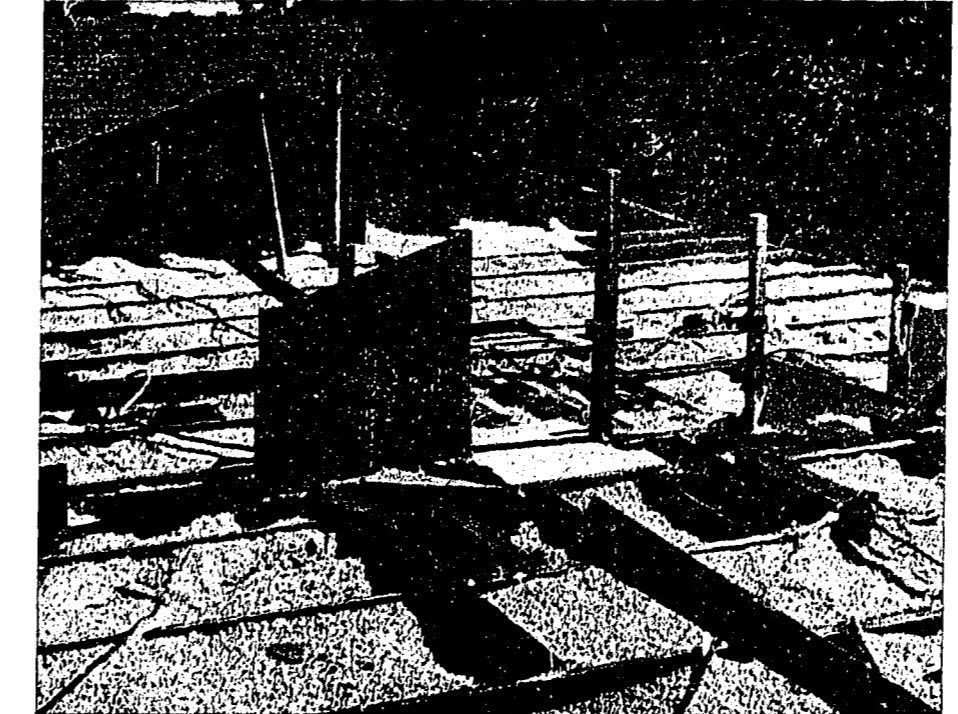


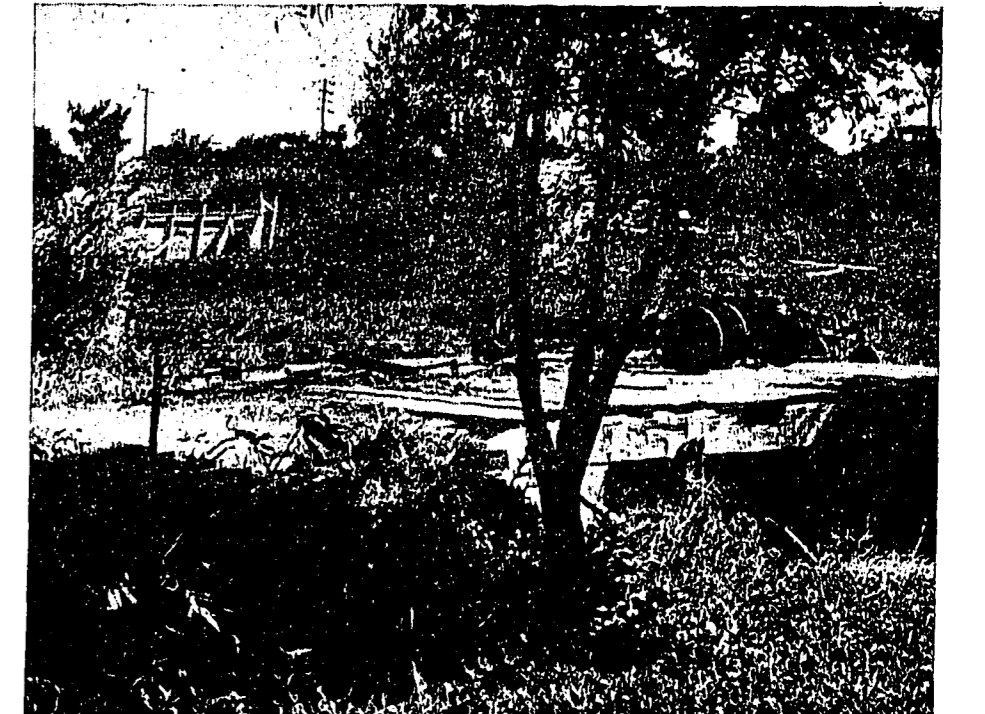
If It Wasn't a Tornado, It Was a Darn Strong Wind

Weather officials have finally agreed — though reluctantly — that it was a tornado and not just "strong gusts."

Whatever its terminology, the wild windstorm that smashed into Novi late on the afternoon of the Fourth of July was a humdinger.

There were no casualties — not among humans at least — but evidence of the storm's wrath can still be seen in scattered parts of the township.

Among other things, the storm was credited with the worst traffic jam in Michigan history — as fallen trees in Novi caused a backlog of cars along Grand River for hours.

In addition, the storm left these results in its wake:

- at least one roofless home.
- several dozens of trees smashed to earth at Bob-O-Link golf course.
- scores of other trees flattened along the new expressway, along Novi road, and along Taft road.
- countless damaged homes, garages, and out-buildings.
- While all this was happening, Novi police were swamped with routine holiday calls — some 10 to 12 traffic accidents, bench midways and even an occasional missing dog.
- The "worst traffic jam in Michigan history," as experts call it, occurred about 7 p.m. as thousands of holiday fun-seekers poured back toward Detroit from Kensington Park. Huge trees toppled across Grand River near Napier road, blocking traffic back into New Hudson.
- State police, working with saws and axes by light from their own cars, gradually cleared it and a trickle of cars through.

The storm entered Novi to the west from Brighton and paralleled Grand River on its way into the Detroit suburbs. In Novi, it hop-scotched across the countryside, touching down about every mile.

On Wixom road, it blew the roof of the home of William Richards while he and his wife sat on a breezeway. Novi clerk Hadley Bachner and trustee Stan Balon, who were passing by, summoned Novi police and firemen. A tarpaulin was spread over the wrecked area.

At the Bob-O-Link golf course, it dashed several dozen huge elms across the fairways and scattered limbs for hundreds of yards in all directions.

At Taft road, it plowed into a small woods and sent scores of trees crashing to the ground. D. M. Parkinson, 27110 Taft, credited the woods with saving his home. Even so, the winds splintered his small covered bridge.

Along the Farmington-Brighton expressway, countless trees lay across the new concrete.

Elsewhere, the storm blew down a fence at the home of Jerry Bapette, 27317 Novi road. A barn on Napier road was damaged. The home of Warren Chafy, 27925 Wixom road, was damaged.

The tower was cut off at the Lincoln plant. Electricity and telephones went dead in Wixom.

Yet in Northville — and even in other parts of Novi — there was no hint of the storm's fury. Brief squalls came and went, and a slow drizzle lasted for an hour. But the wind was actually less gusty than it was the following day.

Schools Seek More Funds To Meet Operating Costs

An intimate part in the battle of the school district pocketbook will be given new school board members Adrian Willis and Dr. Waldo Johnson Monday night at the Northville board of education meeting to borrow another \$37,000 in the form of tax anticipation notes.

Vote for the additional funds, necessary to meet remaining July and August payrolls, was called by new board president Nelson Schrader.

This money is in addition to \$30,000 in tax anticipation notes issued last month, purchased by Manufacturer's National Bank. Because of a cut in school funds from the recent state aid act passed in Lansing, resulting in an approximate \$40,000 loss to the district, funds from the previous notes will not last through the month of July. Money is available, however, to meet the payroll due this week.

In addition to the tax anticipation notes, there are two other potential sources of revenue. A regular state payment of \$20,000 is due the district in August, and board members approved a request for an advance in state aid for the maximum advance allowed, an estimated \$50,000.

The anticipated total from these three sources, \$197,000, should carry the district through July and August bills and payrolls.

Two additional state aid payments of \$20,000 each are due in October and December, and \$16,000 due from the primary school fund.

Meeting another pressing problem, board members approved the appointment of high school principal Elroy Ellison as acting superintendent of schools. Superintendent E. H. Amerman, who has been in acting charge for the past several weeks, hopes to be able to return to his position in Rochester, Minnesota soon for further treatment.

Distemper on the Rise in Wayne, Oakland
Dog owners were warned this week of a sharp increase in canine distemper in Wayne and Oakland counties. A new look at the theory of immunization. To protect older dogs, we are now recommending booster shots.
Dr. Jack Emery, of Waterford, president of the Southeastern Michigan Veterinary Medical Association, said the number of distemper cases treated by veterinarians has shown an upward trend since early January.
Dr. Emery said many of the current cases reported were older dogs previously considered immune to the distemper disease. He said, "It was formerly believed that the early immunization against the distemper virus provided lifetime protection. However, the rising incidence of distemper complex in untreated dogs passing into a secondary or 'complex' stage may recover, he stated, although the death rate is high. Many dogs surviving the disease are afflicted with damage to the nervous system, including convulsions and nervous tremors.
In addition, the case may be further complicated by bacteria infections.
When should a young dog be vaccinated? Shortly after weaning, Dr. Emery recommends. However, this may vary slightly according to the breed of dog, the locale and the conditions under which the dog is kept.
The frequency of booster shots can be determined by the veterinarian who is posted on the prevalence of distemper in his area. Most distemper outbreaks occur in the spring and fall. This is the time the dog owner should be most watchful for symptoms," Dr. Emery said.

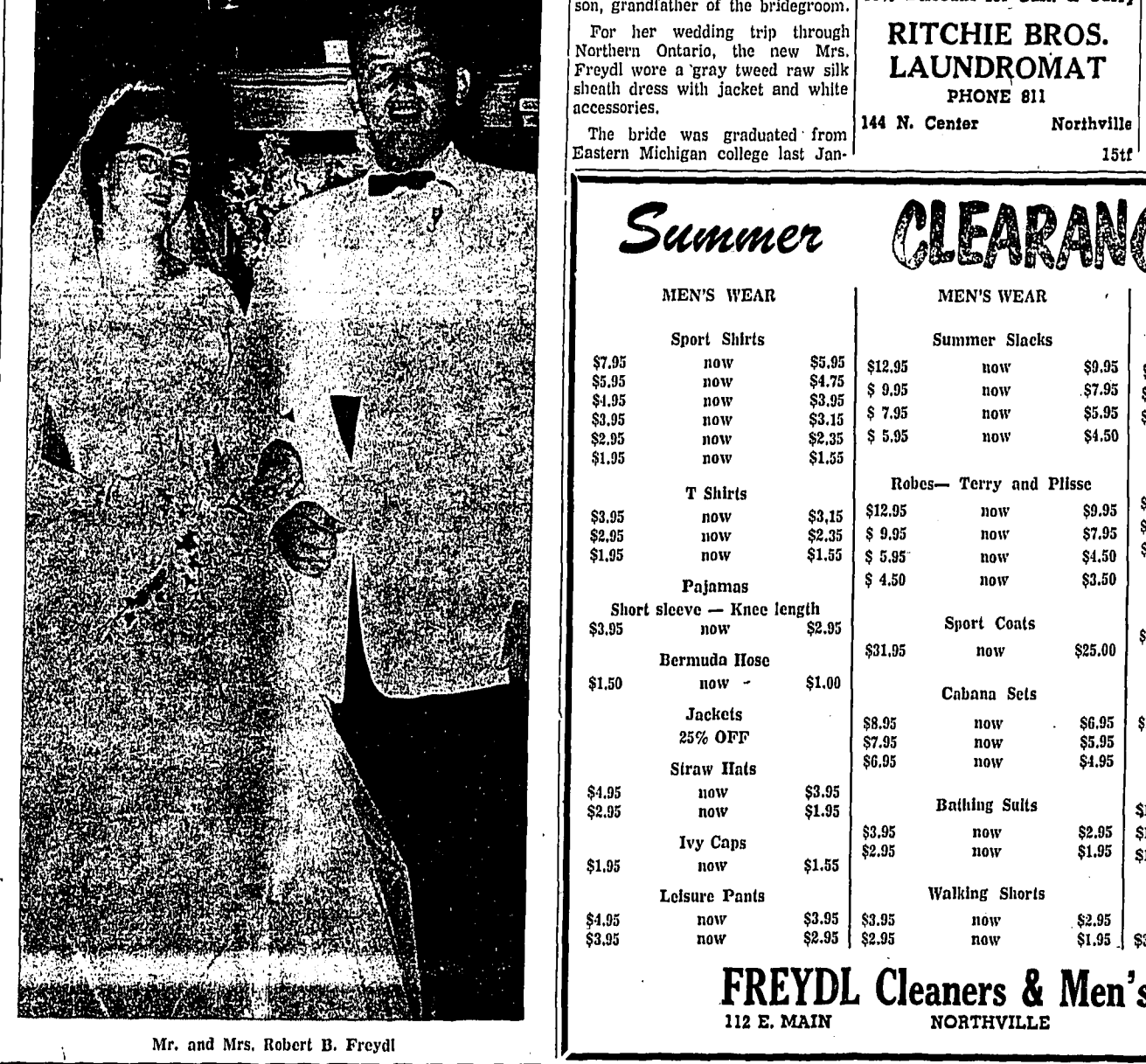

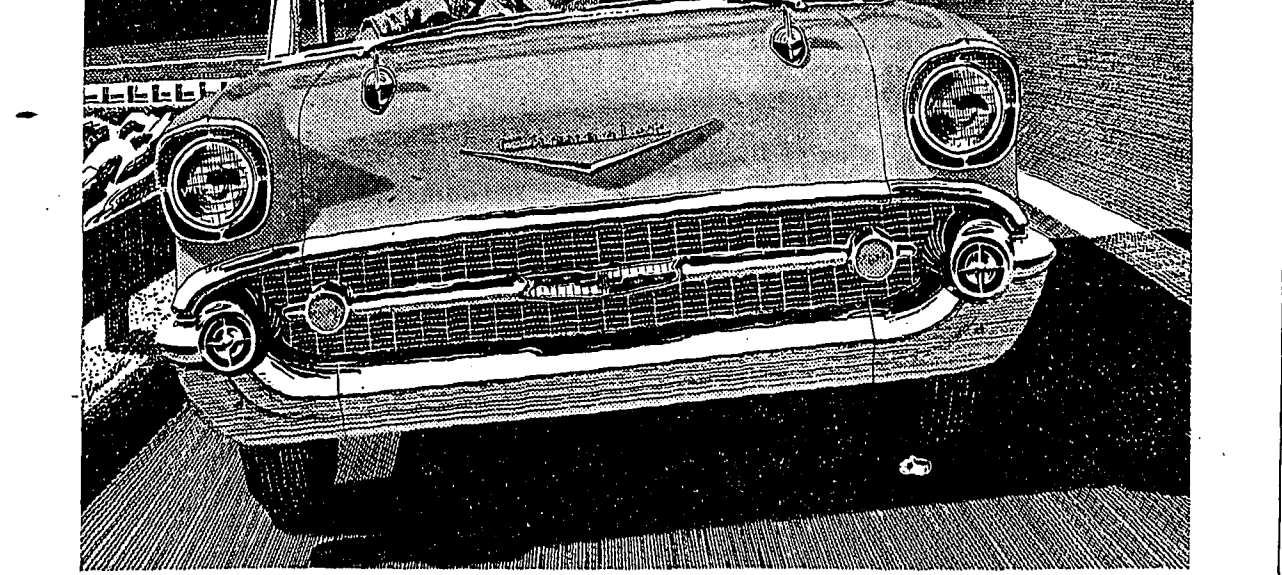

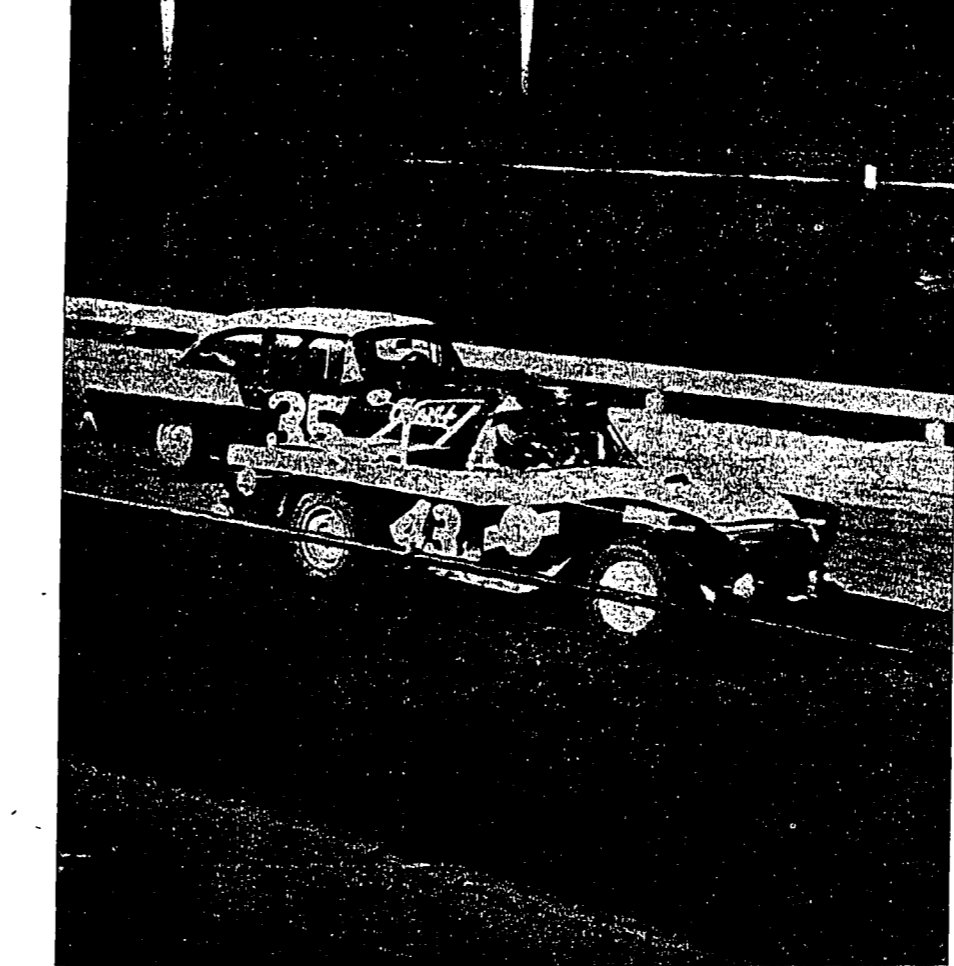

Let Us Look At Birth Rates
During the thirties, birth rates in the U.S. had been running about 37 per thousand. Just before World War II, in 1938, the birth rate was 17.6 per thousand, and in 1943 it was 21.5. Then it began to fall, and slipped lower through the rest of the war years. This was accompanied by a scarcity of men due to the draft, with a surplus of women workers. While normal manufacturing was greatly curtailed, the war created an excessive demand for labor for war industries. Therefore, labor adjusted itself fairly well.

What About The Outlook?
As the oldest of this postwar crop of babies is now under twelve years of age, no relief can be expected (without a severe business depression) for at least five years. The situation is being tinkered with still further by minimum wage and other labor legislation. In the meantime, business is prosperous and production is close to an all-time high. This means that the supply of labor is low and the demand for labor is high.

Almost without exception the members have come out of the meetings with a better understanding of one another's problems. And, more important, it appears that their discussions have led to better relations between the two groups.

Michigan Mirror Dems Take Over Schools, Highways in State

REPUBLICANS HAVE DEPARTED from their last two top elective posts in state government. The party is already working to win back the highway department and the department of public instruction from the Democrats but for now, they are on the outside looking in.

Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler, in office for 12 years, said he was going fishing, far from the scenes of some of the bitterest political battles in state history.

Ziegler's farewell was a veiled challenge to his Democratic successor, Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie.

"I extend my greetings to my successor, and I am confident you will secure him the same fine cooperation which I have enjoyed," Ziegler said.

Major projects are being worked out for U.S.-21, U.S.-101, M-30, U.S.-12, U.S.-27, U.S.-2, U.S.-23, U.S.-10, U.S.-16, U.S.-112, M-53, U.S.-24 and the Detroit expressway.

A Look at the Record Of 1957 Legislature

Editors Note: The 1957 state legislative session is over, and state senators and congressmen are now enjoying a vacation from their chores in Lansing. Since now is a good time to review the record of the recent session, The Record-News here presents a brief rundown on legislative action which pertains to the Northville, Novi and metropolitan Detroit area.

Added two lay members to State Board of Equalization and took Director of Agriculture and Auditor General off.

Legislative Pension Act. May receive \$2,000 a year after 16 years of service at the age of 60.

Authorize acquisition of historic quarters on Mackinac Island as state shrine.

Dividing line of misdemeanor and felony raised to \$100 from \$50 in cases involving malicious destruction, embezzlement, larceny and certain others.

Probate judges, maximum pension of \$6,000 instead of \$4,000. Increase time for appeal in justice courts of cities of more than 80,000 population from five to ten days and raise juror's fees from \$4 to \$6 a day.

Allow circuit judges to hold court in Niles as well as Centerville. Conciliation division in municipal courts to receive and informally settle claims of \$100 or less.

Midemnor to sell minor beverages with any alcoholic content under a name or condition which gives the impression it is beer. Prohibit "near beer" sales to minors. Add two members to the liquor commission after abolishing two.

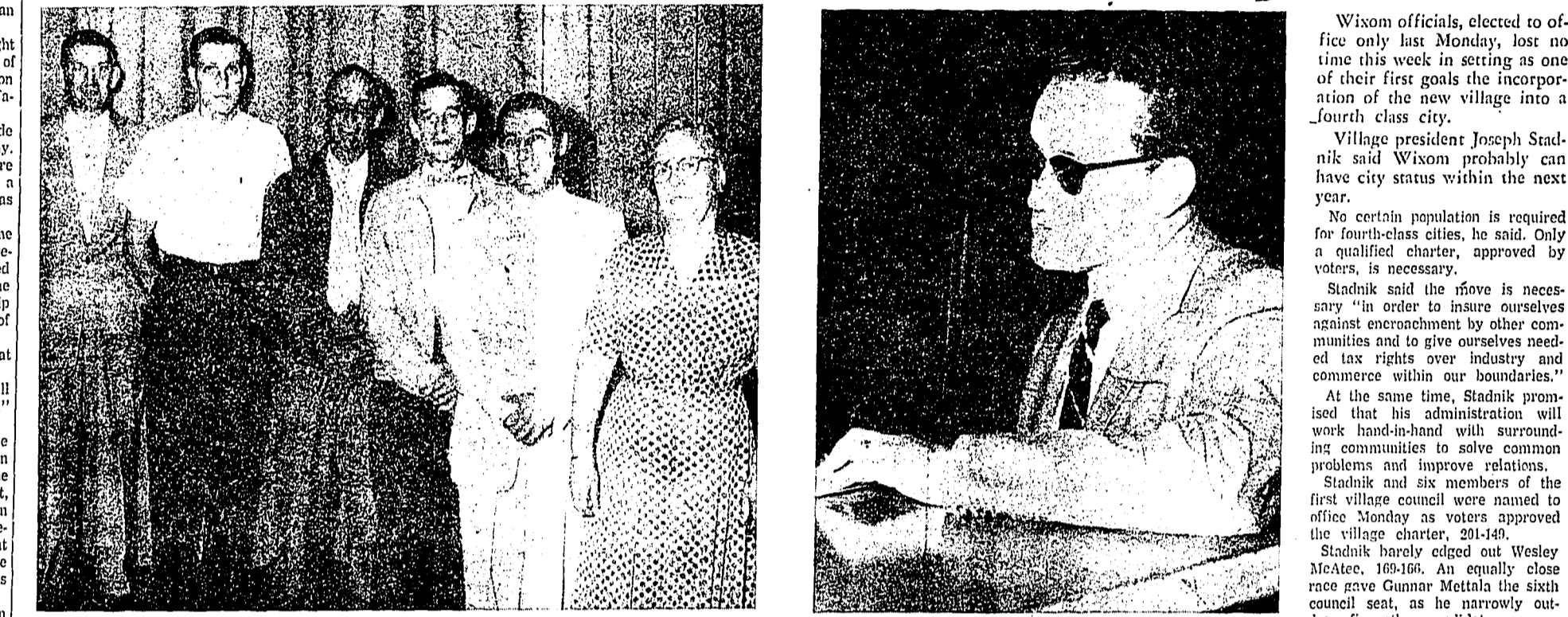
