Over 3,000 auto litter bags will be distrubuted to fight unsightly roadsides in the city - and from some of the pictures on this page, it looks as if they're necessary.

The Garden club is also working to educate citizens to the state law concerning litter-bugs, which reads in part: "If any person or persons unless duly authorized by the highway commissioner shall put any garbage, rubbish or waste material of any kind into any highway of this state, with the intent to permit the same to remain thereon, to the injury in any way of said highway, every person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100, together with the costs of prosecution . . . ".

Helping to keep Northville Beautiful not only will add to the pride you can take in a clean, well kept town, but indirectly can add to your packetbook. The cost of collecting litter in the United States has reached a staggering \$50,000,000 annually.

Several suggestions for cutting the cost that can be followed locally include --disposing of trash in a proper receptacle

-carrying a litter bag in automobiles; -setting a good example for the younger generation

A vow to follow the prizewinning slogan - "Pick Up Litter, Make Northville Glitter" — would be a good start in observing "Keep Northville Beautiful" week.



Involved here are tubercular patients who leave the sanitorium without com-pleting treatment. It is proposed that such persons be returned to complete treatment with sufficient authority to compel them to remain until cured. A minimum "security" arrangement would be established arrangement would be established to effect this.

arrangement would be established to effect this. Nothing is less palatable than to add mental misery to the suffering of persons already afflicted with a serious illness. On the contrary, the circumstances which have brought this need about needs to be under-stood and faced clearly. In past years it was not altogether uncom-mon for a tubercular patient to be-come concerned about his family, especially about their economic welfare. Instead of 'sticking it out', he would return home and attempt to provide for his family again. With his cure unrealized, such a patient was likely to spread the disease to other members of his family or per-sons with whom he worked most closely. This was bad enough. While our sympathies were great for the patient whose anxiety had brought

was back in the news this week with the announcement that construction of the multi-million dollar project has been held up by complex sewer problems. At the same time, there were two other rumblings in Novi about this controversial track.

-that all is not well with the syndicate backing it. -and that the group may look elsewhere in Novi for a site if the

present one falls through. The announcement of sewer trou-ble came from B. F. Gregoric, a civil engineer and leading member of the racing syndicate.

Gregoric said the problem stems from the difficulty of putting in a septic tank system on the present site at Grand River and Meadowbrook. The Oakland county drain commission, he said, has unofficially turned thumbs down on a septic system because it might not handle 20,000 to 22,000 people at race time.

Instead, the commission has suggested installing a major sewerage disposal plant which could becom he heart of a system for all o Novi township, Gregoric said. But, he added, such a system would probably cost somewhere around \$300,000.

Novi township supervisor Frazer Staman indicated Tuesday that Novi is not banking on such a system in its planning, but is instead going ahead with other approaches for a township-wide sewerage system.)

Gregoric said he is now investigating other possibilities for a sewer set-up, including tying into a sys tem at the new Lincoln plant. He is to report to track stockholders late this month.
