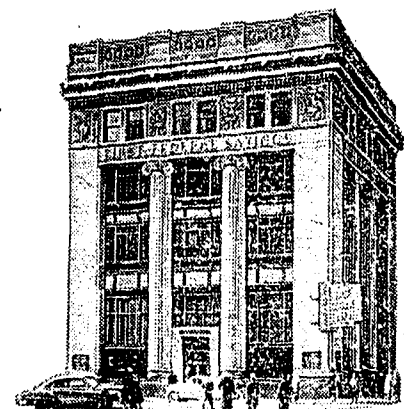

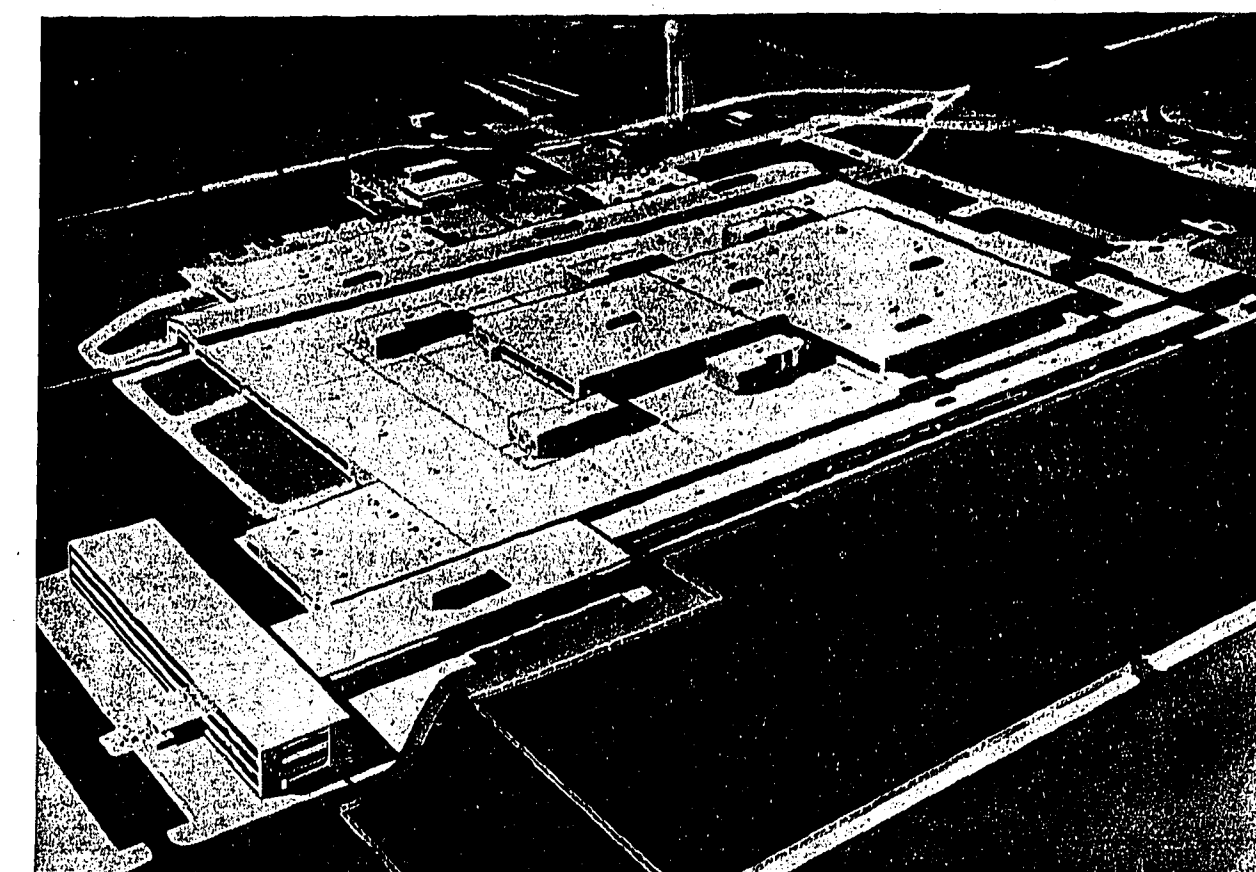

Artist's View of New Lincoln Plant



A LOT OF PLANT AND A LOT OF MONEY. This architectural drawing shows the multi-million dollar general office building and assembly plant of the Lincoln Division of Ford Motor Co. now under construction on Wixom Rd. north of Grand River. A check for \$8,000 was received by Supervisor Fraser Stamm (left photo) early this week as payment for a building permit issued to the company recently. Occupancy of the 200,000 square-foot office building, which incorporates the lift-slab type of construction, is planned for January, 1957. The 1,300,000 square-foot plant, with an annual capacity of 90,000 cars on a straight-time basis, is scheduled to go into operation in mid-1957. The new Lincoln headquarters will employ about 5,000 people, with an annual payroll between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000. The architectural and engineering work was done by Smith, Hinchman and Grylls, Inc. of Detroit.

Twenty-nine building permits totaling a record \$25,292,760 were issued by Novi township during the month of May. One building permit alone, that of the new Lincoln plant, accounted for approximately \$25,000,000 of the total.

Outlines Bd. Policy For Twp. Meetings

A standing-room-only crowd heard Township Attorney Archie Leonard pour oil on troubled waters at Monday night's Novi township board meeting.

At the request of board members, Leonard told the spectators present that "... the township board performs its duties in good faith..." and that actions taken by the board are to be questioned according to parliamentary procedure and in a manner prescribed by law. He suggested that citizens having grievances could accomplish much more through separate talks with board members on a neighborhood basis.

Thus, in a 15-minute talk Leonard brought to potential conclusion a meeting which many observers thought would last a well into the night.

Reliable sources reported that a number of citizens planned to attend Monday's meeting to protest the speed with which the Novi branch of the National Bank of Detroit was recently built and alleged irregularities in the issuance of the building permit.

Referring to the bank building, Leonard said, "The license to build has been issued by the proper office."

Following Monday night's board meeting, Leonard made the news in answer to a question from a spectator. He told the man that the unexpected terms of supervisory clerk and trustee may be filled by appointment but the treasurer's office requires a special election.

"The Democratic club's executive committee met in special session Tuesday, according to Club President Herbert Koester, and decided to request the township board to hold a special election."

"The executive board even talked about having me run for the job," Koester ventured. "We might have it Aug. 7 to tie in with the regular state election and save money."

He also pointed out to Harrowood that elections are held every two years, and he further emphasized that the courts are only a last resort if an individual feels the board's action has damaged him and other methods of appeal.

"You have the right to approach any member of the board individually. They're your neighbors... they are people who have been elected and put in office." He also pointed out to Harrowood that elections are held every two years, and he further emphasized that the courts are only a last resort if an individual feels the board's action has damaged him and other methods of appeal.

Leonard, early Wednesday morning, said that he had been asked by the Oakland County Corporation Counsel to advise on the matter further. He said he would deliver an opinion to Starn Thursday.

Following the meeting, Leonard said that all positions are filled by appointment except the position of treasurer which requires a special election.

Present treasurer Charles Trickey, Jr., was appointed by the board slightly less than a year ago following the death of Treasurer Russell Woodworth.

The fact that meeting procedure had been well planned was evident. Board members held a 15-minute private get-together preceding the regular meeting.

Another entirely humorous incident occurred at 8:15, shortly after the meeting got under way. Following reading of the building inspector's report, Trickey said, "I make a motion to adjourn."

Follow board members addressing glances at him and Clerk Bachert hurriedly asked, "How about the bill?" The meeting then proceeded in order until Leonard had finished his statement of board policy. At that time, Trickey asked for (and received) a second to his adjournment motion.

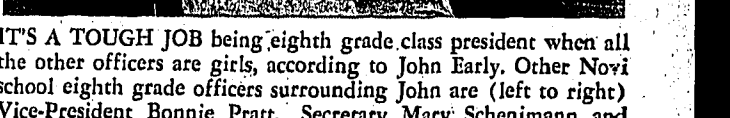

A FISH STORY
(From John 21: 1-13)
Peter said to them (the other disciples) "I am going fishing." They said to him, we will go with you, but they caught nothing...
There isn't fisherman who does not appreciate the frustration of these disciples in their "fish story". Sometimes I wonder who they told their friends when they came back...
Now we are fast approaching a similar situation in our own lives. We are now in the "well ordered lives", the season of vacations. "We use the 1 1/2 inch hose that American LaFrance is bidding on now. If we had a separate bid I don't know if it would be cheaper," he said. The committee recessed for 25 minutes.

After returning to the room Mayor Ely said, "We discussed this matter thoroughly. Does anyone have a motion?" Councilman Reed made a motion to accept the bid of American LaFrance for the new fire engine. The bid was accepted and the purchase price changed from 400 to 500 gallons since the company does not make a 400 gallon tank. Councilman Allen seconded the motion.

The contract was post-dated to meet after July 1. Councilman Reed advised the council that there might be a possibility of receiving Civil Defense aid in the purchase. "The program has been discontinued for a few years," he said, "but it might start again. If we have money just one thing though," Reed continued, "to receive any relief, the fire engine must be paid for in full."

an active interest of community welfare, economic health and cultural progress.

"During the annexation controversy in 1935, we were convinced that consolidation of Plymouth township into the city of Plymouth would not have been in the best interests of township residents. The overwhelming vote against annexation Nov. 1 has borne out this opinion.

"Therefore, we believe that it is not only reasonable but our responsibility to oppose the annexation of all or a part of the township to the city of Plymouth at this time for the following reasons: (1) We sincerely believe interests of the Plymouth township community would be better served with its present form of government until the services of a city-type government are more obviously necessary. (2) The tremendous cost of higher taxes to Burroughs. (3) Because township residents would be side-lined not in favor of such a move and to oppose the clearly expressed desire of the voters. (4) The township would certainly not be in the interests of good corporate citizenship."

Attorney Littell explained to Nutten that since the plats were in the possession of the township they should have been checked before issuing the permit.

"Hold up your permits until you know they are right," Trustee Robert Merriam stated.

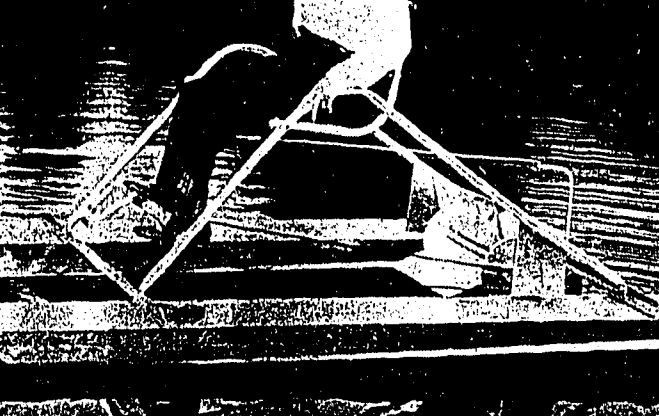
