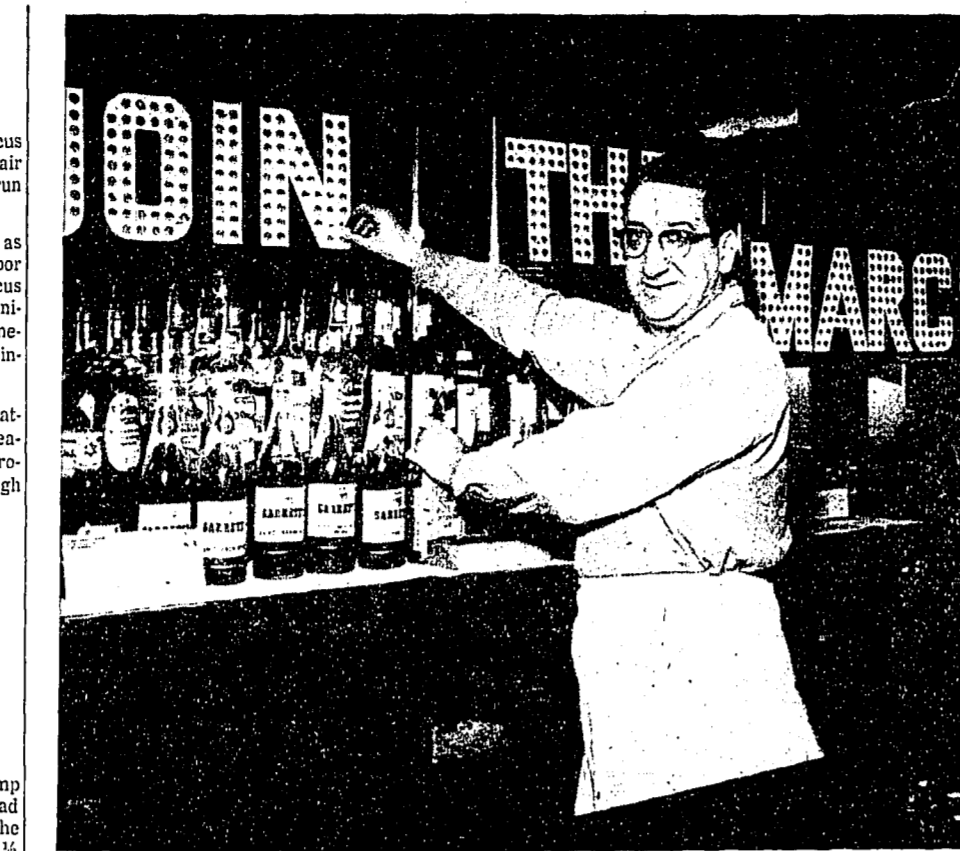

Rail Stocks Future Dim

Babson Park, Mass. — The recent suicide of Mr. Robert Young, chairman of the New York Central Railroad, brings to my attention the problems of the railroad industry. As a matter of fact, President Albert of the New Haven Railroad recently asked the Public Service Commission of Massachusetts to close over 50 railroad stations and discontinue a large number of trains, including cross trains, between Boston and New York.

REASONS FOR RAILROAD CURTAILMENT
One of the main reasons given for the railroads' troubles is that commuter passenger business does not pay, and is provided only at a large loss to the railroads. This is the business of bringing great numbers of people into a big city every morning, and out again at night, all within short periods of time. In order to provide such service, many stations and much new equipment must be kept in prime condition all day for this very short use.

REAL ESTATE TAXES
Another reason for President Albert's appeal for aid is the taxation levied on railroad real estate. Such taxes enable the cities to raise funds to build terminals, airline terminals, etc., which help the commuters of the railroads. The railroads get relief from these taxes; otherwise, they threaten to liquidate. Liquidation would, in most cases, give the cities no relief from their taxes, but would leave very little for the stockholders. Here again, it will be found that entirely different situations exist with different railroads.

RIGHT TO WORK LEGISLATION
This competition is the basic cause of the railroads' difficulties today. The various restrictions upon rates and practices by the Interstate Commerce Commission were instituted when the railroads had a real monopoly. Today, the railroads have no such monopoly. These rate and other restrictions should be eliminated. In fact, I believe that the business of the country, and of the railroads, together with their employees and passengers, would be better off if the Interstate Commerce Commission were entirely eliminated.

LABOR UNION STRATAGEM
One of the greatest handicaps of the railroads is the arbitrary and useless rules of the labor unions. These rules were made years ago before the use of diesel engines, automatic signaling, and the various electrical appliances which now provide safety. The worst of all is the so-called "featherbedding" whereby the railroads must pay for times which is not used in any productive manner while they are largely forbidden to introduce labor-saving equipment.

Mackie Hits Fast on Highway Program

SUPER HIGHWAYS tying together all major Michigan cities and bringing the millions of the cities closer to the playgrounds of the Water Wonderland will be finished in six years. That is the pledge of Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie, 36

Mackie has set up priorities on both Detroit expressway system and the out-state network of limited access multi-lane highways. The total cost will be approximately \$2 billion, about one-third of Michigan's highway needs shown by a survey conducted three years ago. Most of the early planning in the first stages of construction were achieved before Mackie took office last July 1 by his predecessor, Charles M. Ziegler.

But it remains for Mackie to finish the job, connecting the completed pieces of the project. Democrats and Republicans agree that Mackie, ambitious and fast on his feet, cannot help but become the greatest road builder in state history.

Federal aid not available to earlier commissioners will pay for 90 percent of the interstate system, and other financing arrangements have been developed. Most important is the growing public awareness of the need for highways — the pressures which grew through the last years of Ziegler's 12 year regime to a final powerful impact in 1956.

There were skeptics when Mackie announced his \$2,500,000,000 interstate highway program last fall. Contracts came slowly at first but the dam broke in December. Mackie has placed first priority on a super highway linking Detroit and Chicago along US-12, a Detroit to Muskegon route along US-40 and a route from the Ohio like to the Straits of Mackinac using US-23, US-40 and US-41.

He has promised the entire program will be under contract by 1962 and completed by 1964. RIGHT TO WORK legislation may be most controversial in this session. Labor leaders argue that laws which permit employees to work at a unionized plant without belonging to the union are "union busting". Advocates of "right to work" legislation argue that no man should be forced to belong to a union in order to hold his job.

The record seems to indicate that right to work laws, while they might slow down union activity, do not "bust" unions. At present, 19 states have such laws. Some of them for 10 years or more. Two experts in the labor field were unable to point to a single union which ceased to exist because of the laws.

Much union progress, on the other hand, has been reported in the southern part of the country where right to work laws have been in existence for the longest period of time. It will be interesting to see what use both sides of the right to work argument make of the labor picture in states where the law has been in operation.

CALLS GARFIELD DRAIN PLAN OK

To the Editor: In response to the letter written in last week's Record, I, as an interested party in the Garfield Drain, would like to take this opportunity to express my feelings.

We, too, own a few acres in this swamp area, which we bought with the idea of making a permanent home for our family six years ago. We had dreams of a small garden on our cleared land and long hours of enjoying the wildlife in our own woods, but these castles in the air crumbled about our feet our first spring in "God's Country". We found that most of our clear land lay under water and if we wanted to plant we would have to join "China" in the raising of rice, as we knew of nothing else that would grow under water. Our beautiful woods was impassable unless equipped with hip boots or a canoe. Our wonderful country air, as the summer progressed and the water became polluted, was more foul-smelling and far unhealthier than any city factory and machinery air could possibly get in that short period of time. Of course there were some nice days, those when the wind blew quite strongly. Our lovely modern plumbing inside, just would not function. Too much water already under the ground, no place for any more. Our septic tank cleaner kept telling us year after year: "We still had hopes that maybe the drainage springs would not be so bad. You also covered a constant musical tone that accompanied our rising water, MOSQUITOES, thousands all over humming day and night, our days were generally spent inside.

Then we discovered that a drainage system had been attempted some 20 years before and had been tried off and on a number of times but never was completed because of objections raised. We then entered a plea for help and for four years attempted to get some results. Two petitions were circulated in a 6-month period, all signed and sealed according to law. A public notice then appeared in the paper stating that anyone contacting the drain had a period of time to present in letter or person to the Drain Commission, this notice appeared for a number of weeks. Finally a letter to all parties affected, was sent out by the Drain Commission to allow any protests to be brought before probate court within a 10-day period. Notice was given legally. The drain was then a reality. We too, wasn't surprised to get another bill (which was given stated as a retainer fee. This, I might say, was handled by two parties alone—never asking or expecting any help from others.

I feel a great sense of elation everytime I look at this big ditch with its new black swampy ground becoming more and more of a reality every day and hope, that some day soon "God's Country" will be just a little bit sweeter out here because of the Garfield Drain.
