### Rail Stocks Future Dim Most of the early planning in the first stages of construction were achieved before Mackie took office

Babson Park, Mass. - The recent suicide of Mr. Robert Young, chairman of the New York Central Railroad, brings to my attention the problems of the whole railroad industry. As a matter of fact, President Alpert, of the New Haven Railroad recently asked the Public Service Commission of Massachusetts to close over 50 railroad stations and discontinue a large number of trains, including crack trains, between Boston and New York.

#### REASONS FOR RAILROAD CURTAILMENT

One of the main reasons given for the railroads' troubles is that commuter passenger business does not pay, and is provided only at a large loss to the railroads. This is the business of bringing great numbers of people into a big city every morning, and out again at night, all within short periods of time. In order to provide such service, many stations and much new equipment must be kept in prime ondition all day for this very short use.

Your local stockbroker will tell you whether this situation applies to the railroad whose stocks you now hold. With the Union Paific and Santa Fe, the proportion of commuter business is very small n relation to the total passenger business. On the other hand, with the Pennsylvania or New York Central, the proportion of commuter business is very large. Every railroad must be judged independently. We should not generalize about them.

Another reason for President Alpert's appeal for aid is the taxation levied on railroad real estate. Such taxes enable the cities to raise funds to build turnpikes, airplane terminals, etc., which help the competitors of the railroads. The railroads beg relief from these taxes; otherwise, they threaten to liquidate. Liquidation would, in most cases, give bondholders full payment for their securities but would leave very little for the stockholders. Here again, it will be found that entirely different situations exist with different railroads.

For instance, the New York Central owns much valuable real

estate in the vicinity of the Grand Central Station, New York City. Certain short-line railroads are almost real estate companies rather than railroad companies. The Southern Pacific and Great Northern have valuable oil and ore leases which secure their bonds. Here again, your broker will tell you what railroads have valuable real estate and completed by 1964. nd what railroads have not. You cannot generalize

The competition is not only in rates but also in conveniences. For instance, trucks take the goods from the factory door and deliver them to the consumer. Otherwise, trucks would operate from the factory to the railroad and then again from the railroad to the consumer. There are 50 million automobiles competing with the railroads! The higher the railroads raise their rates, the fewer passengers and the less freight they carry. Pipelines for oil and gas are here to stay; 10 years or more. Two experts in but the carrying of coal and oil by railroads will decrease.

#### LABOR UNION STRANGULATION

One of the greatest handicaps of the railroads is the arbitrary and useless rules of the labor unions. These rules were made years ago before the use of diesel engines, automatic signaling, and the various electrical appliances which now provide safety. The worst of all is the so-called "featherbedding" whereby the railroads must ire largely forbidden to introduce labor-saving equipment.


During the past few months. I have interviewed several railroad presidents. When I asked them the main reason for the difficulties of the railroads, they replied — "because of the foolish, useless, and expensive rules of the labor unions." Unfortunately, it takes much courage for Congressmen or Senators to try to curb union labor.

#### WHAT ABOUT FUTURE OUTLOOKS

A large amount of railroad track should never have been laid. Certain railroads were built, not to carry passengers and freight, but rather to sell stocks and bonds. Such railroad trackage should now be discarded and thousands of railroad stations should be closed. I feel that conditions may go from bad to worse until our whole rail-road system collapses and has to be reorganized. Such reorganization could eliminate the useless duplication.

On the other hand, so many railroad bond issues are secured y so many different kinds of assets that each railroad would have to e reorganized independently. This would be sure to take a long time; but most first-mortgage and certain other railroad bonds should come out in the end worth par and interest. Therefore, my conclusion to nolders of railroad securities is this: It may be better for you to sel your railroad securities now and reinvest the money in some new nd growing industry. Otherwise, reinvest in these railroad BONDS iter, when they will sell for half their present price. I now see little

We, too, own a few acres in thi swamp area, which we bought with the idea of making a permanent home for our family six years ago We had dreams of a small garder on our cleared land and long hours of enjoying the wildlife in our own woods, but these castles in the air crumbled about our feet our first spring in "God's Country". We found that most of our clear land lay under water and if we wanted to plant we would have to join "China" in the raising of rice, as we knew of nothing else that would grow under water. Our beautiful woods was impassable unless equipped with hip boots or a canoe. Our wonderful country air, as the summer progressed and the water became polluted, was more foul-smelling and far unhealthier than any city factory and machinery air could possibly get in that short period of time. Of course there were some nice days, those when the wind blew quite strongly. Our levely modern plumbing inside, just would not function. "Too much water already under the ground, no place for anymore," our septic tank cleaner kent telling us year after year. We still had hores that maybe the following springs would not be such wet ones. We also discovered

a constant musical tone that accom panied our rising water, MOSQUI-TOS thousands of them humming day and night, our days were generally spent inside. Then we discovered that a drainage system had been attempted some 20 years before and had been tried off and on a number of times but never was completed because of objections raised. We then entered a plea for help and for four years attempted to get some results. Two petitions were circulated in a 6-month period, all signed and sealed according to law. A Public notce then appeared in this paper stating that anyone contesting the drain had a period of time to protest in letter or person to the Drain

for a number of weeks. Finally letter to all parties affected, was sent out by the Drain Commission to allow any protests to be brough before probate court within a 10 day period. Nothing was protested egally. The drain was then a reality. We too, won't be surprised to get another tax bill (much larger than some of our neighbors) in some not too distant time, but we will pay, and pay gladly if we feel we are I would like to add that money

had to be given before any work or attempt to drain was even started, as a retainer fee. This, I might say, was handled by two parties alonenever asking or expecting any help from others. I feel a great sense of elation éverytime I look at this big ditch with its ugly black swamp-water becoming more and more of a re-ality every day and hope, that some day soon "God's Country" will be

"It's a brand new thing and the state has required that our plant he 95 percent efficient," said Campbell. He pointed out that this is the highest rate of purity ever required in Michigan. The final approval and construction of the disposal plant is actually the reason for preventing earlier construction of homes, Campbell said. He added that the company would try to schedule the completion of the first homes with the completion date of the disposal plant.

"Novi is in the path of progress. It's like a steam roller and can't be stopped," he continued. "But proper planning can avoid building tomorrow's slums today," he cautioned. Campbell called upon township officials to adopt proper zoning and subdivision regulations. He said the area had not vet been spoiled by poor development and could easily become one of the finest communities in the state. He urged officials to call upon the experience of reput-

able developers to help Novi in its planning. Getting back to Lincoln Village, Campbell said the homes would probably range in price from \$18,000 to \$24,000. "They'll all have a maximum size lor for the price of the home," he added. Lots will range from 80 to 110 foot frontage. "There will be no 'row housing' or duplication," Camppell said. He added that planning included recreational areas (maybe even a swimming pool), and sites for churches

While the project was tentatively planned for completion in five years, Campbell said it may take seven to eight years. He concluded by praising the cooperation and assistance given his firm by Novi officials and promised that Lincoln Village would be "the best job we can do . . . one that will make Novi and Thompson-Brown proud."
