It didn't take long to get an answer to the question of why the proposed hospital for mentally retarded children to be located in Northville township near the training school was named the Plymouth State Home and Training school.

According to Representative Sterling Eaton, the name was chosen to avoid confusion with the Northville State hospital. Mail for the new state hospital will also be directed to

While talking with Rep. Eaton, he told us that Northville's school tax problem was high on the agenda of the state legislature's summer study committee. The fact that more than 20 percent of the taxable area in the school district is either state or county owned will be given serious consideration by the committee. "Some means of reimbursing areas for this tax loss will surely be found," Eaton stated.

What about a Fourth of July celebration in Northville? With an automobile race planned at the Downs in the evening, why not some carnival rides in the afternoon and fireworks in the evening? There's still time to plan a program and give families something to do locally. Not only is it typically American to enjoy such a day on the Fourth, but it might be considered something of a community obligation to keep families at home and off the highways.

There's two rather new children's diseases (both of which our boy and girl are currently wearing) circulating in this part of the state. Erythema Serra, which Dr. Atchison tells us means "burning", starts on the top of the feet and lower portion of the leg. The rash later moves to the hands and arms up to the elbow. Burning accompanies the rash and makes sleeping very difficult.
