GOP Going 'All Out' to Get Williams

REPUBLICANS ARE looking for a candidate seven months before they try again to wrest the state's top office from the Democrats. Many will come out only one will be chosen. The party is working on its "new look" as 1958 gets underway — setting up a \$220,700 budget and getting issues organized for the campaign.

They believe Gov. Williams, five terms in office and expected to try for a sixth, is a more vulnerable spot than at any time in his history-making career in Michigan politics. Democrats, remembering the landslide, cannot be budged from their confidence in Williams, who brought the party all the back streets and secured state government from top to near bottom with the party faithful.

Every appointive office is held by Democrats, all administrative offices are in their hands. The last session of Republicanism in the legislature — is the party's next major target. There has been an almost complete turnover since Williams, appointed by a Republican governor in 1950 with a victory. He was the only Democrat in the inaugural January 1, 1950.

Now, Republicans claim they are reviving in their party the same spirit Democrats brought into their last of 10 years of political dominance. Republicans have a budget for next year and an organization built from the ground up in all of Michigan's 35 counties. They will pay state chairman Lawrence L. Lindner \$21,000 this year, plus a \$9,000 expense account. They will keep their publicist, Arthur Levin, and give him an assistant.

Democrats have shown the way of modern politics with professional means and year-around campaigning. But most important, Republicans are the issues. "After 10 years in office, the governor admits, the state is bankrupt — the debt is a failure," said Senator Edward Hutchinson (R-Fennville).

They point to the flight of business and industry to other states, changing that the moves are being made to escape Williams' proposed tax increases. They talk sincerely about the "unhealthy economic climate" produced by Williams' long record of title sympathy for businessmen. About 40 percent of the taxpayers pay less than \$50 each. This equals 95 percent of total revenue. Only 4 percent pay more than \$1,000 which makes up 90 percent of the tax.

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Incorporation Activity Picks Up

New X-Way Scheduled For 1960

An 11 mile expressway connecting the Farmington-Brighton expressway with the future Northwestern superhighway is definitely in the works. The superhighway, an object of criticism by U.S. Congressman William Brockway and Pontiac business groups, will connect Novi with the Northwestern-John Lodge expressway route.

Novi will have two superhighway routes into downtown Detroit: the future Grand River expressway, and the 11-mile Northwestern-Lodge route. Mackle also announced that the entire US-16 Detroit-Muskegon expressway will be under contract by 1958. The recently-opened Farmington-Brighton superhighway is a part of that system.

In addition, Mackle said that Eight Mile will be converted into an expressway from Northwestern to Grand River, giving Northville and southern Novi residents a superhighway route most of the way into Detroit.

The Oakland county road commission also got on the road-building bandwagon last week with the announcement that it will begin the long-awaited relocation of Eight Mile north of Northville this year. At present, Eight Mile (Bassett) dips into Northville for about a mile.

At least last week, the state announced plans for some 600 high-way projects within the next five years and the county revealed plans for 18 roads.

The Record barely missed walking away with top honors. The judges report of The Record said: "Here is a publication slightly more orthodox and it missed a top spot by a plea. Stadnik Improves; Council Works On
The Wixom village council met Monday night to discuss the proposed village. They are Northville Estates and the parts in Wixom and Northville. Stadnik is now back on his feet and is expected to resume his village duties shortly. The council agreed to meet next Tuesday with a citizens advisory group to study suggestions for a village traffic ordinance. The citizens group has studied possible clauses for the ordinance and is now ready to present its findings to the council.

Names of candidates will be on the village incorporation ballot March 17, and voters will elect five of the candidates. The commission then will write a charter which will be submitted to voters for approval. If incorporation is not approved on March 17, however, the charter commission will not serve. Barchett said only residents of the boundaries of the village may vote. But there is a chance that residents of the area currently involved in an annexation suit between Novi and Northville may not be allowed to vote. A decision is expected soon.

The entire procedure leading up to the election and the writing of a charter will be discussed at a public meeting at 8 p.m. next Monday in the Novi community building. Novi residents have been urged to attend so as to inform themselves not only of those procedures, but of the issues involved in the incorporation question itself. The meeting will be the last function of the five-man Novi board of commerce committees which set the incorporation wheels in motion last summer. The committee, under chairman Walter Tuck, is expected to ask for ideas on how to raise funds to cover the nearly \$1,000.00 which is spent on attorney fees and other incorporation preparations.

Abrams Is Member Of Land Use Panel
Herbert Abrams, chairman of the Wixom Planning Commission, will participate in a seven-member panel discussion on resource development Friday at Ecology Center on the campus of Michigan State University. The meeting will be a part of the week-long Michigan Farmers' event at East Lansing. The discussion will be entitled "Land Use Changes Accelerated by Modern Highways". Specifically, the panel will examine the changes that may be expected by the completion of the new Farmington-Brighton expressway. With Abrams on the panel will be William F. Jewell of the Metropolitan Planning Commission; Frank W. Suggitt, resource development department of MSU; Arthur E. Warren, real estate department of MSU; Ross S. Campbell, Thompson-Brown company of Detroit; Carl Goldschmidt, urban planning department of MSU; and Charles Coffman, Livingston county extension director. The meeting will be held at 10 a.m.

Novi Road Now Speed Limit Now
Novi road is no longer a speedway. Police chief Lee BeGoGo warned motorists to slow down that the treacherous road is now posted at 40 mph from Northville to Walled Lake except for a 30 mph stretch near Grand River. "Drivers who go faster than that are not only breaking the law," he said, "but they're taking a chance on being bounced into the ditch."

BeGoGo said police now are merely warning motorists until they get accustomed to the new speed limit. But tickets will be issued soon.

SPEAKING for the Record

Farmington's city council is deeply concerned about the lack of proper development of its downtown shopping area.

Two weeks ago they decided it was time to do something about it. Consequently, Geer Associates, a Birmingham planning firm, was hired to suggest a complete program for the redevelopment of downtown Farmington.

According to Earl Scherffus, Farmington city manager, the council means to stand behind the findings of Geer.

While the council has taken the preliminary steps alone, Scherffus added that it has had the backing of many businessmen and would seek their cooperation in the completion of the program.

Like many other suburban communities, Farmington apparently fears loss of business to outside shopping centers, more attractive to the housewife who likes to shop in modern surroundings with convenient parking.

Specifically, the council has asked the consultants to tell them how to provide parking, improve or build streets, tear down buildings, erect new ones.

The planning alone will probably take three years and cost \$7,000. Some constructive changes may be made this year, however. The Farmington city manager said that the council is determined to back up the recommendations of the consultants with condemnation proceedings if necessary. "Naturally, we hope to get the complete cooperation of the businessmen," he added.

Tentative plans call for a perimeter street around the downtown shopping area. Offstreet parking would be provided at strategic quadrants.

Scherffus said that the council hopes that by creating a more favorable climate in downtown Farmington, more business will be induced into the community.

"Already we have had several inquiries from businesses interested in locating here as a result of the announcement of this plan," the city manager added.

Financing a project of this scope will undoubtedly be the major stumbling block, although Scherffus said that there is a possibility of Federal aid.

The progress of Farmington's plan bears watching. Planning is one thing; application another. The road to the city end will present many knotty problems. How they cope with them will undoubtedly interest local councilmen and planners who have already recognized the need for certain improvements in our business section.

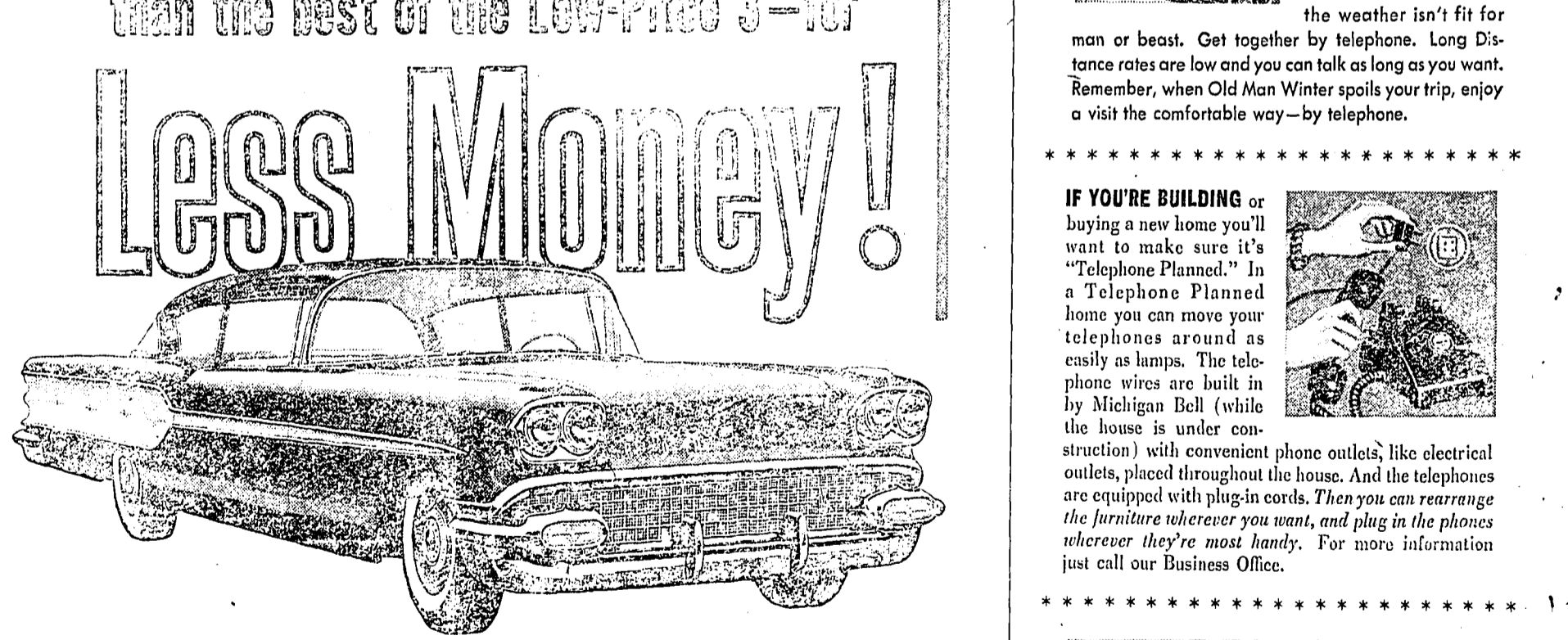

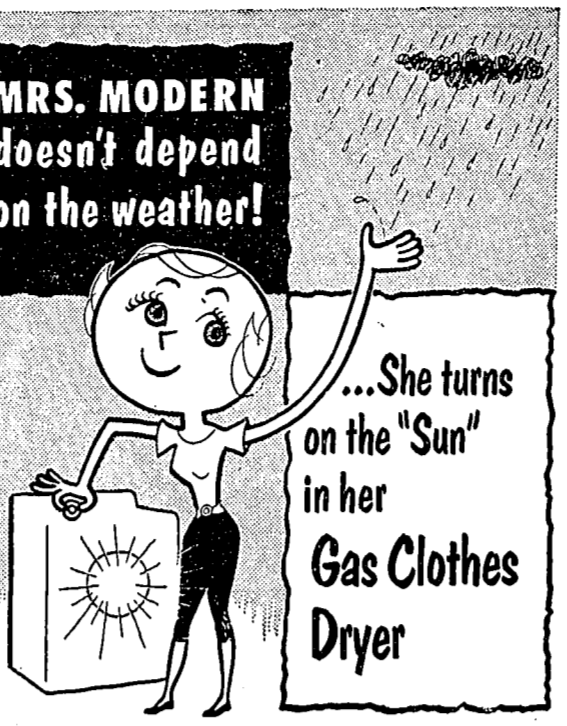

Predict Hot Session On Labor Legislation

FRINGE ISSUES before the 1958 legislature have developed an importance all their own while the state's finances form the core of knotty problems.

There is a chance that labor legislation — the right to work issue — will become one of the hottest of the session.

Significantly, labor has generally favored Democrats. Republican claim further that Democrats and unions used each other to gain power in Michigan and share control of state government.

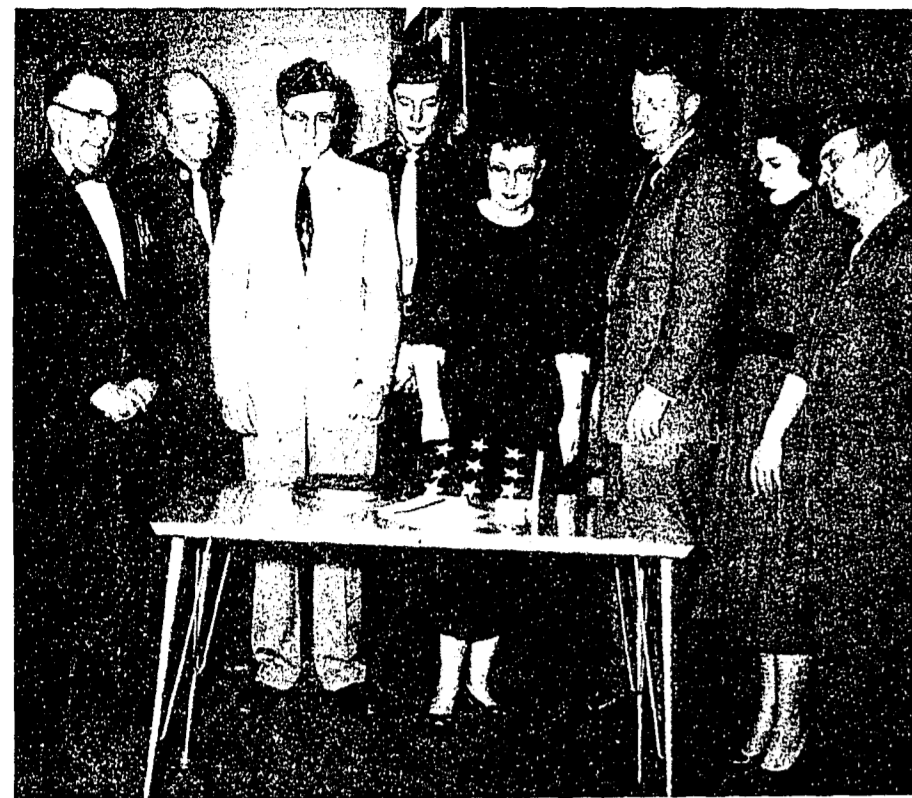

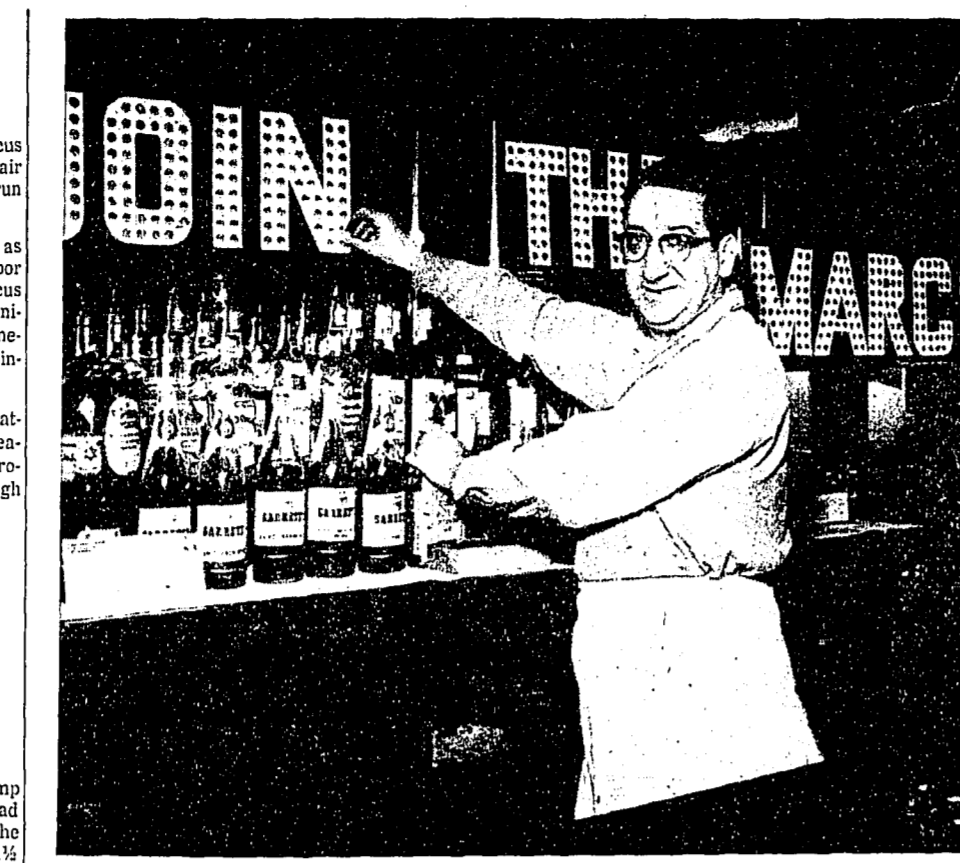

The clinic will be held February 20 and 25 at the Novi community building.

On either day, any Novi adult or child can get a first, second or third inoculation of Salk vaccine for \$1. A second clinic will be held next month, and a third in the fall, so that the full series of three inoculations will be available through the program.

Campbell will discuss plans for the 2,000-home Thompson-Brown development at Grand River and Willowbrook roads.

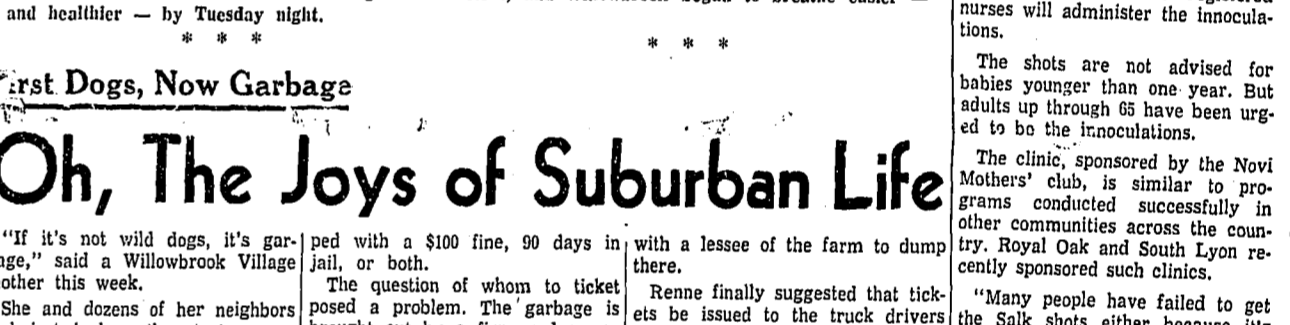

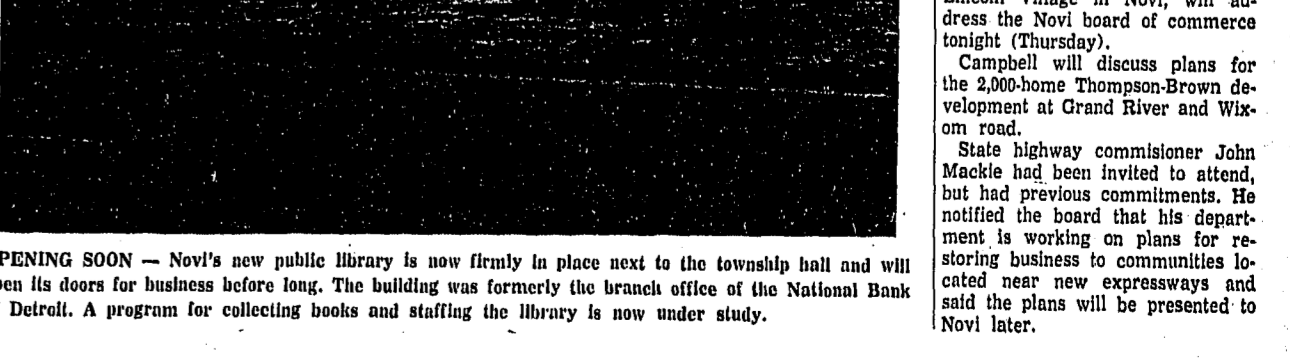
A doctor and three registered nurses will administer the inoculations. The shots are not advised for babies younger than one year. But adults over 16 are urged to get the inoculation.
