New residential construction under way and planned will be reflected in even greater numbers of students in the immediate future. To meet this current and future growth in school population the school district is proceeding with a building schedule based upon careful population studies made by a citizens' advisory group. To date no children are on half-day schedules and no elementary school classrooms are The high school situation is somewhat more critical and will emain so until the new high school is completed. 

## Big Cars, Little Homes

Babson Park, Mass. — The automobile is not only revolu-tionizing highways, retailing and financing; but also the style of buildings and homes. Simple arithmetic will prove that with the narrow business streets in the older cities, one of three things will happen: — (1) The fifty-year-old brick buildings will be torn down and replaced by modern one-story buildings; or (2) the streets will be widened; or (3) all stores will be open evenings. New shopping centers

SMALLER HOMES WILL BE BUILT Another example of simple mathematics: — People can borrow only so much money. This limit is fast being reached. If families are to have one or two larger automobiles, these families must be satisfied with smaller and fewer rooms in their home. As autos become larger and more expensive, homes must become smaller and less expensive. I therefore forecast that many of my readers will

turn their present houses into apartments.

All new homes will not have garages; but all will have enough land so that the family cars can be kept off the streets. The new style of architecture will be based on the Old Cape Cod house of one and one-half stories, or else people will live in duplex or co-operative apartments. People gave up their "horse and buggy" when the bought an automobile. They will learn to give up their present style of homes. Putting more money into the automobile may result in putting less money into the home. This will especially be true if we are facing

space. There will be one large "living room" in which the family will live, cook and eat. There will be no "kitchen". With frozen foods and infra-red cooking, only a few minutes will be needed to prepare a meal. From such cooking there will be no mess or odor.

Every house will, however, have two bathrooms, — one for the parents, who will sleep on the first floor; one for the children, who will sleep on the second floor. Typical bathtubs of the present day will be seen only in museums. Bedrooms will be much smaller, comparing more with the staterooms on ocean liners or on delux trains. Heating and air-conditioning will be much cheaper and more common. Both hot and cold air will come into the houses through underground pipes as gas and water now come. Electricity will be

Clothes can be much cheaper. Cloth will no longer be woven as cloth is today. Cloth will be made like paper cellophane. This unwoven new "synthetic cloth" will come out of a machine as finished dresses for the women and children, or as finished suits for the men. Some women readers will say, "Impossible, women will insist on wearing different dresses and hats." These, of course, can differ in colors, but women will then be satisfied with standard clothes. The automobile will standardize clothing. There will be a few different makes of clothes at different price ranges. Auto dealers and gas stations

Yes, revolutionary changes to be caused by the automobil have just commenced. Far greater changes are ahead. As "drive-in theatres" are following indoor theatres, so "drive-in schools" and "drive-in churches" will follow. Banks are now taking many of their deposits direct from customers who drive up in automobiles to special window. Store show-windows, which have been a fruitfi source of advertising for their merchants, will become of less value as more people pass in autos. More duplex and co-operative apartment houses are coming. Renting automobiles will largely take the place of buying them. This same may apply to furniture, and even clothes. This will especially be true if our nation is facing either War or Disarmament due to the threat of Russian Fallout.



## Novi Had Beginning Under Tons of Ice

history of Novi. They were originally written as a master's degree thesis by William O'Brien, a Southfield bigh school teacher who lives in Willowbrook Village. Next week's article will cover the early settlement of Novi.)

Novi township is one of 25 townships which comprise Oakland county, a part of the Detroit metropolitan area in southeastern Michigan. It lies the southern border of the county, adjoining Wayne county, and is the fourth town-

ship moving west.
The name "Novi" was selected in 1830 because of its "being sufficiently brief and easily written, and yet by no means commonplace or homely, "according to an 1877 history of the county.

Popular legend, however, has it that Novi was named either after a Greek town in which a former resident was born, or after the fact that it was the "No. VI" stop on a postal route out Grand River It might be added, seeking name justification, that until 1830 the township was known as "West Farmington", and


During the earliest period, when the moraines were stationary, water deposited sediment diagonally from southwest to northeast across the township - forming the Commerce gravel plain. Two areas on the gravel plain have higher reief, suggesting broken ice masses from the main ice sheet. After forming the Commerce plain and the Defiance-Fort Wayne moraine, the ice retreated again until the edge of the sheet reached a diagonal in southeastern Novi. Thus the Defiance channel (including Willowbrook Village) and the

Defiance moraine were formed. When the ice retreated to the southeast from Novi, the sheet entered the now disappeared Lake Maumee, a glacial lake in Farmington township directly east of Novi. The physiographic features, then, are two moraines and two small plains which create a rolling terrain in a south-

westerly to northeasterly direction. The highest points follow the crest of the Fort Wayne-Defiance moraine and the lowest points are east and south at the Defiance channel. The maximum height is about 150 feet, and the slope is southeasterly except in the northwest where the slope is northwesterly. Drainage, of course, is directly related to the high and

Walled Lake, covering about 640 acres was evidently one of the Oakland lakes which pre-dated the last ice age. Its name is derived from a wall of large glacial boulders which were found on its shores when the first settlers moved into

Since Walled Lake is east of the Fort Wayne-Defiance crest, its stream and tributaries flow southeasterly, emptying into the Middle Rouge river. West of the crest, drainage i northwesterly into the Huron river.




