THE DRIVER'S SEAT



THE CITY COUNCIL SEZ:

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Race Track Syndicate Seeks Site In Novi

Board Asked If Novi People Want Track

The possibility of a race track in Novi township was discussed by township board officials at their semi-monthly meeting Monday evening.

Sewage disposal, traffic sign, injunctions and septic tank inspection fees were also topics of discussion at the meeting.

Supervisor Frazer Staman told the board he had been approached by the same group of businessmen who have been attempting to secure a site for a race track in the western end of Farmington township.

"That's right," Staman replied. "It would be used for more than horse racing."

The discussion then ended with the board members agreeing to think the matter over and seek public reaction to the new proposal.

More Room

Staman then told the group that he had received additional information on the sewage disposal problem. Because of this information, Staman said he was inclined to believe that the township has a lot more (sewage facility) room than they ever believed.

I think we'll be approached in the near future on it," he added. "It would be a revenue bond set-up. The people who use it would have to pay for it."

Law Changed?

Staman also said that he understood the law had been changed in order that townships might be eligible for a share of the pari-mutuel receipts. The City of Northville now receives approximately \$80,000 as its share of the receipts each year.

When asked where the proposed site for the track would be, Staman said he had no definite information.

Racing dates, the number of days on which racing is allowed, are determined each year by the Michigan State Racing Commission. Racing Commissioner James Inglis has given no indication that his office would grant the racing dates needed to place the proposed track in operation.

Although the law allows four tracks in the Metropolitan Detroit area and only three tracks now exist, previous attempts by other syndicates to establish tracks have been unsuccessful.

Staman said he understood it was NOT the previously proposed site on the Holcomb property (an area at Meadowbrook Rd. between 11-Mile and Grand River).

Sports Arena

The group is reluctant to announce the newly proposed location until all of the necessary options had been secured, according to Staman.

"I've been told that approximately 150 acres would be involved," he added. "They say they're not going to Farmington, regardless of the current zoning election. If it doesn't go here it goes in Dearborn or wherever."

"Would it be their idea to make a large sports arena... to be used for other things too?" Trickey asked.

Novi township officials took steps Monday evening to block annexation of a second parcel of township land by the City of Northville by unanimously authorizing the township attorney "to go ahead and stop the (Aug. 7) election on annexation."

The property proposed for annexation lies between the 8 and 9 1/2 mile lines and runs approximately 1/4 mile west from Center St. It contains the American school and the land upon which the Northville Board of Education proposes to build the new Northville high school. Five private residences are now located in the area, as well as a piece of vacant land which is to be subdivided if and when the annexation is approved.


Eight-Day Girl Scout Encampment Underway At Camp Mindokwin

Our recipe this week, "Brown Sugar Pie," is one of the oldest that Mrs. Charles Strautz has. "It's a family recipe that has been handed down from generation to generation," Mrs. Strautz said. "My grandmother taught me how to make this pie soon after I was married, though why it's called Brown Sugar Pie I'll never know," she said.

- Brown Sugar Pie**
- 2 eggs
 - 1 cup white sugar
 - 2 cups sweet cream (milk or top cream may be substituted)
 - 1 tsp. vanilla
 - Pinch of salt
 - 3 lbs. brown sugar
 - 1 scant tablespoon flour
 - 1 unshaked pie shell
- Mix brown sugar and flour together and line the bottom of the pastry shell.
- Beat eggs, sugar, sweet cream, vanilla and salt in general method for making cuttard and pour very carefully over flour and sugar mixture. Dot with butter. Bake in preheated oven 400 degrees for 20 minutes then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake about an hour until the cuttard is firm.

Six thousand turkeys gobbled optimistically in fields adjoining the Del Smith farm home west of South Lyon July 12 while 125 persons ate turkey meat fixed in 14 different delicious ways. The turkey dishes were accompanied by cranberries prepared in various ways.

It was a turkey Smorgasbord for Michigan turkey producers, their families, news reporters and people connected with the turkey industry.

The smorgasbord was prepared and served by Black's White House, most of the recipes having been developed by the Blacks.

Cheerful broiled turkey kabob appetizers were handed the guests as they arrived. Also, gaudy old tantalizing aromas were broiled turkey legs and wings which were broiled on five huge outdoor grills.

The menu

The garden of the 120-year old early American farm house was set with long tables for the guests where the following menu was served: fruit punch, olives, hearts of celery, pickles, frozen cranberry cup, cranberry orange mokes, turkey gizzard barbecue, smoked turkey, turkey mousse, turkey liver paste, jellied turkey salad, macaroni turkey salad, old-fashioned turkey pie, turkey biscuit ring, turkey roletaine, spaghetti with turkey balls, Arroz Con Pollo, kebabs, mosaic turkey sandwich, turkey cranberry cream cheese sandwich and coffee.

Object of Luncheon

The object of the luncheon was to stimulate wider and more frequent use of turkey in food preparation.

Mrs. Kathryn B. Miles, home economist of the Poultry and Egg National Board in Chicago, was the principal speaker. She stated that 300 per cent more turkey is being used today than 12 years ago and that turkey has a high protein value. Turkeys which are scientifically bred and raised by Michigan growers are reaching the remarkable weight of 18 to 20 pounds in only 10 1/2 weeks and are exceptionally tender and meaty — a vast improvement over the birds of the past.

One million turkeys were raised in Michigan last year. The Smith home, scene of the

festival, was built in 1830 by Mr. Bingham who later became governor of Michigan. Mr. Bingham obtained the property as a land grant from the government while Michigan was still a territory.

Mr. Smith, present owner, was born on this farm which was purchased by his father from Mr. Bingham.

Dogs may be trained in the field between sunrise and sunset after July 15, but Conservation Department game biologists advise sportsmen to delay dog training for at least a week after that date.

Wet spring weather delayed the hatch of pheasants this year and many small birds would be endangered by dogs if training begins on schedule. Normally, young pheasants would be able to take care of themselves at this time of year.

Ralph Blouch, Dept. pheasant specialist, said this year's hatch is about two weeks late and running dogs may catch small birds or break up broods that still need protection of the hen.

State law prohibits any training, practicing or breaking of dogs in open fields from Apr. 15 to July 15. This closed season is designed to protect young game birds and animals.

When training dogs, it is unlawful to possess any firearms other than a pistol or revolver and blank cartridges. Persons intending to use such weapons should consult the local police or sheriff's department regarding necessary concealed-weapons permits.



Flynn Named Sec'y

Will Hold Post On Zoning Bd. for 3-yr. Term

William Flynn, former Novi building inspector, was appointed to a three-year term as secretary of the Novi Township Zoning Board at the board's July 23 meeting.

Flynn, who lives at 4911 Grand River, was township building inspector for many years prior to his resignation last fall. He replaces George Egan, who recently completed his three-year term as secretary.

Only two requests were presented to the zoning board for approval Monday night but no formal action was taken on either request.

Ray Granzow, operator of Oakland Hills Memorial Park at Novi and 12-Mile roads, asked the board to rezone three acres directly east of the cemetery for use by a funeral home. He told the board that he also planned to build two private residences east of the proposed funeral home.

After discussing the request for commercial zoning of the property, the board decided to refer the matter to the zoning appeals board for action. The appeals board has the power to limit usage of the property to only a funeral home.

Some of the board members had expressed fears that if the property was rezoned commercial (C-2), any type of business, eating, or drinking place could move in if the funeral home ever decided to leave.

Charles Verhaag also appeared before the board to ask for additional rezoning on a piece of property he now owns on the southwest corner of Novi and 10-Mile roads.

"At present, approximately half of the 890-ft. frontage is zoned commercial. Verhaag said that a service station was interested in the entire property.

The board advised Verhaag to obtain approval of the surrounding residents and submit it at the board's next meeting.

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Young Escapees Keep Police Depts. Busy

Two 16-year old escapees from the Boy's Vocational School in Lansing gave Novi, Detroit and state police a busy time last week end before being recaptured.

Novi police first entered the case when they were called to the William Harris home, 40500 W. 10-Mile Rd. shortly after dark on July 19.

Harris said his family had just returned from a short trip to Farmington and found a French dog at the rear of their home broken and prints inside the house. Their dog was barking excitedly.

However, a close inspection failed to reveal anything suspicious and Novi police officers suspected that the burglars had fled through back fields upon seeing the Harris car come in the driveway.

Novi Chief Lee BeGole searched the nearby fields and found a track leading in the direction of Spicer's Orchards, 3999 Grand River. They investigated several houses in the vicinity but found no traces of the intruders.

However, shortly after midnight, Robert Spicer called to report his 1955 pick-up truck stolen. The report was relayed to state police who had information on the two escapees.

Novi School Supt. Urges Consolidation of Four Districts

"We must plan now for the population increase which is certain to come, and the consolidation of the four Novi districts is the first step toward this future planning," Novi School Supt. William Melnyk emphasized in a report issued to Novi residents this week.

"For the past several months," he continued, "efforts have been made to bring about the consolidation of Novi's four school districts (Durfee, Putnam, East Novi and Novi No. 8). These efforts have resulted in approval of the proposed consolidation by the Board of Education, Oakland County superintendent of schools; the state department of public instruction; and the municipal finance commission.

Twop Officials Asked About Annexation

"No comment" was the word from Novi's Township Hall this week in answer to questions concerning the progress of the reported legal action protesting the Aug. 7 special annexation election.

Officials said only that Archie Leonard, township attorney, had been instructed to prepare for a legal battle on the annexation question.

The election is to be challenged, township officials stated, on the grounds that the law allowing such annexation of the property is "unconstitutional."

They cite the fact that the assets of the township must be proportionately divided with any area voting to withdraw from the township. The township hall is now debt free, they point out. However, if much land is taken away from the township, the required division of assets would force the township to mortgage the township hall and once again go through the process of paying it off.

Township officials have gone on record as saying that they feel that as long as all of the township residents are financially affected to the above extent by the annexations, it is unconstitutional to give them no voice or vote in the matter.

The Novi land proposed for annexation to the City of Northville lies between the 8 and 24-Mile lines and extends westward approximately one quarter mile from Centerline. The area includes proposed sites for a new high school and a subdivision.

William Clay Ford To Be Reassigned


William Clay Ford, youngest of the three brothers heading the Ford Motor Co., has been replaced as group director of the Continental and Lincoln Divisions, it was announced.
