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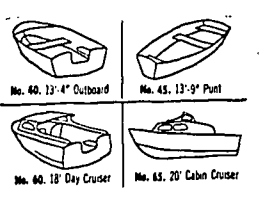
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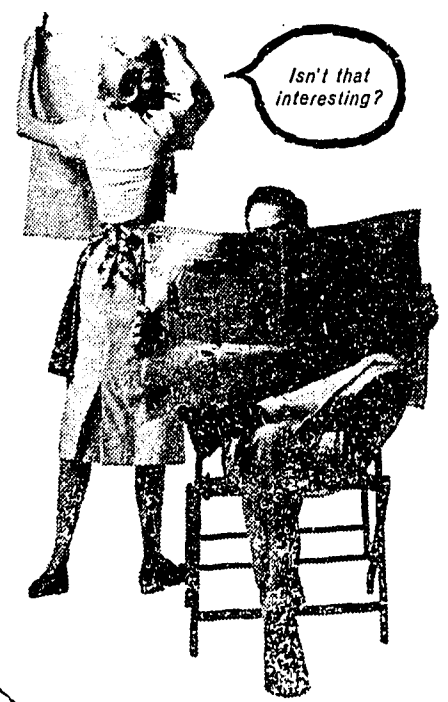
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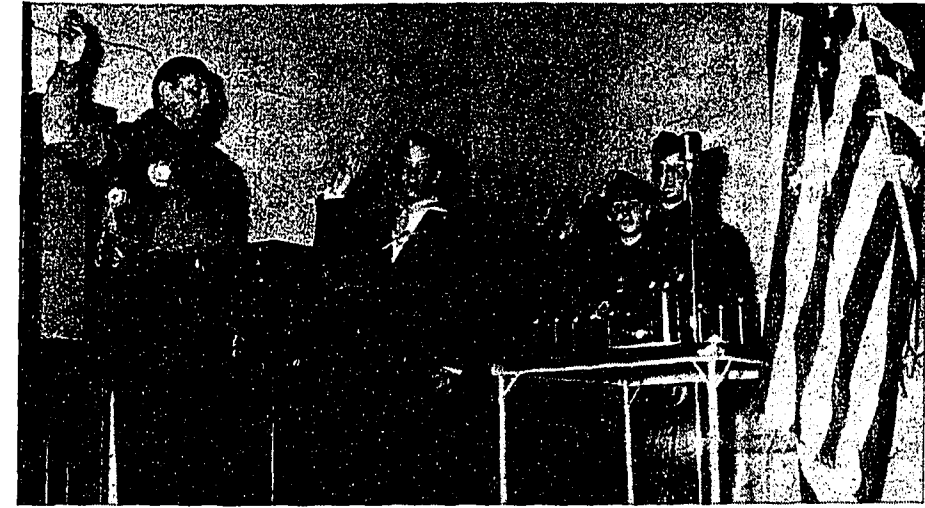

Mrs. Chabut Titles Book 'Preacher Mike'

When Mrs. V. George Chabut speaks about her recently published biography of her father, Dr. Merion S. Rice, she talks with the same humility she attributes to him.

"We were all proud of him," she says, and a glance at the tributes to him by men of the world and men of God would indicate that he was most certainly a father, a minister and a man to be proud of.

The biography was published several weeks ago.

She has titled her book, "Preacher Mike," using the name by which Dr. Rice was known to many friends and admirers.

Dr. Rice, who died in 1943 at the age of 70, was pastor of the Metropolitan Methodist church of Detroit for 30 years.

Mrs. Chabut, one of his six children, makes her home in Northville on Sheldon road with her husband, Dr. V. George Chabut, four children and two regal-looking Dalmanis.

She earned her bachelor of arts degree at Wayne college, did graduate work at Wayne university and is a former teacher.

She is known mainly in North-

ville for her work each Christmas season as one of "Santa's" most unerring helpers — coordinating a gift program for the children at the Maybury sanatorium.

She began her book a few months after her father's death. His letters, diaries, sermons and her own memories provided her with stacks of research material.

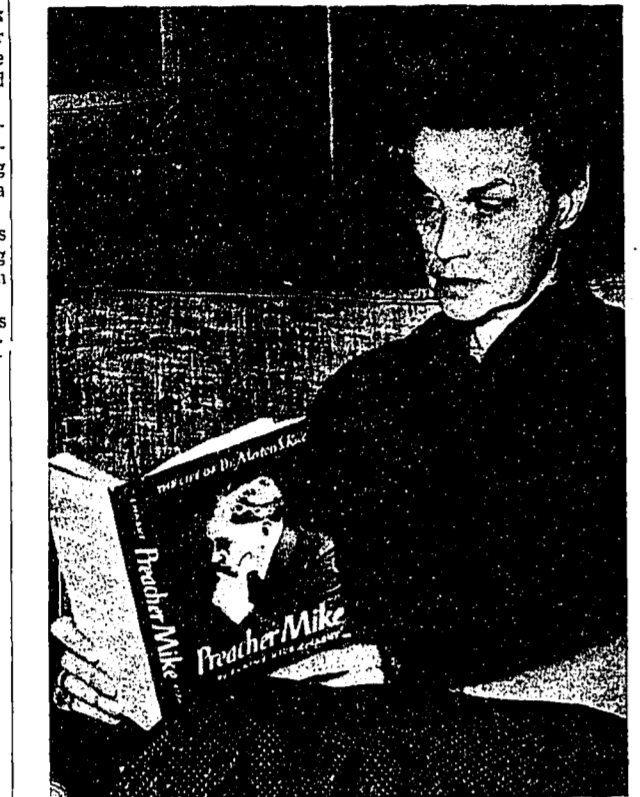
"Most of the work was done at night — and sometimes during the day," said the alert mother of four growing youngsters. "The bound volume is the result of seven re-writings — and each time I thought it was finished."

Retracing her father's life took Mrs. Chabut, her oldest daughter and her mother back to Kansas, the large birth, boyhood and first three churches.

Dr. Rice also served two churches in Iowa and nine years in the Northville Methodist church.

At the time of his death, his flock had grown to 7,000 — making the Metropolitan Methodist church a congregation of 200.

Mrs. Eaton to Review 'Bridge to the Sun'

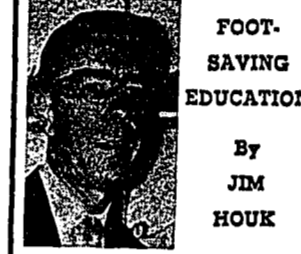
The Northville Women's club will meet tomorrow (Friday) at 2 p.m. at the Northville library.

SPEAKING for the Record

It shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone who witnessed the school board-Smith & Andrews hearing in Wayne county circuit court Friday that Judge Thomas J. Murphy handled more cases than any of Wayne county's 18 circuit judges last year.

The veteran of 30 years on the bench swiftly and skillfully disposed of the low-bidding construction firm's claim that the Northville school board acted wrongly in awarding the general contract for the new high school to Walter L. Couse & Company.

The hearing ended in five minutes on a clear point of law (see story on page one). Northville Attorney James Littell, although naturally happy to have the case dismissed, must have been somewhat crushed after many hours of preparation. His entire presentation was about four sentences long. It ended with a request for dismissal based on the law governing such matters in fourth class school districts.

Legally, the case is closed. But there are overtones that remain. And before jumping to any conclusions, every taxpayer who is concerned should look at all the facts fairly and soberly.

Let's examine the rather unique and unusual set of circumstances surrounding the proposed Northville high school from the very beginning.

More than a year ago voters of the school district approved a \$3 million bond issue to build a badly needed high school. Under the bond issue the board was also given permission to revamp the present high school for junior high school use and purchase property for another elementary school in the future.

About this same time the state was casting a critical eye our way and decided to boost our land and property values. Result: the state equalized valuation of our school district jumped from \$10 million to \$18 million in one year.

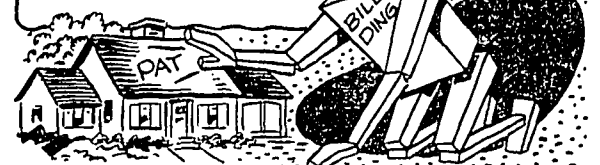

All this was almost too much for the taxpayer to consume. When he voted for the high school bond issue he was fairly certain how many more mills he would be expected to pay. But then, equalization, and in many cases assessments, came along. In some instances in the township taxes were doubled.

The situation became so difficult and perplexing that it prompted Roy Terrill, township treasurer, to write a letter to The Record. Too many people were paying their taxes under protest and expecting him to answer their grievances.

The huge jump in valuation enabled the school board to LOWER its tax mill rate and still obtain the extra dollars it needed. County and township mill rates remained the same as former years, thus the taxpayer was giving more to these agencies, too.

The taxpayer, burning under the new burden, hasn't been satisfied with answers complicated by terms such as "equalization" and "re-assessment". He has become ECONOMIC-MYNDING and wants to know how and where his tax dollar is being spent.

At one point during the school board's presentation of the proposed high school several citizens protested to its design. "Too expensive," they proclaimed.

After a meeting with the board they were partially, but not entirely, convinced that the new Northville high school was what the community wanted and needed, both educationally and financially.

The final touch to our story came when the school board awarded the general contract to the third bidder.

The situation was brought into sharper focus when Smith & Andrews, low bidder for the contract, challenged the board's decision and took them to court. The firm, through letters and an advertisement, appealed to the tax paying public for sympathy. They could hardly have found a more sympathetic audience when they asked "Mr. and Mrs. Northville Taxpayer" . . . "should you pay a \$21,000 premium?"

The low-bidding construction firm knows that it has no legal leg on which to stand. But its officials have asked this writer if he believes that the board was "morally" right in its choice.

To determine this let's put ourselves squarely in the position of the school board.

First of all, you must admit that every member of the board acted in good faith and to the best of his ability. The question must necessarily boil down to one of judgment. Ask yourself, "Did the board use good judgment in awarding the bid to Walter Couse?"

Is it morally wrong to select a contractor with whom you are thoroughly familiar . . . one who has demonstrated his ability locally and who also has deep community interests?

The question naturally arises as to how much value in dollars and cents can be placed on these factors. Especially when the lower bidder is admittedly a qualified contractor.

This much is certain. The school board, faced with the pressure of a difficult decision under the foregoing local circumstances, did not take the easy way out.

Each member, voting individually, decided upon himself that Northville would be financially ahead in the long run and that they would have a greater sense of security, if an individual with deep rooted local interest was building their high school.

After months of preparation and countless hours of study they decided that it was worth \$21,000 to have their final plans for this important structure in the hands of a community resident.

Before registering a complaint I hope that every taxpayer will place himself in the position of a board member and try to UNDERSTAND his reasoning.

Then if you believe the board has made a mistake in judgment, call it that and nothing more. It is no disgrace to be concerned over the expenditure of public funds and, if you are sincere, you deserve to be heard. Actually, the board should commend your interest.

On the other hand, those who agree with the board's action should not be silent. Let them know you stand behind them.

In the middle of the controversy stands the Walter L. Couse company. An innocent bystander, the Couse company submitted its best competitive bid and, upon selection, found itself haled into court.

As a local renter and a contractor who can sympathize with a losing bidder, Mr. Couse undoubtedly felt the pressure of the situation more keenly than anyone.

Strangely, his high personal integrity is principally responsible for the quandary. Had he not stood so high in the minds of the board members, the choice would not have been difficult.

Under the circumstances Northville's new high school will almost certainly receive extreme attention and supervision. Can't you just see a team of experts examining each brick for color, content and dimension?

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Michigan Mirror \$15 Million Coffee Break

THE POLITICAL HATCHET is being swung by Michigan's industrial and agricultural leaders against the state in an effort to interest other manufacturers, both large and small in settling in Michigan.

At a kickoff luncheon which sends some 200 of the state's leading industrial leaders "abroad", the emphasis was on a "unity of spirit". It was pointed out numerous times that what Michigan has to offer is much more important than disagreements within the state regarding the labor climate.

These positive factors were listed as: trained people; clean government; free of graft; one of the best educational systems in the world; a good and improving road system; the long coast line and wonderful supply of fresh water.

It was emphasized repeatedly that all Michigan citizens gain when the state secures a new industry; that everyone should be interested in seeing this accomplished.

MICHIGAN'S ECONOMY is developing the biggest issue of the 1938 legislative session.

Records show that thousands have been out of work in industry and the pinch of decreased buying power is being felt by businessmen on many streets.

Effect on state government is difficult to assess, because of conflicting claims of rival parties.

Republican finance experts are working to develop a policy which makes sense to them; when the people are forced to tighten their belts, state government should be reduced to the same.

Senator Elmer R. Porter (R-Blissfield) has charged that too many of Michigan's 30,000 employees are abusing coffee breaks and having breakfasts on the job. He says the practice costs the state \$15,000, 000 per year. Other GOP leaders have suggested that the number of state employees can be reduced by not replacing those who retire.

Administrators deny abuses; point out that the cost of corporate operation is upwards and the same must be expected in the case of public administration.

LABOR UNIONS are fighting against new controls in Michigan. There are bills in the legislature to prohibit the use of union dues money for political purposes, to outlaw the secondary boycott and to require audits of their funds, including pension and welfare money.

In the interests of partisan peace in an election year, most of the bills are expected to die — though nothing ever is certain in the legislature.

The audit of union funds bills are direct reflections of the Washington hearings which attacked Dave Beck, former Teamsters Union president.

The ban against the use of union funds for political purposes dates back to the 1936 election campaign when Republicans charged that Democrats used dues money improperly.

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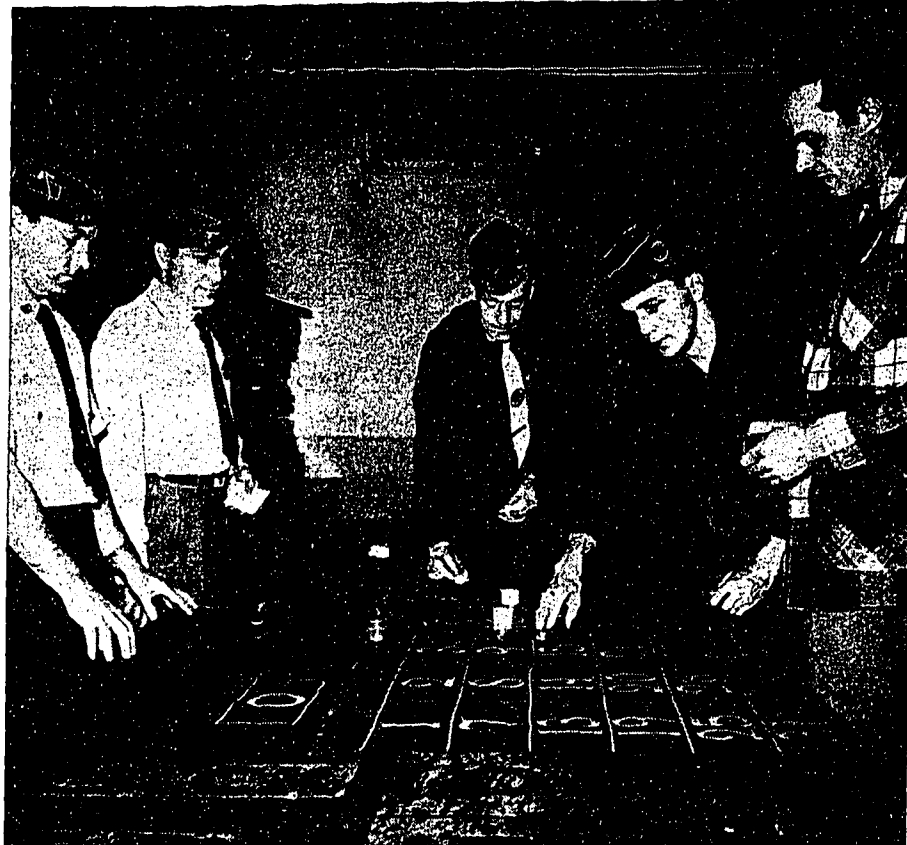

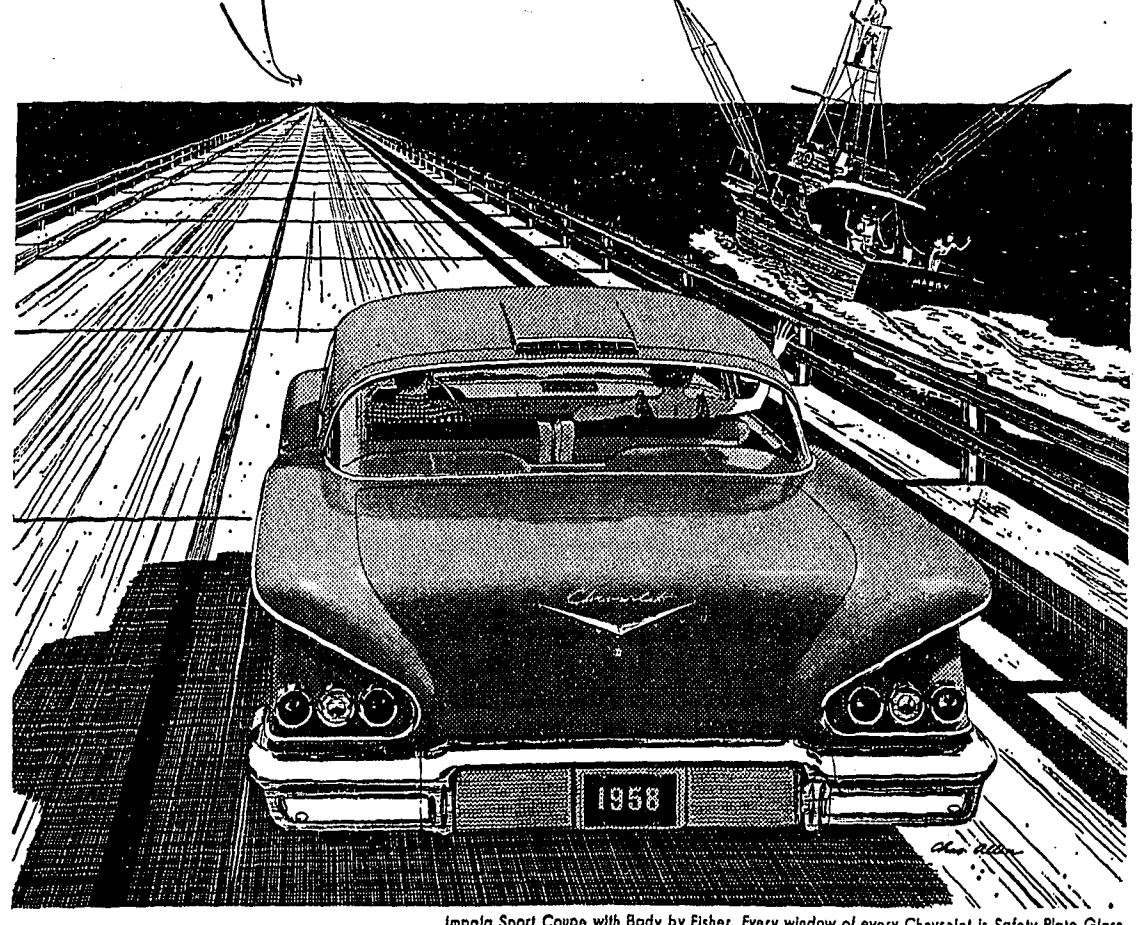
Lodge told Wayne county sheriff's officials that he was traveling north on Northville road at 40 miles per hour when struck by Parmenter's car, going east on Six Mile.
