Novi Minister Dies Enroute To W. Coast The Rev. John McLucas, pastor of the Novi Methodist Church and the Brighton Methodist Church, died Monday, July 9 in Calgary, Alberta, Canada.

Surviving Mr. McLucas are his wife, Ruth; two married daughters, Mrs. Edward Rieneau of Ann Arbor and Mrs. Richard Amo of Howell; also two children at home, Norma Jean and Charles.

Mr. McLucas served as a minister in Michigan for 29 years. Last month he began his 14th year in Brighton and his 13th year in Novi. When Mr. McLucas began his pastorate in Novi, the church membership was approximately 25; today it is well over a hundred. Mr. McLucas was also instrumental in organizing the Youth Fellowship club at the Novi church.

The district superintendent of the Ann Arbor area has not yet appointed a replacement. It is expected that the Rev. M. C. Beers from Pontiac will continue as a replacement until a new pastor is named. Mr. Beers was contracted to substitute while Mr. McLucas was on vacation.

Contributions to the Carol Ann Donnelly Fund have reached \$670 during the last week of the campaign and as this paper goes to press, letters and checks continue to arrive at the office.

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Erwin Resigns Post, Willowbrook Pair Named To School Bd.

James Erwin, member of the East Novi District school board for the past 36 years, resigned July 9 at the district's annual meeting.

Two Willowbrook residents filled the vacancies caused by Erwin's resignation and the death of Earl Banks. Robert Byrd of Willowbrook was elected president of the board and Kenneth Bernard was elected secretary.

The new Willowbrook members of the board are understood to be favorable toward Novi's four-district consolidation plan. The rapid influx of residents in the Willowbrook area has been one of the main factors causing the currently critical school shortage in the Northville-Nowi area.

Erwin's resignation came prior to his proposed change of residence this fall. At that time, he and his wife plan to move to a new home near under construction on the Silver Lake Road between South Lyon and New Hudson.

Nearly seven district residents crowded Erwin's home at 4088 10 Mile Rd. for the meeting. About 50 residents attended from the Willowbrook area alone.

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Burglars Demolish \$800 Safe—Get \$15 An \$800 safe was destroyed and its \$15 contents stolen when burglars entered the offices of the Pitas Pump & Engineering Co., 4800 Grand River, July 4.

Novi police and Oakland County sheriff's deputies who investigated the incident said that the burglars entered the building through a cot chute in the rear of the building. The safe had been opened with an acetylene torch.

The intruders evidently became frightened, Novi police said, because the acetylene was still flowing from the tanks when the police arrived shortly before 10 p.m.

A detective from the sheriff's office stated that the crime was apparently committed by a person or persons familiar with safe-cracking methods.

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Heslip Elected To Head Durfee School Board

Arthur J. Heslip, Novi day-care center director of the Durfee District school board at the annual meeting Monday evening.

Heslip's election was viewed with optimism by several officials of the Novi No. 8 School District, who felt confident he would be of help in the current consolidation plans.

Heslip, however, when asked about his views on consolidation with the Novi districts or annexation to Northville, said only that he thought the people in his district should be "better informed" on the whole question.

Heslip replaces Paul Beard, former president of the board, who resigned recently when the portion of Durfee district in which he lived was annexed to Northville.

Edmund P. Yerkes, secretary of the board, presided at the meeting. He told the group that the state's position, as explained to him by Oakland County Superintendent William Emerson, was that the consolidation question should be settled BEFORE any further action was taken by Durfee district regarding boundaries or annexation to Northville.

Yerkes' explanation apparently forestalled any attempts by the pro-Northville residents to take action at this time.

Mich. Bell Makes Record Payment

Lansing, July 10—The largest single payment in the history of the state's primary school fund was made last week by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

The company turned over the first half of nearly ten million dollars in state taxes, topping 1955's record by one-and-a-half million dollars. The company's 1956 tax of \$9,702,322 again makes it the largest single contributor to the fund.
The first half-year payment of \$4,850,161 was turned over to the state by Herbert F. Lange, the company's vice president and treasurer. Another check for a state revenue commissioner Louis M. Nims on Oct. 31.
The 1956 payments will bring Michigan Bell's total contribution to the primary school fund to more than \$18 million since 1904.
Under law, the company's state tax is levied in lieu of all other local property taxes, and is earmarked for the school fund. Distribution is made throughout the state on the basis of the school census figures.
Other companies following the same provision include railroads, telegraph, Railway Express, Pullman and other telephone companies.

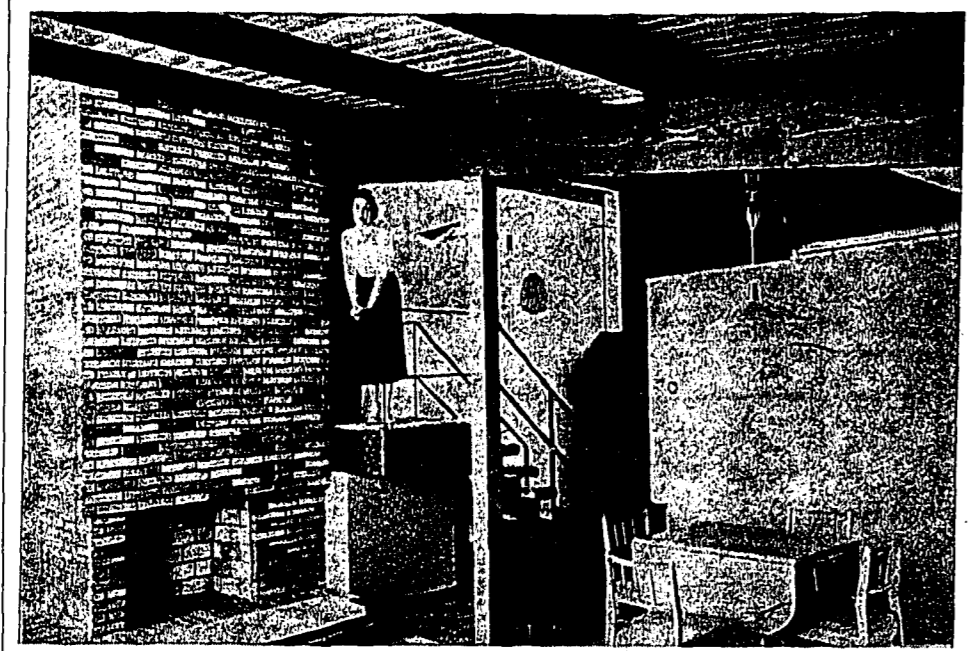

Loch Alpine Subdivision Opens Model For Public Inspection



PICTURED ABOVE IS the fireplace corner of the Ridgcrest tri-level living room, showing also the half-flight stairway to the bedroom level and a corner of the dining area. Although post and beam construction is illustrated above, the model at Loch Alpine is also built with conventional ceiling.

Grand opening ceremonies at Loch Alpine subdivision last weekend officially opened the area to public inspection.
Nestled in 600 acres of wooded, rolling hills just northwest of Ann Arbor on Huron River Drive, Loch Alpine boasts two gemlike lakes and a tournament-tested 18-hole golf course.
Five hundred and forty-eight home-sites have been laid out and the lots will be at least 100 by 150 feet.
According to developer Calvin Shubow, over half a million dollars is being invested in sewer lines, disposal plant and a water system to give residents the benefits of all municipal utilities. This construction work, underway since April, is scheduled for completion this summer.
Two building companies are now constructing homes in the area. They are Ridgcrest Building Company, under Benjamin Baskin and Bernard Goldberg and Alpine Heights Company, under Ralph L. Schemm, George H. Blostein and Larry Shallit. All are Detroit-area builders.
To preserve the custom-developed appearance, builders will not build on adjoining lots, and all home elevations will be different. Present lot owners and lot buyers may select their own custom builder if they desire. However, all home plans must be approved by the Loch Alpine architectural committee before construction is undertaken.
Other features in the subdivision include scenic, winding roads, natural gas, school transportation, and plenty of space for outdoor family living on estate-size lots.
The furnished model has been built by the Ridgcrest Building Co. Probably the most dramatic feature of this house, aside from its site, is the large living room with cathedral-type ceiling and exposed beams. A huge window wall across one side of the room provides a view of the lake. A natural fireplace with raised hearth of brick is interesting. The split-level design provides space for a large activities room below the bedroom wing. A sliding wall at one end provides direct access to a terrace on the lake side of the house.
There are three bedrooms and a compartmental master bath on the upper level.
The kitchen is at the front of the house and features a strip of windows across the entire work surface, which includes the sink and built-in range.
Crestery windows above the cabinets make this kitchen one of the best daylighted kitchens you will see anywhere.
Dividing the kitchen from the living-dining area is a built-in combination breakfast and service bar. All cabinets are mahogany.
The firm is building a second model, to be called the Rancho Rey. It will have a full basement and a two-car garage with a breezeway.

A Tip in Bible Interpretation

One of the problems that faces a student of the Bible is to discern what things are to be taken literally, or taken figuratively, that is, with symbolic meaning.
Both ways of interpretation have their place if one is to properly understand the meaning of the Bible. However, we must be careful that we do not spiritualize a truth that is meant to be taken literally and thus cloud the true intent of the scriptures. Let us pass on to the golden rule of interpretation advocated by the Biblical Research Society: "WHEN THE PLAIN SENSE OF SCRIPTURE MAKES COMMON SENSE, SEEK NO OTHER SENSE; THEREFORE, TAKE EVERY WORD AT ITS PRIMARY, ORDINARY, USUAL, LITERAL MEANING UNLESS THE FACTS OF THE CONTEXT INDICATE CLEARLY OTHERWISE."
This is a safe rule to follow and one cannot go wrong in using it in the study of God's holy word. The most outstanding error which many Christians make is that of spiritualizing and allegorizing all scriptures dealing with the national glory and restoration of Israel to the land of Palestine.
Another common error is to spiritualize the actual visible return of Jesus Christ to this earth to establish his Kingdom over all the earth.

If I recall correctly, one of our "smarm" community leaders seriously proposed that we consider locating our new High School at the city dump — between the railroad tracks and the gravel pit! I would suggest that we DUMP the race track and locate our new high school on the race track site, where there would be ample space for ALL high school outside activities, etc.

TO "NORTHVILLE" RESIDENT:

Your letter overlooks two important factors. First, regardless of your personal dislike of racetracks, the race track has become an important source of tax revenue to the city of Northville and it is extremely unlikely that Northville would want to sacrifice this revenue merely to put a high school on the present race track site.

Second, the cost of the race track site would be prohibitive. We would have to consider other vacant sites which are available. We doubt if the taxpayers would be willing to assume this high cost, especially when it would mean for those who live in Northville the giving up of a large income they receive from the track.

Your signature "Northville Resident" is doubtless due to the fact that as a resident in the Northville community you regard yourself as a resident of Northville. Many of us who live in the township, including the writer, think of ourselves as Northville residents. When we advocate a course of action that may be opposed to the interest of the city, however, it is well to identify ourselves as township residents if that is the case. We therefore point out that you are in fact a resident of the township who lives some distance from the track.

Race Track Syndicate Seeks Site In Novi

Board Asked If Novi People Want Track

The possibility of a race track in Novi township was discussed by township board officials at their semi-monthly meeting Monday evening.

Sewage disposal, traffic signs, injunctions and septic tank inspection fees were also topics of discussion at the meeting.

Supervisor Fraser Staman told the board he had been approached by the same group of businessmen who have been attempting to secure a site for a race track in the western end of Farmington township.

Farmington Out
"They are not going into Farmington," Staman declared. "There is another place in Novi they would consider...also, the City of Dearborn will give them 250 acres of land. The matter should be considered."

After being told that the group proposed spending five million dollars on the installation, Treasurer Charles Trickey, Jr. asked if the schools in the area would benefit from the track. Staman told him that the schools would benefit from their share of the taxes levied against the structure.

Law Changed?
Staman also said that he understood the law had been changed in order that townships might be eligible for a share of the pari-mutuel receipts. The City of Northville now receives approximately \$80,000 as its share of the receipts each year.

When asked whether the proposed site for the track would be racing dates, the number of days on which racing is allowed, are determined each year by the Michigan State Racing Commission. Racing Commissioner James Ingalls has given no indication that his office would grant the racing dates proposed to place the proposed track in operation.

Although the law allows four tracks in the Metropolitan Detroit area and only three tracks now exist, previous attempts by other syndicates to establish tracks have been unsuccessful.

Staman said he understood it was NOT the previously proposed site on the Holcomb property (an area at Meadowbrook Rd. between 11-Mile and Grand River).

Sports Arena
The group is reluctant to announce the newly proposed location until all of the necessary options had been secured, according to Staman.

"I've been told that approximately 150 acres would be involved," he added. "They say they're not going to Farmington, regardless of the current zoning election. If it doesn't go here it goes in Dearborn between the Woodward and the Harper roads. It would be their idea to make a large sports arena...to be used for other things too?" Trickey asked.
