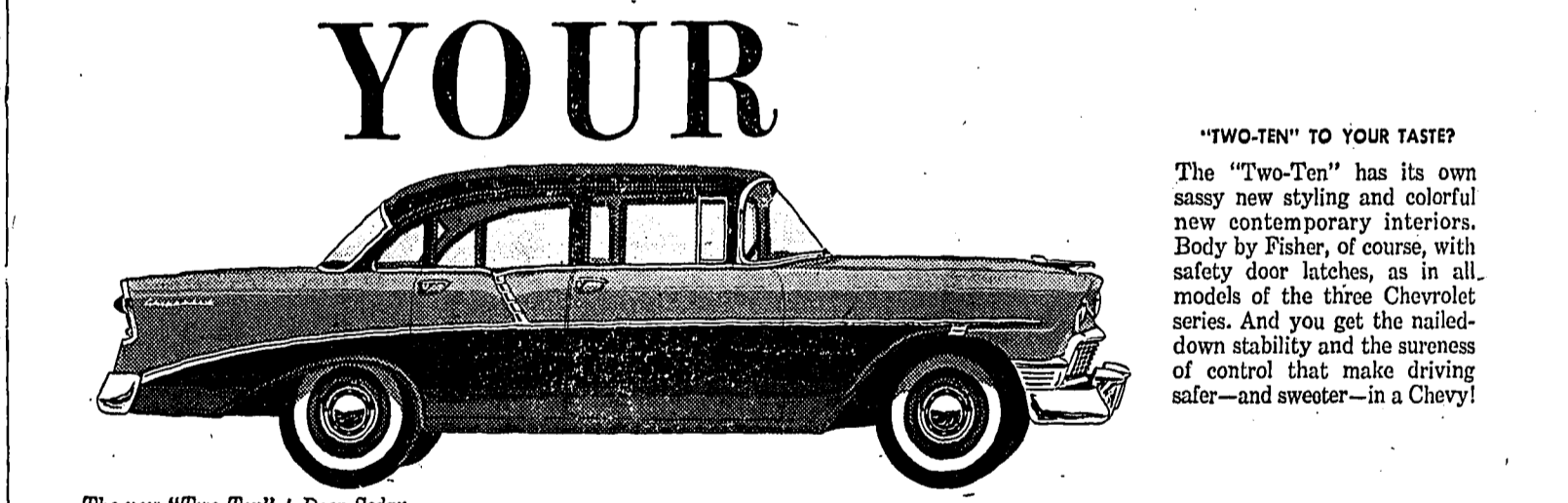

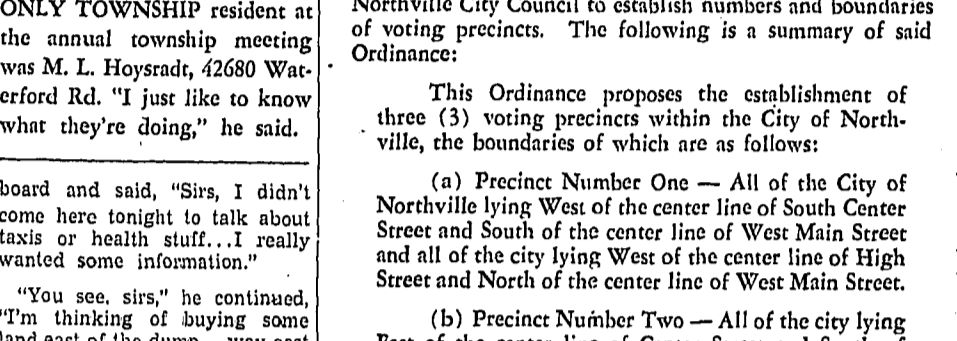

Schrader seconded Coolman's criticism with the remark, "you've got people on this committee that are not good workers" and the further statement that the committee's membership should be approved by the board. He then made it apparent that he might oppose to Dr. Robert R. Yoder of the Northville State hospital as a committee member, by criticizing the Northville Record for having recently printed a letter written by Dr. Yoder which was critical of all board of education members except Mrs. Eliza Wagenschutz and Eural Clark. Schrader expressed the opinion that the Northville Record should not publish letters which might be controversial.

It seems to us that a couple of basic points should be made against Coolman's and Schrader's position. First, the board of education is lucky to find a group of 30 private individuals who are willing to undertake an 18-month curriculum study. Coolman's fear of a self-appointed committee seems slightly ridiculous unless he wants to have a committee that will be subservient to and a creature of the board of education — a committee whose recommendations will conform to his own particular pattern of thinking.

Their desire to have the board of education exercise the right of voting certain committee members if it wishes is understandable, perhaps, but also rather questionable in our opinion. Not only does this power hold the implication that the board seeks to control the committee's findings, but it also can bring needless criticism of the board because in the final analysis the committee is to be only of an advisory nature.

Schrader's criticism of the public's right to have its letters to the editor on matters of public interest published in the Northville Record without censorship except as to slanderous and libelous statements is something that we cannot understand. If the Record had refused to print Dr. Yoder's criticism of the school board, a clear expression of the right of an individual to criticize public officials, if the Record were to refuse to print letters on controversial subjects of public interest, or with which its editor might disagree personally, it would quickly lose its integrity as a quasi-public institution. At the same time, it would take away from its readers the right to a public forum where they may air their grievances or otherwise comment on subjects that are of importance to the community.

We hope that both Mr. Coolman and Mr. Schrader will conclude after more mature consideration that their apparent fear of public participation in school affairs and other matters of general interest is unwarranted. To us, it is a healthy manifestation of civic interest that can only result in maintenance of a good and progressive school system.

**AMENDMENT TO DOG ORDINANCE**  
Township of Northville

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE POSSESSING, HARBORING, OWNERSHIP AND RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS, TO PROVIDE FOR THEIR VACCINATION AND FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF VICIOUS AND DISEASED DOGS IN THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Township of Northville ordains: That the Dog Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by amending Section 3 thereof and by the addition of Section 19, to read as follows:

**SECTION 3**  
At the time of issuing such license, the Township Clerk shall deliver to each applicant a tag containing the number of the license, the words "Licensed, Township of Northville, Michigan" and stating the year of issuance. For each license and for each renewal thereof, the Township Clerk shall at the time and before issuing the same collect from each applicant and pay into the Township Treasury One Dollar (\$1.00) for male and spayed female dogs and Two Dollars (\$2.00) for unspayed female dogs. In the case of lost tags, the Township Clerk shall in every case demand and collect and pay into the Township Treasury Twenty Five Cents (25¢) for the issuance of duplicate tags. The shape and style of said tag shall be changed each year. Current license and vaccination tags must be worn at all times by the dog to whom issued.

**SECTION 19**  
Should any section, clause or provision of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

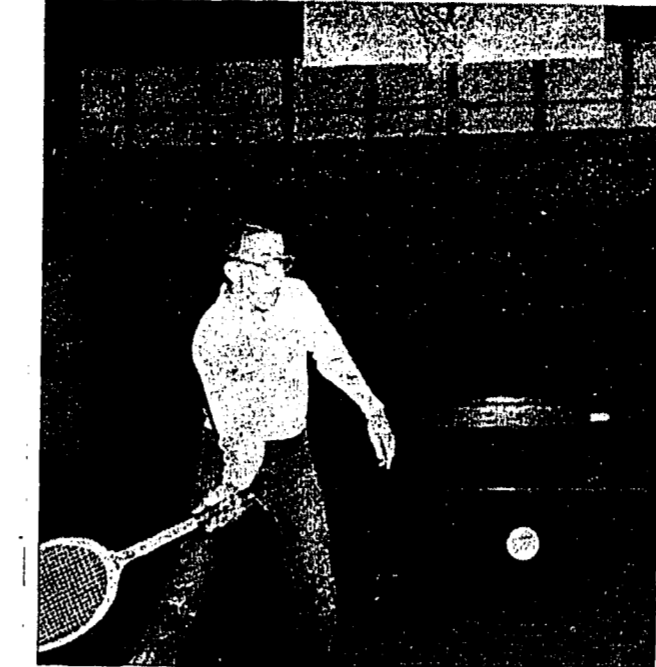

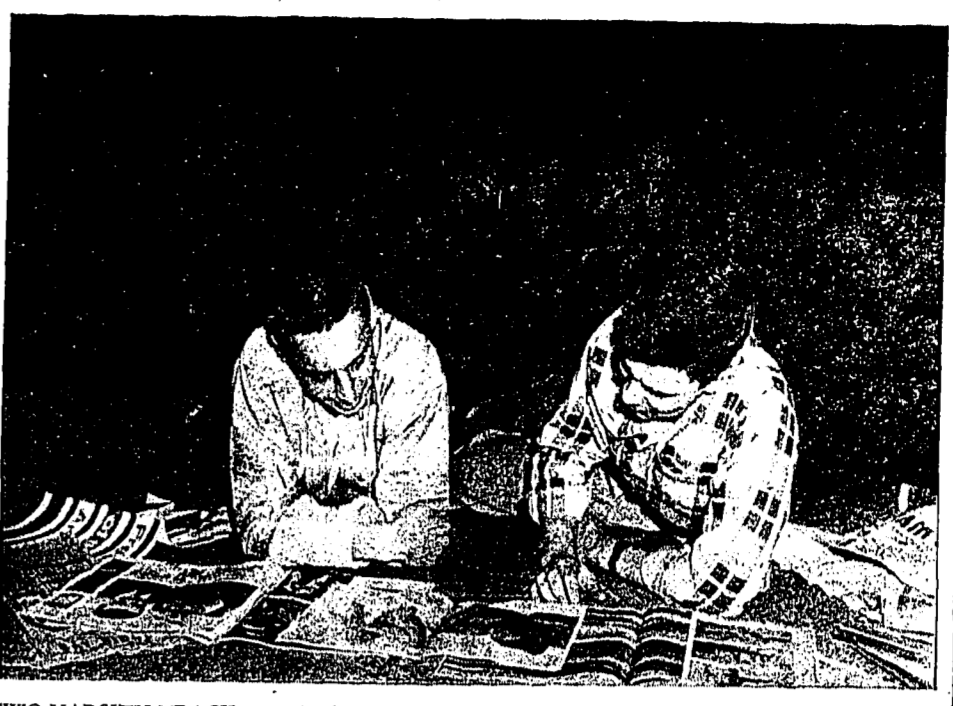
