## Meeting with State Eyed By Board of Commerce

State highway officials may be in Novi next month to hear complaints and answer questions concerning the new Farmington-Brighton expressway and its effect on Novi.

The Novi board of commerce, at the recommendation of supervisor Frazer Staman, agreed Thursday night to invite state highway commissioner John C. Mackie to its next meeting.

The meeting would be open to the public and would give Novi residents a chance to air their complaints.

In suggesting the invitation, Staman noted that the expressway has, and probably will continue to upset Novi's commercial development.

Staman suggested that state officials should be invited to the post-mortem of signs indicating that motorists are entering Novi, of a designation of old Grand River as "alternate US-16, and of improving exit ramps so that large vehicles can enter and leave the expressway more easily.

"These problems should be corrected," he said.

Board of commerce officials will announce further plans for the meeting later.

President Dierck Trautman, conducting his first meeting since being elected last month, announced a new group of committees to deal with Novi's current business problems.

Named to an industrial committee, which Trautman said could do more for Novi than any other group, were Walter Zuk, Staman, Keith Metcalf, Frank Watanabe, Russ Boston, Clark Crawford, and Henry Bashaian.

A welcoming committee was set up to greet new businessmen and encourage their participation in community affairs.



## from the PASTOR'S STUDY

**FOUR HANDS HEAVENWARD**  
"Four Hands Heavenward" is the title of an artist's drawing on the editorial page of a newspaper that just reached my desk. Two hands are lifted in prayer, alongside of two hands of a clock that point upward to the hour of twelve.

The first two hands are an adaptation of Albrecht Durer's famous "Praying Hands". Every detail in the hands is expressive. The prominent veins picture the pulsation of life. The hands are pressed together, as though every last need of body and soul were included in one supplication of prayer and thanksgiving. The fingertips taper toward heaven to indicate that help can come only from God. No face is seen. No furrowed brow, or expectant eyes, or joyful mouth—only hands that express everything, and chiefly this, that the prayer is proceeding from the heart.

Above the hands is a Bible verse: "I will, therefore, that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands..." (1 Tim. 2:8)

All of this is superimposed on the face of a clock, near to heavy black hands that tell the time of the world we are living in.

**TIME IS RUNNING OUT, PRAY!**  
Once again we have stepped from an old year into a new one. It seems like only a few days ago, and here it is already the middle of the first month. So time marches and rushes on. But it is getting close to the end of the year. Above the hands is the name of Jesus, the "Lamb of God, which taketh away the sins of the world." (John 1:29).


There is one other important instruction God gives us concerning prayer. When praying for spiritual blessings we should ask that God is still giving to us. One way of doing that is by praying.

Some people think that prayer is a waste of time. They foolishly believe that they are too busy to pray, too busy to take time on a Sunday morning to pray together with others in the house of God, too busy in their daily routine of life, too busy solving their own problems with their own puny and feeble reason to take time to pray—as though turning to the almighty and all-knowing God for help and counsel were a waste of time. God wants us to take time to pray everywhere, in all situations.

**DOES GOD HEAR PRAYER?**  
Can we be sure that God will hear our prayers? Yes, but only if we pray with repentant hearts and with firm faith in Jesus. The passage we quoted before continues: "lifting up holy hands, WITHOUT WRATH AND DOUBTING." That means that our hearts must be free from bitterness, vengeance, hatred, and wrath. It also means that we must pray with firm trust that for Jesus' sake our prayer will be answered. God is disposed to hear our prayers only if we believe that Jesus is our Savior. Therefore, we are to pray in the name of Jesus. A previous passage in the same chapter of First Timothy reads: "There is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all." Since Christ is the only One who paid a satisfactory ransom for our sins, He is the only one who can be our Mediator in our prayers to God. The hands we lift up to God can be holy hands only because we have in the cleansing blood of Christ, the "Lamb of God, which taketh away the sins of the world." (John 1:29).


The Northville student is Geraldine Schell, 811 Horton.

After last Friday night, Holly's Mustangs probably have very few kind words for Northville. In fact, the mere mention of their tangle with the Mustangs that night might be disastrous. It was all too similar to a snowy night last fall when the Mustangs bumped the undefeated Broncos from the Wayne-Oakland football title and then went on to win it themselves.

No championship was at stake Friday night, but the Broncos did come for first place. All that changed in 22 scoreless minutes, however, as the Mustangs sent Holly crashing to its first defeat of the season.

It was poetic justice in one respect. Last year, Holly was the team which snapped Northville's 14-game winning streak and nudged the Mustangs from undisputed possession of first place.

The final score—61-43—was bad enough for Holly. But even harder to swallow was the 18-point lead that Northville had two minutes before the game ended.

As Holly's coach put it, "That was the worst night yet."

For the Mustangs and the standing-room-only crowd at the community building, however, it was the best night yet.

"It wasn't just that we beat Holly," said happy coach Stan Johnston. "The big thing was that we broke like a ball club for the first time this year."

Examples were on every hand: —Cap Peppers, after a wobbly start, glittered throughout the game. Even with Ed George McDaniel hovering around him, Peppers netted 22 points, gathered in 24 rebounds, and seldom let Holly have a second shot at the bucket.

—Bob Starnes busted up the Broncos' changing defense at several crucial points by snagging bullets, like passes into Peppers or Bill Yahné under the boards.

—Fred Schwarz gained a starting guard position by harassing the Holly offense into costly mistakes and outright fumbles.

—Yahné, Dan Howell and N. C. Schander married Holly's McDaniel so effectively that the big center ended up with nine points for the game, and only two in the second half.

—Dick Beyer broke down court early in the second half, as the Mustangs padded their lead from three points to 15.

The Mustangs were unsteady at first, and Holly took an early lead. But late in the first quarter, Starnes swished a 20-footer to make it 11-10, and Northville never trailed again.

The Mustangs, led by the ball-stealing Beyer and Starnes, pushed their lead to 29-10 in the second quarter. But Holly stormed back to a 29-30 halftime margin.

In the first four minutes of the third quarter, Northville put in 12 points to Holly's 2, as the Mustangs' fast break went to work. One long pass from Peppers to Beyer would have gone for a touchdown if it had been football instead of basketball.

By the middle of the fourth quarter, Holly was routed. With the court at 38-40, Johnston flooded the court with reserves. The Broncos popped in a quick 10 points, but the Mustangs were out of reach.







State Launches Campaign for New Industry

LAUDABLE HARMONY: government and industry are starting a joint campaign to sell Michigan to the world and each other. It is part of a program to look on the other side of the state's economic climate, and the flight of business and industry to other states because of taxes and labor costs. Dan Gerber, president of Gerber's Baby Products at Fremont and chairman of the Michigan Economic Development Commission, said the theme of the campaign is "Michigan Means Business."

"The need is for Michigan people to cooperate in solving their problems and to cooperate in selling their state," he said. About 100 of the state's leading businessmen and industrialists have agreed to take part in a program of "Industrial Ambassadors" to carry the word of Michigan's attractions on their travels around the nation.

The campaign broadside does not get into the controversy over taxes and labor costs which has raged over the past two years. The in-state political impact of this battle between Republicans, who claim Williams' tax ideas are driving business and industry elsewhere, and Democrats who deny everything, is still unknown. It can be gauged after the 1958 campaign when Democrats seek to extend their almost blanket control of state elective offices. Gerber said 20 new industries located in Michigan in 1957. If the selling campaign is successful, the GOP change will lose some of its punch when the votes are counted next November.

The significance of the 1958 election is not lost by either party. Democrats feel it is their last chance under Williams to take full control of state government. Republicans know they must start a comeback soon, or maybe never. Democrats are aiming for a new foothold in the legislature, still dominated by Republicans. In the January 4 inauguration, Democrats formally took over five seats on the Michigan Supreme Court bench, control of the state board of agriculture which governs Michigan State University and gained a 4 to 4 split on the University of Michigan Board of Regents. ## Novi in Early 1900's Those Were the Good ol' Days

John Richter is almost blind, but his memories of early days in Novi are as clear as ever.

Last week, those memories were stirred anew when he came across an old, yellowing, dog-eared volume that once belonged to his father.

It was a 1899 plat record of Oakland county, and on pages 50 and 51 were maps of Novi. The names of property owners — "Helen Jones, O' Doc Holcomb, 'Toot' McCrum, and others — set John to talking about life in Novi during the early 1900's.

"I was more of a town than it is now," he said. "The four corners is just an intersection nowadays, but back then Novi was a real metropolis."

"There was Whipple's elevator and a cheese factory by the railroad tracks, a barrel factory behind it, a couple stockyards owned by Ed Holmes and Lou Boulton, and the two churches stood right where they are now."

"The Novi hotel, where Harrowood's gas station is, was a big stop for travelers, and there was a place behind it where cattle could be rested overnight on their way to slaughteryards in Detroit."

"And we had a couple of blacksmith shops, a woolhouse, an apple drier, a livery barn, and I don't know what else."

Novi was out in the country then, John concedes, but it had its lively moments.

"We used to have turkey shoots in front of the hotel," he says, "and whoever put the most shot into a board won the turkey. Well, 'Toot' McCrum — he was a basketball player — was the best shot I ever saw. He had an old six-gauge muzzle-loader, somewhere, and tossed a full sack of shot in it."

"He aimed it and fired, and all of a sudden he was slammed backwards across the gravel and up against the wall. He had a hole in his head, and he was dead."

"But 'Toot' had hit the board. In fact, he could find no splinters. So he got the turkey, and was satisfied."

"Most of Novi's social life, if it could be called that, centered around several stores at the Four Corners. There was O'Connell's Hall in what was Blomberg's drug store, and where Buck Rogers' used to sell clothes, hardware and a 'bunk coffee' that you had to drink by hand."

"Helen Jones ran the post office (No. 17) out of Detroit which John insists gave Novi its name many years before the public meeting of 1907 that named the town."

Where Watson's Moblog station is, Charles Holmes had a butcher shop. Most of the meat, John said, was sold to the residents of the slaughterhouse south of town.

## Fire Hall at Park Is Out; Building Inspector Hired

The Novi township park suddenly became unavailable as a site for temporary inspector Harold Ack-Novi's proposed new fire hall this week.

The state conservation department ruled that a fire hall would not be built there because it would interfere with public use of the park.

The decision Monday night came as a surprise to board members, who have gone ahead with plans to build a \$40,000 fire hall and polling place in the park.

Superior Fraser Staman produced an earlier conservation department opinion which indicated that restrictions on the park's use, which were made by the Dodge brothers when they originally decided the site to be a state park, no longer are valid since the brothers' are now dead.

The board appointed a county drain commission plan to clean the Novi/Lake drain near Wixom road and 10 Mile. It would cost property-owners \$1,825. Most of the cost is covered by the state.

In any case, it appears that the hall is to be built, the board met by a site and install new plumbing facilities.

## Village Election Set for March 17 Definite OK Is Expected Tomorrow

Novi probably will vote on March 17 on whether to incorporate the township as a village.

That date was set Monday by the Oakland county boundary committee and now needs only final approval by the county board of supervisors at its meeting Friday.

Novi incorporation officials immediately made plans for a public meeting on February 3 to explain to voters the procedure facing them between now and election time.

The boundaries committee quickly approved Novi's petitions and census forms Monday. Novi officials, including members of the original five-member incorporation committee, were present.

As approved by the boundaries committee, the petition call for the proposed village to include all of Novi township except portions in Northville, Wixom and Northville Estates and Brookland Farms subdivisions.

The boundaries committee did not question the right of Brookland Farms to exclude itself from the proposed village. Residents of that subdivision would not sign petitions, preferring to remain independent of Novi village.

Several residents of Brookland Farms attended the meeting and reportedly satisfied any reservations that they might have had about omitting the subdivision.

Incorporation committee chairman Walter Tucker announced Tuesday that a public meeting for Novi voters will be held February 3 at 8 p.m. in the Novi community building.

At that time, committee members and attorneys will explain election procedures, including the matter of naming a shorter commission, writing a village charter, and eventually scheduling a final election to approve the charter and name a village council.

"That meeting will wind up our committee's work—except for one problem," said Tucker. "So far, we've along with several other attorneys' fees and had \$300 for various sources, but there is still a \$700 deficit."

"At the February 3 meeting," he said, "we'll take up this question and see what should be done about it."

If the election date is approved by the board of supervisors tomorrow, an announcement probably will be made next week as to how candidates for the village charter commission can get about filing petitions. Other election details also would be revealed soon.

## New Subdivision to Have Lake

## Lincoln Now Part Of M-E-L Division

The Lincoln automobile got a new look as a result of the merger of new blood brothers last week.

But the family addition apparently will have little effect on operations of the Lincoln plant in Wixom.

The latest additions are the Edsel and a full line of imported English vehicles made by Ford — the Lincoln, Prefect, Consul, Zephyr and Zodiac cars and the Thames van truck.

The division to be headed by general manager James J. Nance, will be responsible for engineering, manufacturing and marketing the Lincoln, Continental, Mercury and Edsel and for marketing the English cars and the Thames van truck.

But each of the car lines will be merchandised and advertised separately and under separate franchises for each car line will still be handled on an individual basis.

The Thunderbolt, produced at the Ford plant in Wixom, will continue to come from the Ford division of Ford Motor Co. Nowdays, the car is the second major Ford reorganization since the Lincoln plant opened last spring. At that time, Lincoln was a separate division of Ford. But last fall, Lincoln and Mercury were remerged. Lincoln's office headquarters were merged with those of Mercury in Dearborn.
