

His Problem: Floods, Mud, and Rats

turned into a huge rat- and snake-infested swamp six times this year has asked the governor of Michigan for assistance.
D. M. Parkinson, 27110 Taft road, says he made the move last week after trying without avail since last spring to get help from officials of Novi township, Oakland county and several state agencies.

The problem, Parkinson says, is that two culverts under

the new Farmington-Brighton expressway bed are inadequate to handle a natural creek running in back of his house.

The result, he claims — with pictures to prove it, is that water has backed up six different times this year to flood his and his neighbor's property for weeks at a time.
"When it happens," he says, "there's a huge stagnant lake about six to eight feet deep that runs from the expressway bed almost to 12 Mile road.

"It smells - and we've had to sleep on the front porch to try to get away from it," Parkinson adds. "There are snakes all over the place, and our dog can catch rats without half trying," he says.

"Our garden is ruined, and half the time we haven't even been able to see it," he continues. "What's more, it's dangerous to have a lake like that right up to your back door," Parkinson says. "A person could

drown easily if he weren't careful." Parkinson claims the solution is simple enough - add more culverts under the expressway bed. What's more, he

says, add them soon, before concrete is poured for the super-Otherwise, water will continue to back up year after year. And the two exiting culverts will fill up with mud

and slime, just as they are now clogged to within inches of

Parkinson says he has tried many times to get help. "But all I ever got was the run-around and buck-pass-

With registered-letter receipts to back up his claims, Parkinson says he has had the following lack of results: -he phoned the Oakland county drain commission and in the spring was told the commission has no jurisdiction below 12 Mile road. But the commission, he says, admits it controls OTHER projects below 12 Mile road. -he wrote the Oakland county health department and

received a letter saying they have no jurisdiction because it —he contacted Novi township supervisor Frazer Staman

who he says told him the township has no control over the the drainage problem. (Staman told the Record-News that as far as he is concerned, it is strictly a state problem.) -he was told by an expressway construction superintendent that they would put in "two, five or ten culverts if either the township or the county says to." -returning to Staman, he was told by the Novi township supervisor, "You wouldn't expect them to dig up the expressway bed just to put in culverts, would you? -Novi township trustee Frank Clark told him that the township could offer him "only moral support."






