

ANNEXATION WINS BY WIDE VOTE MARGIN

No Annual Meeting; School Election July 7



Big "Yes" Vote

The vote in the city was 256 in favor of annexation to 82 opposed. Five residents of the area up for annexation voted "yes". There was one "no" vote.

Warren Products attorneys petitioned the Oakland County Circuit court the day before the election was to be held to restrain election officials in the election process.

Start Court Action

The court issued a "temporary restraining order" and an "order to protect and preserve the status quo" until a hearing can be held July 2 to determine the merits of the Warren Products suit.

Specifically, Warren Products contended that the Secretary of State acted in an unlawful manner in withholding action on the original petitions filed more than eight months ago and then, eight months later, acting upon them after the statutory procedure for calling a special election had been manifestly changed by amendment.

Petitions 8 Months Old

In other words, the law in force when the original petitions were filed last summer did not allow a special election at this time to vote on the annexation. The law was subsequently changed by an amendment this spring, after which the secretary of state accepted the original petitions filed eight months prior to the election.

Novi Township Cooperates

An interesting aspect of the election in Novi township was the registration of two Novi police officers and two part-time Novi township employees as legal residents of 637 Baseline Rd., which is the address of Warren Products. They were Police Chief Les DeGalle, Patrolman Leonard Mazuchowski, Larry Kubiak and Jack Paige. Kubiak was the only one of the four to vote, however, and he was the sixth ballot cast in Novi township. Other Novi voters were Mr. and Mrs. John Burkan, who were leaders in opposing annexation three years ago, their son, Conrad, and Mr. and Mrs. William Sample, formerly of Novi, who are now living on the Burkan property that was up for annexation.

Although named as defendant in the Warren Products suit, Novi township has been openly opposed to the annexation since it involves loss of township territory. Township officials had previously discussed ways of legally blocking the election.

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Warren Products Challenges Legality of Special Election

Temporary Restraining Order Issued; Hearing On Injunction Set for July 2

Annexation of the former Yerkes farm and the John Burkan and Warren Products properties to the city of Northville was overwhelmingly approved by voters at a special election held June 21 in the face of a last minute move by Warren Products, Inc. to have the election invalidated.

The Warren Products plant is located in the area to be annexed from Novi township and will be subject to higher city taxes if the annexation goes through.

Photostatic Copy

To substantiate this charge, Warren Products submitted a photostatic copy of a purchase agreement on file in Oakland County. The company claims that this purchase agreement "... D & R Building Co. entered into an option to purchase a portion of such territory for the sum of \$200 per acre, but as a condition thereof bound the owners who were residents of such territory to ... unlawful requirements."

A third charge filed by Warren Products alleges that the boundary lines of the territory up for annexation "were so drawn as to unlawfully and unreasonably exclude adjacent residents..." This referred to two small pieces of property immediately to the southeast of the intersection of Novi Rd. and the C & O railroad track a quarter mile north of Baseline Rd. which were not included in the area up for annexation. Presumably the owners were thought to be opposed to annexation and their votes could have conceivably made a difference in the outcome of the election.



2 1/2 cups plus 2 T. sifted cake flour 1 t. soda 1 t. salt 2/3 cup shortening 1 1/2 cups buttermilk 3 eggs unseparated 2 1/2 cups unsweetened melted chocolate

Beat the first four ingredients, add shortening and about one-half of buttermilk. Beat two minutes. Add rest of buttermilk, eggs and then the melted chocolate. Blend until smooth. Bake in greased and floured pans, two 8x9 inch pans, 35 minutes or 13x9 pan at 350 degrees for 45 to 48 minutes.





1. Divert your child with toys or picture book, or let him watch TV as you cut. Take care that the scissors don't nip him should he turn his head suddenly.
2. Cut before you shampoo. Clean hair is too soft and fluffy, and difficult to cut. Take a 2 x 2 e towel, small bunch of hair in one hand, and with the other, cut off the longer excess hair, little by little. 

In 1953-54 Beedon served as chairman of the National Education Ass'n's powerful resolutions committee.

Truck Driver Cited For Reckless Driving

Three people were badly injured and a truck driver was charged with reckless driving June 29 when his fast-moving gravel truck and trailer sideswiped another truck, went out of control, and overturned on top of a nearby bulldozer.

The accident, which occurred shortly before noon on Grand River between Beck and Wixom Roads, tied up traffic for several hours.

According to Novi police, the gravel truck, driven by Coy H. Farris, of Detroit, was attempting to pass another car-bound vehicle on Grand River when the accident occurred.

Sewage Disposal Plant Discussed

The feasibility of a half-million dollar sewage disposal plant to serve an estimated 15,000 people in Novi township was recently discussed with engineers, Supervisor Frazer Staman announced at Monday night's township board meeting.

Although no definite action is being taken on the project at this time, long range plans for waste disposal throughout the area are now being considered.

Tentative plans call for locating the half-million dollar disposal plant in the western end of the township provided the board of health will approve the Huron River as the ultimate outlet for the treated waste.



Willowbrook idea
Another sewage disposal plan for Willowbrook Village was recently considered by the developer of the area, Paul LeBoat.

Staman said that LeBoat's idea involved a five to ten acre drain field which would be tied in with individual septic tanks, thus eliminating the need for a separate drain field for every dwelling.

In other action Monday evening the board approved rezoning a strip of land along the eastern side of Wixom Road between the expressway and West Road. The land, previously R-1-P for small farms, will be M-1 for light industry.

Health Insurance
The board also voted to offer township employees health insurance with the township paying the entire premium in the case of a single employee or half of the total premium in the case of a married employee who wished to include coverage for his wife and family.

Clerk Hadley Bachert suggested that the township pay election inspectors at the rate of \$20 per day for the coming primary and general elections. He told the board that the inspectors often work 16-18 hours and that the \$20 per day would actually amount to less than \$1.50 per hour. The board unanimously voted to grant the request.

Mobile Radios
Two additional mobile radio units were also ordered after Staman told the board that the federal government has been paying 50% of the cost for all such equipment used in police work. The township took advantage of the offer last year also. Staman explained that the government felt the equipment would be valuable in civil defense work.

Twp. Office Open For Registration

The township offices will be open extra hours during the next few days for the convenience of residents wishing to register for voting, according to Clerk Hadley Bachert.

Hours from 9:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. will be observed July 5 through 7, Bachert said, and the same hours will be effective Monday, July 9, except that the office will be open one hour earlier, at 8:00 A.M.

Monday evening will be the deadline for registrations for the general primary election, scheduled for Tuesday, August 7.


